

SOME PRACTICAL INFORMATION Concerning the Prevention and ' ceatment

of Cholera-Imprudences. Scientific American.] Frank H. Mason, United States consul at Marseilles, France, has forwarded to the department of state, Washington, some practical information concerning the prevention and treatment of cholera. His conclusions are derived from the studies of the epidemic of 1884 and pre-ceding years in that city. He says that in its choice of victims cholera is most precise and definite. With rare exceptions the victims belong to one of the following classes: Those who live un-

der bad hygienic conditions in respect to eating and drinking and exposure; those weakened and debilitated by alcoholic excess; and those who suffer from chronic digestive weakness or derangement. Among the imprudences which become dangerous in the presence of cholera are overeating to the extent of producing lethargy or indigestion, drink-

ing any liquid so as to check the process of digestion, eating raw vegetables in the form of salads, and, in general, the use of raw fruits, unless perfectly fresh and ripe. Drinking cold water, or beer, after having eaten raw fruit is a direct challenge to choiera, which no person, however strong and healthy, can afford to risk. The susceptibility of drankards to cholerate inquences is proved by abundant evidences, among which may be cited the sweeping fatality of the disease where er it attacked inmates of inebriate asylums. Anything, in fact, whether of a temporary or chronic nature, which impairs the vigor of the digestive organs, exposes persons thus weakened to choleraic at-

Mr. Mason gives as the most effective destroyer of cholera germs in excretions the following solutions: Solution of sulphate of copper in the proportion of not less than z ounces to 1 quart of water; liquid chloride of zinc, 11 onnoes to a quart of water; bichloride of mercury, 1-6 ounce to 1 quart of water; bichioride of copper, 2 ounces to a quart of water; sulphuric acid, 4 ounces to a quart of water. The same chemicals are used for disinfection of water closets, sinks, and all other seats of decay or infection,

For washing streets and drains, sulphate of iron, 10 pounds in 220 gallons of water, or liquid chloride of zinc, 20 pounds in 220 gallons, har been found most effective and practicable. Phenie acid, in the proportion of 10 pounds to 220 gallons of water, was largely used at Marseilles last year, but the results were less satisfactory than expected, some experts even going so far as to aftirm that the phenic principle preserved rather than destroyed the germs of the contagion. He says that in the face of a cholera epidemic darrh a is a serius illness, and should be treated accordingly. He also says that, as a popular remedy for immediate use, nothing has been found superior to chlorodyne, sold by most

The natives have no domesticated beasts of any sort, nor do they raise or catch any animals to eat, as they know nothing of desh as food. No semblance of clothing is worn, and diet is practically confined to spontaneous products of the soil. On almost every corner, however, there is a "tea house," where

convivial Chinamen sit on tea boxes, talk politics and help themselves to any loose groceries that may be lying about. Instead of two friends greeting each other with, "Come and have one with me, ole man," the dignified Chinamen walk sedately into the tea house and ask for "Two teas-have them hot." Then they throw dice or match pennies to see who will pay for them, but each man settles for his own tea in the regulation I hiladelphia style.

The Mexican people, high and low, are very artistic. I have noted with some astonishment the artistic faces of the common peous at work on the paving improvements on San Francisco street. There are faces and forms there that would make an artist or a sculptor envious. A week ago the peon paving gang got as far fown the street as the windows of a well known Mexican art store, where are displayed the finest French and German engravings, photographs, etc. At the noon hour groups of these peon workingmen would stand in concourse about the windows of the store, reveling in the art treasures therein and discussing among themselves the merits of the pictures. Imagine a Washington street paving gang having an eye for the art store windows.

I the heat generated by the bees could be maintained at that degree with an outside temperature of 10 degrees habrenheit, what must it be with the thermometer at 50 degrees; This is the way the cees manage to reduce it, or at least to secure cool, pure air: A number of bees, a thousand or more, perhaps, act as ventilators or fanners. They stand head down as an angle of 45 degrees and keep their Potatoes wings in motion. Throughout the hive, on all the combs, up and down the ventilators keep their fans going. On the alighting-board, with borders pointing away from the hive, they fan also. At the entrance of one hive, on a day in August, 3.0 bees, by actual count, were fanning. The honey gatherers dropped down upon them, templed over them, but they kept to their work.

Some writers have spoken of the "hum of the hive," as though the hum was the result of the work going on within. Twas the hum of the fanners. But in Angust, this year, there were nights when the hives were silent. Not an echo of a hum came from any showing that the air was cold enough to dispense with the ventilators.


