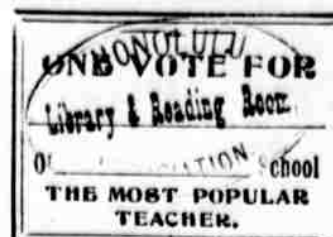

#### Flag Raising Anticipative

After arrangements had been made with the G. A. R. for flag raising at the High School on Territorial Admission Day, the Executive has been induced to change the date of the ceremony to the day before that we are to celebrate. It will take place, as now arranged at 9 o'clock a. m. of Wednesday, June 13.

#### DOWNING TRIAL STILL ON

The prosecution is still on in the trial of Charles Downing for the killing of Post. One native man has been on the witness stand all morning.

Jennie Alexander alias Vincent Bradley vs. Canadian-Australian Steamship Co. is still on before Judge Davis. The jury consists of F. J. Kurger, J. W. Luning, E. F. Imhof, John Neipper, Geo. H. Paris, A. S. Prescott, C. F. Herrick, Chas. Pfeiffer, Nicholas Brehm, W. L. Howard, R. A. Dexter and C. H. Norton. It is the third case tried of twenty-nine suits for \$20,000 damages each claimed by members of Hogan's Minstrels on account of being refused passage to Victoria in the steamer Mowewa.

The C. A. S. Co., defendant, has filed a bond in \$300, with T. H. Davies & Co., Ltd., as surety, on motion for new trial of the case in which Hurley Thynons, plaintiff, was given a verdict for \$175 damages.

Judgment has been filed on verdict for \$600 with costs at \$64 for Charles E. Bartlett against the Hawaiian Carriage Manufacturing Co.

Judge Stanley, on motion of the Deputy Attorney General, continued the case of Torano, a Japanese woman, who appealed for mitigation of sentence as a disorderly person, till the next term of court, defendant to be allowed to go on her own recognizance.

#### Fishing With Explosive.

Kalua, the man who was with another native in a canoe at Waikiki yesterday when the latter lost an eye and a hand through the explosion of giant powder, was arrested later on the charge of fishing with an explosive. His case came up in the Police Court this forenoon but was continued until June 8.

#### DEATH OF MRS. SLOGGETT.

The community was shocked this morning at hearing of the death of Mrs. Sloggett, many of whose friends were not aware that she had been ill. This sad event happened at 2 o'clock a. m. Mrs. Sloggett died of heart trouble with which she had been prostrated for a few days. Yesterday her husband, Dr. H. C. Sloggett, was in fair hopes of her recovery.

The funeral will take place from the residence in Green street, between Kaplan and Victoria streets, at 3:30 this afternoon. Rev. Alexander Mackintosh will conduct the services. A quartet of St. Andrew's Cathedral choir will sing special hymns. The pallbearers will be Dr. F. L. Miner, Dr. E. McKibbin, Dr. Geo. Herbert, Messrs. W. Protenbauer, F. Field, M. W. Couer, H. E. Walby and Ernest R. Ross. The lamented lady leaves a devoted husband, a son and a daughter. The son is Digby C. Sloggett of the General Post Office staff, and the daughter the wife of John F. Humburg of H. Hackfeld & Co., Ltd. Mrs. Sloggett has won universal esteem in social, benevolent and religious circles within the few years since the family arrived in Honolulu. She possessed the best qualities of refined womanhood, with amiability of a rare stamp combining a queenly presence.

#### Kawaiahao Praise Service.

The praise service at Kawaiahao church Sunday morning was very largely attended, and though the exercises went beyond the usual time, they were so interesting that this was not noticed. The pulpit and choir were beautifully decorated by Mrs. Carrie Robinson. A feature of the service was the violin offertory of Paul Egly, who rendered the Intermezzo from Cavaleria Rusticana. Rev. H. H. Parker and Rev. S. L. Desha of Hilo both spoke shortly. Most of the time was given to praise psalms, committed to memory by members and given from the body of the church, exercises by the Kawaiahao Seminary girls, the Reform school and others connected with church work.

#### DR. WIGHT'S COMPLAINT

Continuation of Bill in Equity to Cancel a Lease.

Two Material Witnesses Under Bonds to Uncle Sam - Tewksbury Divorce Case - Matters in Probate.

