## TWO PRECINCTS NOMINATE

NAMES TO BE BALLOTTED FOR  
TOMORROW.

First Precinct of Fourth Votes in Favor  
of Convention at Hilo—The Primary  
Election.

W. C. Achi, C. F. Peterson and Charles E. Dwight were last night nominated by the eighth precinct of the Fifth district as delegates to the Republican convention. The officers of the club are: W. C. Achi, president; C. F. Peterson, vice-president; N. Fernandez, treasurer, and P. Silva, secretary. The president appointed W. Fernandez and George S. Evans as tellers to the judges; the judges elected were C. B. Dwight, James Harbottle and R. M. Duncan. The following comprise the enrollment committee: W. L. Peterson, chairman; J. Harbottle, J. M. Keenan, Chas. B. Dwight, R. M. Duncan, George S. Evans and Ben Haahoa.

There was a very harmonious meeting of the first precinct of the Fourth district, which is that part of the town beyond Punahoa street and all of Waikeke. W. C. Achi, J. W. K. Keiki, J. D. McVeigh and J. H. Boyd were named as candidates for election to the convention. The precinct is entitled to three delegates. Four were put up so that voters may have something to work and vote for.

Attention was called to the fact that the secretary's book had been lost and that in consequence the hard work of re-enrolling the voters of the precinct would have to be undertaken. T. R. Mossman, H. S. Townsend and P. H. H. S. Townsend and P. H. H. S. Townsend were made a committee to do the job. They were empowered to add to their committee as they might see fit.

The following resolution, introduced by J. D. Avery, passed unanimously: "Resolved, That it is the sense of this club that the proposition of holding the next Republican Territorial convention at Hilo is a good one."

## THE COMING RACE.

The boating event of the year is now at hand as far as Honolulu is concerned. The crews are in rigid training at Ewa and everything is pointing to brilliant sport upon regatta day.

The getting ready for a race in this country is very different work to the preparation for a college of varsity race on the mainland. Our young athletes have to work double tides. We have no leisure class which can devote itself to sport. The days' work in office or store has to be faithfully accomplished and only when that duty has been fulfilled can the athletics be attended to. It requires then considerable force of character and much self denial to undertake the training for the Hawaiian blue ribbon of oarsmanship.

Some employers do not look with kindly eyes upon their young men who take up boating. They think it unsettles them for business and is too great a tax upon their time and strength. Such a view is erroneous. Your clerks must have amusement of some kind, and it is very much better for them to obtain it in a healthy and manly form, than to seek it in unhealthy forms. It is far better for young men to take a spin on Pearl Lochs morning and evening, that it is for them to sit in a heated atmosphere, reeking with the fumes of drink and smoke, and risking their money at cards.

The advantage of athletics is that clean men are produced. A man to be a successful athlete must lead a clean life, and habits of order and sobriety are formed which last a life time. The good athlete is a living sermon in temperance. Not only is he a benefit to himself but he is a benefit to others. The force of example is very great, and the example of a healthy, clean living man is of incalculable benefit to many who come into contact with him.

The interest of the community, then, does not lie in the boat race, but it lies in the advantage to be reaped by the youth of the Territory through the purifying influence of athletics. We may consider athletics as a moral force of great weight, and it is in this light that the faculties of Universities and Colleges regard them.

Any one who has made a study of youth knows what an effect athletics has upon character. It is true that athletics may be over done, that they have been over done, but there is no good thing that cannot be misused. Eating is a good thing, but there are those who habitually overeat and misuse the good food which nature provides. Study is a good thing, but a man may sometimes study to the detriment of his health. Money, though sometimes called the root of all evil, is a good thing but a man can make a god of money and sacrifice all noble aspirations to the amassing of it.

In the Universities now athletics are not overdone. A man cannot take prominent part unless he is well up in his studies, and the result is that a man who pulls in his Varsity crew, is liable to be foremost in the schools as well. The sound body and the sound mind go together.

