

THEY RECOMMEND REJECTING BILL

Report of Judiciary Committee in Senate This Morning.

MAJORITY AND MINORITY TALK LONG ON THE MATTER

Finally Adopted--Senator Baldwin Wanted it Tabled to be Considered With Minority Report.

The first work of importance in the Senate this morning was the report of Mr. Kanaha for the Ways and Means Committee in which the passage of Senate Bill No. 5, relating to the biennial fiscal period of the Territory of Hawaii. On motion of Mr. C. Brown, the report was adopted, and, on further motion, it was ordered typewritten to be read the third time tomorrow.

Mr. White reported for the Judiciary Committee on Senate Bill No. 1 as follows:

The majority of your Judiciary Committee to whom the above bill was reported, respectfully beg to report that they have carefully examined and considered the same and recommend that said bill do not pass. The said bill presents many vicious and inequitable features, chief among which is that five of the majority party in the Senate would be appointed to terms of only two years, while only two of the minority party would be appointed to such terms. If said bill should pass, the Organic Act expressly provides that "the acts of appointment shall be made by the Legislature," and the majority of the committee deems it wise that in so doing, we follow as nearly as practicable the practice which prevails in the Legislature of the several States in regard to the election of United States Senators.

We therefore recommend a Concurrent Resolution providing for a joint session of the two Houses of this Legislature and the election by the members thereof in such joint session of eight Senators who shall hold their offices for the term of four years. The majority of the committee are advised that such a Concurrent Resolution embodying this idea will be introduced at an early day.

This report at once gave rise to a great deal of argument on account of the provisions contained therein, providing for a joint session of the two Houses. Mr. Baldwin moved to lay the report on the table and Mr. Kanaha moved the approval of the report.

Mr. C. Brown said that it was peculiar procedure to approve the report of the majority of the committee before the minority had had a chance. He had not even been informed by the chairman of the committee that there was to be a meeting of the Judiciary Committee. He could not for the life of him see how the Organic Act could possibly be interpreted as providing for a joint session. On the contrary, it was directly contrary to the Organic Act.

If it was wished to put out all six Republicans and one Home Ruler, well and good but the Senate should do things according to law.

Mr. Carter said that, if the majority intended to ignore the minority, it would be best to know that fact and then, the latter could go ahead and

present their reports in order to get a hearing before the Senate.

Mr. Achi said that, even if the resolution were adopted and a joint session were arranged for, he would not attend such a session even if he were to lose even his life. Such a procedure was contrary to the Organic Law. By the adoption of the report, the Senate would be trampling established rules into the ground. He had never heard of any such thing in this country ever since the time of Kamehameha. What he wanted was fair play. The action of the majority in the Senate was high handed and ungentlemanly. Some day, this would be regretted.

Mr. Paris asked Mr. White if he had given Mr. C. Brown notice of the meeting of the Judiciary Committee at which the bill referred to in the report had been considered. Mr. White answered that Mr. Brown had been the introducer of the bill and naturally, he would wish it to pass.

Mr. Paris then went on along the same line, as the other Republican Senators. He was another who could not see how the Organic Act providing for a Legislature could be interpreted to mean that joint sessions could be held. It was specially provided that the Houses should sit separately.

The motion of Mr. Baldwin to lay the report on the table to be considered with the minority, was lost and the motion to adopt the report was carried. At 11:40 the Senate took a recess until 1:30 p. m.

HAWAII AT BUFFALO

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO LOOK INTO THE MATTER

Committee Appointed This Morning Confer With Governor Dole to Determine the Proper Steps.

The regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held today with a bare quorum present.

J. B. Atherton, chairman of the quarantine wharf committee, reported that the committee had waited upon Governor Dole and requested him to include an item of \$7,953.06 in his recommendation for appropriations to the Legislature. This sum is the amount now due Castle & Cooke for advances made to the Chamber of Commerce on account of the Quarantine wharf, when it was constructed and managed by that body.

