is Dismissed—County gets \$1500 from the Territory
on Completion of the Iao Valley Road.

SUPERVISORS MEETING CON- TINUED.

Last week we published the
minutes of the meeting of the
Board of County Supervisors for
the first day of the session. As
the Board was still in session at
the time we went to press we were
unable to give the report in full
and now give below the minutes
not published in the last issue.

MORNING SESSION.

Thursday, July 11, 1907.

The Chair called the meeting to
order at 9:30 A. M.

Roll Call: Present: Wm. Hen-
ning, Chairman, T. M. Church, S.
E. Kaue, W. P. Haia, and T. T.
Meyer.

The Chair announced that Mr.
Coelho had something to say to
the Board. Mr. Coelho, Chief of
the Wailuku-Kahului Fire Com-
pany, verbally requested an appro-
priation of \$300.00 for the use of
the Fire Company.

The minutes of the meeting of
July 10 were read and ordered
approved. Communications were again
taken up.

Communication of W. J. Coelho,
Chief of Wailuku-Kahului Fire
Company in re Fire Company was
read and ordered placed on file.

Communication of Jos. Nunes
Secretary Wailuku-Kahului Fire
Company in re Toilet in the Fire
Station, was read and ordered
placed on file.

Action on the rules and regula-
tions of the Wailuku-Kahului Fire
Company was deferred.

Claim demands were again taken
up for examination.

At 11 A. M. a delegation of the
Wailuku citizens headed by Mr.
Wells presented a verbal request
that our roads in this district be
improved.

At 11:45 A. M., the Chair order-
ed a recess until 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Chair called the meeting to
order at 1:30 P. M.

Claim demands were again tak-
en up for examination.

Communication from Hugh How-
ell, County Engineer, in re ar-
rival of Odorless Excavator was
read and ordered placed on file.

The Clerk was instructed to write
to Mr. Sam Johnson thanking him
for his kindness and also to request
him to forward bill for whatever
hose he may order to replace that
which was loaned by him to the
County of Maui.

Mr. Church moved that the
Board of Supervisors accept Terri-
torial Warrant No. 1301 to the
amount of \$1572.85 for the com-
pletion of Iao Valley Road with
the assignee of the contractor of
date.... and order the same de-
posited with the County Treasurer
as County Realization. Seconded
by Mr. Kaue and carried.

Mr. George Weight, Hack and
Sanitary Inspector for the district
of Wailuku made some suggestions
for the disposition of the Odorless
Excavator, and the Clerk was in-
structed to notify Hugh Howell,
County Engineer, that the Excava-
tor has been placed under the care
of the Road Department of Wailu-
ku and to be used when directed
by the Hack and Sanitary Inspec-
tor.

At 6 P. M., Mr. Church moved a
recess until 7:30 P. M. Second
by Mr. Meyer and carried.

EVENING SESSION.

Chairman Henning called the
meeting to order at 7:30 P. M.

Mr. Kaue presented Resolution
No. 258 thereby appropriating the
Sum of Five Hundred Sixty-one
and 80-100 Dollars to the Fund
known as NEW IAO ROAD, and
move the adoption of the same.
Seconded by Mr. Church and car-
ried.

Mr. Kaue presented Resolution
No. 259 thereby appropriating the
sum of Seven Hundred Twenty-
five and 13-100 Dollars to the
fund known as Roads and Bridges,
Wailuku. Seconded by Mr. Meyer
and carried.

Claim demands were again tak-
en up.

Mr. Meyer presented Resolutions
No. 260 to No. 303 inclusive there-
by allowing Salary, Payroll, and
Material and Supply demands for
the month of June, and moved the
adoption of the same. Seconded
by Mr. Kaue and carried.

Mr. Church presented Resolution
No. 305 thereby appropriating the
sum of \$15.30 to the Fund known
as Incidentals Supervisors and
moved the adoption of the same.
Second by Mr. Meyer and carried.

Mr. Kaue presented Resolution
No. 305 thereby appropriating the
sum of \$3.55 to the Fund known
as Incidentals County Clerk, and
moved the adoption of the same.
Seconded by Mr. Haia and carried.

Mr. Meyer presented Resolution
No. 306 thereby appropriating the
sum of \$1.55 to the Fund known
as Incidentals Auditor, and moved
the adoption of the same. Second-
ed by Mr. Kaue, and carried.

