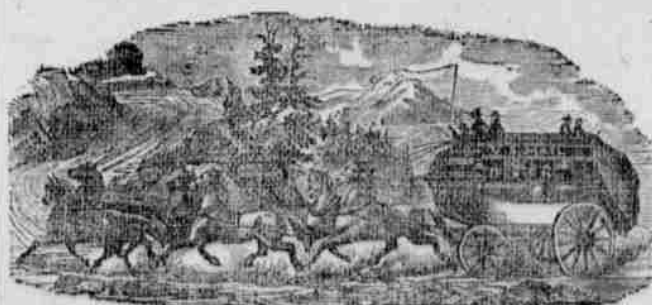

## TELEGRAPHIC ITEMS

The Senate passed the irrigation  
bill with scarcely a dissenting vote.

Immense destruction has been  
wrought by heavy storms in the mid-  
dle eastern states.

Edward Tuck, a wealthy Boston-  
ian, has established a free American  
hospital in Paris.

Capt. McClintock, a gallant rough  
rider and Arizona newspaper man  
has been appointed postmaster at  
Phoenix.

The sum of \$60,700,000 has been  
appropriated by the river and har-  
bor bill, of which California gets  
\$1,000,000.

John Kohs, a San Francisco baker  
who wassup for kissing a young lady  
has compromised the suit by the pay-  
ment of \$200.

King Edward has abandoned his  
proposed trip to Ireland, on account  
of the aggressive action of the Unit-  
ed Irish League.

The different Iron Works plants at  
Fall River, Mass., have voluntarily  
increased the pay of their mill hands  
from six to ten per cent.

The U. S. Government has commis-  
sioned the cruiser Cincinnati to  
cruise along the Atlantic coast and  
destroy all derelicts sighted.

The Bryn Mawr college girls have  
boycotted pie and doughnuts, and con-  
fine themselves more exclusively to  
rounds of roast beef and mutton.

Marconi claims to have success-  
fully received a message 1,500 miles  
distant, at sea, and that "ticks"  
were received 2000 miles distant.

A number of Barcelona strikers  
under arrest for participating in  
riots were shot at Fort Monjuich, on  
March 4, by order of the Government.

Many prominent members of Ox-  
ford University have united in sign-  
ing a memorial of protest against  
executing prominent Boer Generals.

A continuous line of blanket ore,  
eleven miles long, assaying one ounce  
and upward, has been discovered in  
the Ivory Gold Coast Fields, South  
Africa.

As an outcome of the Tillman-Mc-  
Laurin episode in the Senate, amend-  
ments to the Senate rules have been  
introduced by Senators Hoar and  
Platt.

The Chinese rebellion in Kwang Si  
province is spreading and the move-  
ment, which is growing serious, is  
said to be secretly fomented by the  
French.

The Signal Corps of the U. S. army  
have succeeded in sending wireless  
telephone messages, the words spok-  
en in a low tone being heard distinct-  
ly 480 feet distant.

The directors of the Charleston  
Exposition have renewed their invi-  
tation to President Roosevelt to visit  
the exposition, and denounce the  
action of Col. Tillman.

The London Spectator says that a  
wave of financial depression has  
struck the whole continent of Europe,  
and refers to the expansion of Amer-  
ican trade as the cause.

Four snow-slides at Telluride, Col-  
orado, recently did immense damage  
to the mines, and resulted in the loss  
of twenty-five lives, besides a number  
of men injured or missing.

As the result of an attempt to ar-  
rest a priest in his church, at Bord-  
nikie, Russian Poland, a fight ensued  
between the peasants and the police,  
in which several men were killed.

A gigantic revolutionary plot by  
the socialist leaders in Italy has  
just been unearthed and defeated, on  
the eve of its culmination. Hundreds  
of thousands of railroad employes and  
other laborers were enrolled in the  
organization.

It is claimed that the Rothschilds  
own a half interest in the London  
Times, which explains why the  
"thunderer" is for the first time  
violating all its former traditions in  
supporting Lord Rosebery, a Liberal,  
who married into the Rothschild  
family.

The Maui Hotel is doing a good business this week. Peterman is a successful bouffant, and his special Sunday dinners are good enough to eat.

