

1986 BNAI ZION AMERICA-ISRAEL FRIENDSHIP AWARD



Hawaii's senior United States Senator Daniel K. Inouye, who has been unanimously selected by the national administration of Bnai Zion and its Foundation as the recipient of the 1986 Bnai Zion America-Israel Friendship Award, ranks among the foremost consistent and unswerving champions of the cause for a secure and free state of Israel and as a leading figure in the efforts for the promotion of America-Israel friendship between the peoples of both democracies.

From the rostrum of every public gathering he has addressed and within the portals of both Houses of the U.S. Congress he has given voice, loudly and unequivocally, to his support for the valiant struggle of the beleagured people of Israel to preserve its security as an independent democratic state.

Since his election as Hawaii's first U.S. Congressman in 1959 and its first Senator in 1962, Senator Inouye has been an acknowledged leader in efforts to increase the amounts and improve the terms of U.S. assistance to Israel as former chairman and now ranking Democrat on the Appropriations Foreign Operations Subcommittee. In 1980 he submitted the successful motion to table an attempt to cut military aid to Israel by 10 percent. In 1983 and again in the current session of Congress he opposed the sale of sophisticated arms to Jordan before King Hussein agrees to direct peace talks with Israel.

Senator Inouye's interest in the destiny of Jewish people was especially stirred in 1945 immediately after World War II when he was recuperating from serious battle wounds in an Atlantic City Surgical hospital.

"My roommate told me what he saw when he liberated a concentration camp—the bodies piled up like cordwood, hollow eyes, the unbelievable stench," said Inouye. "I couldn't believe that mankind could be so inhumane, that any group of people could be so tortured but when it became apparent to me that these camps were all over Europe, I made it a point to learn why Jews were so mistreated and the more I studied, the more I was left with love and admiration for this people." So much so that in 1951 when his law school friend in Washington turned out to be the son of the Chairman of State of Israel Bonds, Bruce Phillipson, Inouye enlisted in the campaign and for two years served as a Bond salesman. "I have continued to buy Israel Bonds" he notes with pride.

The Senator has visited Israel many times between his first trip in 1967 and his most recent visit this past December. "Israel must remain secure," he said, not only for its strategic value to the United States but because of its historic importance to the Jewish people. From the destruction of the 2nd Temple to the establishment of the American Bill of Rights, Jews have been second class citizens wherever they have lived," he explained, "and have survived a whole series of Holocausts, including the Egyptian and Hitler Holocausts - some worse than others-for 4,000 years. I could only attribute this to their clinging to their religion. Without their religion, they would have disappeared like the Assyrians, the Phillistines.

"The State of Israel stands as a symbol—the reestablishment of the State started by King David and the first time since 568 BCE that the Jews have an internationally recognized land they can call their own nation," he emphasizes.

Bnai Zion has recently committed itself to raising funds towards the construction of a new kitchen and dining room.



AIFL President Celebrates 80th Birthday A TRIBUTE TO HERBERT TENZER

On my desk, as I write these words, is a small bronze plaque that reads, "There is no limit to what a man can do or where he can go, if he doesn't mind who gets the credit." That sign, whose message I have endeavored to incorporate into my own life, was given to me by Herbert Tenzer. Never have I come across a man who more completely personified this gem of wisdom.

Herbert Tenzer never claims credit, directly or indirectly—which may account for how much he has done and how far he has come in his four score years. Herbert has served with distinction in the U.S. House of Representatives and retired from his congressional duties undefeated. He is one of the most eminent

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lawyers in our city, and his reputation in the real estate community is beyond reproach. He has founded and headed synagogues, Jewish schools, rescue operations, and all kinds of organizations dedicated to enhancing friendship and mutual trust amongst human beings. Thus, he has assumed leadership roles in the National Conference of Christians and Jews, and is president of the America-Israel Friendship League. A distinguished Orthodox layman and a vigorous leader of the United Jewish Appeal, he is aware of the possible frictions and tensions amongst his various loyalties-Jews and Christians, America and Israel, Blacks and Whites, Republicans and Democrats. Yet, Herb Tenzer is above all one who seeks to avoid confrontations, and to bring people and groups together. In this, he has been a most enviable success. Perhaps the greatest test of his personal, life-long triumph as a man of peace and conciliation is the warm, loving, and precious relationship between Herbert and his beloved Florrie!

The Talmud records a fascinating incident which Maimonides in his Guide for the Perplexed cites as one of the most precious Talmudic anecdotes. R. Hanina was present at a service conducted by a prayer-leader at a time before the Prayerbook was reduced to writing. In the repetition of the Amidah, he expanded upon the four standard phrases of praise (God, Who is Great, Mighty and Awesome) by adding a long string of elaborate adjectives of his own devising. When he finished, and looked to the rabbi with an obvious expectation of approval for his liturgical creativity, R. Hanina scolded him instead, and asked: "Is that all?" When the cantor showed his perplexity at this response, R. Hanina explained that really we ought not to say anything at all about the Creator, because everything we say implies that only that which we articulate is true of Him, continued on page 11

TERRORISTS— THE GANGSTERS OF THE '80S

Editor's note:

The past year's rash of terrorist activity in the Middle East and elsewhere has caused Americans to face the unsettling reality that there are forces set to destroy our fundamental values and way of life—forces that will go to any lengths to make themselves heard. The search for viable and effective solutions to this problem should be a major priority if we are to preserve the ideals that form the core of America-Israel friendship. Captain Ashwood, who participated in the AIFL's first Conference on International Terrorism in 1976, presents here one suggestion for such a solution.

In the heyday of prohibition in America in the 1920s, gangsters flourished. The prohibition law was openly flaunted with the aid and support of a police force that had become corrupted because of the law, a political structure also corrupted, and the general public, whom the law didn't suit.

As a result of this disobedience of one law, all laws were debased and a public attitude of lawlessness was created, to the point where highly respectable people sought the company and friendship of vicious thugs as a mark of their modern thinking and liberal views.

Now switch the time frame from the '20s to the '80s. Substitute terrorists for gangsters, international law for prohibition, the United Nations for the police force—the political structure is unchanged by time and the general public seems uncaring. As a result you have a growing international disregard for law and human rights and in place of the aforementioned highly respectable people, we have leaders of so-called nonaligned nations who seek the company and friendship of vicious terrorists as a mark of their modern thinking and liberal views.

The results for the world as a whole will mirror the results of the events of America's "Roaring '20s"—a lasting criminal structure that to this day touches every aspect of American life, politics, and commerce.

Unless the world's movers and shakers recognize that terrorists must not be confused with freedom fighters any more than gangsters be confused with Robin Hood, they and those they represent will suffer the consequences of an unlawful world.

The consequences of such an unlawful world are already known to us. Bloody

revolutions past and present in Central and South America, Middle East and Africa have proven to be effective lessons in the use of terrorism both to the winners and the losers (who subsequently become counter-revolutionaries).

Will the world learn in time? I fear not, for we have become numb to tragedy. It is served up with dinner each evening on the television news. Calamitous events are commonplace—21,000 killed in Colombia—why, it's just another number, a meaningless statistic given amid other catastrophic statistics.

