## Republican Party

IS OWNED

By the Trusts.

The Iowa Republican Convention's platform has given a shock of alarm to the leaders and organs of the party.

The Iowa platform declines to regard the Dingley tariff as a sacred thing, criticism of which should be punished as blasphemy.

"We favor any modification of the tariff schedules that may be required to prevent their affording shelter to monopoly," say the resolutions, which also declare for legal action, of the Roosevelt kind, to curb the trusts. And further: "We favor such amendment of the Interstate Commerce act as will more fully carry out its prohibition of discriminations of rate-making."

The importance of this Republican pronouncement does not lie in any real hope it inspires for national party action against the trusts, through reform of the tariff and regulation of the railroads, but in the confession it makes.

The Iowa Republicans admit that the tariff shelters monopoly, and that railroad discriminations foster the trusts.

The Republican party, in possession of both houses of Congress, the Presidency and all departments of the Federal Government, with full power to revise the tariff, to strengthen the Interstate Commerce Commission and to proceed in the courts against the trust monopolies as criminals, has done none of these things.

By necessary inference the Iowa Republicans confess that the Democrats are right when they arraign and condemn the Republican party for refusing to legislate against the trusts and in the interest of the pillaged people.

It is that confession which alarms the leaders of the dominant party. They are affected much as the captain and mates of an old-time pirate brig would have been had the news come from the fore-castle that a portion of the crew had held a meeting and passed resolutions in favor of honest commerce and against buccaneering.

The politicians who controlled the Iowa Convention would not this year, as last, have exclaimed against the trusts and discriminating railroads, and spoken for tariff reform, were it not that upon these subjects a large proportion of their constituents think and feel as Democrats rather than as Republicans.

There is nothing that the Republican leaders dread more than an agitation for tariff reform, and they especially dread any signs of such an agitation springing up anywhere within the party. From President Roosevelt down they are against meddling with the tariff.

Why?

For the good reason that the trusts, with all the other protected interests backing them, want the tariff to remain as it is.

AND AS THE TRUSTS OWN THE REPUBLICAN PARTY, IT IS OBVIOUS THAT THE REPUBLICAN PARTY WILL DO NOTHING THAT THE TRUSTS DO NOT WANT DONE.

In order to keep the votes of the farmers of the Middle West, the Re-

REPUBLICAN PROSPERITY.

From all sides comes the same story of hard times. Workingmen in the United States repeat the same song which is being sung in this Territory: "Work is slack, Money is Scarce." A financial depression prevails all over the mainland. Strikes of fantastic proportions are now on, involving \$100,000,000 and more together with a large army of working men. Wages are being lowered while the cost of living increases.

If a Democratic Administration were at the helm of the nation, a unanimous howl would be heard from Republican newspapers, calling upon the popular vote to defeat the party in power and send Republicans in their place. Democrats would be held responsible for all the ills afflicting the country. But, unfortunately, the Democrats are not in power, they have not been for some years back, and so the blame must be put upon some other shoulders.

The Republican Party is certainly responsible for the present troubles; the Republican party is responsible for the Food Trust which has raised the cost of living so as to render it prohibitory.

The Republican party is responsible for the Coal Trust which refuses to deal with workingmen in a fair and just manner, has brought about a strike which up to date has cost upwards of \$75,000,000, has raised the price of coal to \$10 and \$12 a ton, and has called upon the troops to bully and strike down men whose only crime is to stand for their rights and claim their right to live.

The Republican party is responsible

ble for all the Trusts which today own and govern the country to their best interests but to the detriment of the laboring and consuming classes. Thousands upon thousands of young able bodied men are idle today on the streets of all the big cities in the United States. The Republican party is responsible for their idleness and poverty. It has sent them thousands of miles away to civilize and Americanize a people who neither wanted to be civilized or Americanized and has kept them there several years shooting down Filipinos, burning churches, devastating the country. These young men who had good positions when called upon to defend the flag which was not attacked, are being discharged today, and left to take care of themselves.

In spite of the blessing of "Protection and Prosperity," there is no work for them and they move from place to place hardly able to make both ends meet for a living.