No reply was made by Governor Dole to the showing made by the committee. "Progress" was therefore noted in the minutes and the committee retired.

Mr. Atherton brought up the subject of a Hawaiian delegate at the Pan-American Exposition at Buffalo, which was tabled at last meeting. He said the exposition was to be a very important affair and believed this Territory should be represented. He moved the appointment of a committee to confer with Governor Dole and ascertain what steps were contemplated by the government in the matter. The committee appointed, consists of J. B. Atherton, H. E. Waity and C. L. Wright.

HAWAII POSTAGE MAKES A BONFIRE

New York, Feb. 26.—To tomorrow morning, according to a Tribune special from Washington, the Postoffice Department will destroy about 54,000 postal cards which belonged to the Republic of Hawaii. There are about 28,000 1-cent and 25,000 2-cent cards to be burned. This last remnant of Hawaii's postal service will be placed in a big furnace especially constructed by the redemption division for the purpose of destroying the postage stamps and postal cards of Hawaii's republican government. Two weeks ago all of the Hawaiian uncancelled postage stamps obtainable were burned. Their face value was about \$38,000, but if the department had had the power to sell them, at least \$100,000 would have been given for them by enterprising collectors.

SHRINERS BY HUNDREDS

The steamer Sierra after a splendid run of 5 days and 16 hours from San Francisco arrived this afternoon. She has aboard as passengers the delegation of Mystic Shriners that were expected. There are over two hundred of the pilgrims and they are from Michigan mostly but their numbers were swelled by recruits picked up on the way to San Francisco. All together there are nearly three hundred of them. The chief pilgrim is Low B. Windsor the Imperial Potentate of North America. The committee of arrangements with him are: G. F. Sinclair, T. W. Strahand, Chas. E. Fink, C. B. Quigley, J. C. Hurner, all of Grand Rapids, Mich.; F. W. Lyle and J. A. Walcott of Dowagiac, Mich.; and L. E. Wood of Niles, Mich.

The Sierra left San Francisco on March 8, at 8 p. m. and on the way over the bar it was so rough and the wind was so high that the pilot, Captain Freeman, had to be kept aboard and was brought here. The steamer Coptic left San Francisco seven hours ahead of the Sierra. When the big vessel with her visitors was off the harbor they were met by the tug Fearless having a committee of reception of local Shriners aboard. These boarded the Sierra and greeted their brethren. The reception committee consists of Dr. G. B. Wood, Dr. Galbraith, G. J. Pratt, H. E. Webster, Andrew Brown and Roy Chamberlain.

A great crowd collected at the Oceanic wharf to meet the Shriners and the driveway leading to the wharf was lined with busses, carriages and automobiles. Many of the visitors went direct to the Moana hotel and others to the Hawaiian.

The visitors are nearly all representative business men and their trip here is for pleasure and the installation of Aloha Temple primarily but secondarily the field will be thoroughly canvassed for business openings and an extension of trade.

CABLE BILL KILLED

Washington, Feb. 27.—Senator Perkins' amendment to the sundry civil bill appropriating \$500,000 for a cable from San Francisco to Honolulu, was stricken out by the Committee on Appropriations today after a vigorous fight had been made in its behalf. "It's not that we don't want a cable," said one of the committee today. "On the contrary, we are earnestly in favor of telegraphic communication with Hawaii and the Philippines, but the Senate has done all it can toward the building of a cable, and the matter is now up to the House. A year ago the cable bill passed the Senate. Speaker Henderson has had it in his power at any time during this session to bring up the bill, which in all probability would pass. I believe there is an overwhelming sentiment in the House in favor of cable construction, but so long as the autocrat of the House interposes his edict the matter cannot even be considered."

NO TRACE OF WRECK.

