We, the jury, find that the said person came to his death in the Pacific ocean on the 22d day of February, 1961. through asphysiation from submersion, caused by criminal negligence on the part of both Captain Ward and Pliot Jordan, and we most strenuously censure the Pacific Mail Steamship Company for employing incompetent Chinese crews for saving human lives,
