## Editorial

### Politics - and the Club 100

Good times or bad times, come war or in times of uneasy peace - the hoopeddoo of electing a President goes on every four years. And for the first time this year, we in Hawaii have participated and shared in the excitement of this greatest of all American traditions. And to get the "feel" of voting this first time, we could not have participated in a more appropriate election.

The closeness of the popular vote wherein president-elect Jack Kennedy received less than a majority of the 69 million popular votes; the hair-line closeness of the popular vote in our own State; the shift of California from Kennedy to Nixon; the burial of the religious issue once and for all; the thinning margin of Jack Kennedy's electoral vote, and the accompanying question of whether the electoral college should be eliminated - these and a myriad of other situations, nationally and locally, brought great excitement to us here in Hawaii. And now that the battles are over, we must get back to the business at hand once more.

Where do we start? Of course, we have never closed house, so to speak, so the primary question is that of providing impetus to the new direction (at the national level). As for ourselves, things will continue to go on as usual and for the majority of us, the shock wave of the change in national administration will not be felt at all. However, this should not mean that we can ignore what is taking place. And the best way to feel the sum and substance of this change, and the actions that they portend, is to take an active role in politics.

There is a simile here some place in comparing the political situation to playing the stock market. In making a decision to buy stocks, we try to buy at the low, then hang on in hopes that the market will rise, and on this upswing, we either sell and

take our profit or continue to invest in the future. This is the simile to the political situation - in other words, now is a good time to join either political party.

Confining the question to the local situation, the State Republican Party has a rebuilding job to do, and will be looking around for new and alert, aggressive individuals. This a good time to join the Republican Party, especially if you have ideas or talent to contribute.

The State Democratic Party has a great reservoir of young and aggressive hustlers - merchants, lawyers, businessmen, professionals in every endeavor - who, by tradition, are closer to the people than the Republicans. However, the Democrats are never one to rest on their laurels, and they will be out beating the bushes to see to it that the Republicans do not latch on to the untapped talents floating around the fringe of the political arena. So now is a good time to join the Democratic Party also.

And what has all this got to do with us, the members of the Club 100? Plenty, when you realize that every government and civic improvement must take the form of political action. Political action is the ultimate step in our representative form of government which is initially expressed in the form of the citizen's voting power.

Although members of the Club 100 occupy outstanding political and governmental positions, there are not enough of us. You will note on page 3 that there are 538 paid-up members in the club at present (80% on Oahu). Surely, these 538 must represent a great pool of talent. Why not put this talent to use? And by so doing, the club would be expressing in another way it's motto For Continuing Service. OR WOULD EITHER THE REPUBLICAN OR DEMOCRATIC PARTY BE WILLING TO CANVASS THE CLUB MEMBERSHIP TO DETERMINE HOW MANY WOULD WANT TO JOIN, ON THE ASSUMPTION THAT THEY MAY UNCOVER A FEW POLITICAL NUGGETS? In other words, instead of the party waiting for the people to come to it, let the party go out and systematically recruit membership.

If more of us would enter the field of politics, just think how much more interesting subsequent local and national elections could become. In other words, involvement becomes one of the keys to understanding, appreciation and excitement - and contribution of ourselves and our capabilities to the human good. And it's also possible that in 1964, one of our members could be entering the ticket at the national level. How's that for excitement! -bt

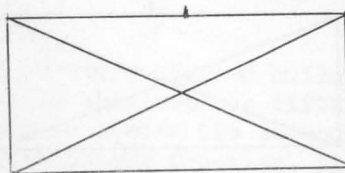
Low gross winners were T. Oshita, J. Oshiro and J. Tani. High net was T. Azama.

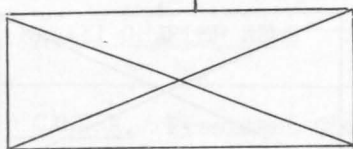
Baker Chapter members voted in favor of donating \$25.00 to the Arizona Memorial Fund.

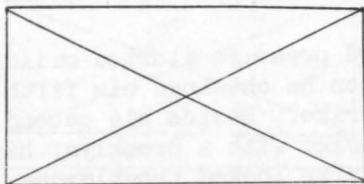
Double congratulations were handed out to him when he also climbed into the 700 magic circle with a 712 series.