San Francisco, March 4.—The Japanese divers, who are proving themselves to be wonderful workers at extreme depths, were out again for several hours yesterday trying to locate the wreck of the Rio. On Saturday they began with the red buoy and the spot where Pilot Jordan "located" the wreck, and worked backward and forward for nearly a mile to the west. They changed their tactics yesterday trying the bottom nearer the shore and close up to the reef. In most of their work they walked on the bottom, following their boat, which was in tow of the tug Alert. Again they found no trace.

WARD AND JORDAN ARE HELD TO BLAME

No Bodies Recovered From the Rio Disaster.

LIFE SAVER HEARD WHISTLE OF DISTRESS

But Paid No Heed--Investigation Being Held--Impossible to Locate the Wreck--Coroner's Jury Verdict.

San Francisco, Feb. 28.—There was a mixture of censure and praise in the findings of the Coroner's jury which examined yesterday in the causes of death of the victims of the disaster that befell the Pacific Mail steamship Rio de Janeiro. The findings were peculiar in that they found cause for blaming the company for the employment of a Chinese crew, though all the evidence before the jury indicated that the Chinese crew did all that men could do to save the passengers.

After deliberating nearly two hours the jury rendered the following verdict in each of the eleven cases:

We, the jury, find that the said person came to his death in the Pacific ocean on the 22d day of February, 1901, through asphyxiation from submersion, caused by criminal negligence on the part of both Captain Ward and Pilot Jordan, and we most strenuously censure the Pacific Mail Steamship Company for employing incompetent Chinese crews for saving human lives.

In addition to the above verdict the jury issued the following to the press:

We, the jury, extend our heartfelt good will to Graham Coghlan, second officer of the wrecked Rio, for his heroic actions and conduct during the terrible disaster.

This was signed by all the jurymen as a separate finding.

Life Saver's Neglect.

San Francisco, March 1.—Incompetency of the man placed on watch in Port Point lookout by the captain of the life-saving station resulted in the loss of many lives when the steamer Rio de Janeiro went down. That Mark Ellingson was incompetent is proved by his own admissions, and that he is worse than incompetent, is proved by the fact that his admissions came only after numerous denials.

When it was stated that the distress signals of the Rio were blown when she struck the rock Captain Hodgson, in charge of the station, thought it strange that his man on the lookout, within half a mile of the wreck, had sent no message to the station telling of the trouble. He questioned Ellingson and examined his record book, but Ellingson insisted that he had heard no signals.

Yesterday morning his accusing conscience could stand the strain no longer and he called the captain aside and told him that he had something to tell him.

"Captain, I heard the signal from the Rio and did not notify you," said Ellingson, his hands trembling and his eyes cast down, unable to look the captain in the face.

Then the whole story came out. Ellingson had heard whistles all through his watch and paid little heed to them, for he recognized them as those of tug boats going and coming through the Golden Gate. When the Rio came up the shore, sounding her fog siren, Ellingson heard her. He heard the sound change to the signal to stand by the boats, then he heard the long blast which continued until the exhaust of steam reduced to a dying moan. But it was not until he saw a boat passing below his point of observation, nearly two hours later, carrying what he thought was a woman, that his slow wit was forced to a recognition of disaster.

PORTO RICANS HELD

Ponce, Porto Rico, March 3.—The United States and Porto Rican Steamship Company's steamer Californian, having on board 500 emigrants for Hawaii, was weighing anchor when she was detained by the authorities. The local press has been publishing alarming stories of ill-treatment, slavery and starvation, thus discouraging would-be emigrants and men and women have calling on the police to recover runaway children. Dozens of women had asked for the detention of deserting husbands.

As a result of these complaints and requests, the police boarded the Californian. The officers of the ship refused to act and the Alcalde wired to the Governor for instructions. Un-

mately the customs authorities received orders to detain the Californian, and the police took off four children and five adults.

The Californian sailed at 10:30 o'clock for New Orleans.

