Telephone for Kona.

Mr. Aungst, lately manager of the Mutual Telephone Co., Honolulu, is making a canvass of the settlers of North and South Kona, Hawaii, with a view of starting a telephone line in the district. Such a line would complete the circuit of the island and would prove very useful not only to the local residents but also to Government officials in communicating with Hilo, the headquarters of the island. Mr. Aungst reports having met with fair encouragement so far, most of those to whom he has spoken being strongly in favor of a line. The white settlers, however, in Kona are as yet so few in number that it is hardly probable that they will form enough subscribers to pay unless the Government comes to the aid with a liberal grant to help construct that portion of the line run-ning from Kealakekua to Kau.



THE YACHT TOLNA.

Count Festetics Arrives at Sydney-A Narrow Escape from Light-

The Tolna, a handsome fore andaft schooner yacht, with white painted hull, arrived in Port Jackson Dec. 10th from San Francisco via the South Sea Islands. The Tolna started from San Francisco, and has visited Hawaii, Samoa, Fiji and Ellice Group. The cruise was not devoid of incident. Whilst in the Ellice Group the yacht was struck by lightning, and had a narrow escape. The lightning struck the topmast, whisked down a shroud, and, fortunately, did no further harm than tearing a piece of copper off the ship's side. The Tolna was favored by fine weather at the islands, but on approaching the coast she had a stormy experience, and a couple of days previous to her arrival the chief officer (Mr. Phillips) had a narrow escape from losing his life. He was on deck attending to the navigation, when the main boom suddenly took charge, striking the officer with such force as to cause him to fall overboard. Fortunately, the officer's leg became entangled in a rope alongside, and he was hauled safely on board again. He has, however, since been confined to his cabin. The Tolna is an Americanbuilt craft of 78 tons, with plenty of beam, and a good sheer, and, according to one of the crew, she "sails like a witch." The yacht flies the slike a witch." ANOTHER QUIET NIGHT.

Sundry Siight Alarms Keep the Guards in Motion.

Fresh Posts for To-day An Bapedition

of Native Police.

After the excitement of the fire elsewhere reported had subsided, there was little to break the monotony of the Police Station watch last night. A few alarms were found to be groundless, but proved the alertness of the authorities in the prompt responses made. Mention of these alarms will be found in the work of our reporters below.

The reports from all along the line of military posts from Manoa to Nunanu Valleys up to 4 o'clock this morning represented "overy-thing quiet." The officers and the men at the front had a very damp time of it, the heavy dew and chilly weather continuing from early yes-terday afternoon until after 8 o'clock this morning. Happy indeed may those of the military force feel who are detailed to duty at headquarters. A change of base in operations is intended, the first move in which took place this afternoon, and will enclose the region from Waialae to Waimanalo.

POLICE EXPEDITION.

Under Captain Parker a Company of Bluecoats Go to the Bush.

Senior Captain Parker with thirtyfive native police officers left on horseback this afternoon for the head of Pauoa Valley. With him are Captain Hookano and Lieuten-ants Kanae and Hart. The men are each supplied with two belts of cart-ridges, a rifle and pistol. They also carry enough provisions to last them two days. Captain Parker intends on reaching Pauoa to leave his horses, to be returned by the mounted patrol, and explore the country on foot. They will go to Manoa, Pauos, Waialae and Waimanalo, and come back to Diamond Head. The intervening country will be thoroughly searched. The captain and his men will return by way of Waikiki. Should any of the rebels be captured word will be sent to headquarters. The officers are well supplied with warm clothing and rain

The police were addressed by Attorney-General W. O. Smith in the Station yard, prior to their starting on the expedition. He spoke about the praise of foreign visitors for the very efficient manner in which the police have been acting in these days of excitement, and he hoped hey would continue to deserve the confidence of the Government. The officers led by Captain Hookano sang the popular native air "Mala-Enough borses had been se-

Trailing Down Wilcox.

Robert W. Wilcox and his men are now supposed to be in a thick banana grove in the mountain above Luakaha, C. M. Cooke's residence. Specials found their trail yesterday afternoon. A close examination was Trees which had been cut down for firewood were found, as well as dry twigs broken off. A cup was also found. Impressions on the grass made by men sitting down were also located. The specials went as far as they could go, but owing to the fog they returned lower down the valley, and waited to see if any of the rebels came down. In this they were disappointed. The trail along which the rebels went leads down to Pauoa Valley. The latter place is filled with taro patches, and the rebels were expected to come down for taro. There is abundance of big bananas in the valley where the rebels are supposed to be. There was a heavy fog on the mountain and according to J. H. Black, one of the scouts, one could not see another within ten feet of him. As long as the fog lasts the rebels are safe and can travel where they like, providing they are acquainted with the ground, which some of them doubtless are. There is abundance of fruit and water.