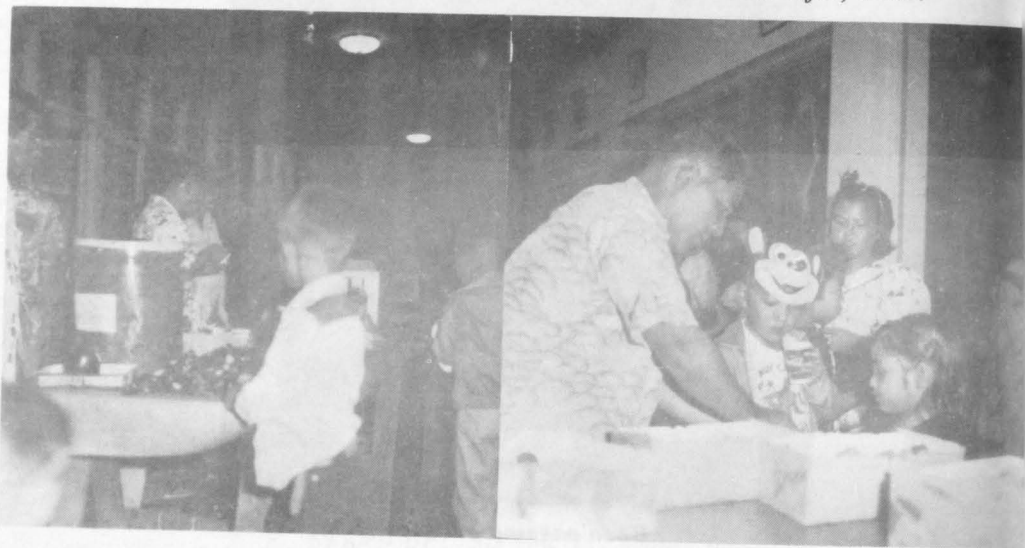

NISEI VETERANS REUNION - HAWAII - June 10-17, 1961

Los Angeles was the site of the last Nisei Veterans Reunion in July of 1958. Next year, Hawaii - the newest state of the Union, will play host to all of the Nisei veterans of WWII. The leg work for this 1961 reunion has been going on, in committees, for many, many months and planning details are fast being transmitted into action. Here to bring you up-to-date as to what has gone on so far is the Executive Secretary of the 442nd Veterans Club, Mr. Christian Nakama, who is also the Program Chairman.

Veterans Reunion Committee revealed that the Representatives of the Reunion Committee from Hawaii were royally treated at all stops by the different Nisei Groups on the mainland. Promotion program included the Aloha Airline entertainers, flap board presentation, movie film of Hawaii, and question and answer period. An overall participation of 600 persons from the mainland was not considered a very high figure.

The Pacific War Memorial Commission is in need of \$200,000 to complete the USS Arizona Memorial Project in Pearl Harbor. Envelopes requesting contribution from individuals were distributed to the Chapter Representatives. Club 100 will donate \$100 as a symbolic gesture because the Club emerged directly by World War II in which the USS Arizona was sunk at the very outset.

Members of the Plaque & Guidon Committee are working on a plaque which will bear the names of Club 100 officers of past years inscribed on metal plates. Display of Chapter guidons in Turner Hall will be delayed because the local market cannot furnish the required product. Services of Col Evans may be requested in obtaining the items.

## COOKING KORNER - A delicious Chocolate Cake!

How many of you have tried the ever popular German Chocolate Cake? A good many of you have seen it in the papers and have tried it by now, I am sure. For the sake of those who do not have the recipe or have it but have not decided whether or not it will be worth your efforts, I urge you to give it a try. It is a fabulous cake.

### German Chocolate Cake

| 1     | pkg. Baker's German Sweet Chocolate |     |                            |
| 1/2 C | Boiling water                       | 1   | tsp soda                   |
| 1     | C Butter or margarine               | 1/2 | tsp salt                   |
| 2     | C Sugar                             | 1   | C buttermilk               |
| 4     | Egg yolks, unbeaten                 | 4   | egg whites, stiffly beaten |
| 1     | tsp. Vanilla                        |     |                            |
| 2 1/2 | C Sifted cake flour                 |     |                            |

Melt chocolate in 1/2 cup of boiling water. Cool. Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg yolks one at a time, beating after each. Add vanilla and chocolate; mix until blended. Sift flour with soda and salt. Alternately add sifted dry ingredients and buttermilk to chocolate mixture, beating after each addition until batter is smooth. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour batter into three 8 or 9 inch layer pans, lined on bottoms with paper.

Bake in moderate oven for 30-40 minutes. Cool. For frosting, use the Coconut Pecan Frosting.

### Coconut Pecan Frosting

| 3      | egg yolks, slightly beaten |         | Angel Flake Coconut |
| 1/4 lb | butter or margarine        | 1       | C chopped pecans    |

Combine milk, sugar, egg yolks, butter or margarine, and vanilla in a sauce pan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens, about 12 minutes. Remove from heat. Add coconut and pecans. Beat until cool and of spreading consistency. Makes 2 2/3 cups or enough frosting to cover tops of three 8 or 9-inch layers.