Mr. Haia presented Resolution
No. 307 thereby appropriating the
sum of \$18.17 to the Fund known
as Incidentals Hack and Sanitary
Inspectors, and moved the adop-
tion of the same. Seconded by
Mr. Meyer and carried.

Mr. Church presented Resolution
No. 308 thereby appropriating the
sum of \$48.35 to the Fund known
as Incidentals County Engineer,
and moved the adoption of the
same. Seconded by Mr. Kaue and
carried.

Mr. Meyer presented Resolution
No. 309 thereby appropriating the
sum of 62.00 to the Fund known
as Coroner's Inquest, and moved
the adoption of the same. Second-
ed by Mr. Haia, and carried.

Mr. Meyer presented Resolution
No. 310 thereby appropriating the
sum of 11.45 to the Fund known
as Expense Witnesses, and moved
the adoption of the same. Second-
ed by Mr. Kaue, and carried.

Mr. Kaue presented Resolution
No. 311 thereby appropriating the
sum of \$33.00 to the Fund known
as Incidentals Sheriff, and moved
the adoption of the same. Second-
ed by Mr. Haia and carried.

Mr. Meyer presented Resolution
No. 312 thereby appropriating the
sum of \$28.25 to the Fund known
as Support and Maintenance of
Prisoners, and moved the adoption
of the same. Seconded by Mr.
Kaue and carried.

Mr. Church presented Resolu-
No. 313 thereby appropriating the
sum of \$59.11 to the Fund known
as Mile Posts, and moved the adop-
tion of the same. Seconded by
Mr. Haia, and carried.

Mr. Church presented Resolution
No. 314 thereby appropriating the
sum of 10.00 to the Fund known
as Street Lights Lahaina, and
moved the adoption of the same.
Seconded by Mr. Haia and carried.

Mr. Church moved that 20 books
of 40 pages and 20 books of 100
pages of application blanks, and
21 Pound Records each 40 sheets
be printed. Seconded by Mr. Meyer
and carried.

At 9:30 P. M. Mr. Kaue moved
to adjourn to 9 A. M. tomorrow.
Seconded by Mr. Meyer and car-
ried.

Friday, July 12, 1907.

Chairman Wm. Henning called
the meeting to order at 9 A. M.

The minutes of the meeting of
July 11 were read and ordered
approved as read.

After the approval of the min-
utes the Board went on a tour of
Inspection of road work.

At 4 P. M. the Board came to
order again Chairman W. Henning
presiding.

Mr. Case, County Attorney pre-
sented a request for a typewriter.
He was allowed to purchase one.

Reports were again taken up.
Report of the County Attorney was
taken. The Board considering
that there were not enough grounds
to prefer charges against Deputy
Sheriff Lake, he was called before
the Board and advised to be more
circumspect in his conduct in the
future. He promised to be more
discreet in the future and expressed
regret for his conduct on the
Fourth.

The clerk was instructed to noti-
fy all road overseers that the pay-
rolls must be completely made out
before being offered to the working
men for signatures.

Salaries Versus Improvements. A study of the proceedings of the Board of Supervisors reveals the fact that at every meeting pressure is brought to bear to increase salaries in many directions and give employment to men regardless of whether they are needed.

The fault is not altogether with the officers who recommend the added expense nor is it with the Board who allows the outlay of the peoples money. All of these men are accountable to the voters for their positions and pressure is brought to bear to raise this mans salary or to create a new office for this man or that and the recommendation follows.

The matter then comes before the Board and the officer making the request, in order to square himself with his constituents makes a fight for the additional man. The members of the Board are also looking to the will of the people and while fully convinced that the expenditure is not of so great advantage to the public as the building of roads or some other public improvement bow to the pressure of the people and grant the request.

As an instance of what is going on we may call attention to the fact that it is costing the tax payers of this county over thirty thousand dollars per year to pay the salaries of the police and the amount is steadily increasing. On the mainland this would be considered a criterion that crime is rampant here as there is probably not another place in the states or territories where the police cost so much according to population as they do here but if we take up the report of the last grand jury we find that that body returned but eight indictments most of whom were either acquitted or found guilty of minor offences.

In a mainland community of the same population that we have here we would think the expenditure of five thousand dollars per year for police exorbitant and are the people here so much worse than they are on the mainland? It has not been our experience with the people here that they are. The Hawaiians are a quiet peaceable people. The Portuguese are noted for being a law abiding class and as for the Chinese they are usually so peaceable that they cannot be kicked into a fight. As for the Japanese in the past they occasionally got into trouble but not to any great extent and during the past few years they have improved very much in their behavior. Nearly all of the offences committed are of a trivial nature and the community would be quite as well off if a great majority of the cases brought into court were settled at home without the intervention of the law.