We have become numb to tragedy—it is served up with dinner each evening on the television news

Paradoxically, let one single death, a nice juicy murder with scandalous trappings take place, and we have news specials devoted to it. The Claus von Bulow murder trial got more media attention than the Mexico City earthquake and the Colombian mud-sea tragedies combined.

It is obvious, then, that it is not the quantity of death that impresses us—it is its quality. This is not concern, this is exploitation and titillation.

What can be done? I'm not sure that even God knows, for the bulk of the maiming and killing is done in His name and on His behalf. This would suggest that morality does not hold the solution. So, if humanity fails to help, maybe the answer lies in inhumanity. Maybe the punishment for such acts should be so draconian that all would fear the consequences.

Let us focus not only on the perpetrators but also those who support and abet them. Let us make death the punishment for the individuals and international shunning for supportive nations.

"Ah," you say, "it's been tried before and it hasn't worked." Well yes, you are right, but consider who was doing the trying—governments and their timorous politicians, ever fearful for their own political survival. Let us perhaps turn to those who have the courage, the organizational structure, the morals, and the means to do something about this monstrous evil—let's look to organized labor, let's look to our unions.



Union pilots fly into terrorist-supporting nations, union seamen sail into their ports. Union mechanics service the aircraft of those nations, union longshoremen load their ships. Union air traffic controllers monitor the skies and union customs and immigration officers police the ports of entry.

THERE IS NOT A SINGLE NA-TION WHOSE COMMERCE COULD NOT BE HALTED OR EVEN DESTROYED BY AN INTER-NATIONAL UNION BOYCOTT.

We have tried diplomacy, national economic sanctions, and war. All have failed. I have seen international unionism at work and know what it can do. I will remind you that following the terrorist destruction of KAL 007 by the Soviet Union, the airline pilots of the world had a boycott of Moscow airport in place and working within 72 hours. An Aeroflot aircraft was trapped at London's Heathrow airport by the ground handlers who refused to service it—these were all union people who acted while their governments were still huffing and puffing and scrambling for position.

Handled correctly, anti-terrorism can have the union label on it—it's really up to you if you want to apply it. History shows what unions can do—it shows that unions brought social order and justice where anarchy and oppression has existed before. Terrorism is anarchy and oppression and given the right tools unions can bring about social order and justice again.

PROJECT INTERCHANGE

PROJECT INTERCHANGE 1986 SEMINARS

Project Interchange has plans for at least five seminars which will be run during the coming year.

In January, the project will send a delegation of 15 to 17 congressional aides to Israel for a 10-day seminar hosted by the Davis Institute of the Hebrew University. The Congressional Aides Seminar was Project Interchange's first undertaking when it began in 1983. The participants will be representatives from the offices of senators and congressmen, comprising a broad cross-section of political views.

In mid-March, Project Interchange will send its third delegation of Hispanic American leaders to Israel, and in May, a seminar of Nashville, Tenn., community leaders will be held there.

The Smith-Kogod Seminar for Christian Leaders will wind up the academic year, and Project Interchange's first seminar for state officials is scheduled for early November.

Christian Leaders Return from Israel

Last June, leading Christian clergy members and one lay-leader, representing various denominations and regions of the United States, came together for a unique experience that blended a mission to the Holy Land with exposure to modern Israel.

The 10-day seminar, sponsored by a grant from the Smith-Kogod Foundation, was hosted in Israel by the Jerusalem Institute for Israel Studies. The itinerary included a visit to the Knesset, where the group met parliamentarians Dan Meridor and Simcha Dinitz, a trip to Beit Jallah in the West Bank where the group met Mayor Farah al-Araj, and a tour of Elcint, one of Israel's high-tech industries. In addition, there were discussions held at Israeli academic institutions, and tours of the historical sites.

The participants, chosen for their stature and influence within their communities, returned to the States not only with an enhanced understanding of Israeli society, culture, and politics, but also with an appreciation for Israel's status as a true guardian of democracy in the Middle East.

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Black Leaders Visit Israel

Project Interchange ran two seminars for groups of Black American leaders during the spring and summer of 1985, in conjunction with Tel Aviv University.

The issues dealt with in these seminars were extremely sensitive and critical because of the volatile Black-Israel and Black-Jewish relations. The seminars encouraged direct confrontation of the issues that have strained these relations, and were meant to dispel myths that have been perpetrated within certain segments of the Black community in the United States.

After the seminars, participants expressed unanimous surprise at the diversity of political opinion within Israel. They noted a new understanding of the complexity of the issues, and an appreciation that these issues were as controversial in Israel as they are here, and that Israeli society is as pluralistic and democratic as our own. "I now have an increased interest, awareness and sensitivity to Israel's people and problems. The program revealed to me my appalling lack of knowledge, [and apathy] based on some preconceived notions. Thank you for broadening my perspective," said Ken Thomas, chief executive of the Los Angeles Sentinel.

"I feel extremely honored and fortunate to have participated in this interchange experience," said Rep. Vernon Sykes of the Ohio House of Representatives. "Although I am not in total agreement with all the points of view and policies presented, [the experience] has increased my knowledge of Middle East issues, my contact with the American Jewish community, and anchored my support for the Jewish people," he added.

Project Interchange Alumni in Washington Reunion

On September 18, Project Interchange held its first alumni reunion in Washington, D.C. Among the participants of the day-long program were representatives from each of the eight seminars which Project Interchange has run since its first Congressional Aides Seminar in 1983.

The morning was spent at the Israeli Embassy in Washington, where participants were briefed, met with Israeli officials, and viewed a special screening of a film about Ethiopian Jewry. Following a luncheon on Capitol Hill, the reunion participants met with Senator Bob Packwood, R-Ore., Congressman Bill Gray, D-Pa., AIFL President Herbert Tenzer, and Ambassador of Israel Meir Rosenne, for a discussion of U.S.-Israel relations.

The day was capped by a cocktail reception that was attended by more than 100 guests, including Israeli and American dignitaries, and leaders of the Washington Jewish community.

U.S. GOVERNMENT SUPPORTS AIFL PROGRAMS Great Success for First

Young Journalist Exchange

By the time the 1985 Young Journalists Exchange Program came to a close last August, it had exceeded all expectations. Although it was a pilot program, that comprised an untested combination of participants, and that dealt with very sensitive issues, it was a resounding success.

The exchange, implemented with New York University's Department of Journalism and the Public Council for the Exchange of Youth and Young Adults in Israel, consisted of Israeli and American delegations. The 16-member Israeli group had a unique opportunity to see the American media in action, and to formally study journalism, which is a nascent academic field in Israel. The 16 American delegates were able to examine firsthand the complexities of the Middle East, and to establish an understanding of Israel and its relationship with the United States.

The Israeli delegation stayed six weeks in the United States. Most of the time was spent in residence at New York University, where the students were occupied with daily course-work and assignments. They also participated in seminars, meetings, and briefings with media professionals, Jewish and Black community leaders, politicians and diplomats.

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This year, two America-Israel Friendship League programs received grants from the United States Information Agency (USIA) under President Reagan's 1985 International Youth Exchange Initiative.

These programs exemplify the AIFL's commitment to improving and expanding its existing programs, and to generating new, innovative programming. The existing "Ambassadors for Peace" High School Exchange Program received partial USIA funding, as did the Young Journalists Exchange Program that was first implemented last summer.