An order of continuance to August term and publication of summons has been made by Judge Stanley in the Tewksbury divorce case.

Amdavita were filed against the motion to set trial day for James Wight vs. Eliza Yates Mackenzie. One is by A. S. Humphreys, setting forth that G. P. Tulloch and J. H. Mackenzie are material witnesses. Another is by A. T. Atkinson, Special Agent in Chief of the U. S. Government for taking the census of 1900 in Hawaii, showing that the two material witnesses named are both special agents to take the census during the month of June in the district where they reside, and under \$500 bond each for the service, so that it would be a great hardship to require them to attend court on any day in June. The suit is a bill in equity to cancel a lease from the petitioner, who states he is 85 years of age, to his daughter the defendant. He claims he was imposed upon to the wrong of nine other children and his wife, when induced to sign a lease for twenty years of hundreds of acres of land more than he portions he had previously agreed to let his daughter have for ten years at \$1 per acre per annum. He alleges that the lease unwittingly made by him takes up all of the lands occupied by him as a cattle ranch. The material witnesses referred to by Mr. Humphreys, one of the attorneys for defendant, are expected to prove that the plaintiff was fully informed of the nature of the lease in question before and when he signed it. Judge Davis granted the motion of Humphreys and C. Brown, continuing the hearing to July 3.

Judge Davis has granted the petition of Mrs. Amelia Richardson to authorize the guardians of her two minor children, Ruth and George, to increase their annual allowance for education and support from \$2,000 to \$3,200.

Judge Davis has approved the accounts of David Dayton, administrator of the estate of Alexander Moore, deceased, and ordered his discharge on filing the receipt of Henry Holmes, attorney in fact for the heirs in England, for \$2282 less \$120.14 inheritance tax. The heirs are a brother and three nephews. Paul Neumann for petitioner.

#### SURPRISE IS SURPRISED.

The gasoline schooner Surprise arrived in port this forenoon after an absence of about a week, bringing passengers, freight and cattle from various ports on the Kona coast. On Wednesday night the Surprise made an attempt to get around South Point to load sugar at one of the Kau points but she was unable to do this, her gasoline power not being sufficient to take her around.

#### Garnishee Summons.

H. T. Hamby vs. Peter Adler and Sophia Adler. The First Bank of Hilo, Ltd., garnishee, assumpt, has been filed in the Circuit Court, Fourth Circuit and the papers have come down here for service. The First bank of Hilo is brought into the suit on account of being the attorney, agent, trustee or creditor of the defendants. Plaintiff claims \$1000 for selling 250 acres of land in Oiaa for the defendants.

#### Schuman Gets Contract.

Gus Schuman has received the contract for supplying the Road Department with six sprinkling wagons, three street sweepers and two lumber wagons. The vehicles he will supply are of the famous Studebaker manufacture. Mr. Schuman's contract amounts to about \$5000.

#### Association Football.

#### NOT ALL FOR CHINATOWN

New Rule on Building Permits Good for Whole City.

It Will Afford Useful Delay for Considering Improvements and Regulate Even Fence Construction.

Yesterday's order of the Executive Council regarding street lines and grades in connection with building permits did not purport to be promulgated with reference to the rebuilding of Chinatown. Nevertheless it ought incidentally to have good results upon operations in that quarter.

No new or improved lines can be enforced without legislative authority. The order in question was a serious want since streets were first attempted to be systematized in Honolulu. Mr. Rowell, Superintendent of Public Works, long ago admitted that it would be a good thing if intending builders were required to get the street grades from the Survey Department before proceeding with the erection of any sort of structure. There has always been such pressure of work in the Public Works Department, however, that Mr. Rowell feared that the strict carrying out of such a rule in all cases would be impracticable.

Walter E. Wall, head of the city work in the Survey Department, spared a Bulletin reporter an interesting quarter of an hour from his valuable time this morning for a discussion of this subject. His facile pencil aiding his tongue, he showed how the order just made was likely to work material good in Chinatown. Aside from the matter of that quarter, however, Mr. Wall indicated the utility of the new requirement in any part of the city plot.