ATTACKED THE EMPEROR

Berlin, March 7.—Emperor William arrived here at 6 o'clock this morning. The Empress and Count von Buelow met him at the station.

In the attack upon Emperor William by Dietrich Weiland, while the former was driving from the Rathskeller to the railway station, the Emperor was struck on the cheek just below the right eye. He was not seriously injured and refrained from commenting upon the subject. The burgomaster who accompanied a member of the staff to the station pointed out that His Majesty's cheek was bleeding.

The assailant of Emperor William in trying to escape fell under the horses of the escort riding behind the carriage. The escort handed the man over to the police. During an examination at the town hall he suffered from several epileptic fits. During the intervals between these attacks he replied to several questions but did not give out any important information. The motive of the outrage was evident when the pockets of the prisoner were searched. Medicaments found in his pockets showing he had been a chronic sufferer from epileptic fits. He is evidently weak minded. After the surgeon's visit to His Majesty, a bulletin was issued as follows:

"The wound is in the right cheek and about an inch and a half long. It passes over the zygoma and penetrates to the bone."

INAUGURAL PAGEANT

McKINLEY AND ROOSEVELT FORMALLY TAKE OFFICE

Usual Drizzling Rain Does Not Dispel Ardor of Immense Crowds--

No "Incidents" to Mar Occasion.

Washington, March 4.—William McKinley a second time is president of the United States. He was ushered into that office today in a city ablaze with more and brighter decorations than ever before had crossed the heads of the gayety-loving national capital.

The streets today resounded to the tread of more marching soldiers and sailors than ever have participated in a national occasion, and had as witnesses to the ceremonies a vast multitude, who cheered tumultuously whenever he was visible.

A slow, drizzling rain commenced falling about noon and lasted with some intermissions and an occasional downpour until late in the afternoon. The worst of the wet weather, unfortunately, came just at the time President McKinley was being inducted into office on the east front of the capitol in the presence of a great assembly who numbered 40,000 persons.

Only a small portion of the vast multitude saw anything of the actual ceremonies at the capitol. The great unnumbered thousands were content to wait in the avenue below to see the two men on whom the mental attention of the world was fixed today, and great procession which followed them in the presence of 20,000, and in the sight of twice that number of people, standing in the soaking rain, the president took the oath of office and delivered his second inaugural. The multitude waited patiently to see him kiss the Bible, and then despite the rain, they wakened the echoes of Arlington across the Potomac with their applause. Hardly had the inauguration been finished when the rain abated, turning into a drizzling mist again and later ceasing altogether.

When the president and vice president had quitted the scene to take their places at the head of the procession, the soldiers stretched across the place where the multitude had been, their bright uniforms, bay standards and accoutrements, all brass and gold showing no bad effects of the wetting they had received. A detachment of the Thirty-third Ohio, the president's own regiment during the Civil War, battered and grizzled by time, trudged along on foot in the wake of the carriage, testifying to the loyalty to the president of the comrades of the civil war. The brilliant display scheduled for the night was postponed on account of the weather, but at the beautifully decorated pension grounds, fair women and their escorts danced and passed the hours till the early hours of the morning.

The President reappointed all members of his Cabinet. Attorney General Griggs will not retire till his successor is decided upon.

London, Feb. 28.—The Queen Victoria Memorial Committee decided that the memorial shall be of a personal and monumental character.

DELEGATE WILCOX AT INAUGURATION

Impressed With Power of Magnificent Pageant.

COURTESY OF GEN. MILES MAKES GOSSIPS TALK

Thought to be Intentional Affront to the President--Miles Disclaims Any Intention of Disrespect.

New York, March 5.—Robert W. Wilcox, the delegate from Hawaii, and a native Hawaiian, is quoted in a Washington special to the World as saying of the inaugural ceremonies:

"The inauguration of President McKinley was one of the grandest pageants I have ever witnessed. I had no idea of the vastness of the United States until I saw the inaugural parade today. I was told that the troops in line represented only a small portion of those which could be commanded if necessary."

