The report that the Pacific Cable bill as appropriation have passed Congress is not correct. A passenger who arrived in the Australia, says that the bill had not passed, and the friends of the enterprise were doubtful whether it could be at this session. The appropriation of \$25,000 to survey the route will probably be voted.

The increased frequency in the arrival and departure of foreign steamers seems to be bringing about the result which has often been predicted—an increase of travel. This has been the case on every route in the older countries, and it will be the same here. The recent extra efforts made to advertise our islands by the circulation abroad of the TOURISTS' GUIDE and the Paradise of the Pacific, are having the effect which was anticipated, and which will doubtless continue each year. The public should increase its efforts in circulating these excellent mediums of information relative to our advantages as a place of resort for tourists in search of pleasure or health.

## COMMERCE KNOCKING AT OUR DOORS.

It is high time that our harbor improvements were taken in hand in grim earnest. We sorely need more harbor frontage, more wharf, more warehouse, more depth of water.

The preliminaries for dredging are in preparation and would bear a little hurrying. In the matter of wharfage the Railway Company are as usual to the fore and have

discharged a large ocean-going ship the Andrew Welch, the third of the kind discharged on the Ewa side of the harbor, but the Fifeshire after a good passage from Liverpool with a heavy general cargo was several days in the stream waiting her time for a wharf. At the present moment three large coal ships from Newcastle, N. S. W., are awaiting the chance to discharge.

If this be the case now, what may it not be a year hence, when almost certainly there will be a line of first-class steamships calling here on their way to and from the Australian colonies and Vancouver, besides the certain expansion of our California trade and more frequent arrivals and departures for China and Japan. Already the wharfs are too narrow for modern ocean ships. The Australia and Zealand are 368 feet long each. The Alameda and Mariposa little less, the Hounslow 325. The White Star ships though the oldest and smallest of the line cannot enter the harbor for insufficient depth of water, how then when the Empress of India and her sister ships of 550 feet or more (the new White Star are 582) want to come in, and these ships will always want a powerful tug to berth them and to get them away from the wharves. All the Ewa side of the harbor is wanted for wharves and warehouses, and immediately opposite the entrance to the harbor is wanted a long, deep cutting to the foot of Richard street, with a berth for three ocean racers. Neither of the flagships of the French or British squadrons can come in, though if they could they would and might lie there for weeks at a time.

So dredging and wharf-building should go on, hand in hand, if possible, but there is no good reason why either should wait for the other.

Within almost calculable months, the cable will be down here, and ships will call for orders, and many of them may want refit and repair if they know they can get them. Two great private enterprises, assisted, but not too liberally, the Marine Railway and the Ewa railway, are working to show what may be done by energy and determination.

## A Cargo Boat.

A splendid specimen of the modern freight-steamer is now in this harbor. The British steel screw ship Hounslow, twelve days from Nainaimo, Vancouver Island. She is 325 feet long, 41 feet beam and 22 feet depth of hold, with a gross tonnage of 4,480.

An idea of the power and economy of modern engines may be gathered from the fact that the Hounslow's triple expansion engines nominally of 240 horse-power work up to 1,160 horse-power and have brought her down here, nearly 2,800 miles, at an average rate of 3.5 knots, at an expenditure of 15 tons per day. By the way, how much does the Kinan burn at the same speed? The Hounslow has a double bottom fitted with tanks for water ballast and so can maintain her trim, being able to take in or to discharge 651 tons of water ballast.

She entered the harbor drawing 20 feet of water and can carry 4,000 tons sugar but will want 22 feet 6 inches which is just close to the maximum depth of our bar as it is.

She was built by Messrs. Blair & Co., of Stockton-on-Tees, in 1890, is commanded by Capt. F. Norman with Mr. H. Oliver for chief engineer.

## Sugar.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20. — Cuban Centrifugal, 96 degrees, 5 65-100 cents; granulated, 6 9-16 cents, the highest it has been since last October.

The local market is quiet and without feature. There have been no changes worthy of note. Both the California and American refineries are getting rid of their stocks of Hawaiian as fast as possible after they come. The last consignments of Manila and Java for Spreckels are now in port, and are stored on Mission Rock, awaiting the time when they can be admitted free of duty.

Some difficulty is being had in conducting the investigation into the affairs of the Sugar Trust recently undertaken. A dispatch from New York dated the 20th says: The Senate Committee on Laws resumed its investigation this morning. It was found that Treasurer John E. Seales, Jr., had disappeared to avoid being questioned. The Deputy Sergeant-at-Arms announced that he was unable to serve subpoenas on Seales, Theodore Havemeyer, Dekest and William and J. D. Dick. The deputy said he was hampered by the people in the office of the trust company, the employees doing all they could to prevent him from finding the persons wanted.

## A Terrible Wreck.

The fine clipper ship Elizabeth, Capt. Colcord, was wrecked at Tennessee Cove, above the North Head of Golden Gate, on Saturday evening, the 21st inst. At 3 o'clock in the afternoon of that day, four tugs went to her relief, but could not get her in the bay.

The wreck resulted in the loss of eighteen men, including the captain and two mates.

## The Nicaragua Canal.

Congress is still struggling with the Nicaragua Canal bill and each week develops stronger opposition to the measure. The bill came up again the following day and Morgan addressed the Senate in its defense.

## American News.

The Legislature of Oregon has adjourned without making any appropriation for the World's Fair. It is as good as settled that the California Legislature will set aside \$300,000 for that purpose.

The final ceremonies over the remains of General Sherman were held at St. Louis on the 21st inst. The procession in St. Louis was fully equal in size to that in New York. The ceremonies were conducted by Father Thomas E. Sherman, son of the dead soldier.