A property owner out on the plains may be erecting a fence, say, on the Beretania avenue line. Unless he build it to proper grade as well as line, up-and-down jogs in baseboard or parapet base is apt to be the unsightly consequence. Under the new rule the Road Supervisor will have control of street appearances even in such a minor respect as that of fences.

Where benefit will accrue in regulating the rebuilding of Chinatown, for one thing, is in procuring delay where new streets are desired to be opened and improvements or extensions of old ones made. There will be a chance to show the property owner how, by straightening out the line with but slight if any real sacrifice of, and on his part, his frontage will be greatly bettered in appearance and value. There are many little inequalities on the lines of the old streets in Chinatown which should thus be corrected to the mutual advantage of the city and the proprietors.

Owners of land through which new streets are planned but not yet legalized will be undoubtedly, in many cases, see it to be for their own interest to come to reasonable terms with the Government for condemnation of the required ground when the time comes. And any who receive notice now that such streets are contemplated will occupy the ground therefor with buildings at the risk of reducing their claims for damages at condemnation.

Mr. Wall met with an instance only yesterday where an applicant for a building permit was quick to see benefit to himself in a street extension, as yet only on paper, through his lot. It was a Chinaman, too. When he found that the extension of Kekaulike to Beretania street would give him a corner business site, he was very pleased and said the improvement to his property would balance his loss of ground space.

#### Reformer Goes to Kauai.

Having done Oahu and Hawaii to a turn in the matter of enlisting Chinese in the work of the Bow Wong society, Leung Khai Cnew, the Chinese reformer with the valuable head left for Kauai in the W. G. Hall yesterday, there to work along the same lines. The reformer was accompanied by the same guardians, all armed for possible trouble.

#### Mauna Loa's Report.

The Mauna Loa reports 17,000 bags of sugar at Punaluu and 5000 at Honouapo. No rain in the Kau district. The Iwakami was at Honouaka yesterday. She expected to get her freight out by last night and then to load sugar for the Martha Davis, now at Hilo.

#### Enlarge Aala Park.

Walter E. Wall, city surveyor, has made a proposition regarding Aala park which invites the earnest consideration of all workers for city improvement. It is to secure the section of burned district Ewa of the park as an addition thereto. This section has a frontage of 370 feet from King to Beretania street, along the line of Kamakela street that opens out on the railway station. The proposed addition would add 115 feet to the park frontage on King street, and 145 to that on Beretania street. Its advantage would be not only in making a larger park. It would avert the almost inevitable result of having the Ewa end of the park bordered with a row of unsightly Oriental shacks. Moreover, it would give space for a driveway clear around the margin of the park. The proposition includes making a 56 foot street along the river wall on the Waikiki side of the park, where the extensive utilization of a 20-foot roadway by vehicles shows the desirability of a respectable thoroughfare. There are only three proprietors, one being Justice W. F. Frear, holding the nub of land desired for this park extension. Probably all three would be reasonable in treating with the Government for condemnation.

#### DELEGATES ALL HERE

Maui and Hawaii delegates to the Republican convention arrived by the Mauna Loa this morning. This completes the various delegations that will gather in convention tomorrow forenoon in Progress Hall. The Maui delegates will caucus this afternoon between 3 and 4 o'clock. Delegates from all the various districts will caucus separately during the afternoon and evening. The Fifth District delegates will caucus at 2 p. m.

#### Drove Dr. Jobe's Horse.

Lokepa was fined \$10 and costs in the Police Court this forenoon on the charge of driving without a light last night. Lokepa was told to hold Dr. Jobe's horse while the latter went into the Orpheum to see the show. The native boy took advantage of the doctor's absence to take a drive up Nuuanu avenue, where he was caught by Officer Apana.

Marshal Brown has been informed that, since April 15 of this year, Cornelius Crowley Jr., son of Cornelius Crowley of Oakland, has been missing from Port Costa, Contra Costa Co. He is fourteen years of age, short, stout, of light complexion, has dark hair and blue eyes. His father thinks he has gone to sea.

A few gun fighters and the calling  
out of troops is all that is needed to  
bring the Montana Senatorship row up  
to the standard of Kentucky.

That the official organ should design-  
ate "Republican" as a hoodoo is not  
particularly surprising in view of the  
faltering allegiance the ponderous cen-  
temporary gives Republican principles.