"Everywhere there was evidence of the strength of the American Government. I am exceedingly glad to have seen such a sight and shall remember it as long as I live. I was told that the rain had interfered with some of the arrangements. It was splendid enough as it was."

Delegate Wilcox is accustomed to the court ceremony of Italy, where he was educated, and also to the ceremonials of the King of Hawaii, whose trusted adviser he was.

Squabble Over Wilcox.

Washington, March 2.—A peculiar turn was given to the Hawaiian squabble today by General Nelson A. Miles, chairman of the inaugural reception committee. General Miles appointed Delegate Wilcox of Hawaii as a member of the committee at the inaugural ball to receive the President and Mrs. McKinley. Coming so soon after the President's appointment of George D. Gear to a Judgeship in Hawaii, after Gear had charged Wilcox with treason, some Washington people take General Miles' choice of Wilcox for such a conspicuous place to mean a studied affront to the President. General Miles, however, defends his appointment on the grounds of Wilcox's official position and the fact that Gear's charges were not sustained.

WARD AND THE FOG

San Francisco, March 5.—An important piece of testimony was given yesterday by Freight Clerk George Englehardt of the wrecked steamer Rio de Janeiro in the inquiry now being held by Captains Boies and Bulger, Federal inspectors of hulls and boilers. It was, in effect, that the night before the accident Captain Ward was afraid to enter the port in the fog, and said that Pilot Jordan advised the move, but he himself would stay outside a week before he would attempt it. Hardly less important was a frank admission by Chief Engineer P. H. Herlihy that he had been remiss in not being at his post while the ship was entering the harbor.

IN SENATE YESTERDAY

When the Senate met yesterday afternoon, only the members of the majority were present. House Bill No. 1, relating to the appropriation to defray the expense of the present legislative session, was taken up again and reconsidered. The word "forty" was changed to "forty" and the bill passed its third reading.

Senator J. Brown gave notice of his intention to introduce the following bill:

An Act to abolish capital punishment and to substitute imprisonment for life in lieu thereof.

Senator Kanaha introduced three bills, notice of which had already been given. These were referred to the Printing Committee.

Senator Paris introduced the following resolution:

Be it resolved, That the officers of the Senate be paid as follows: Clerk, \$10 a day; assistant clerk, \$5 a day; stenographer, \$10 a day; sergeant-at-arms, \$5 a day; interpreter, \$10; messenger, \$3 a day; janitor, \$1.50 a day.

On motion of Senator White, the resolution was laid on the table to be taken up on the regular order of business for Wednesday.

House Bills 3, 5 and 6 were read and referred to the Printing Committee.

On reading House Bill No. 10, Senator White moved that the bill be rejected. This was duly seconded and then came a warm discussion. Senator Achi said that the members of the Senate should be very careful about the way they treated matters from the House. If the bill was to be rejected forthwith in such a discourteous way, the House might some day retaliate.

Senator J. Brown said the act was directly contrary to one of the provisions of the Organic Act. This was the reason why he had seconded the motion to reject.

The motion to reject carried by a vote of 8 to 6, the ayes and noes being called.

LAHAINALUNA A PROBLEM.

Superintendent of Education Atkinson in his annual report says:

Lahainaluna is one of the difficulties of the Commissioners of Public Instruction. A report upon the present aspect of the school is subjoined. My idea would be to give up the system of patching and stopping gaps which has been pursued up to the present. If Lahainaluna is ever to become a great institution it must be adequately equipped with new buildings. The plan of the present buildings is utterly inadequate. In its present condition it is unsatisfactory, though the present Principal is an active, progressive man. But his hands are tied. If Lahainaluna is to be of full service it needs a large sum of money to be inserted in the appropriation bill.

WANT POLICE CALL BOX.

