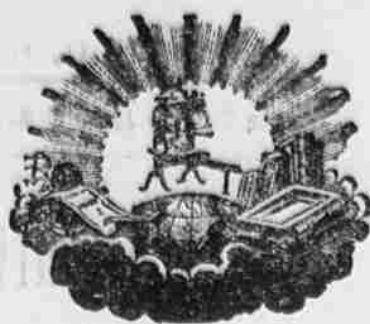

The Paradise of the Pacific for October is out. With the present number the paper appears under the editorial management of Mr. Frank Godfrey, a well known journalist of Honolulu. The announcement is also made that Messrs. J. J. Williams and Frank Godfrey are the proprietors. The journal gives evidence of much improvement under the new management, both as to variety and arrangement of matter. The editorial matter is judiciously written and will serve to extend the scope and influence of the journal abroad as well as at home.

Hon. A. Marques spoke like one who knew all about it the other day, when he told the House that pretty much the whole civilized world took their censuses this year. Therefore, Hawaii, by adopting the reasonable proposition of the Minister of Finance that, on account of shortness of time, the census should be postponed till next year, would appear foolish. Mr. Marques was, however, only showing ignorance in making the statement in question as a ground of opposing postponement, as he showed childishness—a thin House confirming his juvenile pettishness—in moving in effect that the Hawaiian census be abandoned altogether. The fact is that all great nations do not take their censuses in the years ending decades. Great Britain and at least some of her large dependencies take their censuses in the years beginning the decades. As those countries represent a respectable number of millions of the world's population, Hawaii would have pretty tolerable company in taking her census next year.

Mr. D. Howard Hitchcock, the talented young Hawaiian artist, left Honolulu for the Zealandia to begin his studies and travels abroad. Mr. Hitchcock had not, when he left, fully matured his plans and hence they are subject to change. It is a pleasure to make this notice of a home artist of Mr. Hitchcock's ability, and we have no hesitancy in placing him before the public as more than an amateur, from whom his many friends and admirers in Hawaii may expect to hear further in actual and meritorious work.

Mr. Hitchcock goes from here direct to New York, where he will remain a few weeks getting his bearings before crossing the pond for Europe. He will probably take a French steamer direct from New York to Havre. He will go thence to Paris where he will likely remain two years studying under at least two masters. At the close of his Paris tuition the young artist will travel and study throughout the principal galleries of Europe, including those of Germany, Italy and England. He will probably be absent from Hawaii four or five years.

## NOT REPRESENTED.

## EDITOR BULLETIN:—

Being a countryman and loyal subject of a foreign government, having its representative to the court of this kingdom, I was quite struck by a remark made use of in my hearing to the effect that a certain foreign dignitary was absent during the hearing of a recent case before the Supreme Court, wherein the defendant (a countryman of mine) was cited to appear in court and show cause, etc.

How far it is a rule, or custom, among the foreign dignitaries to attend in Court, I don't pretend to know, still it is not unusual to notice their presence in Court, as one often reads in the newspapers; in fact I have seen more than one instance of a foreign representative present in court watching the proceedings against a subject of his government, whose liberty was at stake.

Of the recent case referred to, it would be idle to say that the absent dignitary had no knowledge of the pendency of the matter, especially as the case was pretty well known among the members of a certain society; and besides enough publicity concerning it had been made by a member of said society in one of the newspapers whose local columns are edited by a fellow.

## EDITORIAL THEORY.

## EDITOR BULLETIN:—

In an editorial of the Advertiser of Oct. 21st is the following: "Unless the cost of field labor comes down very materially indeed, our great industries will be so crippled that the mechanic will come in for his share of the loss and suffer severely," etc. The above is only one more sample of the many toots blown from the horn of the Advertiser during the last year or more, in order to frighten the workmen into passiveness and submission, so that the planter can again open the flood gates of Chinese invasion.

The whole course of the planter proves conclusively that he is no friend of the white or native mechanic; he wants no such trash as long as he can get a Chinaman to fill the bill; be it as carpenter, sugar boiler, mason or engineer. And mind you, if John Chinaman could handle the plowing on plantations, as well as the native, the native could go to Jericho also or else come down to starvation wages.

Another thing, the planter wants no one on his plantation who has the independence and manhood to assert and stand up for his rights when trampled upon; therefore his yearning and pleading for servile coolie labor. Taken altogether the planter in his past and present mood wishes to overrun the Islands with hordes of Chinese cheap laborers to enrich himself. He is to be looked upon not as the great benefactor he would fondly have the people believe, but rather as the greatest embodiment of selfishness, that ever appeared within the realms of Hawaii nei.