The League is proud of its programs and the recognition accorded them by the U.S. government. With our members' support we can continue to provide unique and effective programs to further the cause of America-Israel friendship.

Dinner Honors 1985 Ambassadors for Peace

On November 18, the America-Israel Friendship League paid tribute to the 1985 participants of its ninth annual "Ambassadors for Peace" High School Exchange Program, at a special reception and dinner in New York.


The program has long been the AIFL's largest annual project, and is carried out with the cooperation of the governments of Israel and the United States, the Council of Great City Schools, and boards of education across the country.

The dinner, an integral part of the program since its inception, marked the midpoint of the program, as the Israeli delegation's stay in the U.S. drew to a close, and the American delegation prepared to embark on a one-month trip to Israel.

The 84 Israeli young ambassadors, representing a cross-section of their country's society, had spent the previous month in various cities across the United States. In these cities, they visited schools, met with their peers and community leaders, and worked to enhance understanding of Israel among those with whom they met.

The 45-member American delegation, which also represented various ethnic and religious groups, was preparing for a stay in Israel designed to fortify them with a knowledge and awareness of modern Israel which would enable them to return to the States as ambascontinued on page 11

A Lifetime of Tales to Tell Dr. F. Forrester Church

Dr. F. Forrester Church, a participant in Project Interchange's Seminar for Christian Leadership, is senior minister of the Unitarian Church of All Souls in New York, one of the fastest-growing congregations in the city. His first book, titled Father and Son is a remembrance of his father, the late Senator Frank Church. Recently published, it has been nominated for a Pulitzer Prize.

A story from Israel. It was my first visit, made possible by Project Interchange, a national project of the America-Israel Friendship League. I was one of a group of Christian leaders, as disparate a group as you would ever hope to find. One evening, three of us had an after-dinner drink with Simcha Dinitz, former ambassador to the United States, and now Knesset member of the Labor party. The respite was welcome. Since arriving in Jerusalem five days before, with six seminars a day and a full touring schedule, this was the first real opportunity for us to catch our breath.

I was particularly grateful to be with Simcha. He is an old friend of my parents, Frank and Bethine Church. Not only was I delighted to bring my mother's greetings, but I had a question to ask—how was it that my father, half-way through his four terms in the U.S. Senate, had developed such a love affair with Israel? "It was a woman," Simcha replied. In 1970, my father, as member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, visited Israel for the first time. He met with Prime Minister Golda Meir in her home, and Simcha Dinitz was present.

"Would you like sandwiches and tea?" the prime minister asked. They said that they would, and she disappeared into the kitchen. A few minutes later, overcome by curiosity, my father walked to the kitchen door and peeked in. "I know why you are here, Senator," Golda said. "You want to be of help. That is very kind, but as you can see, I am almost done. Besides, there are other ways that you can be of help, not only to me, but also to Israel."

A stunning two-hour conversation on Middle East politics and the special bond of friendship between Israel and the United States ensued. Later, my father told me that he had never been so impressed by a world leader. When he left, thanking her for her hospitality and inspiration, the prime minister said, "Senator, next time you come I promise I will bake you a nice little cake."

Now, I too have a love affair with the people of Israel. I too had only to meet them and listen to their stories to fall in love. I think that this happened to all of us on the Project Interchange visit. Executive Director Debra Berger put together an agenda that could not help but touch us deeply and change our lives. It certainly changed mine—I came home "knowing" less than when I went, but caring more. I also came home committed to do what I can to counter the anti-Israel sentiment in this country, much of which I had hardly noticed before.

A Love Affair with Israel

Christopher M. Bellitto who is pursuing a double major in journalism and politics at New York University, was a participant in the first exchange of journalism students sponsored this summer by the America-Israel Friendship League. Following the trip, he published several articles on his experiences and observations. The Talmud says that a young man must acquire for himself two things: a teacher and a friend. In Israel, I found both—many times over.

Having recently returned from participating in the AIFL's first Young Journalists Exchange Program, I have often been asked by family and friends to describe my trip. My answer is silence, for they have but a few moments to listen, yet I have a lifetime of tales to tell. I believe that this program simply must be renewed year after year.

I have travelled to Europe on several previous occasions, but never have I felt so in tune with a country before. I felt that I was witnessing a nation fighting for its survival. I will never forget the determination in the eyes of the inhabitants of border settlements near Lebanon and Syria, people who are prepared to imperil their existence so that Israel might endure.

As a young journalist, I was able to observe a news-minded population in action. I was able to see how others viewed the potentially debilitating illness of an American president. And I watched every Israeli—young and old, soldier and civilian—cock an ear as six tones heralded the hourly radio news bulletins. I saw a country in action, a country alert.

Perhaps most importantly, I had the chance to be a field reporter. I feel the trip gave me a chance to hone many reportorial skills, such as note-taking and observing, and taught me others, such as working through a language barrier.

I left for Israel full of apprehension, during a time of great confusion and instability in the Middle East. While there, I learned to live with that insecurity, and came to a deep understanding of the Israeli commitment to life amidst the disorder. I arrived with a degree of fear, but left with one wish: "May I return."

I thank [the League] for the chance to find Israel, and to find myself in it.

The AIFL will proudly present Mr. Sasso with the coveted America-Israel Friendship League Award. In addition, the League will establish an annual scholarship fund in Mr. Sasso's name, which will enable students to participate in its numerous cultural and educational exchanges.

The honorary co-chairmen of the event include Senators Alfonse D'Amato and Daniel Patrick Moynihan, and Jackie Presser, president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. The dinner is expected to attract over 2,000 guests, including leaders from labor, industry, and government, as well as a number of prominent supporters of Israel.

WOMEN'S FORUM JOINS AIFL PROGRAMS Yael Dayan and Camelia Sadat Attend Reception

Next spring, a new project, that typifies the AIFL's longstanding commitment to unique and innovative programming, will join the ranks of the America-Israel Friendship League's people-to-people programs. Titled the

"Jerusalem International Forum," it aims to promote dialogue and understanding among groups of distinguished women from North America and the Middle East. Previously operating autonomously as the "Jerusalem Women's Seminar," the program had tremendous success with its four missions between 1980 and 1983.

The participants, all non-Jewish women of high intellectual and professional achievement, are involved in seminars and discussions aimed toward establishing an open exchange of ideas, opinions, and experiences. The Forum has 70 North American women alumni, including author Gail Sheehy, publisher of *New York* magazine Caroline Wall, and Pia Lindstrom of NBC news.

The program comprises two phases. In the first, the delegation of approximately 20 North American women meet

The eighth America-Israel Friendship League/Seton Hall University Study Tour ended early last June, as the 1985 delegation of Christian clergy and senior divinity students returned from a threeweek experience in Israel. The tour, which is the League's longest-running annual program, was carried out in cooperation with the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. in Israel with their Israeli counterparts. This portion of the program is supplemented with tours, and meetings with government officials and Israeli dignitaries.

In phase two, the Americans, accompanied by a delegation of Israeli women, visit Egypt. In Cairo, they participate in a seminar with Egyptian women professionals such as Aziza Hussein, president of International Planned Parenthood, and prominent sociologist Mona Makram-Ebeid. This segment also includes visits to historical sites, briefings by Cabinet ministers and tea with Mrs. Susan Mubarak, the first lady of Egypt. Mrs. Jihan Sadat has participated in the program, and has been a staunch supporter of it over the years.