We should be well satisfied that our young men take such an interest in athletic sports as they do. It is the custom to say that the tropics are too enervating. But one does not notice that among the youth of this Territory. They keep up the traditions of their race here, and when they go abroad they show to advantage along side the youth born in the more rigorous climate of the mainland. They appear in football teams, in baseball teams, in crack racing crews, wherever hard sinews and good judgement are required you will find the Hawaiian boy to the fore. We have inculcated the love of sport here, even though it is a tropical country, and the love of sport does not leave us.

Another thing which ought to satisfy us is that our young men go into sport for sport's sake. This is a country of amateur sportsman. The professional sportsman does not exist here, or if he is here he is merely an exotic. Our sports are conducted in a clean, healthy manner. The influence of university bred men is strongly felt in this direction.

It is to be hoped that the interest in sports by young and by old will long be kept up amongst us. It has a beneficial effect upon the sinews of the youth, it also has a beneficial effect upon the minds of the middle aged and those who are in the "sere and yellow." The race that will be rowed shortly at the Pearl Lochs will test endurance of a few, but it will fire with pride and the desire of emulation in many. The Star has no preferences as to crews and welcomes the winner, which ever it may be. But the Star takes pride in the fact that out here under our ever blue sky and upon our opal tinted waters, the sturdy scions of our race can compete against one another in a gentlemanly way and show that they are equal in strength

and endurance with the youth of any part of the world.

An educational journal says: Germany is given great credit for its universities and schools, but it is questioned, in view of recent investigations, whether she is not paying too high for her preeminence in this respect. The strain upon children in the elementary schools, in particular, is excessive. A writer in a German paper recently made the remarkable statement that during the ten years ending in 1899 not less than four hundred and seven school children, of whom three hundred and thirty-one were boys, committed suicide. This in Prussia alone, where the German forcing system in education is fully developed. Without a single exception, it is stated, these children were pupils of elementary schools and schools where professional training is given. As the ordinary workingman in Prussia is unable to provide meat or nourishing food in abundance, it is possible that insufficient nourishment combined with a severe demand upon the brain was the chief cause why these children took their lives."

## ST. LOUIS COLLEGE.

St. Louis College celebrates the seventeenth anniversary of the arrival of the Brothers to take charge of the school. Since the Brothers have taken charge St. Louis College, as an educational institution has been growing in influence. Up to the time of their arrival it had practically no influence, but under them it has gradually increased until it has taken rank among the foremost of the independent educational institutions in the Territory.

The Brothers come from Dayton, Ohio, where there is a training school and where those who choose to enter the brotherhood are educated for their profession. Schools under charge of the members of the brotherhood are found in all parts of the mainland, from Texas to Wyoming. In the Territory, besides the main school in Honolulu, there are branches in Hilo and Wailuku and all are in a flourishing condition.

During the seventeen years of their work here, there has been ample time to judge of the results. A large number of young men have passed through the hands of the Brothers and many of them are occupying prominent positions in business and stores and have a high standing in the community.

The Brothers not only educate the boys but they have an excellent influence upon them when they become young men, and keep up a pleasant relationship with their former pupils. Debating and dramatic societies have been organized among the old pupils, who assemble in the main hall of the institution, and other social amusements are kept up.

St. Louis College and its off shoots have done good educational work, filling a want and reaching some classes of pupils which might not be content in the public schools.

The criminal calendar is so full that civil suits have to take a back seat, so rules Judge Humphreys in reply to a request of several legal firms. When Judge Estee gets into his own court room, matters will run more speedily.

It is to be hoped that the anti-leprous shrub may prove a specific in the case of this terrible disease. One wants very reliable experiments, however, extending over a length of time. There have been so many so-called specifics, and all have hitherto been failures.

The training quarters at Ewa are reported as by no means comfortable. The idea is suggested that it would be a good thing for each club to own a house boat and let the crews sleep there. Indeed the idea of house boats for families might be initiated with advantage. There are plenty of places in the Pearl Lochs where house boats might be anchored and an enjoyable outing spent. House boats are popular on the mainland and in England.

