HOW ROOSEVELT STICKS TO TRUTH

(Special Correspondence of THE INDEPENDENT, by Charles A. Edwards.)

WASHINGTON, D. C. Jan. 2:

Addressing Yale students, Rev Dr
Rainsford said:

"Mr Roosevelt has earned the
thanks of this country for the good
he has done in telling the truth.

"The man who tells the truth and
sticks to it does the most lasting
good, whether he tells that truth at
the dinner table or in public."

Did Mr Roosevelt tell the truth
when, in his "Life of Thomas H Ben-
ton," he agreed with political econo-
mists that protection "is vicious in
theory and harmful in practice?"
Then did he stick to it when he ad-
vocated a protective tariff wherein
the duty should be "more than"
equal to the cost of wages abroad
and at home?

Did he tell the truth in his Cin-
cinnati speech on September 20,
1902, when he said that the tariff
did not foster trusts, and asserted
that the anthracite trust was not
protected by tariff duties? Did he
stick to it when in his message of
December, 1902, he admitted that
the tariff can produce monopoly,
and recommended the removal of
the tariff on anthracite coal?

Did he tell the truth when, in his
speech at Logansport, Ind, he ad-
mitted that the tariff might need
revision, and when in his message of
December, 1902, he said that it was
important that a tariff commission
be appointed? Did he stick to it
when he later adopted the "stand
pat" policy and showed his utter
contempt for the tariff question by
ignoring it in his latest message to
Congress?

Did he tell the truth when he re-
jected the little gift of a silken flag
woven by the hands of a patriotic
American girl on the ground that
the President of the United States
should not receive gifts? Did he
stick to it when he accepted free of
all cost special trains at the hands
of railroad magnates?

Did he tell the truth when in his
"Ranch Life and Hunting Trail," he
said that the "cowboys are much
better fellows and more pleasant
companions than small farmers and
agricultural laborers; nor are the
mechanics and workmen of the
great cities to be mentioned in the
same breath?" Did he stick to it
when he came to appeal for the
votes of the small farmers, the agri-
cultural laborers and the mechanics
and workmen of the great cities?

Did he tell the truth when he said
he would strictly enforce the civil
service laws of the country? Did
he stick to it when he made one of
his own appointees as Civil Service
Commissioner tear up a report he had
written recommending the dismissal
the Philadelphia postmaster for
just cause and flagrant violation of
the law, simply because he was
afraid of Matt Quay?

Representative J. Adam Bede, of
Minnesota, is the very essence of
frankness, and he tells republican

HIS TIME IS OUT.

The position of assessor is still filled by Mr. Pratt. It is true that he is in charge of the land office, but there is nothing in the law which prevents him from holding two commissions as long as he only draws one salary. Assessor Pratt can only be removed for cause. Therefore, though Treasurer Kepoikai has the appointment of assessor, he cannot make it until Mr. Pratt resigns or is removed. It looks very much as if Mr. Pratt had the situation in his own hands.—Star.

Nonsense! Mr. Pratt's commission as tax assessor went a-glimmering at the time he was tendered and accepted a commission as head of the land bureau. He was requested by Treasurer Kepoikai, who is the appointing power, to hold the tax office down until Jan. 4; when it was expected that the County Act would go into effect. Mr. Pratt left the office on the afternoon of January 3 for good and all, but was again requested to hold it down until the County Act case was decided. This he did until the adverse decision was handed down by the Supreme Court on January 13. He was again requested to hold down the office until a permanent assessor might be selected, which he has done and is now doing. Treasurer Kepoikai might just as easily have selected any other citizen to hold down the office.

IS COURTING TROUBLE.

Superintendent Holloway will be laying up troubles for himself on earth should he continue to employ Marston Campbell, even as supervising engineer of special contracts. The Legislature has already expressed its opinion of Campbell, in no uncertain terms, and Mr. Holloway must be aware of the fact. He was voted out of office, yet, in spite of the wishes of the representatives of the people, has been retained ever since, and the legislators will not overlook this open disregard of their orders. Most of the blame will fall on Cooper, but Holloway should take a word of warning. He will find that Governor Carter pays more attention to the legislative desire than did his predecessor, for Carter has sense enough to recognize the fact that legislators are selected by the people and act, presumably, as their constituents direct. Should Carter choose to be at loggerheads with the Legislature he will have his hands full and find that his opponents are equally as strenuous as he is. But we predict that he will not allow Holloway, or anybody else, to buck the law-makers.

