APPROPRIATION BILLS.

At the meeting of the Legislature this morning the Appropriation Bill was introduced by the Minister of Finance. The bill was read a first time by title, and Monday, Wednesday and Saturday of each week decided upon for its consideration in committee of the whole. The bill was presented in printed form, and therefore required no reference to the Printing Committee.

A kind of a preliminary Appropriation Bill, which was read a day or two ago, also came from the printers this morning, and was distributed. This bill is "to provide for the payment of the expenses of the Government until the passage of the Appropriation Bill," and is of more immediate importance to a number of creditors than the Appropriation Bill itself. It is short and to the point, and is just what the title above quoted indicates. Its passage through all its stages, which from its length and nature should require but little time, will be hailed with satisfaction by creditors who are in need of their money. We trust the time will be made as short as possible.

Legislative Assembly.

25TH DAY—June 27th.

MORNING SESSION—CONTINUED.

The amendments were lost, and the section passed as in the bill.

Noble Widemann asked where section 14 commenced and where it ended. The Minister can make rules for the government of the army. The King is at the head of the army. Can he make rules for the government of the King? It seems hardly possible that such incongruous stuff as this law is could emanate from any sensible man. It may be law but it is not military law. And for the Ministry of this Government in the year of our Lord 1888 to bring in such a military bill is incomprehensible.

Noble Smith offered an amendment in line four after "forces:" Which rules and regulations shall be binding on such forces.

The amendment was carried and the section passed as amended.

The remaining sections passed as read. The title and enacting clause were then read and passed. The bill as amended passed to engrossment to be read a third time on Monday.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

Third reading of a bill to provide for records to be kept by officers authorized to take acknowledgments. Passed.

Second reading of a bill to amend section 1, chapter 1 of the session laws of 1876, defining the word "drunk."

Minister Ashford moved to refer the bill to the Committee on Public Lands and Internal Improvements for the reason that drunkenness is considered by some to be an internal improvement.

Rep. Kamaoia, the introducer of the bill, said that its object was to prevent abuses now practised by police and other officers of the law. Many people are arrested for drunkenness, when in reality they are only partially under the influence of liquor, are able to take care of themselves, and would, provided the police let them alone and not try to drag them to the lockup, go home and molest no one.

Noble Hitchcock moved to lay on the table. Carried.

The House then took recess until 1 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The House re-assembled at 1:05 p. m. and resumed the order of the day.

The consideration of the report of the committee on the mechanics' lien bill, with the bill.

On motion the bill was read section by section, and passed as amended. The title and enacting clause were then read and passed. The bill passed to engrossment to be read a third time on Monday next.

Second reading of a bill to amend Article 1068 of the Civil Code, relating to the practice of attorneys. The Judiciary Committee recommended that the bill be laid on the table. The bill was read by its title and considered with the report. Indefinitely postponed.

Noble Smith under suspension of the rules, presented two reports: one from the Judiciary Committee on the bill to provide for the challenge of jurors, in which they recommended that it do not pass, and substituted another bill providing for the challenge of 3 jurors. The bill was read. The report was accepted and laid on the table to be considered with the bill. The bill was referred to the Printing Committee.

The other report was from the special committee to whom the bill to construct and maintain a submarine telegraph cable was referred recommending its passage, with some amendment.

On motion the bill was taken up for consideration with the report of the committee.

A lengthy discussion on the amount to be charged for a word, and what a message consists of followed. Amendments were offered that a message should consist of 10 words, and that the minimum rate should be \$1.00 for a message. Others contended that 10 cents a word was all that is asked for in the bill, and consequently the rates should be left as in the bill.

Noble Richardson said that the subject had been pretty thoroughly discussed, several members had spoken twice on the bill, and the Assembly was very tired, he therefore moved an adjournment until 10 a. m. to-morrow. Lost.

Rep. Kamaoia moved the previous question, which was lost.

On motion the bill was referred back to the committee.

Noble Robinson, under suspension of the rules, presented a petition from merchants of Honolulu, praying that their claims for the funeral expenses of Likeli amounting to nearly \$30,000 be paid. Referred to Finance Committee.

The House adjourned until 10 a. m. to-morrow.

NEW PUBLICATIONS.

Two new publications, of more or less interest to our readers, came to us by the last mail.

The first of these is a Hawaiian guide book, edited by F. L. Clarke. This is a little book of about 150 pages, 7 1/2 inches long and 4 inches wide—made this unusual size for convenience in carrying in the pocket. The book contains a beautifully colored map of the Hawaiian Islands, with a brief account of the islands, the principal places of interest, and the many intricacies which a traveller requires to know. The reading matter is interspersed with advertisements, which also convey useful information. A cursory glance at this guide book is sufficient to convince that it is vastly better calculated to serve the purpose for which it is intended than anything ever before attempted in the same line. To use a stereotyped expression, it really "fills a long-felt want," and its merits entitle it to a ready demand.

The other publication, referred to is "The Pacific States Newspaper Directory," published by Messrs. Palmer & Rey, proprietors Pacific States Advertising Bureau, 405-407 Sansome street, S. F., California. Although this a book of special value to newspapermen and advertisers, it contains a large amount of general information of interest to general readers.

The new engineer has arrived, and the vessel is taking in coal preparatory to taking in freight.

PEARL RIVER HARBOR.

The following is from the New York Journal of Commerce:

San Francisco, March 19.—Information has reached here from Honolulu that an extensive examination of Pearl River Harbor, in the Hawaiian Islands, has been completed by the force of United States naval officers. It is stated in the estimates and plans which have been sent to Washington to convey the information that it will cost \$100,000 to make the entrance available for the new cruisers being constructed by the United States. It is understood in Honolulu that the cessation of the harbor is virtually forever.