The religious question is going to complicate educational matters in Porto Rico. At a recent meeting on that Island, the Roman Catholics and the Liberals engaged in a very rancorous debate, and the Bishop thumped the table in a very unepiscopal manner. In countries where the Roman Catholic church has had full control in educational matters, there will be a good deal of heat evolved before the American system of unsectarian education is set to working smoothly.

The Aala squatters have at last been removed. Why they have been allowed to remain so long there is by no means clear. The matter was reported long ago by the Board of Health inspectors, but received absolutely no attention. The Star brought the matter before the public a fortnight or so ago, with the result that action has at last been taken. It remains to be seen whether the squatters will only move from Aala to encamp themselves in some other locality. A pretty sharp eye should be kept upon them.

The order of the Auditor's Department against the practice of assignments of "Receipts of warrants" is a good one. For a long time the government was made use of by collectors as a means for ensuring their collections. This was discontinued some years ago. There was a time when a collector would lodge with the paying clerk of a department a list of those who owed him, and would expect the clerk to deduct from the various salaries the amounts mentioned. Then in a day or two he would call round for his cash. There has been since the above plan was abolished, a means of advancing money on assignments, and this the Auditor has stopped. This is in strict accord with methods in Federal offices.

## PRIMARIES.

Pursuant to a resolution passed at  
a meeting of the Executive Committee  
of the Territorial Central Committee  
of the Republican Party in the Terri-  
tory of Hawaii, a call is now issued  
for Primary Election to be held in the  
various precincts on Saturday, Septem-  
ber 1, 1900, for the purpose of electing  
delegates to a District Convention, the  
polls will be open from 3 p. m. to 9  
p. m.

These are the Rules and Regulations  
of the Republican Party in the Terri-  
tory of Hawaii, governing Precinct  
Clubs:

### ARTICLE I. PRECINCT CLUBS.

Section 1. The unit of organization  
shall be the precinct clubs.

Section 2. There shall be a precinct  
organization in every election precinct.

Section 3. Every person legally en-  
rolled, in the various precinct clubs,  
shall be a member of the precinct club  
when permanently organized.

Section 4. The officers of each Pre-  
cinct Club shall be a President, Secre-  
tary, three Judges of Election, and  
such other officers as the by-laws of  
said precinct may provide. No initia-  
tion fees or dues shall be charged the  
members of any precinct club. All offi-  
cers shall serve for one year, or until  
their successors are elected. Any duly  
enrolled member of the club may be  
eligible to hold office.

Section 5. The duties of these officers  
shall be those usual to said officers and  
such as may be provided for in the  
by-laws of each Precinct Club. The  
three Judges of Election shall be sole  
judges at all primaries.

Section 6. No less than one-fifth of  
the members enrolled shall constitute  
a quorum for the transaction of busi-  
ness.

Section 7. The President and Secre-  
tary of each precinct club shall act  
as a revising board of the roll of the  
Precinct Club, and from time to time  
shall meet and revise said roll so that  
it shall consist of only such members  
as still reside in said precinct, but no  
member on the old roll shall be omitted  
if he still resides in said precinct.

Section 8. Each precinct shall at the  
primaries elect, besides the officers  
aforesaid, delegates to the District  
Committee.

Section 9. Each precinct shall be en-  
titled to elect one delegate to said dis-  
trict committee for each 25 votes cast  
in said precinct for the Republican  
ticket at the preceding election. When-  
ever after dividing said Republican  
vote by 25 there is a remainder of 15 or  
more than the precinct is entitled to an  
additional delegate, but each precinct  
shall be entitled to at least one dele-  
gate to said district committee, al-  
though the Republican vote as afore-  
said in said precinct shall be below 25.

Section 10. Any person who is a duly  
enrolled member of a precinct club  
shall be eligible as a delegate to the  
district committee.

The above Rules and Regulations of  
the Republican Party in the Territory  
of Hawaii are also published in accord-  
ance with a Resolution passed at the  
same meeting referred to above.

The Committee urge upon all the offi-  
cers and members of all Precinct Clubs  
the importance of prompt and harmo-  
nious action in relation to the above  
call.