Governor Begins Campaign.

Active politics have begun early this year. The first ball of the campaign has been started rolling by Governor Carter himself, aided by "Jack, the Jollier", during the present gubernatorial excursion to Hawaii. Whether the Spring spell-binding will be of sufficiently lasting effect to endure until next Fall remains to be seen. Usually a short campaign and a merry one has been the rule. But this is a Presidential year and it may be felt that strenuous efforts are needed on behalf of our strenuous President. Anyhow the Hawaiian taxpayers will foot the expense bill out of the Executive incidental funds, which allow a certain amount annually for the Governor's traveling expenses. An accurate record of the Governor's speeches would be interesting, as well as those confidential talks indulged in by the "Jollier", when the kid Secretary thinks he succeeds in making his listener believe he is the whole cheese. Still, the incident of the political trip will make good Home Rule campaign material and the good folks of Hilo will have gazed upon a real, live "Guvner".

Helping The Home Rulers

Republicans are making excellent campaign material for the Home Rulers and adding fuel for their November cremation day by day. It is only necessary to keep a record of their appointments since they came into power—to show how many Hawaiians have been turned out of office—how many have been promised jobs and then been left in the cold for haoles—how many have been insulted as though they had no feelings—how many have been compelled to wrestle with the problem of procuring food on nothing a day, while the white man

waxed fat. Governor Carter seems to have forgotten his desire, expressed two months ago, to be mindful of the needs of the Hawaiians, to get into closer touch with them and to do something for them. Of all the appointments he has made since becoming Governor, we can recall but one given to a Hawaiian and that was a member of the Board of Health—a position without pay. If this is to be his method of Americanizing the Hawaiians, then God help the Hawaiians!

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

In ruling that the subsidy to the hospital for incurables is illegal we think Attorney General Andrews has missed one important point. Alexander Young and the other philanthropists who put up the money for the grounds and buildings had a distinct understanding with the Government that if they supplied the hospital property the Government would subsidize it. We do not believe this contract (and it was a contract) can be arbitrarily broken as is proposed by the Attorney General.

The Republican party has ousted the poor Hawaiians, who were burned out in the plague fires in 1900, from their refuge at Kalihi camp. They have been forced to seek shelter in other parts of the city, many of them going to Kakaako and Iwilei. In the last campaign these people supported the Republican ticket on the promise that they would not be compelled to leave the camp, which, during the past four years, had come to be regarded by them as their home. The incident shows what little dependence can be placed by Hawaiians in Republican promises and how little the natives can expect from that party. Throwing poor people out into the streets these wet, cold nights is an outrage that only the Republican party of these Islands would perpetrate.

It is true that the position of assessor is still held by Jim Pratt, but he is only doing it upon the request of Treasurer Kepoikai. When he failed in the County elections, he was given another position, not because he was still in office, but because he was out of office; and in order to recompense him for past patriotic (?) services, he was rewarded with the office of Land Commissioner, vice E. S. Boyd, resigned. The Star says that he "can only be removed for cause." Sure; the cause is his unpopularity. But it is simply silly to say that Treasurer Kepoikai cannot appoint another until he "resigned or is removed." Why, he was as good as resigned and removed when he failed of election and since received another appointment in place of the one he lost in the shuffle. He cannot hold two positions, even if he only drew one salary for both, and being out, he should stay out and not hold it down to prevent another from getting into it. Even if he didn't actually resign, we hold that he has virtually resigned by implication, and

only the voidance of the County Act made it look that he should take charge again, only temporarily, till one is appointed to fill the vacancy, and that is the situation today. That Pratt is out is as clear as daylight.

It seems to us that the amount of home study required of a child should be dictated and regulated by the school teacher. Much depends upon the physical condition of the pupil and still more upon his or her disposition and susceptibility or lack of susceptibility. A teacher should, upon beginning a school term, learn as speedily as possible the traits, eccentricities and abilities, if you please, of every youngster to be instructed; and act from and upon that knowledge. No set rule can be laid down for the proper training of a school of children. The INDIVIDUAL must be worked upon. Some will advance faster than others and give less time to study at that. Some pupils, equally as healthy as others, cannot stand as much study. A school is, in this respect, much like a hospital. While there is a general supervision over the whole, the particular case of each "patient" must be treated. "Symptoms" are hardly ever the same in a grade of, say, forty, and the "medicine" of the teacher must vary accordingly—precisely as in a hospital.