Sheriff Brown in his annual report says:

The efficiency of the officers on duty in Honolulu would be greatly added to by the installing of the police call box system. The installation of twenty-five such boxes at a probable cost of \$10,000, would enable all officers on their beats to immediately communicate with police headquarters, would enable them to call for assistance for the patrol wagon, or give immediate notice of fire. It would enable the officer in charge at headquarters to know how constantly the men were patrolling their beats, for every such patrolman would be required to ring in his report.

KAMEHAMEHA SCHOOLS

ECKLEY STANDS UP AS PROTECTOR OF INSTITUTION

Refers to Emmeluth's Remarks—Argument All Came Up Over Mahoe's Report to Reject Bill 26.

The House met promptly at 9 o'clock today. Kakaia asked for the reconsideration of the report of the Superintendent of Public Works on the map at Hookea, South Kona, Hawaii.

Mahoe moved that the matter be referred to the Committee on Public Lands, so ordered.

Ewakilo presented the following petition signed by twenty-six voters of the Republic of Hawaii:

"We the undersigned qualified voters residing in the Third Precinct of the District of the Island of Hawaii, Territory of Hawaii, do humbly ask for immediate consideration and approval of the following prayer:

"1. To repeal that section of the constitution which has reference to the segregation of the Chinese and Japanese."

"2. To repeal the vaccination law."

"3. To provide an Act for the education of native Hawaiian youths abroad."

"4. To provide an Act for the granting of licenses to Hawaiians to practice medicine."

"5. To provide an Act that the Hawaiian language be taught in all public schools."

"6. The petition was referred to the committee on miscellaneous petitions."

Robertson presented a petition from Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co., setting forth that the petitioner for years been engaged in the business of transporting freight and passengers between the ports of these islands and now asks relief in the sum of \$136.25 from the Collector General Customs; the sum being paid to expenses of a coasting license the steamer Kilohana which was asked prior to the expiration of the same, at Lahaina, Maui, Dec. 12, 1899. He petition was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

(Mahoe presented a report for the callaneous Petitions Committee on Bill 26, as follows: We beg leave to report that, after a full consideration of the laws now in force on desertion and, after carefully studying those sections to be repealed, your committee has seen fit—If these sections pass one of chapters of the Penal Laws and chapter of the Session Laws of 1890, then

there will arise more disagreement between husband and wife because of the absence of such a law.

Therefore, your committee recommends that the sections now in existence in reference to desertion, be left as they stand and we beg leave to recommend this Act be rejected."

There was a lengthy discussion on the bill, during which Emmeluth said he believed in the passage of such laws that would have the tendency to improve home life. He referred to the present system of the Kamehameha schools in educating the children to higher ideals, and believes in the passage of an act or acts that would improve the home life of the average Hawaiian.

Later, he said that more graduates of Kamehameha school were seen as police officers and back drivers in Honolulu than in the regular professions.

Beckley took the floor to reply to Emmeluth's remarks. He said he thought it was his duty to protect the interests of the pupils of Kamehameha school from the attacks made upon that institution by the member from Oahu. His comparison of the studies taught there were extravagant and not based upon facts.

"I was taught in the Kamehameha schools," said Beckley, "and what lessons of economy I may possess were obtained in that institution."

Emmeluth's remarks created quite a stir among the members. A running debate took place on the proper mode of procedure in acting upon the report of the committee, as to whether it be rejected or adopted. Points of order were called and, for a few minutes, the excitement over the final disposition of the measure was quite intense.

The chair brought the matter to a head by stating that the only question before the House was the adoption or rejection of the committee report. Emmeluth asked the chair to be excused from voting.

The report was adopted by a vote of 19 yeas to 5 nays.

At about 11:30 the House took a recess until 1:30 p. m.

CIRCUIT COURT OVER

MAUNALEI INTERVENORS

MOTION WAS DENIED

Motion to Dismiss Filed Today in the Ejectment Suit of Hawaiian Trust and Investment Company.