Neither of these evils can be remedied by the Republican party. The Food Trust, the Coal Trust, the Sugar Trust nor any other trust can be destroyed by the Republican party for the simple reason that that party is the creator and the protector of the trusts.

Moreover, the Republican party is owned by the Trusts. Now, what are the people of this Territory going to do at the polls, will they support that party or not? We shall see!

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

May we ask the Honorable H. E. Cooper if he took advantage of the fact that U. S. Senator Burton came down with him on the Sierra, to relate some missionary tale of woe to the Senatorial Commission? It would have been so very natural!

Report has it that ex Senator Thurston's mission here is coupled with some scheme up his sleeves. Aside from this scheme, which we don't know at present, he has come here as the private attorney of those in opposition to the Kohala Ditch bill, and furthermore, he's after Haywood's job. Eh!

In presence of the present monetary stringency it's up to the Governor to renew some of the liquor licenses that have expired or are about to expire thereby replenishing a depleted Treasury. Or will the Anti-Saloon League render help by presenting to the Territorial Treasury the salaries of its officers?

By inaugurating, in her paper, a campaign of personalities and defamation, Mrs. R. W. Wilcox creates a bad precedent, and which may, sooner or later, recoil and be used against her. Fight for principles, but not for personalities, "Princess!" But then, she may be a hardened sinner not to mind the flaunting of personalities in the air.

Now that the wheels of justice, as practiced by our Circuit Courts, are clogged, shortage of funds being the cause, what are the judges going to do about it? Not very long ago one of them decried against the Fire Claims Commission, because it saw fit to go out of its way to borrow money so that its work may not be cut off short, and now the same condition has happened to

them. Will they insist upon the Governor the necessity of calling an extra session of the Legislature?

Senator Burton, the advance guard of the Senatorial Commission, arrived this morning in the Sierra. We hope that our missionary friends will respect the majesty of the U. S. Senate, and will keep their hands off of the Commission. Senator Burton and his colleagues know their business, and will know where to call for information, when necessary.

Jas. W. Girvin proposes the name of W. H. Rice as a good candidate for the Delegateship. Which Mr. Rice, please? Is it the Hon. W. H. Rice of Lihue, Kauai, or the Rev. W. H. Rice, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League? If the latter, we can assure Mr. Girvin that he would make an ideal candidate—to be snowed under such an avalanche of votes that he wouldn't know where he is at. And if the former, well, that is another tale.

It is said has been urged and advanced by some that had the last Legislature passed the Loan Act which was introduced at the eleventh hour, the present hard times would not have overtaken us. We very much doubt it. The Republican minority in the last Legislature played politics by obstructive tactics, aided and abetted by the Governor, and the Home Rule majority played them the same game in retaliation. A measure of such importance should have been introduced at the beginning of the session, but introducing it as it did at the eleventh hour it received its just deserts. What is good for one is just as good for another.

During the last Legislature, while it was in session and even after it had adjourned, THE INDEPENDENT urgently advocated the necessity of calling an extra session. It felt and knew at the time what would follow and the country today is up against it. Home Rulers have been blamed for the present stringency and depression now staring us in the face, but it should not alone rest there. In our opinion the main blame should rest on the Executive, for had the Governor listened to the suggestion and advice of this mite, there might probably have been some relief, but as it is we are now suffering through his stubbornness and pure cussedness. The Governor was assisted in his course by the arbitrary tactics and antics of our local Republicans, backed by our monied missionary merchants and money lenders. Had they given way a little, things might be better than what they are at present.

### Latest News Items of Interest From Other Lands

#### CALIFORNIA'S GOVERNOR ARRESTED.

San Francisco, Aug. 14—John D Spreckels and W S Leake, proprietor and manager respectively of The Call, were arrested yesterday under the new warrants issued from Wilmington Township, Los Angeles County, on complaints filed by Henry T Gage. Both were released at once under bonds. Gage was placed under arrest at Los Angeles by Detective Thomas Gibson of San Francisco on the warrant issued in San Francisco upon the complaint sworn to by John D Spreckels charging him with criminal libel. He at once went before Judge Shaw and petitioned for a writ of habeas corpus. He was ordered released on bail, to appear in court today, when the case will be continued to such time as arguments can be heard on both sides.

