PAINFUL ACCIDENT .- The numerous friends of On of San Francisco, we have dates from Mr. Henry P. Baldwin were shocked on Wednesday Transport the Mines. Business prospects in California. last by the report which came by the Nettle Merrill, that his right arm had been crushed in the rollers of the Hamakus Sugar Mills. The particulars of the accident are as follows: -On Thursday afternoon March 30th, after the grinding for the day was over, the engine as usual was kept running for the purpose of pumping water. Mr. Baldwin and the engineer were standing near the mill, engaged in conversation, when the former, wishing to inspect the distance between the rollers placed his fingers in too close proximity to the jaws of the releatless machine. His attention was for an instant diverted and before he knew it, his hand had been select with an implacable grip and was being rapidly car-ried through the mill. With great coolness, he told the engineer to reverse the engine, which was done as soon as he could spring to the lever, and none too promptly, for a delay of but a second or two, and his life would have been the forfeit. As it was, the arm was completely crushed as far up as the elbow, while the muscles and flesh above were so torn and incerated as to render amputation uccessary within four inches of the shoulder. After his arm was ex-tricated, Mr. Baldwin sent a boy for Dr. Moffit who was at Wallnku, some fourteen miles distant, and then walked to the house of the engineer to awalt his arrival. The doctor was on hand, in the simost incredibly short time of one hour and twenty min-ates from the time the messenger started, and he performed the amputation successfully, and we are happy to be able to state that at last advices the process of healing was going on satisfactorily, and the patient was comfortable.

To THE ERITOR HAWARIAN GARRITE. Sin :- In last Saturday's issue of the Parific Com exercial Advertiser, I see there is a letter signed Vox. in which he freely wages his thoughts and opinions, against my statement of practical facts, published in the Gazzrre of the 22nd ultimo, but as I perceive that he has no more practical knowledge of the subject upon which he writes, than he has of translating the Hinder Shastrass from Oorden into Sanscrit, Higdu or Nagri, I shall proceed to reply to his letter, taking each paragraph in succession.

Paragraph 1 .- Can For give a brief detail of some

of the items which would bring the cost of immigrants here from India up to either \$150 or \$125? I think not; besides, what has this government to do with what it costs planters in the British Colonies per caput for immigrants ? I cannot see the least necessity for taking this either as a precedent or criterion. Perhaps Vox may be a little betterenlightened on the subject, when I tell him that the reason generally why coolie immigration to the colonies corts the planters so much, is, that the Colonial Immigration Agent is in most cases, a pompous, empty-headed snob, who fritters away his time by dawdling in the vicinity o, the Foreign Office, or the Office of the Board of Im migration, or perhaps occasionally breakfasting at the Government House, (every Thursday when the Vicercy is in Calcutta,) the remainder of the day be ing probably passed in playing billiards in some of the fast houses about Calcutta, entrusting the procuring of his immigrants to a set of unscrapulous rascals who style themselves Co die Agents. These men are either Anglo-Indians, Eurasians or Natives. mostly the two latter. They receive advances to cover expenses in procuring immigrants, and either go into some of the districts themselves, or employ natives for this purpose, in which latter case, they amuse themselves in much the same manner as their emplayer, but on a smaller scale. Indeed, I have known several cases where men of this class have taken advances which they have appropriated for their own use and have never afterwards put in an appearance. As a matter of course the agent must have a

auce. As a matter of course the agent must have a clerk, and this gentleman, you may be sure, studies his own interests, and furthers, so far an lies in his power, the schemes of the raceals referred to, so long as they are remunerative to himself.

This is not the system however upon which the figures in my statement are based. The deputed agent from this kingdom, as I have already said before, should be an efficient and well qualified man, and I should also say, an influential member of society. He would require an able assistant, and the way to obtain a good one, would be through the head of some Public Department, and as there is not the least doubt but that the agent would in due course be in-

troduced to the heads of all the Public Departments in Calcutta, he would find it a very easy matter to obtain an excellent assistant for the salary I mentioned, viz., \$150 per month, giving him also conveyance bire or traveling allowance as the case may be, at the rates laid down for Government servants drawing 200

way, they have plenty of qualified medical men in Infever, leaving din, and to spare if necessary—men who have a thor ough knowledge of the flindoutannes language, both colloquial and vernacular, as well as of the treatment of all diseases to which natives of India are liable: and is it likely that they would send to Eugland for medical practitioners, and most probably get men from thence who could neither speak the language nor have any real knowledge of the treatment of diseased natives? Most certainly not, and now I will give two instances of apothecaries having been sent in medical charge of coolie immigrants during the years 1872-73, which I think will refute the assertions made by Vor. An apothecary named Hastings shipped with a batch of coolies for the Mauritius at a salary of 75 rupees or \$37.50 per month for the veyage; after disem-barking them at the Mauritius, he was to proceed with the ship (a chartered one) to London, and on arrival there, was to be provided with a 21 class pas-aage back to Calcutta if he desired it, if not, he was to receive the amount of passage money by way of a

