"No Senator or Representative or Territorial Delegate of the Congress or Senator or Representative, or delegate elect or any other officer or employe of either house shall directly or indirectly solids." either house shall directly or indirectly solicit or receive or be in any manner concerned in the soliciting or receiving of any assessment, subscription or contribution for any political purpose whatever from any officer, cierk or employe of the United States, or any department, branch or bureau thereof, or from any person receiving any salary or compensation from moneys derived from the United States treasury.

"No person shall in any room occu-

or compensation from moneys derived from the United States treasury.

"No person shall in any room occupled in the discharge of official duties by any official or employe of the United States "solicit in any manner whatsoever, or receive, any contribution of money or any other thing of value for any political purpose whatever.

"No official or employe mentioned in this act shall be discharged or promoted or degraded or in any manner changed in official rank for giving or withholding or neglecting to give money or any other valuable thing for any political purpose whatever."

The penalty for violation of these provisions is a fine of \$5,000 or three years' imprisonment, or both.

In addition to the laws Collector Stackable posted some good advice on the subject, issued by heads of department in 1886 by order of President Cleveland.

"Office holders are agents of the people, not their masters," says this circular of advice. "Not only is their time

"Office holders are agents of the people, not their masters," says this circular of advice. "Not only is their time and labor due to the government, but they should scrupulously avoid in their political action, as well as in the discharge of their duty, offending by the display of obstrusive partisanship their neighbors who have relations with them as political officials.

They should also constantly remember that their party friends, from whom they have received preference, have not invested them with the power of arbi-

they have received preference, have not invested them with the power of arbitrarily managing political affairs. They have no right as office holders to dictate the political action of party associates or to throttle freedom of action within party lines, by methods and practices which prevent every useful and justifiable purpose of party organ-

"The influence of Federal officials should not be felt in the manipulation of political primary meetings and no-minating conventions. The use by these officials of their positions to com-pass their selection as delegates to po-litical conventions is indecent and unfair and proper regard for the proprie-

between the things a citizen may properly do and the purposes for which a public office holder should not be used is easy in the light of a correct appreciation of the relation between the people and those intrusted with official places, and the necessity, under our form of government, of political action free from official coercion."

The Mauna Loa this morning brought news of the death of Mrs. Hanai Parker, widow of the late Hon. John Parker, vho was an uncle of Sam Parker.

who was an uncle of Sam Parker. The deceased woman was one of the best known women on the island of Hawaii, being of a family that was prominently identified for many years with the affairs of the old monarchy.

The Hon. John Parker was one of the chiefs of monarchy days and held prominent place under King Kalakaua. He died some years ago. He was one of the principal owners of the immense Parker properties on Hawaii, in which

the principal owners of the immense Parker properties on Hawaii, in which his widow had a life interest.

Mrs. Hanai Parker was 79 years of age. She had spent all her life on Hawaii and was widely known and respected, as the wife of an honored chieftain and for her personal qualities. She had bees ill for a long time, and death was due to old age.

The death occurred on Monday last and the funeral was held on the following day, the remains being interred in the Parker family burying ground at Mana. Mrs. Parker was a resident of Walmea, Hawaii, living on the Parker estates there.

The deceased left no property, her interest in the estate being only for life. Her death will therefore not effect the big property interests in which she had onsiderable interests while she lived.

Who Want Discharges-Turk and Lewis once More.

The Washington and London governments will have to settle the Carnedd Liewellyn libel case if the local United States court does not throw the case out of court, says Captain Griffith. He will appeal to the consul here on the ground that American courts have no right to interfere with a British ship under such circumstances. under such circumstances as are at issue, and says that he and the wwa-ers of the vessel will fight the issue to

The crew of the ship have libelied her for their pay, in the United States district court, demanding their discharges, Captain Griffith has shipping articles, signed by each of the men under the British consul-general at Hamburg, agreeing to work for three years. Not a year has clapsed since the articles were signed.

The men on reaching Honolulu are said to have decided that they wanted to leave the ship because they count get higher wages here than they are getting on board. On the other hand the captain says that he actually has no legal right to discharge them. "The articles declare," said the captain, articles declare," said the captain, "that if any of the men should be left ashore here by me and should become financially stranded, it would be my duty to take them back home, at the ship's expense."

THE SHERMAN.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 22.—
Promptly at noon yesterday, and on the first anniversary of her arrival here with the returning California Regiment, the transport Sherman sailed for Nagasaki and China, with the third battalion of the Fifth Infantry, a battalion of the Eighth Infantry and a battalion of the Second Infantry, besides fifteen medical officers and a detachment of the Signal Corps, The men sides affeen medical officers and a detachment of the Signal Corps. The men of the Second Infantry did not arrive until yesterday morning, the transport having been held for their arrival. The Sherman also took out fifteen shipwrights, three shipjoiners and three calkers, who have been engaged at \$5 a day each, dating from last Monday, for the purpose of building eight large barges to be used on the shallow waters of the Chinese rivers. It is estimated of the Chinese rivers. It is estimated that it will take six months to complete all the burges. Each is to be seventy-five feet in length, by thirty-four in breadth, and will be capable of holding several hundred tons.