### District Committee.

Pursuant to a Resolution passed at a

the Territorial Central Committee of

for the purpose of electing delegates to  
a Territorial Convention.

These are the Rules and Regulations  
of the Republican Party in the Terri-  
tory of Hawaii, governing District  
Committees:

### ARTICLE II. DISTRICT COMMITTEE

Section 1. Each district committee  
shall consist of delegates from the pre-  
cinct clubs in said district.

Section 2. Each district committee  
shall meet when notified to do so by  
the Territorial Committee, and shall  
elect the following officers: President,  
Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer,  
and such other officers and standing  
committees as it may be entitled to.

Section 3. Any duly enrolled Republi-  
can shall be eligible as a delegate to  
the Territorial Committee from the  
district in which he resides.

Section 4. Each district committee  
shall be charged with the general care  
and supervision of the affairs of the  
party within its district, subject to  
these rules and regulations. It shall  
take such measures as it deems neces-  
sary and expedient to secure the or-  
ganization and maintenance of precinct  
clubs in every precinct, and secure the  
co-operation of all Republican voters  
with the party organization, and shall,  
under the control of the Territorial  
Committee, have charge of all cam-  
paigns in the district. It shall decide  
all disputes from the precinct organi-  
zations and contests within said district  
as to primary elections.

Section 5. District committees may  
hold regular or special meetings as may  
be provided in their by-laws, and not  
less than one-third of the members shall  
constitute a quorum.

The above Rules and Regulations of  
the Republican Party in the Territory  
of Hawaii, are also published in accord-  
ance with a resolution passed at the  
same meeting referred to above.

The committee urge upon all the offi-  
cers and members of the District Com-  
mittee the importance of prompt and  
harmonious action in relation to the  
above call.

## THE SCHOOL TEACHER'S GUIDE TO THE HIGHEST SALARY ATTAINABLE

STEPS THE COMMISSIONERS OF EDUCATION HAVE POINTED  
OUT AS THOSE LEADING TO PREFERENCE AND THE  
HIGHEST PEDAGOGICAL POSITIONS IN HAWAII.

The Commissioners of Education have  
made a thorough revision and classifica-  
tion of schools, teachers and salaries.  
The whole subject has been formulated  
so that now teachers may know only  
what salaries they will get at the  
present, but what they can expect to  
get by capable service and efforts at  
improvement and increased efficiency.  
At the same time the commissioners  
have avoided tying themselves up in  
red tape, or blocking themselves by  
rigid contracts so as to prevent their  
meeting emergencies or changed condi-  
tions.

Their formulated classification and  
schedules are as follows:

### SCHEDULE.

1. This schedule is not to be consid-  
ered in the nature of a contract between  
the department and teachers, but may  
be altered or suspended at any time if it  
is deemed necessary.

2. Schools will be classified and salar-  
ies fixed at the beginning of each  
school year. Satisfactory service only  
will entitle a teacher to a rise in sal-  
ary.

3. Teachers obtaining Normal Certi-  
ficates will be allowed one year's ex-  
perience. One half of the time taught  
in the United States outside of Hawaii  
will be allowed.

4. A teacher promoted to a higher  
position will begin at the lowest salary  
of that position, and if for one year his  
service has been satisfactory, all pre-  
vious experience may be allowed.

5. Competent teachers in undesirable

locations or where living is unusually  
expensive may be paid above the  
schedule.

6. Teachers of schools with an en-  
rollment under 45 will be classed as  
assistants.

7. The Royal, Kailua, Kaneohe, Maunaloa,  
Honolulu Normal, and Hilo Union  
Schools are hereby recognized as of the  
same class, the Principal of which will  
receive salaries of \$2,400 a year each  
without regard to length of service.

### SCHEDULE OF TEACHERS SAL- ARIES.

Select Schools—Grammar Depart-  
ment: First year, \$50; second year, \$55;  
third year, \$60; fourth year, \$65; fifth  
year, \$70; sixth year, \$75; seventh year,  
\$80; eighth year, \$85; ninth year, \$90;  
tenth year, \$100.