## FANATICISM AND INTOLERANCE.

## EDITOR BULLETIN:—

In the "Forum" for Sept. of the present year appear an article entitled "The Christianity of the Future" which might supply the numerous fanatics and intolerant extremists of temperance preaching with healthy food for thought. In community on the "backward development" of Christianity during the first decades after the coming of Christ and later, the author of the article, Prof. John J. Blackie, shows the extremes, from uncurbed license to austere asceticism, into which the early Christians went, and regarding the latter goes on to say: "The opposite extreme the denial of the rights of the flesh altogether, was more obvious and we have asceticism in various forms. . . . In the New Testament the flesh is used as a comprehensive term to designate sin generally, but to conclude from this that the flesh has no rights, is as absurd as it would be in a workman to deny the right of his tools to be kept in good working order, or in a rider to deny the right of his horse to be well fed and well cared for. The flesh or the body or the material outside of a man has as much right to its own sound condition and healthy enjoyment as a good house has to a sound foundation, or a good picture to a sound canvas. But of course every hasty fool does not see this, so the newly converted sinner, in his hurry to become a saint, thinks he can eradicate all vice at a stroke by retreat from every field where a temptation is possible, and by abstaining from every enjoyment that may shoot up into a vice. Hence asceticism and monkery, which look very pretty in the lives of a certain class of saints, but which in fact are only a cheap method of getting freedom from certain vices at a bound, and of acquiring the reputation of a hero by refusing to fight a battle. For, say what we will, abstinence is the despair of virtue. I abstain because I am too weak to be temperate; I retreat because I dare not face the adversary; I commence my virtuous career by a public confession of the most unmanly of all vices, namely, cowardice."

No doubt it is wise in some persons in some cases to play the coward; and self-sacrifice and self-denial in some exceptional style, like the amputation of a limb, may be the only safety to a man for whom a large freedom cannot be claimed. But neither our Lord nor his

apostles were taught that the abstinence prescribed for the moral diseases of the few was to be laid down as a rule of health for the many. On the contrary, even drinking at marriage feasts and elsewhere receives a sympathetic recognition from the same God-man by whom the sour faces, the formal fastings and the severe sabbath practice of the pharisaic respectables was condemned; and meats and drinks, according to the great apostle, were to be wisely used and moderately enjoyed, just as we enjoy the universal brightness of the sun and the universal fragrance of the flower.

Not only temperance-craze, but advocates of the Sunday-law in all its absurd Puritanical rigor; which denies all innocent and healthful recreation and amusement to the hard-working members of society; business men, mechanics and laborers, would profit by studying the lesson of this article, which includes all kinds of abstinence self-denial and asceticism.

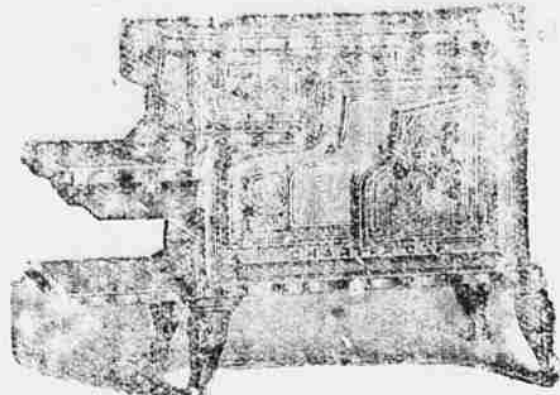

## THE LEGISLATURE.

108TH DAY.

TUESDAY, Oct. 21.

Noble Macfarlane was doubtful about the legality of the lease, but there were some extenuating circumstances. According to Mr. Cornwell's statement his father let adjoining lands at \$75 a year, and he doubted if this could have been rented for more than the lease calls for. However, he would take the ground that the lease was illegal. It has been stated that Mr. Cornwell has a good claim for damages. Even if the Government would have to pay damages of \$20,000 on account of breaking this lease, he did not think that the House could afford to make a new lease after the previous one had been adjudged illegal. He would not admit that the late Minister of the Interior was actuated by high motives and a conscientious sense of duty in breaking that lease. Mr. Thurston was personally interested in an adjacent piece of land—the land of Omaupio, situated in the middle of his Haleakala Ranch—in the case of which the application was carefully pigeon-holed and it was not until fifteen months after that the lease was put up at auction, when it brought \$730 per year. In that case Mr. Thurston was not paying a cent of rent, it was what is known as a "sleeping" on the land. There were numbers of other expired leases over the kingdom, including valuable business property and sugar lands, which should have been renewed by Mr. Thurston and at considerably advanced rentals. Noble Macfarlane then proceeded to read a list of these lands.

Noble J. M. Horner called the speaker to order. He should give his information to the Minister of the Interior.

Noble Macfarlane proposed to give the information to the House. If Noble Horner did his duty he would move a resolution to-morrow to have all the illegal leases of public lands broken, and the expired leases put up at auction at once as provided by law.