The spirit of the program was epitomized by a recent reception held to benefit the Forum, at the New York home of Mrs. Isabelle Leeds. Yael Dayan and Camelia Sadat were the guests of honor for the evening. Both women have recently written books about their fathers, men who were involved in the dramatic peace efforts between Israel and Egypt.



The women presented each other with signed copies of their books, and each delivered a brief message to the group of program supporters and alumni.

Faith and Fulfilment: Christians and the Return to the Promised Land by Michael J. Pragai (Vallentine, Mitchell & Co. Ltd. London 1985)

In his book, "Faith and Fulfilment: Christians and the Return to the Promised Land," Michael Pragai traces the story of Christian interest in, and active support of, the restoration of the Jewish people in the Promised Land. Throughout this fascinating account, we find the common conviction that the bible offers a firm basis for belief in such restoration, despite the fundamentally different approaches which its advocates have put forth.

This is a story traced through centuries, many lands and cultures. It ranges from theology to politics, from mystical contemplation to archaeology—a story that culminates with the spectacular achievement of the modern return.

Next spring, the America-Israel Friendship League will bring two exciting, dynamic speakers, Knesset Member Zeidan Atashi and Jerusalem Post Editor Ari Rath, to the United States. Mr. Atashi is a leader of the Israeli Druze community, and was first elected to the Knesset in 1977 as a member of the Shinui party. Prior to that, he was a member of Israel's permanent mission to the United Nations.

Mr. Rath, who joined the Jerusalem Post in 1958 as a political and diplomatic correspondent, has been its editor since 1976. His longtime career at the Post has placed him in the thick of history-shaping events in the Middle East and abroad.

Mr. Rath and Mr. Atashi are extremely articulate speakers, each with a refreshing, unique perspective on Israel and the Middle East. land, as head of the Foreign Ministry's Division for Church Affairs, and as Israel's advisor for Christian relations in North America. Since 1979 he has been director of the Israel Universities Study Group for Middle Eastern Affairs. His well-documented historical survey of Christian interest in the Jewish people's return to Zion serves as a reminder that the theological concern for Israel is not limited to narrow sectarian circles, but is in fact of broad ecumenical interest. As such, it brings into focus a vital component of the ongoing struggle in the Middle East today.

This book is recommended both to those who are part of the story, and to those who wish to familiarize themselves with this often-neglected aspect of Christian thought and action.

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Journalists Exchange

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In addition, the Israelis travelled on a week-long excursion to Atlanta, Ga. and Washington, D.C. In both cities, they were hosted by local families. In Atlanta, the students visited the headquarters of Cable News Network (CNN), local television and radio stations, as well as the offices of local newspapers. In Washington, the group was briefed by State Department spokesmen and by officials at the Israel Embassy, thus gaining insight into press-government relations.

The participants' comments reflect overwhelming satisfaction with the program, and confirm the fulfillment of its goals. "I was able to enter the large world of the U.S. media, and could better understand how it works and how it succeeds," said Yoram Rotem of Galei Zahal, the Israel Defense Forces radio station. Orit Harel, of the Israeli newspaper *Ma'ariv*, said the program "gave me a great overview and inside look at the dynamics of American journalism and a deeper understanding of the American press, as well as a chance to try out new fields in journalism."

The program for the American delegation shared the goal of providing crosscultural exposure, but had a fundamentally different orientation than the program for the Israelis. It was designed to give the participants, all journalism students at New York University, a chance to witness firsthand the dynamic, pluralistic, and thriving democracy that is Israel.

The group spent 10 days in Jerusalem, five days in Haifa, eight days in Tel Aviv, and the remaining time touring the country from the Gaza Strip to the Golan Heights, from Judea and Samaria to Kibbutz Kfar Giladi at the Lebanese border. Throughout the four weeks, the students participated in meetings, interviews, and lectures with government officials, journalists, academicians, and representatives of Israeli minorities. Trips were also arranged to historical and archaeological sites.

These activities heightened the students' awareness of the problems, paradoxes, and personalities that make up Israel. In their future roles in the American media, their 1985 trip to Israel will form a foundation they can use to produce more sensitive and accurate reports on Israel in particular, and the Middle East in general.

but no more, thus limiting His greatness. The four phrases of praise are permitted to us only because the "Men of the Great Assembly" used those adjectives, and therefore we must limit ourselves to those terms and no others.

In a manner of speaking, making provision for the obvious and infinite difference between the Creator and His creatures, this accounts for my feeling that all the genuine love and profound esteem that a grateful community feels for Herbert Tenzer is best left unsaid, lest what we really want to say—no matter how lengthy or eloquent—prove inadequate. Indeed, what can one say that will neither offend his innate modesty nor pale by comparison with his actual record?

I have had the personal privilege of knowing Herbert Tenzer for most of my life, and I have worked closely with him in his role as chairman of the board of trustees of Yeshiva University for almost a decade. I know that my experience writ large is that of all the various individuals and institutions whose lives Herbert has touched: a marvelous combination of strength and sympathy, perseverance and sensitivity, fortitude and faith, valor and charm.

The America-Israel Friendship League is joined by the host of organizations which have benefited from his leadership, and from the even greater number of individuals whose lives have been enriched by him, in wishing Herbert Tenzer a very happy 80th birthday. May he, and his beloved wife and family, enjoy the years to come in health and contentment, and with renewed vigor may he continue his creative contributions to his country, his people, his faith, and all humanity.

leaders participated in the seminars, which resulted in efforts to improve relations between Black Americans and Israel, and between Blacks and Jews here in the United States.

Perhaps the most exciting development, made by a group from the first seminar, was the commitment to bring two Ethiopian Jews to the United States to visit selected Black communities. Another participant, Ms. Gracia Hillman Bates, organized a meeting at the Joint Center for Political Studies in Washington, D.C., that dealt with the issues raised in the seminar. In addition, several participants have scheduled speaking engagements in their communities and in Jewish communities. A number of them have also joined or initiated Black-Jewish dialogue groups.

Rev. Barnett Thorogood, of Norfolk, Va., best exemplified this appreciation when he noted Israel's commitment to safeguarding the holy sites for all faiths. "Now, under the Israeli government, I watched the Jews praying down in a hole —at what is just a remnant of a supporting wall—not even the Temple wall, and on the Temple Mount is a magnificent mosque where Muslims freely come to pray," he said, "Why doesn't the world appreciate this!"

The tremendous need for positive action on behalf of Israel among various churches throughout the States makes this group of leaders a most vital one, and the participants indeed returned with a commitment to effect change.

The unqualified success of this year's program has warranted its addition to Project Interchange's annual list of programs, along with the seminars for Hispanic and Black American leaders and key congressional aides.

Governor John V. Evans



A descendent of an Idaho pioneer family whose grandfather served as Idaho House Speaker at the turn of the century, John V. Evans has chalked up a remarkable record of public service over the years. Prior to taking office as Governor of Idaho in 1977, Gov. Evans served in the Idaho Senate, as the Mayor of Malad, and as Lieutenant Governor. He is a former chairman of the Western Governors' Conference and a member of numerous committees of the National Governors' Association.