A band of Honolulu elks were sighted on Tuesday's Kinohi, headed by Hilo to install a new lodge of the Antlered brotherhood at the Crescent City.

Rehearsals for the concert for the benefit of the M. A. A's, are being held frequently, although the event will not probably come off before the first week in April.

The Wailuku Plantation will probably buy some of the mules of the Hamoa Plantation. The balance of the personal property of the plantation, and also the mill are for sale.

It is to be hoped that the citizens of Wailuku will press the matter of petitioning the Board of Health to macadamize our streets, which become disgracefully muddy in rainy weather.

There have been quite a number of visitors in Wailuku this week, who have not been here for a year or more past, and their favorable comments on the growth of the town are quite flattering to our civic pride.

Steps are being taken to bring a supply of water from east Maui to central Maui sugar plantations although some months will elapse before active work is begun, as all labor available is now needed in the cane.

The matter of planting new varieties of seed potatoes in Kula is being pushed by Mr. Sedgwick, although it is a question in the minds of some experienced potato raisers as to whether the present is the best time to plant.

Owing to the inclemency of the weather, and the absence of some who were expected, the citizens did not hold the meeting called for last Tuesday evening, to discuss the proposition of macadamizing the streets of Wailuku.

A thunder storm swept the crest of Haleakala on last Monday morning, and when the wind drove the clouds away shortly afterward, the summit and far down on the side of the crater was covered with an unusually heavy fall of snow.

An auction sale of about fifty broken and unbroken horses and mules will be held at the Waioli ranch today. W. O. Aiken will do the "holerlin". Another auction sale of stock will be held at Wailuku shortly. Col. W. H. Cornwell is the seller.

Mr. W. F. Pogue is preparing to devote considerable attention to poultry raising at Nalihi. His former experience in this line of business will stand him in good stead, and as choice poultry realizes \$12.00 per dozen, and eggs 50 cents per dozen, he should find the venture a profitable one.

## Athletic Notes.

The absence of Mr. Crook from among the players was much felt, as he is a first class poloist. However he is training for the foot races in Honolulu, to be run next Saturday, and did not care to stiffen his joints by hard riding.

On Sunday afternoon, the M. A. A. and the Morning Star baseball teams crossed bats at Wells Park, and a rattling game followed, won by the Morning Stars with a score of 19 to 12. The continued success of the Morning Stars is principally owing to the fact that the M. A. A's have not a full team at present, and have to play a lot of new men, to fill up their nine.

### Miss Rose Davison Visits Maui.

Miss Rose Davison, school agent at Honolulu, who won golden opinions for school work on Hawaii by her excellent management of the Hawaiian school exhibit at Buffalo, was a visitor on Maui this week, having come over on the Claudine, and returned via Lahaina on yesterday's Kinohi.

She kindly accorded the News an interview, in which she spoke fully and enthusiastically of her experiences at the Buffalo Exposition. She said among other things, that the Lahaina and other industrial work exhibited was a source of perpetual surprise to the many teachers who visited the Hawaiian display, and the pupils of the high schools could hardly credit the fact that much of the work exhibited was done in the primary grades.

Miss Davison states that the Buffalo Exhibit of the Hawaiian schools was turned over to commissioner Harris, and by him installed at the Charleston Exposition at government expense, where it now is, in charge of Mr. Boykin of Buffalo.

Miss Davison's attention was called to the rickety condition of the Wailuku school building, and she stated that she would try and help along the movement for a new school building this summer.

### Maui Monthly Magazine.

The News extends kindly greeting to a new publication on Maui, with the above title. It is a ten page mimeograph published in the Japanese language, save the first page which is published in the English language. The purpose of the magazine is the moral elevation of the Japanese on Maui, and under the editorial management of Rev. Sichi Tanaka will doubtless accomplish much good.

The following leader, in English explains quite fully the scope and purpose of the publication.

"After our Talkyodendo, (special Evangelical forward movement,) which lasted one week, God gave us thirty-three conversions and forty-nine seekers or enquirers at Wailuku First Congregational Church, Japanese. The young men of the Y. M. C. A., having received spiritual strength by this effort, were moved to try and publish a Monthly Magazine with Christian and temperance principles, by which all the new converts and enquirers will be led to the marvelous light of Christianity. So, by the kindness of Miss Malone who loaned us the "Kindergarten" room for one evening, we gave an entertainment with stereopticon views showing pictures of Japanese life. The same entertainment was given at Spreckelsville and elsewhere on the island clearing thirty-five dollars. With this money we purchased a Mimeograph, which is our printing press.

