PEACE PROSPECTS.

The Boers Hope to Save the Independence of Their Republic.

LOURENZO MARQUES, March 21.—A Boer peace delegation, consisting of three commissioners, has sailed for Europe.

LONDON, March 21.—A dispatch to the Morning Post from Cape Town says: The real objective point of the Boer peace delegation, which recently sailed from Lourenzo Marques for Europe, is Russia. The delegates, Messrs. Wolmerans, Fischer and Wessels, the latter being the President of the Free State Raad, took with them all the secret incriminating documents from Pretoria, thus making it difficult to incriminate Steyn and the members of the Afrikaner Bond in Cape Colony.

SECRET MESSAGES FROM KRUEGER. LONDON, March 22, 4:20 a. m.—Several telegrams have passed between President Krueger and the British Government, in addition to the Salisbury-Krueger correspondence already published. The Foreign Office received a dispatch from Pretoria yesterday. The contents of these communications cannot yet be obtained.

So far as the military situation is concerned, there is practically no change. Lord Roberts is quietly making preparations for the next move. As necessary to a beginning, Generals Gatacre and Brabant are swiftly moving from point to point in the southern districts of the Free State, dispersing or accepting the surrender of any remaining Boers, thus insuring the safety of Lord Roberts' communications before starting toward Pretoria.

LONDON, March 22.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail, telegraphing Tuesday, March 20th, says: "I have just returned from Bloemfontein, where I learned that no further movement is probable for three weeks, as negotiations are proceeding. I failed to ascertain the nature of the negotiations or whether Sir Alfred Milner's departure from Cape Town is connected with them, but I should not be surprised if the war collapses quickly."

A dispatch to the Standard from Bloemfontein, dated Tuesday, says: Four thousand Transvaalers from Colesburg trekked on Saturday and Sunday to the northeast, going by way of the Basutoland border. They will probably be caught at one of the passes.

A striking feature of the advance on Bloemfontein was the abandonment of our communications with Poplar Grove. Lord Roberts, confident in the ability of his transport to meet all immediate needs of the army, deliberately left the enemy at Abraham's kraal to do what they liked. The result fully justified him. The enemy to the south were paralyzed by the boldness and rapidity of the stroke, and Generals Clements and Gatacre were enabled to cross the Orange river almost without opposition.

A Daily Chronicle correspondent at Bloemfontein, telegraphing Tuesday, March 20th, says: "The civil government has been reorganized. J. A. Collins, Under Secretary of the Interior in Steyn's executive, has been appointed Landrost. Steyn is regarded as guilty of fatuity, but not influenced by nepotism. He was always Krueger's tool. It has been rumored that he has reaped financial benefits from this connection, but the report is not substantiated. Mr. Fischer played the part of Steyn's Mephistopheles."

LONDON, March 22.—The correspondent of the Times at Lourenzo Marques, telegraphing Tuesday, says: It is reported from Pretoria that a scheme has been arranged for the amalgamation of the Transvaal and the Free State. Krueger will become President of the Federated States and Steyn Commandant General of the Boer army. The flag will be the same as that of the Transvaal, with an additional orange color.

Although this story is not confirmed it is not improbable. It is a notorious fact that General Joubert has lost the confidence of the burghers simply because from the first he refused to shut his eyes to the inevitable result of the war. With all the burghers in the field it might not be difficult to secure a formal indorsement of this rumored scheme.

NEW YORK, March 21.—A Sun cable from Pretoria, March 20th, 1 p.

m., via Lorenzo Marques, says: A dispatch from Kroonstadt, Orange Free State, dated March 18th, says: The Pretoria federal commandos are here. They are in grand spirits. They are ready for the enemy, and are even defiantly awaiting the British advance. Presidents Krueger and Steyn addressed a vast camp meeting to-day. The Transvaal President made an impassioned appeal to the burghers to maintain a gallant fight for freedom. He told them it was certain that the ultimate result of the war would be that the Boer republics would retain their independence despite the temporary British occupation of Bloemfontein.

President Steyn followed President Krueger in a strong speech. He told the burghers that the Free State was far from conquered because its capital had been occupied by the British. He informed the burghers that England had definitely refused to allow the republics to remain independent states. Therefore, all the republics had to do now was to fight to the last. President Steyn said that in the six months the war had been going on the Boers had lost less than 100 men killed, and that the fighting was really commencing now. As President he warned the Free State burghers not to believe Roberts' proclamation and accept his invitation to lay down their arms. He assured them that the British had failed on every occasion to keep solemn treaties they had made.

Sir Alfred Milner, Governor of Cape Colony, Steyn declared, had publicly proclaimed that the Afrikaners would be exterminated, knowing the republics would fight to the end. He closed by urging the burghers to place their trust in God.

President Steyn's appeal aroused the burghers to a pitch of wild enthusiasm.

LONDON, March 23.—A special correspondent of the Times at Bloemfontein, telegraphing Thursday, says: "Yesterday Krueger issued a proclamation annexing the Free State to the Transvaal. Steyn immediately issued a counter proclamation, declaring the Free State intact."

The Daily News has the following from Bloemfontein, dated Wednesday: It is rumored that Krueger and Steyn will meet at Kroonstadt, in the Orange Free State, on April 4th, to discuss the future programme. The feeling between the Transvaal and the Free State is very bitter.

THOSE PROMOTERS.

Misery loves company and our fellow citizens who invested money in such companies as the American Sugar Co., Kihai and Olaa should feel relieved when learning that there are "others" who listened to the bland proposals of our local promoters and now mourn their losses.

