SHIPPING NOTES.

The bark Stillman B. Allen, from New York to Honolulu, was spoken Feb. 27th, in lat. 22 N., long. 36 W.

The bktne Selina arrived at San Francisco on April 8th, 18 days from Honolulu.

The bark D. C. Murray brought a large cargo of general merchandise. The bktne Eureka brought 13 safes, gasoline, naphtha, and a large assortment of groceries, hardware, etc.

The s.s. Coptic brought 503 pkgs fruits, medicine, etc., and 73,004 pkgs in transit.

The bktne Ella brought 4,807 red wood posts, 175 bales hay, 3,312 sacks bran, oats, flour, etc., 175 doors and 2,168 pkgs gen mdse.

The Brit. s.s. Coptic, Capt. Kidley, arrived yesterday, 12 days from Yokohama, having left Hongkong on the 28th ult. She is anchored off port. She brought 1191 Chinese, of whom 586 for this port and the balance for British Columbia. She leaves to-day at 5 p.m. for San Francisco.

The bktne Ella, Capt. Kirk, arrived on Tuesday evening, 16 days from San Francisco. Fine weather the entire passage. She left together with the Eureka and Murray, but arrived 9 hours later. The Lilly Grace was to leave 2 days after for this port, via Kohala.

The schr Kaala sailed on Tuesday evening for Koolau with a load of coal, but on arriving off Kawaihoa she began to leak, owing to the rough weather. She returned yesterday half full of water.

The Mokoli and Waimanalo were plying yesterday between the Coptic and the Quarantine Station at Kahakaulana with loads of Chinese.

The schr Malolo took a load of coal to the Coptic yesterday.

The schr Liholiho brought 1,170 bags sugar, and 82 bbls molasses.

The Malolo brought 800 bags sugar.

The Mile Morris brought 160 head of sheep.

The Kikikat from the Sound and the Monitor from Humboldt will be due shortly. The Lizzie Marshall from the Sound is fully due.

LOCAL & GENERAL ITEMS.

LEWERS & Cooke are selling mixed paint now.

The mail for San Francisco by the Coptic close at 3 p.m. to-day.

The Geo. W. DeLong Post of the G. A. R. hold their regular meeting this evening.

The Band will give an extra concert at the Hawaiian Hotel on Friday evening.

An exciting race between 5 boats belonging to the Russian man-of-war took place last evening.

A Government water-cart is much needed. It was promised, but it has never yet been obtained.

By the Suez on Tuesday 3456 letters and about 1000 newspapers were sent. The mail keeps on increasing.

The trial of Akana and Akiona on a charge of accepting bribes comes off this morning at the Supreme Court.

The large telescope on a stand now in J. W. Robertson's is to be raffled as soon as possible, on Saturday probably.

AMONGST the Chinese passengers by the City of Sydney were a Chinese pastor and assistant for the Chinese mission here.

The Chinese from the City of Sydney were handed over to the Board of Immigration yesterday afternoon, and bonds were taken.

Mr. J. S. Smithies is now Acting Chief Clerk in the Interior Department during the absence of Mr. Hassinger. We congratulate him.

"THE time ball and the noon whistles are not in accord. Which sun is ahead?"—*Gazette*. J. W. Roberts(u)n, every time, and correct, too.

TO-NIGHT the annual meeting of the Y. M. C. A. will be held in the Bethel Vestry. New officers will be elected and the reports of the retiring officers read.

On Tuesday night a young Government employee thrashed a young man in the street for insulting language. The other responded by getting out a warrant for assault and battery yesterday morning.

A SUBSCRIBER wants to know "whether it is the intention of the Government to run the people living makai of the railroad terminus on Beretania street out of the country, with the dust or not? A few gallons of water daily would prevent it."

A considerable amount of excitement has been raised in the minds of the citizens of Honolulu concerning the Chinese influx. As a consequence rumours are started of the dozen. The latest is that the revolver trade has taken a sudden boom, the Chinese being the principal customers.

We are sorry to find that a disciple of Count de Zaba and a man so well acquainted with Russian history could have made such a slip in history, as the *Gazette* says it did. We, of course, are sorry that we didn't know better than to take its statements for granted without inquiry and research, but we shall not so offend again.

A new Kerosene Warehouse is being built but is not yet finished. The present one is full. In the meantime there are about 2000 cases of the oil on Brewer's wharf and some of the cases are leaking. Suppose some one should drop a lighted match or a cigar there what would be the result with the present high winds? Why not put them out on the plains and hire a watchman.

On Tuesday night late the bar-keeper of one of the saloons told a man to go out, as he wanted to shut up. The man being large, and the bar-man small, refused. After a few more words the stranger took up a billiard cue and broke it over the head of the other, and a glass or two was thrown at him in return. In the meantime the proprietor and some persons outside came in and speedily ejected the unwelcome stranger. Damages: a cue, lamp and glasses broken.

THE P. C. A. of yesterday contain the following paragraph: "The steamship Abergeldie sailed March 2, 1883, from St. Michaels, Azores, with 264 men, 195 women, 119 children above 12 years of age, 329 children from 1 to 12 years of age, 36 infants due, say in all April." 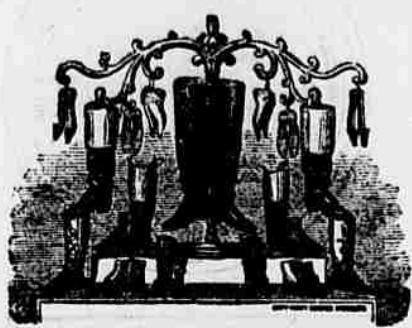

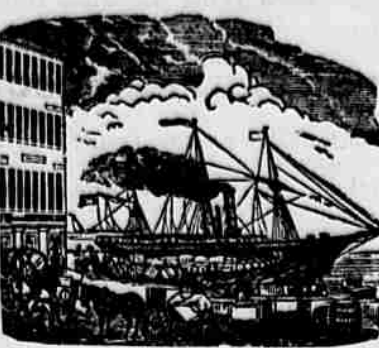