When the inside facts are brought  
out at the national conventions it's ten  
to one a new party will be sprung on  
the unsuspecting public. For Presi-  
dent, Dewey; for Vice President, Hob-  
son; platform, woman's suffrage, petti-  
coat government and free kisses. Then  
the war party will indeed roar.

With the Democrats watching to  
take advantage of every point left  
them by the Republicans, delegates to  
the Territorial convention cannot afford  
to lose time or prestige in factional  
or personal strife. The men who  
have the party's best interests at heart  
with give and take, making a fair dis-  
tribution of honors to all the islands.

The number of delegates to the na-  
tional convention to which Hawaiian  
Republicans will be entitled will de-  
pend largely upon the efforts of the lo-  
cal party to secure a good sized repre-  
sentation in its appeal for admission  
to that convention. While two dele-  
gates are generally accepted as the  
proper number there is nothing to pre-  
vent an appeal for more.

The Maui News has established a  
splendid series of wants in its editor-  
ial columns, adding each week a sub-  
stantial necessity for the town's pro-  
gress and demonstrating that the town  
will support the enterprise. Thanks to  
a good newspaper Wailuku ought soon  
to be in the way of making good its  
claim to a more important designation  
than "one of the country towns."

Notwithstanding the efforts of dis-  
gruntled critics the opera season at  
the Orpheum has opened with every  
prospect of a popular and artistic suc-  
cess. It is the spirit of antagonism  
rather than fair play that puts down as  
a foregone conclusion that Honolulu  
will not support high class drama and  
opera at the same season. There is  
every reason to predict success for all  
theatrical organizations in the midst  
of Hawaii's jollification period.

Whether Hawaii's failure to publish  
complete statistics has, in years gone  
by, been due to lack of funds or indif-  
ference to statistical facts, the people  
may rest assured that the United  
States authorities will demand a strict  
accounting down to the smallest detail.  
In the various departments, the census  
investigations by the labor bureau and  
what not, the people of Hawaii will  
find that honest agents of the United  
States will slight nothing. If returns  
are not forthcoming there will be new  
agents, and Uncle Sam will spend \$100  
to get a dollar's worth of facts.

One of the ideas, new to this com-  
munity, which is likely to be impressed  
upon it with force in the near future,  
is that it will be impossible to conceal  
public sentiment here on public ques-  
tions from our fellow countrymen in  
the rest of the United States. We are  
led to make this statement because of  
the recent Associated Press despatches  
which present garbled if not absolutely  
untruthful representations of recent  
political activities. It is yet to be  
learned that the Associated Press has  
offered its service to the idle vapors  
of personal fancies, the glorifica-  
tion of any faction or as the vehicle of  
misrepresentation. The Associated  
Press will not view with indifference  
any action in Hawaii that will discredit  
its well known record for unbiased  
statements of fact.

## UNITY AND HARMONY.

Practically complete delegations to  
the Territorial convention from all the  
districts of the Islands is one of the  
most reassuring signs that the people  
are not indifferent to the demands of  
new political conditions, and that the  
Republican party at its inception will  
be thoroughly representative. Certainly  
not in the history of the defunct  
Republic was there ever such a general  
response to a party call. Even in the  
days of the monarchy, there is no  
record of such an assemblage of dele-  
gates in Honolulu from all districts to  
lay the foundations for party activities.  
Republicans have every reason to be  
highly gratified that the call for organ-  
ization has been so universally heeded,  
that prominent men of the other is-  
lands have been ready to take time  
from private business interests for a  
trip to Honolulu, to act and speak for  
the Republican party in the Territory,  
to create an organization that shall be  
the tool of no faction or locality, but ac-  
ceptable to all.

Thus far no mistake has been made.  
Every step has been taken in the true  
American spirit with hearty acceptance  
of the will of the majority. It rests  
with the convention that meets tomor-  
row to keep this record clear. This  
record will be kept clear if the dele-  
gates enter the convention in a spirit of  
harmony, prepared to present indi-  
vidual arguments honestly and accept  
with equanimity the final disposition  
which the delegates may make.