NEW USE FOR TRANSPORTS. The Government to Carry Menagaries

On Them. At the request of Acting Secretary Rathburn of the Smithsonian Institu-tion the Secretary of War has authori-zed the use of army animal transports zed the use of army animal transports for bringing home animals secured by officers serving in the Philippines and intended for the National Zoological Park in the District of Columbia. The last named institution will bear all necessary expenses, such as food and shelter for the animals in transit across the Pacific.





Pursuant to a resolution passed at meeting of the Executive Committee f the Territorial Central Committee of the Territorial Central Committee of the Republican Party in the Terri-tory of Hawali, a call is now issued for Primary Election to be held in the various precincts on Saturday, Septem-ber 1, 1990, for the purpose of electing delegates to a District Convention, the polls will be open from 2 now to be polls will be open from 3 p. m. to 9

p. m. These are the Rules and Regulations These are the Rules and regularion of the Republican Party in the Territory of Hawaii, governing Precinct Clubs;
ARTICLE I. PRECINCT CLUBS.

Section 1. The unit of organization shall be the precinct clubs.

Section 2. There shall be a precinct organization in every election precinct. Section 3. Every person legally en-rolled, in the various precinct clubs, shall be a member of the precinct club when permanently organized.

when permanently organized.

Scetion 4. The officers of each Precinct Club shall be a President, Secretary, three Judges of Election, and such other officers as the by-laws of said precinct may provide. No initiation fees or dues shall be charged the members of any precinct club. All officers shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected. Any duly enrolled member of the club may be eligible to hold office.

Section 5. The duties of these officers shall be those usual to said officers and such as may be provided for in the by-laws of each Precinct Club. The three Judges of Election shall be sole judges at all primaries.

Section 6. No less than one-fifth of the members enrolled shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of busi-

Section 7. The President and Secretary of each precinct club shall act as a revising board of the roll of the Precinct Club, and from time to time shall meet and revise said roll so that it shall consist of only such members as still reside in said precinct, but no member on the old roll shall be omitted if he still resides in said precinct.

Section 8. Each precinct shall at the primaries elect, besides the officers aforesaid, delegates to the District Committee.

Section 9. Each precinct shall be entitled to elect one delegate to said district committee for each 25 votes cast in said precinct for the Republican ticket at the preceding election. Whenever after dividing said Republican vote by 25 there is a remainder of 15 or more than the precinct is entitled to an additional delegate, but each precinct shall be entitled to at least one delegate to said district committee, although the Republican vote as aforesaid in said precinct shall be below 25.

Section 10. Any person who is a duly

Section 10. Any person who is a duly enrolled member of a precinct club shall be eligible as a delegate to the district committee.

cinet clubs in said district. Section 2. Each district committee shall meet when notified to do so by the Territorial Committee, and shall elect the following officers. President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and such other officers and standing committees as it may be entitled to.

Section 3. Any duly enrolled Republican shall be eligible as a delegate to the Territorial Committee from the district in which he resides. Section 4. Each district committee

shall be charged with the general care and supervision of the affairs of the party within its district, subject to these rules and regulations. It shall take such measures as it deems necessary and expedient to secure the organization and maintenance of precinct clubs in every precinct, and secure the co-operation of all Republican voters with the party organization, and shall, under the control of the Territorial Committee, have charge of all campaigns in the district. It shall decide all disputes from the precinct organizations and contests within said district as to primary elections.

Section 5. District committees may hold regular or special meetings as may be provided in their by-laws, and not less than one-third of the members shall constitute a quorum.

THE SCHOOL TEACHER'S GUIDE TO

The Commissioners of Education have made a thorough revision and classification of schools, teachers and salaries. The whole subject has been formulated so that now teachers may know not only what salaries they will get at the present, but what they can expect to get by capable service and efforts as improvement and increased efficiency. At the same time the commissioners have avoided tying themselves up in red tape, or blocking themselves by rigid contracts so as to prevent their meeting emergencies or changed conditions.

A lot of the ship captains coming here have an idea that Honoluin is a A lot of the ship captains coming here have an idea that Honoluiu is a jay port, said a prominent customs officer today, and it will take a few fines to convince them that it is a full fledged American port, ready to enforce all American regulations. This is the view taken by many customs men of the breaking of the custom house seal yesterday on the ship invincible. To break such a seal is a felony and the statutes expressly provide that any ship on which it is done shall be forfeited.

"Such an act would no more be thought of in San Francisco than jumping overboard in mid-ocean," said the custom house man. "There are many skippers who have an idea that this is a small 'jay' port where they can override the laws, but they will find in time that American laws are going to be carried out."

The Invincible was sealed up, with red tape, when she arrived. Yesterday the seal was found to be broken and oargo was being taken out, before any authorized official had broken the seal. The Marion Chilcott, beginning to discharge without a permit, was guilty of a similar offense.

The increase in capital is made advisable by the remarkable strides of the bank's business in the past year. It is figured that with more money a correspondingly larger business can be done at about the same expense, enlarging the per cent of profits on investment. vestment.
The stock, the par value of which is

\$100, will be issued at \$125 a share. This will give the issue a selling value of \$250,000. The unarrided profits of the

of \$250,000. The individed profits of the bank, or reserve, is about \$100,000. Altogether, therefore, the bank will have a bapital of about \$750,000 to work on. It is the intention to maintain the reserve proportion straight through.

Stockholders will have the preference in taking the stock. If any is left it will be sold outside. The bank already knows of more willing purchasers on the outside than it will have stock to dispose of.