A Falso Alarm

On the strength of a message that people were assembling at J. L. Kaulukou's house in Nuuanu Vatley last night, an order was sent up there countermanding that for the return of the Citizens' Guard detachment. Reinforcements were house by guards. AN INCENDIARY CAUGHT.

He Sets Fire to a Building Adjacent

the sidewalk.

to the Police Station Shortly after 7 o'clock last night a strong smell of fire was felt in the vicinity of the Police Station. Smoke was at the same time seen arising beyond the wall of the yard on the Waikiki side. Harry Evans the turnkey and others began investigating and were not long in finding that the old wooden two-story build ing, next to F. A. Schaefer & Co.'s store in Kaahumanu street, was on fire inside.

An alarm was turned in and ward struck on the big bell of the central station caused some excitement all over town. It was the first alarm and the second fire since the present trouble began. The fire brigade was promptly on the spot, and the front door being burst open, after a little trouble, the chemical engine played on the flames. Then entrance was made by an outside stairway to the second story, formerly used as a sail loft but now unoccupied. A hole was cut through floor and ceiling, through which a torrent of water was poured directly upon the focus of the fire. This was soon effectual in putting out the flames. It was just thirty-five minutes from the arrival of Chief Engineer Hant and the fire apparatus until the fire was extinguished.

In the meantime Minister King and Captain C J. Campbell, of the rear of F. A. Schaefer & Co.'s to the burning building. Capt. Campbell climbing up removed a bar behind the gate, but there was another fastening and the gate had to be forced open. A terrier dog that runs with the firemen entered with them. Just as the gentlemen named were feeling their way down stone steps from Schaefer's yard to the back of the

making for a high fence in the rear.
Captain Campbell was in the act of NOWLEIN drawing his revolver, when Minister King said to let the dog get after the fellow. The dog was set on him and almost nipped him as he scrambled over the fence. J. K. Nakookoo, a native lately employed by Kahookano and Johnson, lawyers occupying offices in the building, was at once suspected as the incen-diary. He had been seen by several persons shortly before the fire. Offi-cer Albert McGurn saw him passing the Beaver lunch saloon, and noticed he had on a tourist cap and carried something like a bottle in his pocket. A guard on Queen street also identified him. He was seen after his escape over the fence running round

from Queen street, but slackening his pace as he passed within sight of the excited throng at the fire. Senior Captain Parker, ordered Captain Hookano and Turnkey Evans to get into a back standing front of the Station. Officer Kaapa went with them. There being no driver Evans took the reins and e vehicle was driven at top speed Kaumakapili church, near which Nakookoo lived. The officers got there even wifh the fugitive and nabbed him whenever he entered are in fact many points cover premises. Evans identified Nakoo- the latest plan of campaign. koo as the man whom he had seen on Kaahumanu street between Mac-farlane & Co. and T. H. Davies & Co.'s stores. Evans pulled out a pistol and was about to shoot the man, when he was stopped by Captain Hookano. Nakookoo was closely examined by the Attorney-General in the Marshal's office. He con-fessed to having set fire to the building, also to his having been with the rebels under Wilcox. He deserted them on Monday and came into town.

Nakookoo was lately discharged by Attorney Kahookano and swore reveuge, which some believe to have been the motive of his incendiarism. Mrs. Nakookoo is related to Kahookano by marriage and she does not live very happily with her husband. She is reported to have given damaging evidence against Nakookoo.

Ministers King and Smith, accompanied by officers and reporters, inspected the building with lantern light. The walls of a narrow passage leading from front to rear were deeply charred, and there was a pile of half burnt newspapers on the floor, in a corner between an open bookcase and a door, at about the middle of the passage. There were no manuscript papers in the pile so far as could be seen on turning it over. There was a broken bottle that had contained kerosene oil found near the spot. A rear window was open, through which the incendiary no doubt had escaped.

The building is owned by the Foster estate and contains office rooms occupied by Kahookano and Johnson, Antone Rosa, W. C. Parke and A. G. Correa, lawyers, the Hawaiian Investment Co. (Charles Colburn and Carlos Long, managers), and Mr. Long as a notary public.

W. A. Kinney with 18 men will approach the pass, to intercept Nowlein, on this side by way of Waialae.

T. B. Murray will stay in town to do police duty with 42 men of the Citizens' Guard and regular police,

Fresh men are being enlisted and armed, many who have hitherto held aloof coming forward to volunteer their services for the permanent restoration of peace.


