

Besides it is a fact which tenderhearted philanthropists sometimes orget that the healthy child, especially one that is allowed to play out of doors, is almost always blessed with an appetite and ready to eat anything eatable. Still another consideration should not be lost sight of. Cockett vs. Kihei Matter Breaks All Maui Record

WAILUKU, Maul, Nov. 14.-The jectment suit of Patrick Cockett gainst the Kihel Plantation Co., Ltd., after occupying the attention of Circuit Judge A. N. Kepolkal and he jury for a period of eight days, erminated this afternoon in favor of the defendant plantation. Attorney C. W. Ashford fought hard for his client, while Attorney W. A. Kinney represented the Kihel Plantation Co. ome years ago, P. Cockett of Waikapu and manager of the W. H. Cornwell estate ranch, bought the interest of one of the heirs of Poonui of Pulehunui in Kula. 