BUILDING COMMITTEE MEETING.

A meeting of the St. Andrew's Cathedral building committee was held yesterday afternoon. The report of the finance committee was read and approved. The canvassing committee was asked to continue its labors and collect all outstanding pledges and as many new subscriptions as could be obtained. It was decided to notify the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts, that two bays of the new cathedral had been completed and that the Cathedral would accommodate five hundred worshippers. The Society had promised \$2,500 when this was carried out. The meeting throughout was a very enthusiastic one.

BROKE HIS NECK.

C. B. Patterson, a painter who formerly carried on business in Honolulu, was recently killed by a fall in California. He was engaged in painting a lofty ceiling at Senator Stanford's residence. The staging not being high enough, Patterson placed a box on top of it, to enable him to reach the ceiling. While standing on it, the box collapsed, precipitating Patterson to the floor. He fell on his head. His neck was broken and death was instantaneous.

An essay by one of the first class boys, Charles Blake, on "the new Hawaiian Constitution," is worthy of being published, as showing the author's independence of thought and ability to write his ideas in good and lucid English. The ideas and the English are both Charles Blake's, and not his teacher's. The Principal of the school is in no wise responsible for the ideas expressed.

ESSAY.

It was one year ago, the 30th of this month, that there was held in the capital city of Honolulu, the largest and most important mass meeting ever known in Hawaiian History.

This has always been known as the "Reform Meeting." This meeting caused a great excitement that soon spread all over the islands.

This, as we all know, was the beginning of our New Constitution.

This mass meeting was composed of almost every kind of people to be found in this Kingdom; but, mostly were white foreigners and natives, who came together to hear and talk about the affairs of government.

Many speeches were made by leading men in Honolulu, and they all said that, the country was going to ruin through the ill governing of bad men. They also said the constitution was not a good one, and that they must have a new constitution.

This assembly chose 13 of their number as a committee, and sent them unto the King demanding a new constitution; and strange as it may seem, the King yielded to their demand.

We do not know exactly why the King gave this new constitution, but probably because this mass meeting had collected a body of armed men; for, had the King refused their demand, a bloody revolution would surely have followed.

However, a new constitution was made, and on July 7 was proclaimed the constitution of the Hawaiian Islands.

But, was this constitution lawfully made? I believe not. Because, it was made by the men who had no right to make it. And, if a few hundred men had right to change or make a constitution a year ago, do not we possess the same right to-day? Certainly we do.

But this thing can not be so, for you will find in the old constitution, this clause written: "Any amendment or amendments of this constitution must be made in the Legislature."

Therefore, by this, we understand that no other body of men whatever, had a right to change or make a constitution.

And, if our present constitution was not lawfully made, how can it ever be held as our constitution, as it was not made by the Legislature in accordance with the constitution.

But, considering this as our constitution, lawfully made, then let us point out the good and evil there is in it.

As far as this constitution goes, it is a pretty good one I think, with the exception of a few places. The 1st I will mention is in the 48th article, where it says: If the King will not return a bill presented to him by the Legislature within 10 days, Sundays excepted, it shall also become a law, as if he had signed it. Now, if the King should be very sick so that he could not attend to the bill in time, it would become a law, whether it was a good law or a bad law.

Second, is because, the right to vote is not given to all men in this Kingdom. Are not the Chinese, Japanese and the South Sea Islanders as wise and able to know what they are about, as the other people in this Kingdom? Very likely they are. Do not they pay taxes as other people do? Of course they do. Why then is not given to them the right to vote?

The 3rd is in the 59th and 62nd Articles where it says, that every man who cannot read or write but who voted last election can vote any time to come whether he knows how to read or write, and those who can not read or write who did not vote last election, can not vote as long as they are not able to read or write.

There is no reason, why some are allowed to vote, and some who are of the same class of men are not allowed to vote.

Now friends, so far as we think this constitution is right, let us sustain it, at the same time, let us try and correct the blunders we thus find, and may God bless this Kingdom when it has a good and rightful constitution.

### COMMITTEE MEETING.

TESTIMONY TAKEN FROM TINSMITHS, ETC., ON CHINESE QUESTION.

The following is a summary of the evidence taken before the Legislative committee on the Chinese question last evening, Mr. Foster in the Chair, Mr. Kinney examined witnesses.

First witness called was Mr. F. Wilhelm, who stated that he had been a resident of Honolulu for twenty-one years, had worked for fourteen years as a carpenter, four of these years as a master carpenter. Being asked if he found that in his occupation he had to compete with Chinese, he replied that he had to his sorrow, and did not know how to get it over at times. The reason why was, that the Chinese did the work so much cheaper than he could dare attempt to do it at. The rate of pay for which a Chinese carpenter works is about two dollars or less a day, at least, I saw an advertisement lately, offering mechanics at that rate, but of course, the master would have some of that for profit. The white carpenter is actually driven out of the country, as he cannot compete with Chinese wages. I employ natives, but not quite as many as I could employ, were it not for the Chinese; I pay them two and two and a half dollars per day.

F. Wilhelm, (continued.) The Chinese have entered against us in all kinds of carpenter work, and many prominent men in this town employ them as well as men of limited capital. There are seven or eight white carpenters having shops in town. I could not really say how many Chinese shops there are. There have been scores of good carpenters, men with families, men with little plots of freehold property, who have been citizens here for years, forced within the last few years, to leave the country and seek employment elsewhere. I can name numbers of them, (which the witness did.) There have been Chinese come to me offering me their services; gratis, to be allowed to learn the trade, one especially, a Chinese Contractor, bothered me considerably on this head six months ago. I am not a member of the Anti-Asiatic Union, nor did I sign the petition.