One of the Supervisors at least takes the stand that it is better to pay the efficient police officers well and even raise their salaries substantially than to employ so many who are not needed and use the public funds for the improvements needed on the roads and elsewhere for the benefit of the public and incidentally for the mass of the laboring people.

In this all thinking people must agree. This plan would give the people something in return for their money and at the same time give employment to the needy.

Let us have better roads and fewer policemen.

Oil for the roads. At the last meeting of the Board of Supervisors the matter of oiling the newly macadamized roads was taken up but nothing was decided in the matter.

The Union Oil company offered to furnish all the oil the County might wish at the rate of one dollar per barrel. The oil was to be of not less than fifty per cent mineral matter.

It has been practically demonstrated that oil of this nature is the best obtainable and that when once applied it will keep the roads in good condition for at least one year while oil of a lower grade of mineral matter will be of much less value and in consequence prove too expensive.

The company offers to keep the oil stored for the county as long as it may desire and require the county to pay for the same as it uses the oil provided the county will build its own storage tank as a guaranty of good faith.

The supervisors are now starting the grading and will macadam the road to Kahului soon and the proper time to oil the macadam is as soon after the same is completed as possible as then the oil will take hold of the porous surface and remain permanently. If the Board waits until the roads become compact the oil will not enter the soil and consequently must either be scarified at an additional expense or be a useless application.

Good business judgement will dictate the immediate erection of suitable oil tanks for oil of a large percentage of asphaltum and the application of the same to the roads as soon after the completion of the same as possible. This will make permanent roads and allow time and money for the building of belt and side roads that are so much desired by a great majority of the people here.

Liquor Men Turned Down.

The Board of Liquor License Commissioners for the County of Maui met at the public room of the Masonic temple Monday and considered the applications of seven dealers in intoxicating liquors.

Four applications were refused. They were Otto S. Meyer, Lin Hee, and Chang Tung of Molokai and M. Imamura Co. of Hana.

All of the Molokai applicants were refused a license on the ground that they were running stores in the same buildings in which they had their liquor business and between which doors opened allowing entrance from

one to the other contrary to law. There was nothing against the men or the way they conducted their business other than that above mentioned which being contrary to law the Board was compelled to refuse the license to each of them.

It is probable that each one of the applicants will remodel his building and close up the doors between the saloon and the store by making a solid wall between and then apply again.

At this meeting licenses were granted to E. K. Devauchelle, and L. Y. Aiona for saloon licenses and to the Pioneer Hotel for a whole sale License.

Arrested for Seduction.

Police officer E. H. Rogers went to Honolulu Monday with a warrant for James Ahlo, charging him with seduction. In conjunction with the local police Officer Rogers arrested his man as he was about to board the Illoman to sail for San Francisco. The prisoner denied that he was running away, but stated that he was going back to San Francisco, where he had formerly lived, in order to get work intending to return later. He was brought back to Maui. The prisoner had purchased his ticket in the name of "James A. Low."

Rather than stand trial he married the girl Virginia Martins, whom he had wronged.

It is said he left the following day for Labaina and it is believed will again leave for the coast.

A Family Row.

The peace and quietude of the town was ruffled by the appearance on the street Tuesday evening of number of angry Japanese. An old couple followed by a number of their children were giving chase to a young man and a young woman who lost no time in making use of their spitting abilities to seek the protection and shelter of the police station. As the old couple ran they called lustily for help and soon followed by a large number of boys and others but no one seemed to know whether it was a fire or a lynching that he was expected to witness. On reaching the police station it was learned that the young couple had quietly stolen away and had been married without securing the blessing of the old couple and as a result received a blessing of a very different character to that which is supposed to be due a newly married pair.

On learning of the marriage of the young people the older ones went home and the little boys dispersed feeling satisfied with the fun.

Relief From Horn-Fly.

From the nature of the case it is impossible to estimate the amount of loss suffered by cattle men of these islands from injury by fly pest, particularly the horn-fly. This injury is many fold. The pain and loss of substance from the amount of blood these flies withdraw from the animals is only equal to the constant worry and torment. Sores are kept open by these pernicious pests and frequently aggravated to the extreme. All animals are driven to despair and many doubtless lose their lives as a result of the incessant attacks.

