If there be any such country in the world we confess our ignorance of its existence.

What was it built the railroad systems of the world but borrowed money in one form or another? Private enterprise incurred these debts in the United States and the United Kingdom. In the British Colonies and India the Governments became responsible, either directly as builders and operators of the railroads, or as guarantors of interest upon the

bonds issued against capital borrowed for construction. What was it built the Canadian-Pacific Railroad across the untraveled and trackless wilderness connecting the wharves at Quebec by a steel track with the waters of the Pacific at Burrard's Inlet except borrowed money? The Dominion Government undertook the construction of the road, and by 1880 had built 432 miles of track between Winnipeg and Lake Superior, 213 miles up the Fraser river in British Columbia, and some other short sections. In 1881 the work was turned over to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, to which was given 710 miles of completed road, \$25,000,000 in cash (borrowed by the Government), twenty-five million acres of land, exemption from taxation or customs duties on construction materials, and various other valuable concessions. In the first property derive the bulk of the profits; in the latter case the income from reproductive works goes to the public treasury in reduction of taxation, or in other words in payment of interest on loans, and creating a sinking fund for their extinction. It is a fact that freights and fares are lower as a rule on Government than on corporation railroads, while on the former there are no freight wars leading to general business disturbance, as is now in progress in the transportation business of the United States. VOLCANIC CHANGES.

Letter Describing the Occurrence-Changest hat Have Taken Place in the Past-A Grand Voleanie Display

Predicted.

On the arrival of the Kinau, March 14th, the report spread that the bottom had fallen out of the Volcano, and that there was an end, for the present at least, of New Lake and Halemaumau. Those who were unfamiliar with the case those having control of corporate habits and eccentricities of Kilauea were greatly perturbed, but old inhabitants are aware that sudden subsidence of the lava in the active sections of the great crater is not uncommon. Indeed, this is regarded as the precuser of a more active state of volcanic eruption, and if the present occurrence is not out of the usual course and the evidence of the extinction of the internal fires of Kilauea altogether, we may confidently look forward to a still more magnificent display at Kilauea in the near future.

> DETAILS OF THE OCCURRENCE. The following letter addressed to Hon. S. G. Wilder, by Mr. J. H. Maby, manager of the Volcano House, dated March 8, 1886, may be regarded as an authoritive description of the late volcanic phenomenon. Mr. Maby writes:

It had fallen into the liquid lava and got melted up. I have also seen New Lake and Halemaumau practically dormant. They had sunk wholly out of sight, and were without either fire or smoke. This phenomenon also occurred before the lava flow of 1880 towards Hilo. Just before that occurrence Halemaumau sunk out of sight, and instead of a lake of seething lava there was what appeared to be a bottomless pit. The New Lake was formed about 1882. I saw it when it was very small. Gradually the upper crust was undermined, as it were, and collapsed, leaving the molten lava exposed. This appears to have taken place on a larger scale this time. WHAT THE REV. DR. TAYLOR SAID. In this connection it may not be out of place to quote from notes of a trip to the Volcano written by the Rev. James Taylor, D. D., Wakefield, England, and published in the Advertiser, October, 1885. He appears to have anticipated the recent occurrence. Dr. Taylor wrote of his first sight of the lake of fire: "At one time the New Lake, for half a mile or a mile in diameter, shows a row of glowing terraces or ranks of gigantic warriors, eager for the fray. Here, at our feet, up flew great balls of fire from a score of stores, where Vulcan keeps his rockets; there, a broad river of dazzling lava flowed into a bay, to aid once more in filling up the huge crater, which once sank in a night more than 600 feet down, the walls of which still stand as sharply cut as if man had designed and executed, but which only gods and giants could plan and effectuate. This crater is a rough parallelogram, of which the east and west sides are three miles long, the north and south ends one and a half miles each, making a circuit of nine miles. It is all again daily being filled up by the continued streams of lava "Halemaumau" consisted of a deep pit, from the central furnaces below, but it is Wednesday and Thursday, not at all unlikely that when filled the additional weight will again cause another sinking into the void which is being hourly created."

WHAT CAPTAIN CLARENCE EDWARD DUTTON

In his valuable report on Hawaiian Volcanoes to the U. S. Geological Survey Department, Captain C. E. Dutton, of the United States Army, gives an interesting description of the caldera of Kilauea. The lava pool called New Lake was Gold and Ivory Jewelry, formed in 1882, and became enlarged by the gradual clearing off and engulfment of successive slices of its encircling wall. Lava lakes do not, as a rule, maintain any constant position. Five or six lakes were known in the floor of Kilauea in 1853. In 1878 a large open lake existed near the north end of the pit, but its location is no longer discernible. There was also a large southern lake. In truth the floor of the caldera is liable to

[New York Mercury.] In 62 B. C. Cæsar, who had barely escaped the conspiracy trial with his life, was made przetor, and the following year proprzetor, but he had been vaccinated and so escaped. In 60 B. C. he formed with Pompey and Crassus the first triumvirate, a kind of blind pool for passing any kind of a bill they

thought would be a good thing. Cæsar then went into the war business and it was a cold day when he did not sound from one to five toesins, and with a loud whoop go on the warpath. Every little while he would fire the culverin, and then you would see him roll up his pantaloons with great sang froid and wade in blood. He did not care whose blood it was, so that it wasn't his own, and so that it was warm.

Cæsar's daughter, Julia, who became the wife of Pompey, afterward died, and a coolness sprang up between Pompey and his father-in-law, for Pompey was a leader of the aristocracy, while Cæsar ate pie with his





Casar soon found himself at the head of a small army and Pompey at the head of another. He was ordered to disband his forces, which he agreed to do, provided that Pomp would do the same, but the latter refused, and on the banks of the Rubicon, with 5,000 infantry and 300 cavalry, he considered the perilous situation of going to war against his son-in-law. After thinking it over for a long time he finally exclaimed, "The die is cast." His language on that occasion has been used with more or less success ever since.

He then crossed the Rubicon and marched on rapidly to Rome, where he made it red hot for Pompey. Pompey soon took his troops and went over to Greece, where it was cooler and where Cæsar could not follow him without getting his feet wet. Soon afterward, however, the two enemies met on the plains of Pharsalia. Pomp had 52,-000 troops, but Cæsar succeeded in putting the kibosh on Pomp, who went to Egypt, claiming that he and Cæsar never could get along together, and as Cæsar would not go to Egypt, he would go there himself. Pompey was afterward assassinated by parties who are still at large. It is thought that they are concealed somewhere in Can-

When Cæsar had cleaned out an army, he would make report to the senate something like this:

To the President of the Senate, Sir:
Veni, vidi, vici. Yours truly, CÆSAR.
He was afterward made imperator or emperor for life or during good behavior, with a large salary. This office he held with marked success until the ides of March, 44 B. C., when he was assassinated by a committee of influential citizens, who waited on him

Casar's great coolness in a crisis is here most noticeable, for while surrounded by assassins and with his system full of large irregular holes, seeing Brutus, whom he had been led to believe solid, he exclaimed, "Et to Brute," and expired. In the excitement naturally incident to an assassination in which Cesar had been chosen to act as the corpse, his great sang froid in addressing Brutus in perfectly correct Latin shows that he well deserved the tribute paid him by an eminent historian, whose name at this moment has escaped my memory, in which he stated that "Cæsar was no slouch." 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
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
