TELPHERAGE,

By which a nearly continuous stream of sugar cane or other material may be moved by means of electric motors, drawing buckets, baskets or other containers, along a stationary steel rod suspended on posts, the power being supplied at a central station by means of a steam engine or water power working an electric dynamo.

This system does not profess to compete with tramways where the ground is suitable for such a mode of conveyance, but the circumstances under which its advantages are apparent are:

Where the ground is very rough, uneven or gulchy, or where the gradients are steep, as it has no difficulty in drawing a load up an incline of 1 in 10.

Where the space for a tramway cannot well be spared, or over swamps or other ground impracticable for tramways.

It can be taken along the high road with as much facility, and with little more obstruction to the traffic than by a line of telephone posts.

It has the advantage of the overhead wire rope system without its disadvantages, as there is not a long wire rope to drag, with its attendant friction and loss of power, whilst it can turn on sharp curves.

The main line can be moved to different positions at a moderate expense.

A line is now working at Glynde, in Sussex.

BILL NYE AS A BIOGRAPHER.

Fresh Light Thrown on the Character of Caesar—His Coolness Toward Pompey. [New York Mercury.]

In 62 B. C. Caesar, who had barely escaped the conspiracy trial with his life, was made pretor, and the following year proprietor, but he had been vaccinated and so escaped. In 60 B. C. he formed with Pompey and Crassus the first triumvirate, a kind of blind pool for passing any kind of a bill they thought would be a good thing.

Caesar then went into the war business, and it was a cold day when he did not sound from one to five tocsins, and with a loud whoop on the warpath. Every little while he would fire the culverin, and then you would see him roll up his pantaloons with great sang-froid and wade in blood. He did not care whose blood it was, so that it wasn't his own, and so that it was warm.

Caesar's daughter, Julia, who became the wife of Pompey, afterward died, and a coolness sprang up between Pompey and his father-in-law, for Pompey was a leader of the aristocracy, while Caesar ate pie with his knife in order to conciliate the common people.

Caesar soon found himself at the head of a small army and Pompey at the head of another. He was ordered to disband his forces, which he agreed to do, provided that Pompey would do the same, but the latter refused, and on the banks of the Rubicon, with 5,000 infantry and 800 cavalry, he considered the situation of going to war against his son-in-law. After thinking it over for a long time he finally exclaimed, "The die is cast." His language on that occasion has been used with more or less success ever since.

He then crossed the Rubicon and marched on rapidly to Rome, where he made it red hot for Pompey. Pompey soon took his troops and went over to Greece, where it was cooler and where Caesar could not follow him without getting his feet wet. Soon afterward, however, the two enemies met on the plains of Pharsalia. Pompey had 30,000 troops, but Caesar succeeded in putting the kibosh on Pompey, who went to Egypt, claiming that he and Caesar never could get along together, and as Caesar would not go to Egypt, he would go there himself. Pompey was afterward assassinated by parties who are still at large. It is thought that they are concealed somewhere in Canada.

When Caesar had cleaned out an army, he would make report to the senate something like this:

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE, SEN. VAIL, VAIL, YONGE, YONGE, CESAR. He was afterward made imperator or emperor for life or during good behavior, with a large salary. This office he held with marked success until the day of March, 44 B. C., when he was assassinated by a committee of influential citizens, who waited on him for that purpose.

Caesar's great coolness in a crisis is here most noticeable, for while surrounded by assassins and with his system full of large irregular holes, seeing Brutus, whom he had been led to believe solid, he exclaimed, "Et tu Brutus," and expired. In the excitement naturally incident to an assassination in which Caesar had been chosen to act as the corpse, his great sang-froid in addressing Brutus in perfectly correct Latin shows that he well deserved the tribute paid him by an eminent historian, whose name at this moment has escaped my memory, in which he stated that "Caesar was no slouch."

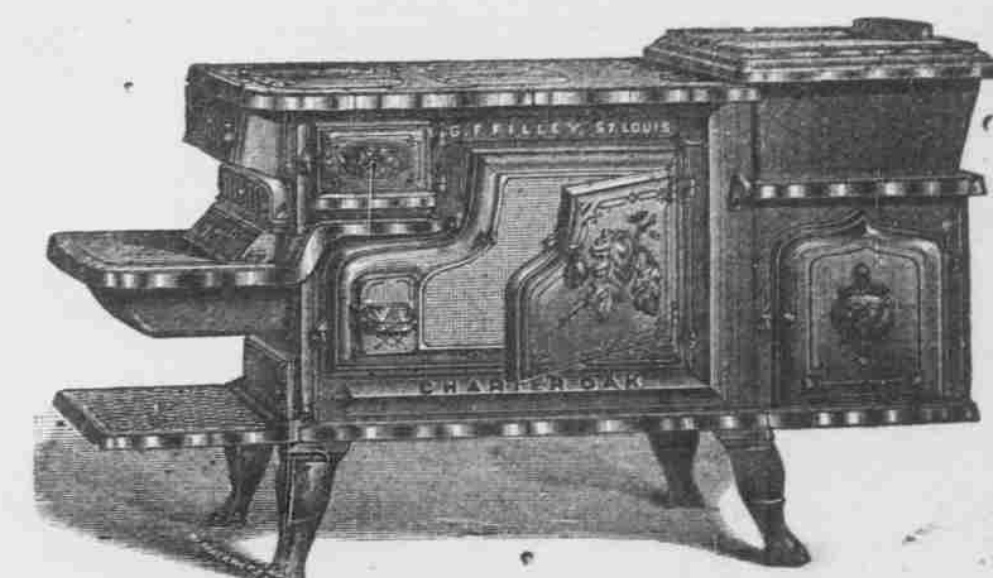