As stated in the last report (1906) of the Board of Agriculture and Forestry, Mr. Koebele has given much attention and work to the enemies of these pests in Arizona last year. Among other things he sent here for propagation was a rather small, more or less ant-like, four-winged fly bred from pupae collected in compost matter. This fly has been bred here in large numbers and distributed so far as they lasted, over all the islands about a year ago. A couple of months ago it was discovered in large numbers on a dairy near Honolulu by the Board's entomologists and, the few flies upon the animals there, and the ease and comfort that these animals seemed to enjoy, gave proof that something was doing execution among the pests. From maggots and pupae collected these large numbers of the parasites were bred. These parasites the Board is now distributing as fast as they issue. In cooperation with Dr. Norgaard a complete list of those interested in cattle was secured and colonies are being sent out in rotation. The Board is also ready to send colonies on application to those not already on their list.

While the entomologists refuse to make definite promises, the outlook for relief seems to be encouraging. Certainly the useful fly deserves attention. All ranch managers need to do with it is to release it according to instructions that are sent with the colonies, watch for the fly in the field, and as soon as it is discovered collect three or four old droppings in the place of discovery and distribute them over the ranch. Here, as elsewhere, vigilance is the price of relief.—Ad vertiser.

Raw Sugar is quoted at \$76.70 per ton. Beets \$79.80 per ton.

HONOLULU, July 16.—Sir Chentung Liang Cheng, late Chinese Minister to Washington, with suite passed through yesterday.

Several of the Kumerie passengers left for the Coast yesterday on the steamer China.

The Japanese Maru boats are to be replaced by larger boats. Acting Governor Atkinson says that the Kapaa lands will be settled immediately, all the difficulties having been settled.

The steamer Hilonian leaves for the Coast today. Geo. Rodiek was refused citizenship by Judge Dole owing to conflict in the law. This law has bearing on that in which the Morita Kaiza case is taken to the United States Supreme Court.

LONDON, July 16.—An unconfirmed report from St. Petersburg announces the death of Count Tolstoi.

BOSTON, July 16.—Yesterday while loading an eight inch gun on the U. S. S. Georgia sparks exploded several bags of powder killing eight men, including Lieut. Goodrich, son of Admiral Goodrich, who died shortly afterward. Among the other dead are midshipman Goldwaite and seamen Hamilton, Thomas, Miller and Burke. Fourteen men were injured.

BERLIN, 16.—Severe floods are causing death and destruction in various parts of the German empire.

HONOLULU, July 15.—F. B. McStocker has sued the Afong estate for \$78,000 as commissions for the sale of the Pepeekeo plantation in 1889.

A fire in the Boston Building was discovered on Sunday and extinguished without damage.

The transport Sherman left yesterday. She communicated with the Advertiser by wireless last night when more than one hundred miles away.

Saturday's baseball resulted as follows:

First game: St. Louis, 2; Kams, 1. Second game: Diamond Heads 10, Punahons, 2.

Castle for the Puns gave four men bases on balls in the first innings. He never recovered the gain but improved in the delivery. He had only two days, practice on the grounds and shows good form.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—The barkentine S. N. Castle reports that while cod fishing off the coast of Siberia she was boarded by a Russian gunboat, her papers were taken and she was warned to stay thirty miles from shore.

PARIS, July 15.—Leon Maille, a naval reservist, yesterday fired twice at President Fallieres. The President is unhurt but Maille narrowly escaped being lynched. He is supposed to be insane.

TOKIO, July 15.—Terauchi declares that there are no Japanese spies in America.

SEOUL, July 15.—Twenty-four members of the conspiracy to assassinate the ministers have been arrested.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—The Labor Council has rejected the plan proposed to choose a mayor to fill the unexpired term of Schmitz.

SEATTLE, July 13.—A shortage in the accounts of ex comptroller Replinger amounting to \$68,000 has been discovered.

THE HAGUE, Holland, July 12.—The French proposals that a declaration of war and notice shall precede hostilities has been adopted by the Peace Conference.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 12.—Vice President Fairbanks arrived today to attend the Christian Endeavor Convention.

NEWPORT, Wales, July 12.—Miss Sutton won in the semi-final tennis play.

OYSTER BAY, L. I., July 12.—After a luncheon with Admiral Yamamoto and Japanese Ambassador Aoki, President Roosevelt issued a statement today announcing that a thoroughly good understanding and fundamental friendliness exists between America and Japan.