Honolulu Normal and Training  
School: First year, \$75; second year,  
\$80; third year, \$85; fourth year, \$90;  
fifth year, \$100.

Elementary Public Schools—Assistant  
Teachers: First Class—First year, \$50;  
third year, \$55; sixth year, \$60; ninth  
year, \$65; twelfth year, \$70; fifteenth  
year, \$75. Second Class, same year  
\$40, \$45, \$50, \$55, \$60. Third Class, first  
year, \$30.

Normal School graduates will begin  
at a salary of \$55 a month and will re-  
ceive the maximum salary in twelve  
years.

Teachers with special aptitude and  
training for primary teaching will be  
paid from \$720 to \$1,200 per annum, ac-  
cording to experience and qualifica-  
tions.

## HONOLULU NO JAY PORT

A lot of the ship captains coming  
here have an idea that Honolulu is a  
jay port, said a prominent customs offi-  
cer today, and it will take a few fines  
to convince them that it is a full fledged  
American port, ready to enforce all  
American regulations. This is the view  
taken by many customs men of the  
breaking of the custom house seal yester-  
day on the ship Invincible. To break  
such a seal is a felony and the statutes  
expressly provide that any ship on  
which it is done shall be forfeited.

"Such an act would no more be  
thought of in San Francisco than  
jumping overboard in mid-ocean," said  
the customs house man. "There are  
many shippers who have an idea that  
this is a small 'jay' port where they  
can override the laws, but they will  
find in time that American laws are  
going to be carried out."

The Invincible was sealed up, with  
red tape, when she arrived. Yesterday  
the seal was found to be broken and  
cargo was being taken out, before any  
authorized official had broken the seal.  
The Marlon Chilcott, beginning to dis-  
charge without a permit, was guilty of  
a similar offense.

The breaking of a seal, according to  
the United States, is cause for the ab-  
solute forfeiture of any vessel on which  
it occurs. The statute simply says that  
the vessel "shall be forfeited," not  
naming any other penalty. Another  
section provides for a fine of \$1,000 or  
five years' imprisonment, or both, for  
who the man guilty of breaking the  
seal.

It is not known who broke the seal  
on the Invincible, though one of the  
stevedores is said to have done it. Cap-  
tain Mackenzie and his mates say they  
do not know. The matter was placed  
in the hands of United States district  
attorney Baird, by Collector Stackable,  
and action by the attorney is awaited.

Dan. H. Case will leave by the Aus-  
tralia for a vacation trip to his old  
home in Kansas. F. D. Smith, fourth  
clerk of the courts, will officiate as  
court stenographer in his absence.

## DEMOCRACY AND SILVER

### HOW PARTY VOTING STRENGTH STANDS.

Analysis of the Sentiment in the States  
Which Have Electoral Votes to Give—  
A Minority Issue.

The Chicago Record makes the fol-  
lowing analysis of Democracy and the  
16 to 1 silver plank of the Kansas City  
convention:

The vote on the financial plank of the  
Democratic platform in the committee  
on resolutions at Kansas City was in a  
measure a test vote and revealed to a  
considerable extent the feeling of the  
Democrats in the several States. The  
committeesman from each State was se-  
lected by the State delegation, and the  
votes of the representatives 277 chosen  
determined how the platform should be  
drawn and reported to the convention.  
On the question of specifying the ratio  
in the platform the vote in the com-  
mittee stood 25 in favor of naming the  
ratio and 24 against. Below is a tabula-  
tion of the States and Territories whose  
representatives voted for reaffirmation  
of the ratio, with the number of electo-  
rally possessed by each State:

Alabama, 11; Arkansas, 5; Colorado,  
4; Delaware, 3; Iowa, 13; Kansas, 10;  
Kentucky, 13; Maine, 6; Massachusetts,  
15; Missouri, 17; Nebraska, 8; Nevada,  
3; New Hampshire, 4; North Dakota, 3;  
Oregon, 4; South Carolina, 9; Tennessee,  
12; Vermont, 4; Washington, 4; Wyom-  
ing, 3 votes. Total, 157 votes.