The Washington Post has created a political sensation by announcing that under no circumstances will ex-President Cleveland consent to run for the Presidency in 1892. The announcement has brought about a deal of talk and gossip, and its truth has been half a dozen times asserted and denied. Cleveland has not defined his position, but he is commonly considered to have ruined his chances by reason of his open opposition to the free coinage of silver.

The New York Herald's Washington correspondent asserts that Blaine is scheming for the annexation of Cuba, and that the reciprocity treaty, as proposed, is only a deep-laid scheme to compel the Spanish planters to throw off the yoke of Spain and annex the island to the United States. The Cubans are very restive over the failure of the Spanish Government to come to terms with Blaine and conclude reciprocity treaties.

President Harrison has named ex-Governor Charles Foster of Ohio as Secretary of the Treasury to succeed William Windom, who died at New York so suddenly recently.

## San Francisco News.

The steamer China has brought four steel plates, from Japan, covered with a lacquer which it is claimed will not foul when kept under the sea water. If it is all that is claimed for it, the United States Government will adopt it for use on the new men-of-war.

The brig Tahiti has arrived from Tahiti bringing later news of another outbreak on Raiatea island one of the windward group. Three men-of-war, the Champlain, Vore and Volage have shelled the native villages with no real advantage. The natives refuse to submit to French protection and have thus far successfully resisted.

## Foreign News.

Berlin has another remedy for tuberculosis. It is the discovery of Professor Lieberich, Director of the Royal Medical Institute of that city. He asserts that it will cure advanced phthisis, and announces that he will give the world the full benefit of the remedy in a short time.

A state of siege has been declared at Buenos Ayres, on account of an attempted assassination of General Roca, formerly Minister of the Interior. The inhabitants are greatly alarmed over the situation.

## THE CONTEMPT CASE.

Supreme Court of the Hawaiian Islands, in Banco—March 3, 1891.  
IN RE JOHN E. BUSH.

## OPINION OF THE COURT BY DOLE, J.

There were two law points which were raised at the last hearing, the first of which was in regard to the policy of a trial of this kind. We feel that it is a matter of discretion with us and it is for the Court to say whether it is desirable to take summary proceedings or leave a case of this kind to take its course by indictment, and it seems to us not a very practical suggestion that a trial of this kind is going to affect a subsequent trial by indictment, because there is no probability that a subsequent trial will take place. One would fulfill all the demands of the necessities of the case, and so that seems rather a fanciful objection. The law gives it fully into the power and discretion of the Court to act in this matter.

In regard to the unconstitutionality of this kind of a trial, we do not think that the section in the Constitution precludes it. And, gentlemen, it is not a matter which we are personally interested in in the least, we appear here officially, and an attack which affects us officially is a public matter, which affects the power of the Court; a matter of great importance and of sacred character which we are here to defend in our official and public capacity. We are not, therefore, personally interested in the matter in the sense in which it has been referred to in any way, and so we overrule that point also.

In regard to the merits of the case, we feel that from the evidence placed before us by Mr. Bush, that he has satisfactorily purged himself from the contempt which we felt was committed by the publication of the article referred to. If this was a trial by jury he would be entitled to the benefit of the doubt, and we are satisfied that he has shown to the Court that he has not knowingly published this article.

This being a proceeding by statute, we are confined to the words of the law which defines this offense as knowingly publishing maliciously in a Court or jury tending to bring such Court or jury into contempt, or to bring into contempt or odium. The fact that it has not been published knowingly, although it has been published in his paper, we are satisfied, relieves him from the charge of contempt of Court.

If it had been a case of libel Mr. Bush, want of knowledge would not relieve you, you would be still responsible in criminal or civil proceedings. And we think that the management of your paper in the way you have carried on is very dangerous and careless.

You are discharged from the contempt brought against you.

## CHICAGO FAIR IN TROUBLE.

It begins to look as if the Colum-  
bian Fair at Chicago might have to  
be abandoned, owing to a strike on  
the part of laborers. The follow-  
ing is from the Alta of February  
15th:

"The situation at Chicago is such  
as to warrant the gravest reflec-  
tions. The capital and credit have  
been secured, after much exertion,  
to make certain the needed pre-  
paration for the Columbian Fair.  
Much concession and compromise  
have been required to accomplish  
this, and at last ground was broken  
and the work began. Then appear-  
ed the local labor unions, declaring  
that no work shall be done except  
on their terms, and that the Direc-  
tors shall not look elsewhere than  
in Chicago for the labor needed.  
The first squad of men put at work  
on the grounds were driven off  
with clubs, and the first carpenters  
who went to erect some temporary  
tool houses, were ordered off, and  
had to go or be mobbed.

The Fair is held to celebrate the  
discovery of a new world by an  
Italian; but the first workmen  
clubbed off the grounds were his  
countrymen. If Columbus himself  
should materialize he would be  
knocked down for manipulating a  
spade and shovel on the Columbian  
Fair grounds. Those who have  
hoped and hoped for a betterment  
in the labor situation seem doomed  
to disappointment. Every year it  
grows worse; every year the peace  
and order of the land are more dis-  
turbed by the evidences that there  
is not work enough in the country  
for those who need work. The  
threats made in Chicago, if carried  
out, will end in a bloody struggle  
which will be a nauseating com-  
mentary upon the lesson intended  
to be taught by the Fair. It is  
something for American statesmen  
to think of, that at Vienna, Paris  
and Melbourne, expositions equaling  
what this is expected to be were  
prepared for and held without  
such disorders as are now rife at  
Chicago. Is it because the classes  
that are incapable of self-restraint  
have forsaken those countries and  
become domesticated here?"