"Talkyodendo, have been held at Spreckelsville, Pala, Hamakua, and other places on this island. God blessed them all and gave us eighty-

## BY AUTHORITY.

### NOTICE.

RULES AND REQUIREMENTS for Aerial Circuits for Electric Light, Power or Railway, Telephone or Telegraphic Circuits on Public Roadways and Highways.

In the construction of aerial circuits for the above purposes, the following rules and requirements must be observed on and after this date:

### POLES.

1. Application must be made on proper blanks to the Superintendent of Public Works for permission to erect.
2. Use of poles is limited to the purpose for which they are erected.
3. Poles erected within town or city limits, other than those for electric railway purposes must not be less than forty feet in length and twelve inches in diameter at butt.
4. Space between poles must not exceed 100 feet.
5. Poles subjected to special strains must be properly guyed or braced. Guy lines are not to be secured to trees.
6. Poles must be stamped with owner's name and numbered.
7. Private signal lines must not be placed on poles for public service without permission.
8. Where curb lines are established, poles are to be placed inside of and tangent to the curb line.

### CROSS ARMS.

1. Must be chamfered.
2. For high potential lines should be dipped in oil.
3. When carrying more than two lines must be braced with galvanized iron braces.
4. Must be secured with galvanized iron bolts; not lag screws.
5. Where lines are dead-ended double cross-arms should be used.

### WIRES.

1. Main conductors for electric light or power on roads and highways must not be less than No. 6, B. & S.
2. Service wires on roads and highways must not be less than No. 6, B. & S.; in private grounds not less than No. 8, B. & S., and rubber covered.
3. Electric light and power lines must be kept clear of foliage. Supply companies are responsible for lines on roads and highways, and owners on private grounds.
4. The lower limit of wires on roads and highways is that of the electric railway trolley wire, twenty one feet above the level of the track.
5. Where wires for various purposes are run on the same poles, or lines cross, the following order will be kept, beginning with the highest:
  - (a) Signal wires.
  - (b) Telephone and telegraph.
  - (c) High potential alternating current.
  - (d) Arc light.
  - (e) Low potential alternating current.
  - (f) Direct current, constant potential.
6. Telephone and similar wires must be protected by dead insulated guard irons or wires from possibility of contact with other conducting wires. Must not be placed on same cross arm with electric light or power wires, and when placed on same poles with such wires the distance between the inside pins on each cross-arm must not be less than twenty six inches.
7. Wires crossing flat roofs must clear same by at least seven feet. Wires crossing pitched roofs must clear ridge over which they pass, or to which they are attached by at least one foot.
8. Service wires must be run as nearly as possible in horizontal lines from poles to point of attachment to buildings.
9. All joints in all wires must be soldered.

### INSULATORS.

1. All insulators for high potential circuits must be of glass and triple petticoat.
2. Insulators for other electric light and power circuits must be glass and double petticoat.
3. Service wires for electric light or power, where secured to the outside of buildings, must be carried on double petticoat, glass insulators. The term "high potential" covers any current between 550 volts and 3,500 volts.

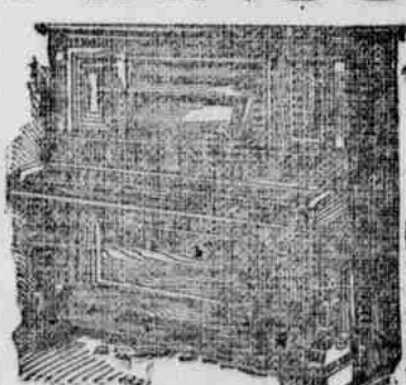

## FOREIGN NEWS

### Russia Preparing for War.

LONDON, March 10.—In a dispatch  
dated Shanghai, the correspondent  
of the Standard says that Chinese  
merchants coming from Port Arthur  
declare they have been ordered to  
remove their families from Port  
Arthur, because preparations were  
being made by the Russians there for  
a war with Japan.