The Republican party is not the  
child of Honolulu, Hilo or any other  
town or district of the Territory; it  
cannot be dominated by delegates from  
any precinct or any island; it cannot  
recognize the predominance of any  
single personality or single purpose an-  
tagonistic to the majority.

In this, the first gathering within a  
country where jealousies and personal  
political warfare has been the rule,  
every effort of every delegate should  
be towards harmony and united action,  
a fair representation of all the islands  
and liberal distribution of such official  
honors as may be desired by the vari-  
ous island delegations.

Delegates elected to the national con-  
vention should be selected with a view  
to influence they will exert among  
the leaders of the party in the States  
as well as the following they have in  
Hawaii. The idea that Hawaii will  
be a nonentity in national politics will  
become a fact only if our people allow  
it. Our claims for recognition and  
liberal favors should be pressed with  
redoubled enthusiasm and force. Haw-  
aii will be a factor in national affairs  
if the people will put forward workers  
who have influence and acquaintance  
in national circles. The power in the  
national political field rests, not in  
McKinley, not with Congress but with  
the Republican party, the workers of  
the campaign who will assemble in  
Philadelphia to name executive officers  
of the party who will conduct the cam-  
paign and carry the party to victory  
at the polls.

Having been admitted to full Ter-  
ritorial rights Hawaiian Republicans  
must put their best foot foremost.  
They must bury local personal antago-  
nisms completely and absolutely. Har-  
monious aggression that follows in the  
pathway of American progress will not  
only make the Republican party the  
popular ruling power throughout Haw-  
aii, but will gain for it a place in na-  
tional councils of greater importance  
than that held by any Territory that  
has ever been accepted in the American  
Union of States.

of Health as a sanitary measure.

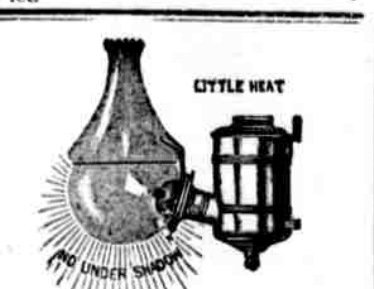
The election of officers to serve for

## HOME OF CRETAN KINGS.

New York, May 13.—British scientists excavating on the site of Cnosus, ancient capital of Crete, have unearthed what is believed to be the palace of the Kings of Crete in the Mycenaean age, about 1400 B. C. In the chambers of the palace were found a whole series of clay tablets, the palace archives, analogous to the Babylonian, but with indigenous Cretan script. Prof. Arthur J. Evans, director of the Ashmolean Museum of Oxford, who had charge of the work of excavation, telegraphed to Prof. Richardson news of the discovery, which is regarded as of unusual importance.

The question of Mycenaean writing and the actual plan and construction of the palace are regarded as settled. In a corner was found a fresco representing a girl in Mycenaean costume, holding a long vase. The colors are brilliant and the picture is said to surpass in grace of form anything known of the period. The tablets may establish characteristics of the civilization of the era sung in Homeric poetry.

### Danish West Indies.

New York, May 15.—An article in the Vorland, the organ of the Danish Government in Copenhagen, states that Denmark is considering a plan to put an end to the Danish West India islands muddle by placing the islands in the hands of a chartered company, which will conduct their affairs under the Danish flag, and thereby cut off Germany, as well as the United States, from obtaining possession of the islands. The chartered company is composed of leading Danes, and they have shown the Government clearly that they can make the islands a source of profit to the crown instead of a loss, as heretofore. The Danish Government awaits only the close of Congress to ratify publicly the agreements privately entered into.

### Water Front Accident.

A Japanese hack driver was quite badly injured about the head along the water front Monday afternoon. His horse got away from him up town and ran toward the Irmgard wharf. Upon arriving near the California Feed Co.'s building, the Japanese jumped out of the hack thinking the horse was about to plunge into the water. The poor fellow struck against the stone wall, cutting his forehead and face. He was taken to the police station where his wounds were attended to and from there he went to his home.

### Rescue Home Work.

At a meeting Monday morning of those interested in the Rescue Home movement, it was decided to appoint each one present a member of a committee to raise \$200 for immediate use in connection with the work. The sum of \$500 will also be needed to make sure of a certain place for a home that the people interested in the work now have on hand.