#### CUMANA IS ATTACKED.

Port of Spain, August 13—The Venezuelan revolutionists are attacking Cumana and intend to storm the city within twenty-four hours. The government cannot oppose more than 350 men to the 1,100 revolutionists composing the attacking party. Cumana is a town of about 10,000 inhabitants, situated in the State of Bermudez, on the Gulf of Cariaco.

#### UNITED AGAIN.

Lisbon, August 13—May Yohe and "Major" Putnam Bradlee Strong are united once more.

They are living happily together in apartments at the Avenida Palace Hotel here and are registered as Mr and Mrs Atkinson.

#### HERE ON SECRET MISSION.

San Francisco, Aug 14—Former United States Senator John M Thurston of Nebraska, one of the Republican leaders of the Senate at the time war was declared against Spain is at the Palace on his way to Honolulu. Mr Thurston, who now has law offices in the national capital, leaves for Honolulu today. He says he has nothing to do with former Queen Liliuokalani's claim to the Hawaiian crown lands, which are now part of the United States public domain. When asked if his trip to Honolulu was for the purpose of consummating a big sugar plantation deal, with which the sugar trust may or may not have some connection, he said:

"I am going to Honolulu on private business for clients of mine. There is nothing sensational or mysterious about my trip, but I must decline to talk of my clients' business in a newspaper interview."

#### SLAIN BY HIS SON.

Ottumwa (Ia.), August 13—J H Sims, a wealthy farmer, was shot and killed by his son today. Sims Sr, while intoxicated, made a vicious attack upon his wife with a butcher knife and the son interfered just in time to save her life.

#### DEMOCRATIC TEXT BOOK

Washington, August 13—The Democratic text book will be issued next week. It was held back in order that a few chapters might be added dealing with the sins of omission in the Republican text-book, which, for reasons best known to the leaders of that party, said nothing about Cuban reciprocity or revision of the tariff, but did contain a chapter in defense of the protected trusts.

The Democratic book is full of good material for spellbinders and will have an enormous circulation.

#### PREACHER KILLS TWO MEN.

Nashville (Tenn.), August 13—News of a double tragedy reached here tonight. Two brothers, John

and William Tramwell, were killed by the Rev W H Duncan, a Baptist minister, whom they assaulted following a quarrel in which John Tramwell charged the Rev Mr Duncan with being too intimate with his wife.

Duncan denied the charge, but the brothers repeated it and then assaulted the minister with clubs, beating him severely on the head. He managed to break from them and walked away, warning the men not to continue their assault. They followed him, however, and started to renew the assault, when Duncan drew his revolver and fired, killing both.

#### Conference Brings Results.

As a result of a conference between Governor Dole and the three Circuit Judges, which was held yesterday afternoon a way has been found by which probably money will be secured to carry on the work of the Court. This is by paying back to the general expense fund the amounts already paid to the bailiffs appointed by the judges and amounting to about \$4,500 leaving that sum to be used for the general expenses of the Supreme and Circuit Courts.

publican politicians of the region will adopt the Iowa plan of TALKING tariff reform and war upon the trusts, but while the Republican party remains in power at Washington there will be no genuine tariff reform—no changes in the Dingley schedules to which the trusts refuse assent.

The denial of justice to Cuba by a Republican Congress at the command of the beet sugar lobby and the Sugar Trust proves the baselessness of any hope that there can be obtained from the Republican party "any modification of the tariff schedules that may be required to prevent their affording shelter to monopoly."

The purpose of the Republican tariff is to afford shelter to monopoly.

The Iowa Republicans may TALK tariff reform, but the national bosses at Washington will take very good care that no harm shall come to the trusts through the action of a Republican Congress.

Talk is cheap. As President Roosevelt says:

"Words are good if they are backed up by deeds, and only so."

And that well stated truth applies to Mr. Roosevelt, summer trust-hunter, with no less force than to his trust-owned party when it talks about depriving monopoly of the shelter of the tariff.

How about the FOOD TRUST, for example?

Though the whole country called for a removal of the tariff duties which shelter the worst monopolies from competition, there was no response from President Roosevelt, and the Republican Congress strangled the bills, introduced by Democrats, that, if passed, would have at once relieved the American people from the Food Trust's robbery.