The February term of the First Circuit Court was ordered adjourned this morning by Judge Humphreys. All cases and all motions and other matters pending, are continued until the next term of this court, whether the same be special or regular.

Arguments were heard this morning on the motion to intervene in the case of Gear, Lansing & Co. vs. The Maunalei Sugar Company. The motion was denied by Judge Humphreys on the ground that it was irregular and informal in matters relative to intervention.

In the suit for ejectment brought by the Hawaiian Trust & Investment Co., Ltd., vs. Annie Barton, Helen A. Denning, Gear & Lansing, J. O. Lott and Sullivan & Buckley, motion to dismiss the action, was filed today by Gear, Lansing & Co. through their attorney, Geo. A. Davis. The motion is made on the grounds that the court has no jurisdiction over the persons of the defendants, Gear, Lansing & Co. Also that process was not duly served upon the two defendants, or either of them, as required by law.

DEATH OF MRS. WARD.

Mrs. Elizabeth Ward, widow of the late Edward Francis Ward, died at noon today after a lingering illness from cancer of the stomach. During the last months of her illness Mrs. Ward and her husband were in constant attendance. Mrs. Ward was a native of Scotland, but has been a resident of Honolulu for some 15 years, coming here from New Zealand. Of late she has been residing with her son, L. de L. Ward. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 from St. Clement's chapel, Makiki.

London, Feb. 25.—One white child has died of plague at Cape Town. Three others are suffering.

MISS ROBERTS AS CAMILLE DE WET'S CAMP IS SCATTERED BY BRITISH

London, Feb. 25.—Lord Kitchen states that De Wet's invasion of Cape Colony has completely failed.

Reuter's correspondent states that it is reported at Cape Town that after the engagement at Disfontein De Wet crossed the Orange river in a boat, fleeing with a handful of followers.

Later Colonel Plumer reports that Colonel Owen's detachment of King's Dragoons, the Victorian Imperial Bushmen, and the Imperial Light Horse on Saturday captured De Wet's 15-pounder and pom poms.

The Boers are in full retreat and are dispersing, being vigorously pursued. Fifty prisoners and some carts and ammunition were captured.

There were no British casualties. Other reports state that De Wet on Friday thrice failed in his attempts to cross the Orange river.

Colonel Plumer on Saturday chased him from Kameldrift towards Hope town.

Fancying the British were exhausted, De Wet lagged in the evening, and then Colonel Owen charged, capturing the enemy's artillery.

The Boers fled, leaving their horses saddled and cooking pots full.

Mr. Bennett Burleigh states that Colonel Owen also captured a maxim.

The Boers scattered in small bodies. De Wet's party is reduced to 300.

Steyn told the Boers, many of whom were dismounted and shoeless, to shift as best they could, and return to the Orange River Colony. He and De Wet took 500 of the best horses and crossed the railroad at Kranskul, 60 miles north of De Aar, early on Sunday, moving eastward.

Colonel Thornycroft and others with fresh horses are closely pursuing the fugitives.

They carried beautiful wreaths of flowers with which to decorate the tomb. A photographer also accompanied the party to take a picture of the resting place of the Austrian commander, for his wife, who now lives at the naval port of Pola, Austria.

Captain Schweigsuth was buried in Nuuanu cemetery nine years ago, having died at sea on the Fasana, an Austrian man of war.

Striking Specimens of Olaa Cane

Some remarkable specimens of cane, grown on the Olaa plantation are on exhibition at the entrance to the store of the Pacific Hardware Company. One shows a growth of six feet in nine months at an elevation of 3900 feet. Eight stalks from 12 to 15 feet in length, show the growth of the Rose Bamboo in 18 months at an elevation of 1600 feet.

Several stalks of like size and length show what has grown at the 1400 foot elevation, without care or cultivation of any kind.

The display has attracted passers by all day and is a valuable object lesson in the merits of Olaa.
