

Fanciful Names of Leading Cities of the Union, and the Principal Geographical Nicknames of the United States.

"Queen City," and "Queen of the West" were names given to Cincinnati before her supremacy was questioned by Chicago and St. Louis. Denver, Col., is referred to as "Oneen of the Plains." Upward of fifteen railroads center in Indianapolis, from which fact it desires the appellation "Railroad City." "Right Arm of the Com-monwealth" is a descriptive term given to the peninsula of Cape Cod, by reason of its peculiar shape. "State of Franklyn" is the original name of Tennessee, under which name it was organized in 1785; ant part of the City) continues to the "Strait City" is Detroit, Mich., being situated on a strait connecting lakes Erie and St. Clair. "The Sugar Loaf" is a conical hill on the Hudson river, fifty-seven miles from New York, and the term "Switzerland of America" is applied to the White Mountains, and also to the region around Mauch Chunk, Glen Onoko, and the Switchback Railroad, Pa. "Symme's Hole" is an imaginary aperture in the earth's crust near 82 degs. N. L., which was imagined by Captain John Cleves Symmes (1829) to communicate with the interior was hallow, inhabited by animals and plants, and lighted by two subterranean suns Pluto and Pro-

> Fort Alarm, Texas, has been named the "Thermopylae of America," in allusion to the heroic defense made for it in 1836, by a small body of Texans against a horde of Mexicans under Santa Anna. David Crocke is said to have been the last to succumb before the invaders. During the subsequent war for indepen-dence the Texan war cry was, "Remember the Alamo." "Tremont" is an easy name applied to Boston, which arose from three hills on which the city was built; the "Underground Railroad' is a popular designation given to the various secret routes and methods by which slaves from the Southern States were assisted to Canada. It was sometimes abbreviated by

using the initials, U. G. R. R. "Vermilion Sea" is a name sometimes given to the Gulf of California, because of the scarlet infusoria which infest its waters; because Dana was for so many years solidly Republican in politics it has been termed the "Vermont of the

West."

Utica, N. Y., has been termed the "Watering pot of America" for the following reasons: "A few years ago the Utica Driving Park was first opened for running and trotting races, not yet understood, whenever an unusually large crowd attended, it rained from first to last. Whenever the races were postponed the rain was likewise put off, and as often as the horses were called, a shower-not called -also came on. Eventually the sun smiled on the races, and the association has been smiling ever since. Yet to this day, far and near, horsemen know Utica only as "the watering-pot of America." "Western Saratoga" is a sobriquet plied occasionally to Waukesha, Wis. The "Panhandle" is term popularly applied to the northern extremity of the State of Virginia; the north-western portion of Texas is also sometimes called by the

M.'s Commissioner and Consul-General, a private audience for the purpose of presenting to Her Majesty an autograph letter from Her Majesty Victoria. Queen of Great Britain, Empress of India, etc., etc., etc. of which the following is a copy:

" VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, Empress of India, etc., etc., etc., To Her Majesty Liliuokalani, Queen of the Hawaiian Islands, Sendeth Greeting! Our Good Friend! We have received the letter which Your Majesty addressed to Us upon the 29th of January last, announcing the death of Your Majesty's brother, His Majesty King Kalakaua, and Your own accession to the Throne. While we condole with Your Majesty in the grievous loss which has been sustained by You, and by the whole Hawaiian Nation, We cannot forbear to express to You at the same time Our cordial congratulations upon Your accession to the Throne, and We take this opportunity of renewing to Your Majesty the assurances of Our highest consideration and regard. And so We recommend You to the protecti n of the Almighty. Given at Our Court at Windsor Custle, the twenty-first day of March, in the year of Our Lord, 1891, and in the fifty-tourth year of Our Reign.

Your Good Friend, [M. R.] VICTORIA, R. I. Countersigned. SALISBURY."

FOREIGN OFFICE. Honolelu, H. I., April 30, 1891. Her Majesty the Queen has received an autograph letter from His Imperial Majesty the German Emperor and King of Prussia, of which the following is a translation:

" WILLIAM.

by the grace of God, German Emperor, King of Prussia, etc., etc., etc., to Her Majesty LILIUOKALANI, Queen of the Hawaiian Islands; Greeting. Great and Good Friend.

It was with sincere sympathy that I learned from Your Majesty's letter of the 29 h of January last, the sad news of the death of His Majesty King Kalakaua. Your beloved brother and predecessor, de. paried from this life on the 20th of January last. I received with interest by the same letter the information that Your Majesty, in accordance with the Constitution of the Hawaiian Kingdom, has ascended the Throne of Hawaii.

1 assure Your Majesty of Mv sincere sympathy with the severe loss You and Your Nation have sustained by the decease of King Kalakaua.

At the same time I am glad to be able to reciprocate the sentiments of friendship and of esteem expressed to Me, and I beg FRIDAY, : : MAY 1, 1891. Your Majesty to be convinced of the continuance of the same feelings towards You, which have always animated Me towards the late Monarch.

I likewise trust that Your Majesty in accordance with Your Christian confession, will like Your predecessor, extend to tition, projoses to build two Amthe German citizens residing in Your country Your kind protection and assist-

ing You sincere y upon Your accession to the Throne, I avail Myself at the same time of this opportunity to assure You of delphia; and the ships will cost two the esteem with which I remain,

You stated that I overstepped all sporting rules by jumping into the track and following Torbert. As for jumping into the track, that is not true, I walked in, as I was given that privilege, and as all trainers are entitled to, all over the world, in all such races as this, whether amateur or professional, if not other wise advertised or disallowed. But in this race trainers were allowed. Both I and the other two trainers were on the race track all the time of the race attending to our men, and I saw nothing unfair and no person made any complaints

As for running round after Torbert, I will give my reasons: I was standing close to one of the judges and six other men, who had watches on the race. heard them say, when Torbert was at the other side of the track, that the time was up. As he came by the time keepers shouted out "time is up," every one in the Armory could see by the clock the hour was up Thinking that Torbert might stop I ran round after him to tell him not to stop He was thirty yards ahead of Rosa then, in fact the race was won by Torbert before I went round the track. I will leave those present to judge whether a trainer has a right or not to run around to a tend to his man, providing he does not interfere or obstruct any runner

As for causing a kick in the race, that is all moonshine. Rosa told me himself he was squarely beaten, and made no complaints; he had a fair field and all the show he could ask for. As for the kicking, it was all done by one or two young men well known to the sportsmen of our national game, who, I suppose, had a quarter staked on the losing man. The judges were quite right in giving the chronic kickers the cold shoulder for making such a child like protest. 

OUR SAN FRANCISCO LETTER.

Per O. S. s. Australia, San Francisco. April 21, 1891.

(From our special correspondent.)

(Concluded.) The Trust Controversy.





Room for Reform.

Lawyers, in addressing juries, are apt to think themselves licensed to say just what they please; and ELECTRIC LIGHT LANTS of any they often please to say things that have no relevancy to the matter in hand, and no foundation in the evidence, but which, as they suppose, may have some influence in affecting the verdict. The Court Appeals of New York state recently laid down the following just principle as the rule of law on this subject:

"Where counsel, in summing up, proceeds to dilate upon facts not in evidence, or to press upon the jury considerations which the jury would have no right to regard, it is, we conceive, the plain duty of the court upon objection made to interpose; and a refusal to interpose. where otherwise the right of the party would be prejudiced, would be legal error."

It was on this ground that the Court of Appeals reversed the judgment rendered in the court below, and ordered a new trial. The rule thus laid down is certainly one that commends itself to com mon sense; and this ought to make it good law.[-N. Y. Paper.