Noble Baldwin wished to correct the previous speaker. He was equally interested with Mr. Thurston in the ranch to which reference was made. There were thousands of acres there of which the outside public had more use than the nominal holders. The land was largely worthless for agricultural purposes, and it was when they desired to fence a portion of it for a cattle run that, in order to establish their right, they concluded to have it put up at auction. This was done and the lease run up to three or four times its value by Chinese and others. Whether the slur by the hon. Noble was intended for Mr. Thurston or himself, it was unjust and should be withdrawn.

Rep. Cummings gave some facts from his own experience in leasing public lands to prove that the lease in question was a reasonable one when made. Opponents of this measure were overlooking graver encroachments on public rights, such as the harbor lease previously mentioned. A few years ago you could get all the land on the Honolulu plains for a dollar an acre, whereas now you could not get it for a thousand dollars an acre. Mr. Cornwell's enterprise had increased the value of this land, and now an outcry was raised that he was getting it too cheap.

The President, on a motion for recess, appointed the following committee on the Fire Marshal resolution: Messrs. Lucas, Muller, Berger, Bush, and Spencer.

Recess from 12 to 1:30.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The House resumed at 1:50.

Rep. Cummings said there was no doubt the lease was illegal, but if all the illegal leases were to be annulled he would be in favor of that. He hoped they would vote for the passage of the bill.

Noble Cornwell had but a few words to say on the bill. There is hardly a member in the House but will say that I have been unjustly dealt with. It is for the House to say whether the bill passes or it is left for me to bring action against the Government which I do not want to do. As the bill has been pretty well discussed, I move the previous question. Carried.

The motion to indefinitely postpone the bill was carried on the following division:

Ayes—Messrs. Brown, Spencer, Nobles Widemann, Berger, Muller, McCarthy, Phillips, J. M. Horner, Hind, Marsden, Baldwin, W. Y. Horner, Anderson, G. N. Wilcox, Kanos; Repts. Rickard, Knudsen, Rice, A. S. Wilcox—19.

Noes—Nobles Pua, Crabbe; Repts. Cummings, Lucas, R. W. Wilcox, Kauli, Kahookano, Pachaole, Kaneali, Cockett, Halstead—11.

When Noble Cornwell's name was called he voted no.

Noble Widemann asked if a member interested in a bill could vote on it.

President Walker said the vote would not count.

Rep. Bush asked to be excused, as he had been one of the parties concerned.

A motion to reconsider was lost. Third reading of an Act to provide for and regulate the sending of Hawaiian youths abroad to be educated.

Rep. Rickard moved the bill do now pass.

Noble J. M. Horner said there was a good deal of money involved in the bill, and he thought that those sent away should return at the completion of their studies, so that the country get some benefit.

Rep. White—Can the hon. noble mention any that have not returned?

Noble J. M. Horner—There is Makaina in England.

Noble W. Y. Horner—It is common talk about Lahaina that he does not intend to return.

Rep. Pachaole—There something in what Noble Horner says, and I am in favor of putting in an amendment that they return when they complete their education abroad. The country should certainly receive some benefit.

Minister Brown—The intention of the amendment is very good. But how is it going to be carried out? They may find things more congenial abroad, and how are you going to compel them to come back? The amendment might be introduced into the bill, but it would have no effect. The Government has a ward in Boston who is a very skillful engraver. When he gets through he will be able to find employment there at good wages. There is no chance for him here. I support the motion to pass the bill as its stands.

The bill passed.

Third reading of an act to regulate the issuing of wholesale licenses, as provided by section 56 of the Civil Code, as amended by Chapter LVI of the session laws of 1876, approved on the 27th day of September, 1876.

Rep. Rickard moved to amend section 2 by striking out the words "other than a room for the display of samples."

Noble McCarthy moved the bill be indefinitely postponed. It was aimed against the interests of one particular person. These people want to shut him out. They have been so anxious about the bill that in section 2 this person's place of business is actually defined. It is an outrage.

Rep. Brown said this was the first time that he knew this bill was aimed at one particular person. It was brought in to protect the wholesale dealers who pay taxes and compel drummers to take out a license according to law. The bill should pass.

Noble Muller was surprised to hear Noble McCarthy say that the bill was aimed against one person, when he knew it was not so. He took good care not to mention names.

Noble McCarthy—The bill is aimed at Mr. P. Peck, and those who got it up came and asked me to vote for it.

Rep. R. W. Wilcox moved an amendment that the stock of goods be fixed at \$5000 instead of \$10,000 as in the bill.

Rep. Cummings moved the amount be \$1000.

Rep. Brown moved section 2 be stricken out.

Rep. Cummings withdrew his motion.

The motion to indefinitely postpone the bill was lost on the following division:

Ayes—Nobles McCarthy, J. M. Horner, W. Y. Horner and Anderson; Repts. Nawahi, Horner and Waipulani—7.