The case of Walters vs. Hare now on trial in the San Francisco Courts is of interest to all would-be speculators. Dr. Walters, the complainant, is one of the most popular men in the Islands, and his friends will deeply regret his purchase of a "gold-brick," especially as the promoter was not connected with the Central Union Church of Honolulu. The matter is very plain according to the Financial Review of the San Francisco News Letter, which says:

In the case of Walters vs. Hare, in which the issue is now raised, the evidence shows that Hare, who follows the business of mining promoter, bonded two locations in Siskiyou county for the sum of \$1550, which he was only called upon to pay in two installments, one-half after the working season of 1900, and the other half after the working season of 1901. This was in turn the basis for the formation of a company, capitalized with 16 shares, each of which was valued at \$1500, the total amount Hare was called upon, under his bond, to pay for the property on installments, with two seasons of work on the claims to help him out. Dr. Walters was subsequently induced to pay \$6500 for 4 1/2 of these shares in this \$1500 layout upon the installment plan, and outside of his checks drawn for this amount, he has not a scrap of paper to show for the transaction, such was his confidence in promoter Hare, who it appears was introduced to him by a mutual friend. As to what Dr. Walters was told about the property matters little, his statements in this regard ranking as hearsay, lacking any documentary evidence in substantiation, which is not likely to be forthcoming in a case of the kind. But the fact remains, nevertheless, that he was induced to pay \$6500 for less than a one-third interest in a property which was held simply under a bond by Hare—and to which he had no title whatever—for \$1500, and even this bond has been allowed to lapse, leaving Walters without even a chance to recoup himself.

The good people of Cuba are having some experience with the "promoters" and a writer to the New York Herald expresses himself, in regard to them as follows:

"During the last few weeks I have met him all over the island. He is here in Havana, with his air of proprietorship, his talk of millions, and his empty pocket-book. In the beginning the people had some faith in the grand projects which he was planning, and for which he was promising unlimited American capital. He was welcomed by the Spanish property-owners and business men, and was given the opportunity which he wanted to exploit their properties. But the American capital failed to come, and after a time they discovered that the American "promoter" was trying to get control of their properties without paying for them. They are a very polite people, and they continued to be courteous in their treatment of the enterprising stranger who talked so large and did so little. For that reason he was a long time in finding out that they had shut down on

him. In some instances he has not yet found it out. I have run across him at the cafes, the hotels, and in the clubs, still maintaining an undaunted front, and still talking big of his projects, but the banks scan the checks and sight-drafts of the "promoters" very closely, and they are likely to become a common nuisance. A few of them have actually got into jail at various periods, and it is the keenest regret of their countrymen that the prison reforms and the administration of justice which General Wood is seeking to establish made it necessary to let them out."

After all let us be grateful that our local promoters are only of the "missionary" style. They may have some mercy on the poor people whom they inveigle into buying stocks in sugar estates, the prosperity and prospects of which are on paper and in which the promoters don't invest a cent in cash.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

When we read of the apparently heavy losses of the British forces in the campaign against the Boers, it may interest some to remember that they do not compare with the losses incurred in ancient days when battles were fought hand to hand. For instance, on the "woful field" of Flodden, fought on the 9th of September, 1513, the loss of the Army of the Scots alone amounted to 10,000 men. Here too died King James, an Archbishop, 13 Earls, 2 Bishops, 2 Abbots, 15 Lords and Chiefs of Clans, 5 Peers' eldest sons and some hundreds of distinguished men and warriors of fame.

If the somewhat sensational news in the Coast papers has anything of accuracy in it, which is very doubtful, the situation in China is becoming very interesting. We are inclined to think, however, that there is no need of anxiety or apprehension as to Russia forcing any inimical issues for the present. Probably, perhaps, if Great Britain met with serious disasters in the Transvaal Russia might feel inclined to force certain diplomatic concessions in her favor as the price of maintaining a peaceful attitude in the Orient and India, for she much prefers to gain by diplomacy what she might not obtain by a war *a outrance*.

The London Daily Mail says, in regard to the terms of peace between Great Britain and the Transvaal:

"It is high time that England should state her minimum terms. These are the absolute and unconditional surrender of the 'Federals,' when their territories will at once pass under the British flag. Does Dr. Leyds suppose that we have spent fifty millions and sacrificed three thousand precious lives to lay the foundations of another and yet more terrible war in the remotest future? If so, he must be simple indeed. Moreover, he must be aware that the Transvaal never was independent. The conventions alike of 1881 and 1884 left it a vassal State of the British Empire. In the hour of victory we are scarcely likely to surrender what even Mr. Gladstone declined to concede after Majuba. And in the case of both the Transvaal and Free State the Empire acquires a new right. 'A stricken field,' to quote Lord Salisbury, 'is one of the stages upon the road of history, and the state of things that existed before that stricken field cannot be the same as that which exists afterwards.'"

Rebels Surrender.

LONDON, March 20.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts, dated Bloemfontein, Tuesday, March 20:

Kitchener occupied Prieska yesterday unopposed. The rebels surrendered their arms. The Transvaalers escaped across the river.

Mr. Steyn is circulating a notice, by means of dispatch riders, in reply to my proclamation, to the effect that any burgher who signs a declaration that he will not fight against us again will be treated as a traitor and shot.

The Bloemfontein people are affording us every assistance in the matter of hospital accommodations. We have consequently been able to find 500 beds.

Thirty-three prisoners were taken at Prieska, 200 stands of arms and some supplies and explosives. The Boers have begun to surrender on the Basutoland frontier.

Mafeking still holds out while the relief columns are speedily approaching to the rescue.

Bloemfontein is converted into a great base for the next advance. When the opportune moment arrives 3 armies will leave there for Kroonstadt, Biggarsberg and Karldorp.