Gov. Evans plans to run for the U.S. Senate in 1986 in a bid for the seat of the late Sen. Frank Church.

The following is excerpted from John V. Evans' statement on U.S.-Israel relations.

American support of Israel is not only a sound investment in our national security, but a moral imperative of our foreign policy

Recently, I returned from a trip to Israel where I witnessed the contrast of a vibrant and stable democracy flourishing in a region of extremism and turmoil. I visited many of the holy sites mentioned in the Bible. As I stood atop Masada, I truly understood the Jewish people's constant struggle for survival. I was deeply moved as I walked through the Old City in Jerusalem, and by the Western Wall. I shall never forget that experience. Israel, as the United States, is a nation of immigrants with a strong pioneer spirit. They are a people committed, as we are, to preserving the rights of the individual. While in Israel, I often reflected on how similar the challenges these people faced were to those of my grandparents, who struggled to make their home in the arid climate of the western United States. Israel embodies the basic values that Americans treasure. It is no wonder that our two nations have enjoyed a close and special relationship since Israel's rebirth in 1948.

However, beyond our closeness to the people of Israel, American support of Israel is not only a sound investment in our national security, but also a moral imperative of our foreign policy.

A close personal friend and political associate of mine, the late Sen. Frank Church of Idaho said, "Independence, freedom and rejuvenation—these are the very precepts forming the spiritual cornerstone of the State of Israel." He was truly one of Israel's greatest supporters, and I share his beliefs as I seek the seat he once held in the U.S. Senate.

Senator Daniel K. Inouye



During his 23 years in the U.S. Senate, Daniel Inouye has emerged as a champion of American-Israel friendship. His unfailing support transcends political expedience—he stands by Israel simply because of the principles she represents. In 1959, Sen. Inouye became the first congressman from the new state of Hawaii, and was elected to the Senate in 1962. He has served on the Senate Appropriations Committee since 1971, and is the ranking Democrat on the Subcommittee on Foreign Operations.

Speaking at the Yeshiva University commencement exercises on June 6, 1985, Sen. Inouye commented on U.S. support for Israel:

In a region that has been fertile ground for the seeds of terrorism and tyranny, Israel has been a constant defender of freedom and democracy

"The United States will not place an insupportable burden on a country that is a democracy based on meaningful elections and free and open debate, which observes and defends human rights, and which shares the fundamental human values of our people. Along the arc of instability that stretches from Pakistan through Iran and the Middle East and on through the Horn of Africa, there is one country-just one-that shares and practices daily the democratic principles that govern our own country. In the Middle East, a region that has been fertile ground for the seeds of terrorism and tyranny, Israel has been a constant defender of freedom and democracy. The people of Israel, at a great cost of blood and treasure, have done their utmost to preserve their security and independence. U.S. interests in the stability of the Middle East dictate the necessity of helping to maintain Israel as an independent, democratic nation with a bright future of economic and human development."

RIGINAL

This Consultant Agreement entered into this \mathcal{M}_{dd} day of \mathcal{M}_{dd} , 1985, but effective the *First* day of \mathcal{M}_{dd} , 1985, by and between DANIEL K. INOUYE IN 86, a political organization duly organized and registered with the Federal Election Commission (hereinafter referred to as "DKI") and MYRNA FRANKEL, a resident of $\mathcal{M}_{dsh'nghn} DC$ (hereinafter referred to as "CONSULTANT"),

WHEREAS, DKI is a political organization attempting to further the reelection of Senator Daniel K. Inouye to the United States Senate in 1986 and is interested in raising funds on a nationwide basis in furtherance of said purpose; and

WHEREAS, CONSULTANT has the required expertise, training and experience to: (1) provide services as a fundraising consultant to DKI with respect to the 1986 election; and

WHEREAS, DKI and CONSULTANT now desire to enter into this CONSULTANT AGREEMENT as follows:

NOW, THEREFORE, upon the foregoing facts recited and in consideration of the covenants and terms hereinafter contained, the parties agree as follows:

CONSULTANT SERVICES

1. CONSULTANT shall use her best efforts to perform fundraising consultant services pertaining to the reelection of Daniel K. Inouye to the United States Senate in 1986. Such services shall include, but are not limited to, the following: (a) Producing by May 1, 1985 a fundraising goal and plan for implementation to be executed between May 1, 1985 and November 1986.

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(b) CONSULTANT shall be responsible for seeing that political action committees are solicited regularly and that reasonable efforts are made for these political action committees to contribute to the Inouye campaign consistent with all applicable campaign spending and contribution laws.

(c) If acceptable to and requested by DKI, CONSULTANT shall recruit leadership nationally representing a wide cross-section of communities and leadership to serve on a separate national committee to reelect Senator Daniel K. Inouye. These core group of leaders shall serve on the finance committee of said national committee upon approval by DKI. CONSULTANT shall use reasonable efforts to have said leaders contribute to the Daniel K. Inouye reelection campaign and fundraise within their community on behalf of said campaign.

(d) CONSULTANT shall be responsible for acting as the liaison between DKI and the national committee referred to in (c) above. CONSULTANT shall communicate with the members of said national committee regularly to continue solicitation for donations, host events in their communities, engage in target mailings, compile organizational lists, etc.

(e) Upon obtaining prior approval from DKI, CONSULTANT shall select, schedule and accompany Senator Inouye to meetings and conferences involved in her area of responsibility and follow up said meetings and conferences with regard to potential fundraisers and verbal commitments.

(f) CONSULTANT shall periodically provide a call list to DKI when a personal call from Senator Inouye is required in order to solicit a contribution. In connection with said calls, CONSULTANT shall provide all necessary and appropriate information, background and objectives, as well as the timeframe in which the calls must be completed.

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(g) CONSULTANT shall augment the current contribution list of DKI with her own fundraising list.

(h) CONSULTANT shall provide to DKI a list of potential high-dollar donors and find and engage in target mailings aimed at said individuals.

(i) CONSULTANT shall provide periodic status reports to DKI regarding the implementation of her fundraising plans and objectives and assist with income projections as required.

(j) CONSULTANT will perform any other services required to coordinate and achieve the fundraising objectives described herein.

2. CONSULTANT understands and agrees that the specific consultant services to be rendered pursuant to this agreement shall be closely coordinated with DKI.

3. CONSULTANT agrees during this term of this agreement or any extension thereto, that she will not:

 (a) Personally take or otherwise cause, directly or indirectly, any action detrimental to the interest of DKI or Senator Daniel K. Inouye;

(b) Permit herself to be in a position of conflict of interest with DKI or Senator Daniel K. Inouye without previously fully disclosing in writing such conflict to DKI or its designated representatives.

CONSIDERATION

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4. In consideration of the complete performance by CONSULTANT of her obligations under this Agreement, DKI agrees to pay the following consultant fees:

(a) DKI shall pay CONSULTANT a fee of FOUR THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$4000) per month, beginning on _____, 1985, payable on the first day of each month during the term of this agreement. Said payment shall include payments for CONSULTANT's services, any and all employees needed by CONSULTANT, office space in Washington, D.C., the installation of phone lines within said office and any and all office equipment, furniture and fixtures needed to provide said services. Said payment does not include out-of-pocket expenses (i.e., copying costs, telephone costs, postage, messenger service, printing, word processing and travel costs), which costs shall be reimbursed to CONSULTANT as set forth later in this Agreement. CONSULTANT shall use her best efforts to keep her expenses to a minimum. The aforesaid monthly payment of \$4000 shall be pro rated equitably on a daily basis for any month which CONSULTANT performs work for DKI for part of a month only.