Another apotherary named Leibenhalls shipped with coolies for Demarara for a like salary and a re-turn passage to Calcutta by the same ship. Now, what necessity can there be for \$5,000 for medical

altendance &c. These apothecaries are men who have been trained in the medical department under Government, and are generally clever and skillful men. They first commence their career at the age of 12 or 13 years and have even then to pass a certain examination fore being admitted into the department as appre ees. From this, they rise by merit from grade to grade, and for each grade they must pass a soccessful examination until they obtain the rank of senior apothecary. This latter rank, however, is given acapotheoary. This latter rank, however, is given according to seniority in the department, after having attained the rank of lengrade apotheoary. But many of these men go to England and walk the public hospitals in Lendou for two years for their diplomax and upon their return to India are generally appointed civil surgeons of small stations.

From their first entry into the medical department if not retained for employment in the Presidency Gen

eral Hospitals, they are drafted to serve in the regi-mental hospitals of the army, and as India is very seldom long without some active field service going on, these men have excellent opportunities of gaining cal knowledge of all apportaining to medica

There are always men of this description available in India, who have mostly been discharged from the Government service for some trafting offence, but who are well qualified to take medical charge of a batch of East Indian Immigrants. It does not however, folhast Indian immigrants. It does not however, for-low that men of this class should be engaged for the voyage from Calcutta, while there are diploma'd sub-assistant surgeons (native) who have graduated in the medical college in Calcutta, their rate of pay &c. on first appointment to a charge, being 125 rupees, with 30 rupees horse allowance per month. One of these doctors would, I should think, be an acquisition to the Board of Health here for to prevent his enter-ing into private practice and to utilize his services to the best advantage he might be appointed a perma-nent medical inspector on a fixed salary and his doties would be to visit periodically all the islands on which the E. I. immigrants were located and furnish

reports to the Board of Beath.

Paragraphs 4 a 5.—Wrorg again, Vox. With regard to paragraph 5, the mode of procedure for applying for immigrants, is through the Commissioner here, but not to the Government of England, for the Home Government would not for a mor any proposal or scheme for obtaining immigrants from India unless approved of and recommended by

the Viceroy.

The Governor General does not act under the direction of the Secretary of State for India; he has full power to smooth all acts of the Supreme and Legislative Councils, excepting nots of an important State na-ture requiring the authority or sanction of H. M. Impe-rial Government. All such acts being submitted thro' the Secretary of State for India.

The coolies in the East Indies are no more the soum of the population, than the laboring white men are the soum of the population of other countries; nor can I understand why men, no matter of what race, who earn an honest livelihood by the sweat of their brow, can be set down as such; it being a well known fact, that most peo-ple possessing any kind of common sense, generally suppose the scan of a population to be composed chiefly of idle rogues, thieves, vagabonds &c.
Should Fex again venture to write upon the subject of immigration from the East Indies, I trust he will kindly refrain from quoting my name, for I can-not afford the time, nor do I wish to have the bother of replying to letters containing nothing but a lot of nonsense. W. H. Calliss.

You are aware that January 30, 1875, a trenty of commercial reciprocity—to last seven years, and until a year after notice of withdrawal—was concluded between the United States and the Hawaiian Islands, the ratification of which was advised by the Senate, March 18th, which was ratified accordingly by the President, May 31st, ratified by the King April 17th, ratifications exchanged at Washington, June 3d, and the treaty proclaimed on the same day. As this treaty abolishes duties on certain enumerated articles, an Act of Congress is necessary to give it effect, and the proposition must originate in the House ntatives. Accordingly the Committee on Ways and Means have made a favorable report upon and submitted to the House a bill on the subject-introduced by Luttrel-which pro-

duty, hereby secured to the United States.
