The Legislature.

FIFTY-THIRD DAY, THURSDAY, JULY 8.

On suspension of the rules Mr. Kahala read a petition from Honolulu praying that the \$10,000,000 loan be accepted. Referred.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the petition of one Wahi, reported that the petition be referred to the Minister of the Interior to be considered with Kanaka's petition. Adopted.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the petition from South Kona asking leave to open the mail at Hapuna, reported favorably. Adopted.

The majority of the Committee to whom was referred the bill forbidding the Minister of Interior to make further sales of Government lands, reported that the bill be indefinitely postponed, and the minority reported that the bill be passed. Both reports were laid on the table.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the bill to exempt from taxation the parents of large families, reported that the bill be laid on the table to be taken up with the bill relating to local taxes. Adopted.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

Mr. Baker read a resolution that after the third reading of the bill to indemnify the School Agent at Kona, the remainder of the liquor bill be considered. Passed.

Mr. Koon gave notice of a bill to pension Mr. Senison.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The bill to indemnify the School Agent at Kona was read a third time and passed. The remainder of the liquor bill was then taken up section by section. Sections were read separately and passed with some amendment.

The House took a recess at 12 M. On reassembling at 1 P. M. the House went into Committee of the Whole for consideration of the remainder of the bill relating to local taxes. Bill read and passed.

On suspension of the rules Mr. Kahala read a resolution that the Secretary be instructed to number the Sections of the liquor bill as passed. Carried. Mr. Ahole moved that the bill be passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Tuesday next. Carried. Adopted.

FIFTY-FOURTH DAY, FRIDAY, JULY 9.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the bill to amend Art. 61 of the Constitution, reported that the amendment be passed to engrossment. Report laid on the table to be taken up with the bill.

Mr. Gibson read a resolution to the effect that in the "Hawaiian Gazette" of July 7th it was stated that the market is out of silver and gold, and requested that the Minister of Finance should state before the House whether it is so or not. The Minister replied that the Government has plenty of silver and gold.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The House went into Committee of the Whole for consideration of the remainder of the Appropriation Bill.

For printing and binding the Session Laws of 1880, \$4,000, passed. For carrying lepers, \$20,000, passed. For printing the book entitled "Rules of Health," \$5,000, passed.

The bill to regulate the importation of opium and its sale was read a third time and passed. The amendment to Art. 36 of the Constitution was read a second time and passed to engrossment. The bill relating to local taxes was taken up and the first part passed. Adopted.

FIFTY-FIFTH DAY, SATURDAY, JULY 10.

On motion, the Order of the Day was taken up.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

On the remainder of the bill relating to local taxes, it was read and passed. The committee rose.

On suspension of the rules Mr. J. Mott Smith read a resolution to bring up the amendments of Sections 128 and 129 of the Civil Code.

On further suspension of the rules the Attorney General read a communication from Mr. A. S. Hartwell declining the authorship of the article which appeared in the GAZETTE.

On motion the Cabinet was instructed to cause the Editor of the GAZETTE to retract the article in question. Adopted.

FIFTY-SIXTH DAY, JULY 11, 1880.

On motion the credentials of Mr. Kapahu were referred to the Judiciary Committee and the same returned them with their approval. Adopted. The member was sworn in.

PETITIONS.

By Mr. Mahoe, from Puna, praying that the mail contract between Hilo, Puna and Kona be paid \$30 a week. Referred.

By Mr. Kahala, from Waiuku, praying that an appropriation be made for the English school now taught by Mrs. Akaki. Referred.

By Mr. Glenison, from Makawao, praying that the crown lands be leased to those who occupy the same. Referred.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

Mr. Smith read for the first time a bill to amend Sections 128 and 129 of the Civil Code, and to repeal Sections 128 and 129 of the Civil Code relating to marriage. On suspension of the rules the bill was read a second time and ordered to be printed.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

On motion of the Minister of the Interior the bill relating to local taxes was laid on the table to be brought up again on Wednesday next.