5. CONSULTANT agrees that all checks payable in support of Daniel K. Inouye as a result of her fundraising efforts shall be made payable to DKI and be controlled by DKI.

6. In consideration for this Consultant Agreement, CONSULTANT further agrees to the following with respect to confidential and/or proprietary information which CONSULTANT has become privy to or does become privy to as a CONSULTANT to DKI:

(a) CONSULTANT understands and agrees that all confidential and/or proprietary information heretofore or hereafter used or developed by DKI (or by any of its predecessors or by any party to whom DKI owes an obligation of confidentiality), such as but not limited to, campaign secrets, secret campaign strategies unique to DKI, confidential contributor lists, budgetary information, confidential research, confidential developments, confidential marketing strategy unique to DKI and secret information related to the business or affairs of DKI and/or Senator Daniel K. Inouye, are and shall be the sole property of DKI unless and until publicly disseminated.

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(b) CONSULTANT agrees that she shall not use or disclose to any person, firm or corporation any such confidential and/or proprietary information except as necessary in the fulfillment of this Consultant Agreement with DKI or as otherwise authorized by DKI or its authorized representatives, or as directed by a court of competent jurisdiction.

(c) CONSULTANT further understands and agrees that all documents and records (and copies thereof) and information in any form touching DKI's operations, plans, strategies, finances, investigations, contracts, procedures, legal arrangements of business, made, developed or received by CONSULTANT or made known to her during this contract with DKI are the exclusive property of DKI (unless and until publicly published) and shall be returned upon the termination of this Agreement.

EXPENSE ALLOWANCE

7. DKI shall reimburse CONSULTANT for travel and out-of-pocket expenses previously referred to in this Agreement which have been previously authorized by DKI, but that to the extent practicable, CONSULTANT shall obtain such prior authority in writing. CONSULTANT shall not be entitled to reimbursement for use of any required employees including, but not limited to, typists and word processing operators, office space, phone line installation within said office, office equipment, furniture and fixtures.

8. CONSULTANT agrees to perform the services described herein in accordance with all Federal and State campaign laws, rules and regulations.

9. CONSULTANT shall keep full and complete records accurately reflecting all transactions to which she is a part relating to her fundraising activities for DKI and file all required reports and documents with the federal authorities.

TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT

10. This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon 30 days' prior written notice.

11. CONSULTANT understands and agrees that DKI shall have no continuing duty or obligation pursuant to this agreement to CONSULTANT, her heirs, personal representatives or any others claiming through her from and after termination of this Agreement.

INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

12. CONSULTANT understands and agrees that she will perform under this agreement as an independent contractor and not as DKI's employee, partner, agent or representative.

13. CONSULTANT further agrees that as an independent contractor, DKI shall not be responsible for including her in its employee coverage for workers compensation, unemployment compensation, insurance, temporary disability insurance, medical insurance and other employee benefits, if any.

INDEMNIFICATION

14. CONSULTANT shall indemnify and hold DKI harmless against and from any and all claims, damages, costs and expenses including reasonable attorney's fees, arising from the conduct of CONSULTANT in connection with her performance under this agreement.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

15. In the event of any controversy, claim or dispute between the parties affecting or relating to this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the non-prevailing party any and all of the prevailing party's reasonable expenses, including but not limited to reasonable attorney's fees.

16. If any term, covenant or condition of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall, to any extent, be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, or the application of such terms, covenants or conditions to persons or circumstances other than those to which it is

held invalid or unenforceable shall not be affected thereby and each term, covenant or condition of the Agreement shall be valid and be enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.

No multicandidate political committee may contribute more than \$5,000 to any candidate and his or her authorized political committees for any election for federal office.

In order to be a multicandidate committee and contribute up to the \$5,000 limit, a political committee must have more than fifty contributors, have made contributions to five ore more candidates for federal office, and have been registered as a political committee for at least six months.

If these requirements are not met by the committee, it is limited to a maximum contribution of \$1,000 to any one candidate and his or her authorized political committee for federal office.

In addition, no multicandidate political committee may contribute more than \$15,000 in any calendar year to the political committees established and maintained by a national political party, which are not the authorized political committees of any candidate. 2 U.S.C 431(4); 441a(a)A, (2)(B),(4)

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

Dear Candidate:

As in past elections, the Democratic Party of Hawaii is conducting a Campaign Assistance Program for the purpose of assuring victory for you and your fellow Democratic Party candidates on November 4th. The neighbor island County Committees (Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui) have devised programs that take into consideration the local media and activities that are most effective for each county. The State Party and the Oahu County Committee are working together with complementary Oahu County and statewide programs.

We are writing to advise you about the assistance that the State Party and the Oahu County Committee will be providing to support your candidacy; to ask for your kokua in promptly paying the minimal assessment that will assist the Party to fund its programs in coordination with its County Committees; and to inform you of a number of related events and services the Party is sponsoring. All of the programs sponsored by the State and County Committees are designed to give you the greatest impact possible from the resources available to us.

1. Candidate Assistance Program.

The program is designed to accomplish two goals: (a) to expose the voters to the themes and goals of the Democratic Party so that they vote for Democratic candidates, including you; and (b) to let the voters know who the Democratic candidates are so that, when they vote, they are familiar with you and your fellow Democrats. It will do this through media advertising, grass-roots efforts and sponsorship of Democratic Party events.

Toward these ends, the Party has just completed (a) running a one-week ad in the two major daily newspapers urging voters to vote Democratic; and (b) running a similar ad in major radio markets. In addition, the following activities will be completed in the coming weeks:

By Oahu County Committee:

(a) <u>Newspaper Ads-Statewide Candidates.</u> Two full-page newspaper ads will appear in the Oct. 19th & 26th Sunday Advertiser/Star-Bulletin newspaper promoting support for "statewide/multi-area candidates" (i.e., Waihee, Cayetano, Inouye, Akaka, Hannemann) and the entire Democratic team.

(b) <u>Newspaper Ads-Double Truck Team Ad-All Candidates.</u> A double page ad will appear in the major dailies, on the day before the general election containing a picture of you and your fellow Democratic candidates and urging a Democratic vote.

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(c) <u>Mass Canvass Team Piece</u>. A party team canvassing piece listing the candidates by island, including brief highlights of the accomplishments of the Democratic Party will be produced. This will be the only canvassing piece featuring the entire Democratic ticket.

By the State Party:

(a) <u>Mass Canvass</u>. The Party will assist in the coordination of an island-wide mass canvass on October 25, delivering a brochure urging a Democratic vote, together with supporters of Democratic candidates.

(b) <u>Party Rallies.</u> The Party is sponsoring a series of rallies (schedule attached) in various parts of Oahu which will be attended by the major candidates. You are encouraged to avail yourselves of the opportunity for voter exposure.

(c) <u>Mailings.</u> The Party will do direct mailings urging a Democratic vote.

(d) <u>Party Issues/Themes.</u> The Party has made available platform statements and other materials to assist you in discussing issues with the voters.