Noes—Messrs. Brown and Peterson; Nobles Widemann, Berger, Macfarlane, Muller, Pua, Phillips, Crabbe, Parker, Marsden, Cornwell, Von Tempisky, Wilcox and Kanos; Repts. Brown, Cummings, Lucas, R. W. Wilcox, Rosa, Kauli, Baker, Rickard, Apiki, Pachaole, White, Kaneali, Cockett, Halstead, Knudsen and Rice—31.

The motion to strike out section 2 was carried, and section 3 was made section 2.

The bill passed as amended.

A motion to reconsider was lost. Second reading of bill No. 102A, an Act to regulate the military forces of the kingdom.

A motion to consider the bill section by section was carried.

Section 1. The military forces of the kingdom shall consist exclusively of the King's Royal Guard, which shall be a permanent force as herein-after provided.

The section passed.

After section 2 was read, Noble McCarthy moved an amendment with regard to the number of officers. It passed, and the section passed as amended. It reads:

Section 2. The officers of the King's Guard shall consist of a captain and two lieutenants who shall be appointed or removed by His Majesty. These officers shall have power to make, alter and revoke all regulations not repugnant to the provisions of this Act, concerning enlistment, discipline, exercises, accoutrements, arms and clothing, and to make such other rules and orders as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this Act, and to provide and prescribe penalties for any violations of such regulations not extending to deprivation of life or limb or the infliction of corporal punishment. Every such rule, regulation or order shall require for its validity the approval of His Majesty the King, and shall be countersigned by the Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Section 3. His Majesty the King shall be Commander-in-Chief of all the military forces, and shall have power to convene courts martial and to confirm the sentences thereof, and may appoint persons to serve without pay on his personal staff with such honorary rank as he may designate.

The section passed.

Section 4. There shall be a paid permanent military force of not less than 65 men nor more than 100 men of all ranks, which shall be named the "King's Royal Guard."

Rep. Rickard moved it be amended to read "not less than 35 nor more than 75 men," etc.

Noble Muller moved the section pass as in the bill.

Noble J. M. Horner moved to reduce to 50 men.

The section then passed as in the bill.

Section 5. The King's Royal Guard shall be the body guard of His Majesty the King, and the King shall have the sole right to appoint and commission all its officers, which commissions shall be countersigned by the Minister of Foreign Affairs. Passed.

Section 6. The soldiers of the King's Royal Guard shall be enlisted to serve for three or five years, and shall be men of good physical development and in sound health, which must be certified to by two regular physicians. One-half between 20 and 30 years old shall be enlisted for three years, and one-half between 20 and 25 years old shall be enlisted for five years, and all shall take the oath prescribed in Schedule A. Passed.

Section 7. All public property used for and in connection with the military forces of the Kingdom, and the expenditure of all moneys appropriated for military purposes and for bands, flags and salutes, shall be subject to the orders and under the general supervision and control of the Minister of Foreign Affairs. Passed.

Section 8. Any armed force not organized in accordance with the provisions of this Act shall be illegal, and is prohibited. Provided, however, that this section shall not apply to the police.

Noble Marsden moved it be indefinitely postponed. It will be illegal under this section for any rifle club to carry on its sport. It will work against the uniform rank K. of P., who wear uniform and carry swords.

Noble McCarthy did not like the section as it stood. He moved to amend by inserting the words "without permission of Minister of Foreign Affairs."

Rep. Brown moved to amend so as to read "Any military or armed force."

Noble Widemann—There are a great many who take pride in a rifle club. They carry rifles and make a show of them when they go out. There is no harm in that. The amendment by Rep. Brown was good one, but, if passed, there should be another section to provide for the punishment of anyone who would misconstrue it.

Noble McCarthy was not in favor of striking the section out. He moved to add at the end the following words: "or any military force connected with any organization holding a license at the time of the passage of this Act."

The motion to strike out the section was lost.

The amendment offered by Rep. Brown passed.

The amendment by Noble McCarthy was lost.

The section then passed as amended.

Noble Widemann said there should be a prohibitory section, and the military committee should be instructed to bring in such a section.

Section 8. This Act shall be in full force and effect from and after the time of its approval, and Chapter XXV. of the laws of 1888, entitled "An Act relating to the Military Forces of the Kingdom," and all other laws and parts of laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. Passed.

The schedule referred to in Section 6 was read and passed.

Rep. Brown moved to reconsider the last vote. Carried.

The hon. member then moved the insertion of the following section:

Section 9. Whoever shall organize any military armed force, or belong to or become a member of any military force, other than that provided for by this Act shall, upon conviction before any police or district justice, be fined in a sum of not less than \$100, nor more than \$250.

The section was amended to read No. 10 and passed.

The bill passed as amended to engrossment, to be read a third time on Tuesday.

The House adjourned at 3:50.