Following is a list of those States  
whose representatives on the committee  
opposed the reaffirmation of the ratio,  
together with their electoral votes:

California, 9; Connecticut, 6; Florida,  
4; Georgia, 13; Illinois, 24; Indiana, 15;  
Louisiana, 8; Maryland, 8; Michigan, 14;  
Minnesota, 9; Mississippi, 9; New Jer-  
sey, 10; New York, 36; North Carolina,  
11; Ohio, 23; Pennsylvania, 32; Rhode Is-  
land, 4; South Dakota, 4; Texas, 15;  
Utah, 3; Virginia, 12; West Virginia, 6;  
Wisconsin, 12 votes. Total, 287 votes.

From this comparison it appears that  
the representatives of two-thirds of the  
electoral college strength were against  
reaffirming the 16 to 1 ratio. Except for  
the fact that the representatives of the  
territories were allowed to vote, the 16  
to 1 proposition would have been re-  
jected by the committee.

## WILL INCREASE CAPITAL

BANK OF HAWAII WILL NOW  
HAVE \$800,000.

New Issue of \$200,000 of Stock at a Premium of \$25—Reserve to be Kept Above \$100,000.

The capital stock of the Bank of Hawaii will on October 1, be increased from \$600,000 to \$800,000. This was decided upon at a meeting of directors held yesterday.

The increase in capital is made advisable by the remarkable strides of the bank's business in the past year. It is figured that with more money a correspondingly larger business can be done at about the same expense, enlarging the per cent of profits on investment.

The stock, the par value of which is \$100, will be issued at \$125 a share. This will give the bank a selling value of \$250,000. The undivided profits of the bank, or reserve, is about \$100,000. Altogether, therefore, the bank will have a capital of about \$750,000 to work on. It is the intention to maintain the reserve proportion straight through.

Stockholders will have the preference in taking the stock. If any is left it will be sold outside. The bank already knows of more willing purchasers on the outside than it will have stock to dispose of.

The short history of the Bank of Hawaii has been most interesting. As a success it has been second to none. Having a good location, it has also the advantage of excellent connections and trade. Its future is conceded to be the brightest possible.

## STRECKELS MAY GO.

Expected to Visit Australia on Mail Subsidy Business.

No action with regard to the mail subsidy asked for by the Oceanic Steamship Company has been taken yet in the colonies. It is reported that J. D. Streckels is going in person to the colonies to present the claims of his company, and that nothing will be done until he has arrived.

Captain Phillips of the steamer Warrimoo, leaving here two days ago, was asked regarding the proposed subsidy while he was in port, and stated that it would probably be some time before any decision was made.

"Mr. Streckels is expected to make a visit to the Colonies," said Captain Phillips, "and nothing is likely to be done until he gets there. I expected to hear that he had passed through Honolulu before this date."

"The present contract has two years to run yet, so that there is plenty of time for considering the new arrangement."

"TEA ROOM" OPENED.  
Bishop & Company's "tea room" is now open. This place is in the rear section of the old Press Publishing Company's building. Its purpose is to afford a neat place for employees of the firm to get lunch every day.

ESTATE MAKES MONEY.  
Cecil Brown yesterday filed his annual accounts in the Walter Murray Gibson estate, charging himself \$12,222.74 and crediting \$17,150.55, leaving a balance of \$12,927.81.

TO EDUCATE THE NEGROES.  
A department store, the main purpose of which will be to elevate the negro, will be established next fall in Chicago by the Rev. J. M. Townsend, of Allen M. E. Temple, a colored church who has been elected field secretary of the African Methodist Episcopal mission work, with headquarters in Chicago. "I maintain," he said today, "that the great need of the negroes is employment in something more than menial lines. The negro problem is not one of the race, but of the individual. In connection with my church work in Chicago, I will run the department store, and I have the capital in view. White and colored men will be the stockholders, and white and colored will have employment on the basis of ability. The money power will raise the negro as it has the Jew who was once as much persecuted as the negro is now.—Cincinnati Enquirer.