(e) <u>Information</u>. The Party will issue statements via press releases and other means to familiarize voters with Party themes and encourage a Democratic vote.

(f) <u>Endorsements/Photos</u>. The Party will coordinate efforts to obtain endorsements and/or joint photos for you from major Party officeholders or candidates.

(g) <u>Coordination with Other Campaigns.</u> The Party is willing to assist you in coordinating your campaign activities with those of other candidates.

(h) <u>Resource Persons/Expertise</u>. The Party is willing to put you in touch with Party members with the experience and expertise to discuss with you any aspect of your campaign or provide other assistance within our resources.

2. <u>Candidate Assessments.</u>

Our budget for the combined program of the State Party and the Oahu County Committee is \$75,000. U.S. Senator Daniel K. Inouye has very kindly donated \$50,000 of that amount to the Oahu County Committee to conduct its portion of this program, making it possible to provide the entire program through a very low assessment to you. We must emphasize that both the State Party and Oahu County Committee programs are necessary to bring about a Democratic Party sweep on November 4th. Your participation is what will make this coordinated program a reality.

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We are enclosing an assessment schedule which shows your contribution to make this program a success. It is based on the number of registered voters whose votes you are seeking. For example, candidates for contested State House races are being asked to contribute \$100, with candidates for other offices making contributions proportional to their constituent base. Because we have to pay for program activities up front, we ask that you make out your check payable to the Democratic Party of Hawaii and return it by October 20, 1986. An envelope is enclosed for your convenience.

We want to do everything possible to ensure victory for you on November 4th so that the themes and goals of the Democratic Party are forwarded. We urge you to take advantage of our desire to be of assistance, and to aid our unified cause by promptly affirming your participation.

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



Re: Expenditure of \$50,000 transfer from Incuye Campaign Committee

As you know, Senator Inouys's campaign committee has offered to transfer an additional \$50,000 of excess campaign funds to our party committee. I have taken the liberty of accepting the funds on behalf of the Committee and have deposited in the appropriate account. Pursuant to our conversations of last night and today, the following budget has been established for the disposition of the funds. The program was developed in consultation with our advertising agent Jean Myers of Myers Advertising. Since time is of the essence, I will assume that it reflects our understanding and will immediately proceed with the necessary arrangements unless I hear otherwise from you.

Disposition of New Campaign Budget:

- 1. <u>Television Advertising</u> <u>\$30,000</u> Four ads will be produced to promote the Waihee/Cayetano ticket. Inidividual ads will feature John Farias, Patsy Mink, Congressman Neil Abercrombie, and Senator Inouye. These ads are intended to have a broad unifying effect.
- 2. <u>Radio Advertising</u> <u>\$10,000</u> The radio ads will feature the voice-overs from the television ads.

RE: The Closing Weeks of the Campaign

Last evening, Hart Research completed interviews with a representative national sample of 521 respondents who are likely to vote in the upcoming elections. The survey results provide extremely useful insights for Democrats as they head into the final weeks of the campaign.

(1) The voters' major priorities in this election relate to domestic issues, rather than to foreign policy matters. The Republicans' efforts to shift the debate to other grounds have not worked thus far, and it is essential for Democrats to consistently bring the dialogue back to economic concerns in the campaign's closing weeks.

We asked voters which of five issues would be most important to them in deciding how to vote this year. Their top three priorities are improving economic conditions (26%}, cracking down on the drug problem (26%), and reducing the federal budget deficit (23%). The two issues that are least frequently selected are working for nuclear arms control (16%) and being firm in our dealings with Russia (7%).

When asked how the events of the past few weeks have changed their voting intentions, 32% of the respondents say they have become more likely to support Democratic candidates and 27% say they have become more likely to support Republican candidates. When asked to volunteer the issues that have affected their political preferences, only a very small fraction of the voters mention matters related to defense or arms control.

(2) <u>There is widespread concern about the condition of the economy</u>, and <u>Democrats must keep this concern front-and-center in the political</u>

debate. By far, the most appealing reason for a pro-Democratic vote on November 4 is voters' desire for new steps to improve economic conditions in their local areas.

We asked voters whether they believe the national economy and their local economies are getting better, getting worse, or staying the same. <u>Nearly half (45%) of all voters express pessimism about economic</u> <u>conditions, either on the national or local level</u>. By contrast, 19% are consistently optimistic about economic conditions. Voters who express concern that the national economy or local economy is getting worse say by a 2-to-1 margin (52% to 26%) that they will vote Democratic in this year's elections for Congress.

When voters are asked to react to six reasons for voting Democratic, the largest consensus by far forms around the message of "putting top priority on new steps to improve the economy in this area." Fully 80% of the voters say this would make them more inclined to vote for a Democratic candidate.

If Ronald Reagan tries to make this election a referendum on Star Wars, the answer from Democrats should be: "Mr. President, we support your efforts in Iceland, but America needs help in the heartland; the only way we can ever afford to spend billions on your Star Wars plan is if we first strengthen our economy here at home." Remember, the goal is to bring the campaign back to the voters' dominant economic concerns.

(3) For the time being, at least, President Reagan has broadened public support for his Strategic Defense Initiative. While the survey data indicate that Democrats can fight this battle to at least a draw, Democrats should not take the Republicans' bait when they try to force a narrowly focused_debate_on_S.D.I.

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Our polling confirms the findings of recent published polls that indicate increased public support for S.D.I. By 48% to 35%, for example, voters say the United States should develop the Strategic Defense Initiative and should not give up S.D.I. in negotiations for arms reductions.

From a political perspective, Democrats clearly have the potential to neutralize the Star Wars issue. When given a choice, for example, 39% say "it is more important to elect Democrats who will put top priority on working for arms control," while 38% say it is more important to elect Republicans who will help President Reagan pass his Strategic Defense Initiative. Nonetheless, the Democrats' potential for making gains is far greater if the election is framed in other terms.

(4) President Reagan may have minimized his clout on the S.D.I. issue, and perhaps runs the risk of an eventual backlash, by becoming overly partisan in his discussion of the matter. On this issue, the Democrats should continue to be the voice for bipartisanship and national unity in dealing with the Soviets on arms control, while helping voters to understand the shame of the Republicans' petty partisanship.

In our poll, we asked voters the following question:

Since returning from the Summit in Iceland, Ronald Reagan has been campaigning against some of the Democratic candidates, saving that they "promise to take a meat ax and chop up SDI." Do you feel that Ronald Reagan is correct in making this a partisan issue between Democrats and Republicans, or that he goes too far when he makes this a partisan issue?

Overall, voters say by a margin of 53% to 26% that the President is overplaying his hand by being so partisan. Even among voters who plan to vote Republican in November, a 40% to 38% plurality voice concern about the President's partisanship.

(5) To the extent that S.D.I. is a subject of debate in the closing weeks. Democrats must always make certain that it is placed in the larger context of the arms control issue.

Sixty-five percent say they would be more inclined to support a Democrat who stresses the need for new arms control negotiations with the Russians. At the same time, voters are surprisingly equivocal in rating the Reagan Administration's commitment to working for arms control: 48% say , they have a great deal or quite a bit of confidence in the Administration, but 48% say they have just some or only a little confidence.