The bill extending the jurisdiction of the district judge in certain cases was read a second time and passed. On suspension of the rules the bill was read a third time on its title and passed.

The bill relating to explosive substances was read a third time and passed.

The bill to re-organize the Board of Health was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill relating to the sanitary condition of contract laborers was read a second time in Committee of the Whole. On motion the committee rose. Adopted.

FIFTY-SEVENTH DAY, THURSDAY, JULY 13.

The Committee to whom was referred the petition of S. Paoletti reported that the petitioner be paid \$75 for his services in 1878. Tabled.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

Mr. Rhodes read a resolution that His Excellency the Minister of Foreign Affairs be asked to state before this House, what the relations of this government were with Great Britain after the passage of the Neutrality Treaty?

His Excellency the Minister of Foreign Affairs stated that the relations between the two governments are friendly, and there was no claims laid by the British Government for any damage whatever.

On suspension of the rules Mr. E. W. Whiton presented a petition from Makawao asking, first, that no assessor or collector be sent there from other districts; second, that Mr. Glenison be appointed as a tax collector for Makawao; third, that fifty dollars be inserted in the appropriation bill for instruction of the boys in short-hand writing at Haleskaka School; fourth, that Mr. Glenison be appointed as a district judge for Hualaia. Referred.

Mr. Kahala read a resolution that the pay of the Messenger be raised to three dollars a day. Passed.

Mr. Kapahu gave notice of a bill to amend Section 25 of the Civil Code.

Mr. Kapahu read a resolution that His Excellency the Attorney General be requested to state in writing, to-day, the pay of all sheriffs in the kingdom. Passed.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The bill allowing the natives to drink mild liquor was read a third time.

The House took a recess at 12 M., and on reassembling at 1 P. M. the bill was passed as amended, and to be read again on Thursday next.

The bill relating to the sanitary condition of families was read a second time, and was referred to a special committee, consisting of Messrs. Kapahu, Rhodes, Cleghorn, Hamana and Kaulakou.

On suspension of the rules Mr. Kaulakou read a resolution that the bill relating to collisions at sea will be taken up to-morrow. Passed.

Mr. Koon was taken for the first time a bill to pension Mr. E. Senison. On suspension of the rules the bill was read a second time on its title, and referred to a special committee, consisting of Messrs. Kahala, Koon, Nawaia, Kapua and Judd.

The bill to indemnify the Minister of Finance was read a second time on its title, and passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Friday next.

The bill to amend Section 1, Chapter 43 of the Session Laws of 1875 was read a second time, and passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Saturday next.

House adjourned.

FORTY-EIGHTH DAY, WEDNESDAY, JULY 14.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

Mr. Kaulakou gave notice of a bill to amend the law relating to the English and Hawaiian versions.

Mr. Kapahu gave notice of a bill to amend Section 25 of the Civil Code. On suspension of the rules the bill was read for the first time, and on further suspension of the rules was read a second time; passed, to engrossment, to be read a third time on Saturday next.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The remainder of the law relating to local taxes, commencing from Section 30, was then considered

in Committee of the Whole and the same passed. The House took a recess at 12 M., and on reassembling at 1 P. M. Sections 51 and 69 were then considered without progress. The Committee rose and the House adjourned.

FIFTY-NINTH DAY, THURSDAY, JULY 15.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The bill allowing natives to drink liquor was read a third time, and after some debate was passed by 25 to 15.

The bill relating to the sanitary condition of laborers came up in Committee of the Whole, Mr. Ahole in the chair. After reading the bill it was passed to engrossment to be read a third time on Tuesday next.

On suspension of the rules Mr. Kahala read a petition from the Honolulu Fire Department asking that \$300 be appropriated for that Department. Indefinitely postponed.

The bill relating to collisions at sea came up for consideration, and was passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Thursday next.

The bill relating to local taxes came up for consideration, commencing at Section 30. On motion Section 69 was referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Messrs. Nahaku, Preston, Kani, Nawaia and Kaulakou. Adjourned.