### Fighting in Manchuria.

TR. PETERSBURG, March 13.—A  
dispatch received here today at the  
War Office announced that another  
fight occurred March 3 between Rus-  
sian troops and 3000 Tunguses, north  
of Hudbandy, Manchuria. Two hun-  
dred Tunguses were killed, including  
their leader. Two Russians were  
wounded.

### Moody Succeeds Long.

WASHINGTON, March 10.—The third  
change in the Cabinet of President  
Roosevelt occurred when Secretary  
Long submitted his resignation in a  
felicitous letter, it being accepted in  
one equally felicitous by the President.  
The change was made complete by the  
selection of Representative William  
Henry Moody of the Sixth Congres-  
sional District of Massachusetts as  
Long's successor in the Navy De-  
partment.

### Nicaraguan Route Chosen.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—The  
Senate Committee on the Isthmian  
Canal today decided by a vote of 7 to  
4 to report the Hepburn bill provid-  
ing for the construction of an isth-  
mian canal via the Nicaragua route.  
The action of the committee was  
taken at a called meeting held dur-  
ing the afternoon, and came as a  
brief report by Senator Morgan,  
chairman of the committee, detailing  
the results of a conference with Sec-  
retary Hay as to the status of diplo-  
matic negotiations with the Central  
American republics concerning the  
canal.

### Altgeld is Dead.

JOLIET, ILL., March 12.—Former  
Governor John P. Altgeld died at the  
Hotel Monroe this morning at 7:09  
o'clock. After becoming unconscious,  
shortly after midnight, he remained  
in that condition until death. At 3:10  
o'clock this morning, it was though  
he had died, but he revived, and from  
that time until shortly before the end  
showed wonderful vitality, although  
he made no move.

### Governor Dole Invited to Washington.

WASHINGTON, March 6.—As the  
result of two conferences with George  
R. Carter of Hawaii, the President  
today wired to San Francisco, to  
catch the steamer Coptic for Hon-  
olulu, a dispatch to Governor San-  
ford B. Dole, requesting him to come  
to Washington at his earliest con-  
venience to discuss Hawaiian mat-  
ters. Governor Dole some time ago  
expected to come here of his own  
motion, but later appeared to have  
changed his mind. The situation in  
Hawaii is so complicated that the  
President wants the best light ob-  
tainable on the subject. From the  
latest indications the President will  
take no radical steps in dealing with  
island politics, and talk of a clean  
sweep of executive and judicial offi-  
cials there is unwarranted.  
Carter will remain in this country  
until after Governor Dole's arrival  
at Washington.

### Miss Roosevelt Went Go.

NEW YORK, March 7.—Alice Roose-  
velt will not see King Edward of Eng-  
land crowned. The President has  
decided that for a young girl she has  
been too much in the public eye of  
late, and so she must stay at home.  
The report that she would not grace  
the coronation came first from Lon-  
don, where it was printed in the  
London Times. Later it was learned  
that the London rumor was true,  
and that for domestic reasons the  
President and Mrs. Roosevelt had  
decided to keep Miss Alice a little  
more in the background.

### Russian Internal Dissensions.

LONDON, March 6.—A correspond-  
ent of the Daily News, wiring from  
Copenhagen, says that the authentic  
reports have reached there from St.  
Petersburg that the revolutionary  
movement is spreading in all direc-  
tions and assuming serious propor-  
tions. The latest has reached many  
portions of Siberia.

## SHIPPING NEWS

The American Shipping Co. are  
very much in earnest in the matter  
of establishing a freight route be-  
tween Maui and Honolulu, and if they  
give prompt service, they will build  
up a large trade.

Kahului presents a very lively ap-  
pearance at present, and as all the  
central Maui mills are all running  
steadily, an immense amount of sugar  
is being shipped.

The Gasoline schooner "Eclipse"  
under charter to the American Ship-  
ping Co., was expected at Kahului  
yesterday, but did not arrive on  
Schedule time.

The Atlantic Liner Etruria, which  
broke at shaft in mid-ocean, was  
safely towed to Horta, in the Azores.

The S. S. Hyades will be due in  
Kahului again about April 15.