TOKIO, Japan, July 12.—The conclusion of the Franco-Japanese agreement was celebrated today by the Japanese. The new treaty guarantees the maintenance of the present status in the Orient for the contracting nations, and assures an open door in Oriental markets.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 12.—Acting Mayor Boxton testified today that he had been granted immunity by the prosecution in the graft trials on his promise to aid in the prosecution of others.

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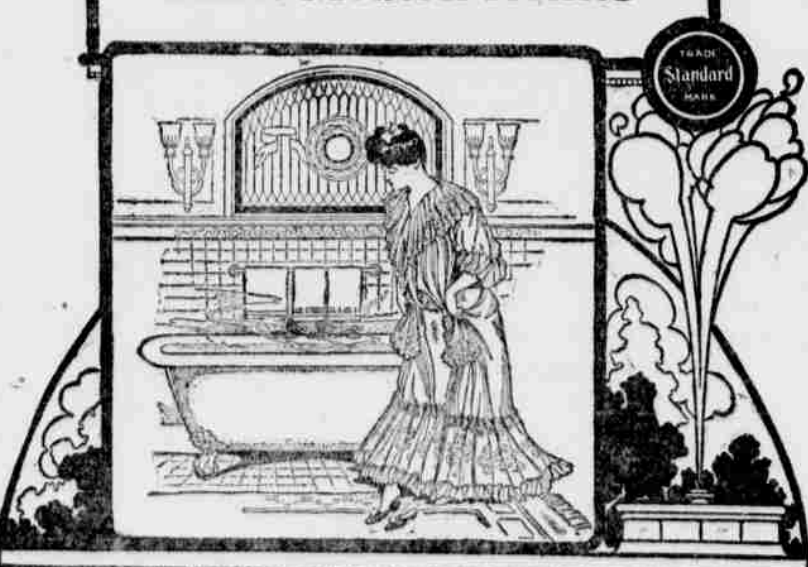

Home Grown Tea.

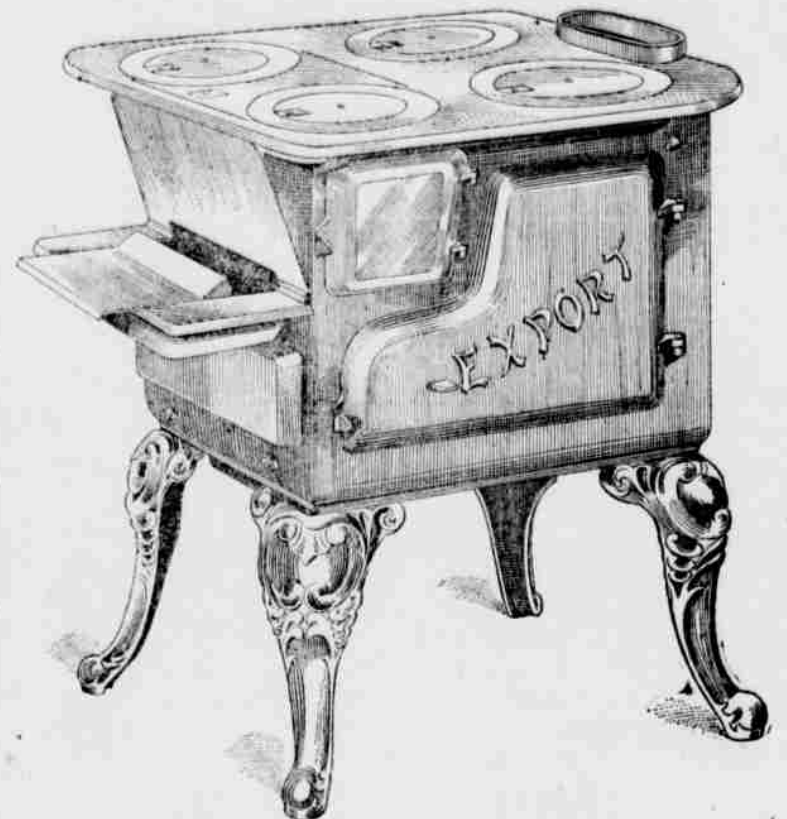

Grinding is Pa'u.

The Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company's big mill at Pounene blew her whistle long and loud at eight o'clock Tuesday evening to announce the completion of the grinding of her crop for the season.

The tonnage of cane ground was 360,629 which included that of the Kihel Plantation Co. the latter being 28,269.

