OBITUARY.

Death of a Schoolmate of Several
Royal Persons.

Mrs. Nancy Sumner Ellis died at
4:30 o'clock on Thursday afternoon
of asthma. Deceased had been ail-
ing for some four years. Recently
she became much worse and medical
skill was unavailing. Mrs. Ellis was
fifty-six years of age at the time of
death, and leaves two sons and one
daughter. She was born in the old
palace where the Executive building
is now located. She was educated in
the Royal School and had for school-
mates such persons as the late King
Kalakaua, Liliuokalani, Kamehameha
and other chiefs. The funeral
took place yesterday afternoon, in-
terment being in the Catholic Ceme-
tery. A large number of friends and
acquaintances attended the funeral.

Do Thou Likewise.

When one sets a candle in a win-
dow on a dark night he never can
tell how many lost and bewildered
travelers it may guide on their way.
I once knew a dear old lady who
habitually did it on every dark night.
The road that passed her house was

enough, and houses were far apart.

a sort of projecting window, where

now, but let us hope that her family

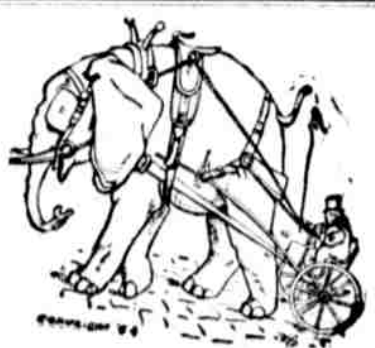

Timely Topics

December 29, 1894.

The movement to widen Beretania street from Punchbowl street to the Nuuanu stream is a matter which should receive the favorable consideration of the government because it is of interest to every one. It comes directly under the head of improvements and a petition to Minister King would probably have his approval when it was brought up for consideration. There are not many finer drives than on Beretania street from Punahou street to Punchbowl street, but there the squeeze begins and the good road ceases. To widen the street would not benefit any one man or set of men, the benefit would be to the masses. Good roads are as much an advertisement for a community as anything else, visitors are influenced one way or another by the pleasure derived from a drive through a city; if the streets are narrow and the roads poor they are apt to say the people in authority are "just a little Peoria," if on the other hand, they are broad and smooth the solons are said to be "up to date." 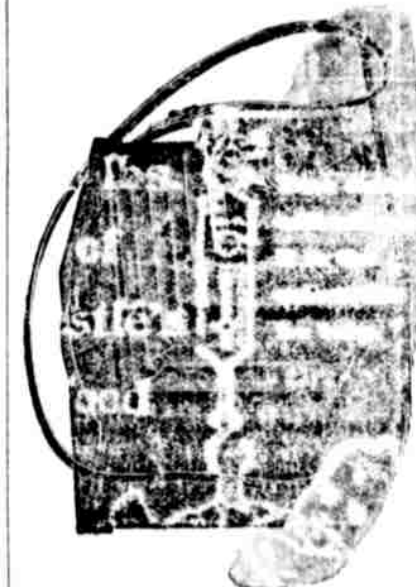

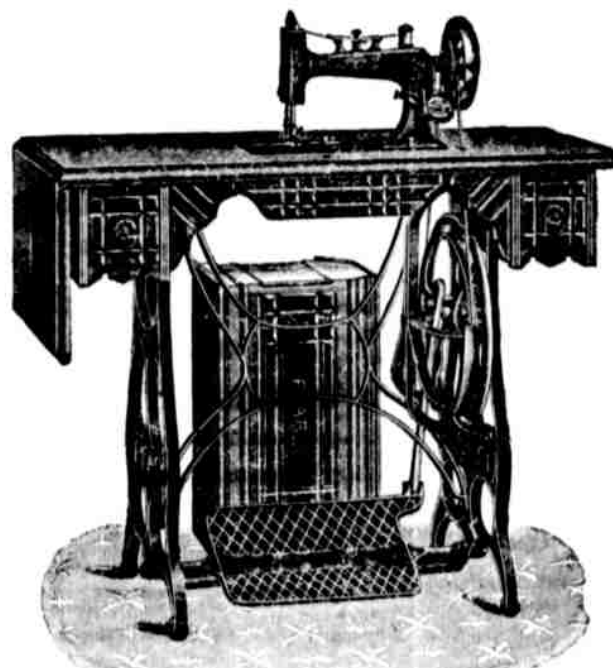