The tonnage of sugar will be reported as soon as completed which will be some time next week. It will probably be somewhere about 44,000 tons.

The Bishop then asked the solemn question of the candidates, calling each by name, and each answered in clear tones "I do." Then the candidates knelt before the Bishop while he placed his hands on their heads and prayed that they might be defended and would grow in grace unto their lives' end. After the confirmation followed Holy Communion, the Bishop being the celebrant. The Bishop preached a powerful and practical sermon from the text, "And the disciples were first called Christians at Antioch." His theme was "Character." The true Christian is one who not only makes the Christian profession, but, more than that, one who endeavors to live the Christ life. It was a ringing call of action.

The rector is to be congratulated in preparing and presenting so large a class for confirmation.

Mr. Kaue presented Resolution No. 321 thereby granting the request of Sheriff Saffery for Special Officer Luke Chan a \$35.00 per month, and moved the adoption of the same. Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried.

At 9:30 P. M. Mr. Kaue moved to adjourn to 8 A. M. Seconded by Mr. Haia and carried.

MORNING SESSION.

Saturday, July 13, 1907.

Chairman Wm. Henning called the meeting of the Board of Supervisors to order at 8 A. M.

Roll Call. Present Henning, Church, Haia, Kaue, and Meyer.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and ordered approved as read.

The Clerk was instructed to write to the Supt. of Public Works stating that the Board of Supervisors of Maui had visited McGregor's Landing and have found it in a deplorable condition the back railing and the flooring on the makai side being all torn off and request that immediate repairs be made of the said landing.

The report of the County Engineer was read and ordered laid over until the next meeting.

The County Engineer was instructed to report more fully the road work being done in each district.

The report of the County Engineer about Mile Posts was read and ordered placed on file.

Mr. Geo. Weight, Hacks and Sanitary Inspector for the District of Wailuku when asked what he had to say concerning the report of the Grand Jury in reference to his department made the statement that he had tried to ascertain from some of the members of the Grand Jury what specific charges were made that brought about this report, and they had stated to him that they were sworn to secrecy and could not divulge any information, but one Grand Juror had admitted that the matter which originated the criticism was not discussed in the sessions of the Grand Jury, and the first that he knew of it was when the report was being read before signatures were affixed, and that at no time was the matter discussed in the sessions of the grand jury. So far being unable to find out what the Grand Jury specifically refers to, he has been unable to act.

Mr. Case called the attention of the Board to the matter of Sol. Kawahoa. He stated that Sol. Kawai had been reported drunk after his suspension, and for that reason the Grand Jury had made the recommendation it did concerning him.

The Sheriff was instructed to diligently investigate this matter and report at the next meeting of the Board.

The Clerk requested that the Board approve the appointment of Mr. Carl F. Rose as First Clerk of the County Clerk's office.

Mr. Church moved that the Board of Supervisors approve the appointment of Mr. Carl F. Rose at a salary of \$35.00 per month. Seconded by Mr. Kaue and carried.

Mr. Church presented Ordinance No. 8 in re Paliuli Road and moved that a notice be published in the paper that the same be taken up for consideration at the next meeting. Seconded by Mr. Kaue, and carried.

When Schmitz was Sentenced.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 9.—"Eugene E. Schmitz," said Judge Dunne in a low voice, leaning over his desk and glancing from time to time at a sheet of notes, while the convicted Mayor stood to receive sentence, "the court in pronouncing judgment has but brief comment to make. The verdict of the jury in this case has a deeper significance than ordinary attaches to a finding of guilt. It is a message to all the people that in the city of San Francisco law and order are supreme. That no man, no matter how exalted his station or how strong and powerful the political, social and financial influences which surround him, is above the law."

Judge Dunne turned on the attorney sharply. "If you interrupt these proceedings again, Mr. Metson, I will send you to jail. You would be in far better business if you were here begging a day in court to answer the charge that you willfully and improperly sought to tamper with a witness in this case."

"I am ready to answer now or at any other time any charge that may be lodged against me," replied Metson simply, and then relapsed into prudent silence.

Judge Dunne turned again to Schmitz. "You have by your willful, criminal act, so a jury of your fellow citizens has declared, broken that confidence and betrayed that trust."

Schmitz was angry; he winced, but his voice was still strong. "With all due respect to the court I ask that you sentence me and not lecture me," he said in deep tones.

The court paused but for a moment. "Therefore, it may be said," he went on, "that the penalty which the law permits in this case is

insufficient to meet the demands of justice."