The Democrats must make one essential point in this debate: "We support President Reagan's promise to keep the negotiating process moving. America needs to be firm, but we also need to keep working for answers. The Democrats are America's best insurance policy that the arms control process will continue."

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BACK HERE ON EARTH

Mr. Byrd.

Mr. President, I am a supporter of SDI -- the Strategic Defense Initiative. I believe it should be funded, I have supported it's funding. I have voted for the President's 'initiative. I believe research should go forward so that we can investigate vigorously the true potential of space defenses for the future. In the last few days, the American people have learned a great deal about space weapons. Indeed, the American people have taken a crash course on laser defense technology.

But it is time now to bring the public debate back to terra firma, back to solid earth -- down here, rather than up there. It is time to talk about our national interests in real terms before the President's public relations men place SDI in a permanent political orbit.

All this Buck Rogers, "Beam me up, Scotty," talk of space beams and lasers is about a future possibility that has little to do with the here and now reality that our economy is not working as it should be working. So let us begin the "reentry phase," and get the public debate back down on Earth again.

The thing I am trying to point out here now as we go down the road in the next few days and weeks, let us get this public debate back down here on earth because people's pocketbooks are impacted, their jobs are involved, and the farmers' farms and homes are involved. The banks that lend money to the farmers are involved. The steelworkers who are out of work want to know what is going to happen to them. Those who are still working are wondering when they are going to get their pink slips and the coal miners who are out of work are more interested in hearing what we are going to do about this economy. What are we 'qoing to do about jobs? What are we going to do about this terrible trade imbalance? These are the things that we ought to be debating as we go into the elections.

So let us begin, as I say, the "reentry phase" and get the public debate back on course. Back here on Earth, there are economic troubles, real troubles in the heartland of America, down in Louisiana, in West Virginia, in the farm States, in the oil producing States, and in the steel producing States. Back here on Earth, the trade deficit continues to grow. We are now \$170 billion in the red this year in the trade deficit. It could become \$180 billion.

So back here on Earth, let us keep both feet on the ground now. Back here on Earth the national deficit continues to loom larger and larger. It is a veritable "black hole", if we are using space terminology.

Back here on Earth wages are stagnating. American workers are fighting to hold their own, and our standard of living continues to weaken. Our economy does not sit very well with us.

So it seems to this Senator that it is important for the public debate to take a midcourse change in direction. We must attend to the business at hand, to make our economy competitive again, to save the family farm, and to reduce the national deficit.

Our growing economic troubles will not be solved by laser beams from outer space. That is not going to put the unemployed people in Louisiana, Mississippi, and West Virginia back to work. The reality is that SDI represents possibilities for some future time. As SDI research moves on we will debate its merits in the next Congress, and in the next Congress, and probably in the next Congress after that. In time the American people in their wisdom will come to a consensus about the merits of the program.

It is a debate that is too serious to be rushed, and in the here and now with our economy beginning to tumble out of control, we need to focus on the immediate. The public debate needs to come back to earth. The real truth of our situation, and we all know it to be true, is that America is living on the installment plan -- stalling for time -- even as we borrow our way deeper and deeper into debt.

America has borrowed its way into its current economic prosperity and the price is going to be paid by future generations.

The President spoke yesterday to a group of Moscow-bound young Americans. I will read from the news wire:

> President Reagan told Moscow-bound schoolchildren Thursday he refused to trade his Star Wars missile defense program for a sweeping arms agreement at the Iceland summit because, "I couldn't give up your future."

Well, he told those young people he couldn't give up their future by trading Star Wars. But, Mr. President, their future is already spoken for. They will be paying our bills, our debts, our deficits. They will be paying for a very long time unless we get the national debate back to earth.

Finally, Mr. President, I would like to make one last comment about the recent SDI debate. As I say, I think I can say it and look the most avid advocate of SDI straight in the eye because I have supported it all the way. I supported the President in it. Last week before the President went to the summit I stood right here on this floor, and I spoke to wish the President well when he went to the summit. I said, "Mr. President, when you go to the summit you can feel, you can know, that it is as it were 100 Senators, Democrats and Republicans, sitting right behind you at the summit, as you look across the table into the eyes of Mr. Gorbachev. You can feel that there are 100 Senators, Democrats and Republicans, holding up your

hand. Do not forget, we are there with you in spirit. We are supporting our President. When it comes to a national security emphasis, there is no dividing aisle between the Democrats and the Republicans."

That is the kind of support I spoke of to the President as to what he could expect when he went to the summit.

As a supporter of SDI, I think, as I say, I come well qualified. I am a charter member, a blue ribbon supporter, of SDI.

I hope that in the days ahead, the national discussion about arms reduction will remain on a high level, a serious level, a level of debate that is above partisanship. The President wanted bipartisan support when he went to the summit. He got it. I meant every work I said when I said, "There are 100 Senators backing you up. Do not forget that. Keep that in your mind's eye as you look in Mr. Gorbachev's eye, and the American people are backing you."

So he got that bipartisan support. I believe that the President only demeans all that he strived for in Iceland if he simply reduces it now to a partisan political debate.

The election will soon be behind us, but the need for thinking of our Nation's future will always be ahead of us.

So I say in closing, let us keep our eyes on the problems here on Earth, let us keep our eyes on the fact that our people are losing their jobs, our manufacturing base is eroding,

Re: Ad Copy For Oahu County Committee-Unity Canvassing Piece

Attached for your review and comment are two versions of the ad copy which will appear on the inside-right page of the canvassing piece. The first version lists accomplishments (including comments); the second version seems to set forth the vision and purpose of our Party. The first version may raise more questions than answer some of the attacks that Andy Anderson has levelled against the Administration (i.e., last week's double truck ad). For example, in the area of education, Hawaii rank's 20th in spending per student for the fiscal year ended 6/30/85. Andy Anderson's television ad seems to suggest that in the area of education that the state does not spend its money effectively -- why should it cost the state almost as much as private school tuition to deliver a "public school education". In reality, private tuition does not include all the school COSte (capital improvements, etc.) which may be paid for from endowment fund revenue or contributions. In the area of the state's finances, the Governor's 1974-1986 report listed 4 major accomplishments. The information on Crime and Congressional Delegation came from your Address to the Democratic Party of Hawaii Convention in May.



Dear Candidate:

As in past elections, the Democratic Party of Hawaii is conducting a Campaign Assistance Program for the purpose of assuring victory for you and your fellow Democratic Party candidates on November 4th. The neighbor island County Committees (Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui) have devised programs that take into consideration the local media and activities that are most effective for each county. The State Party and the Oahu County Committee are working together with complementary Oahu County and statewide programs.

We are writing to advise you about the assistance that the State Party and the Oahu County Committee will be providing to support your candidacy; to ask for your kokua in promptly paying the minimal assessment that will assist the Party to fund its programs in coordination with its County Committees; and to inform you of a number of related events and services the Party is sponsoring. All of the programs sponsored by the State and County Committees are designed to give you the greatest impact possible from the resources available to us.

1. Candidate Assistance Program.

The program is designed to accomplish two goals: (a) to expose the voters to the themes and goals of the Democratic Party so that they vote for Democratic candidates, including you; and (b) to let the voters know who the Democratic candidates are so that, when they vote, they are familiar with you and your fellow Democrats. It will do this through media advertising, grass-roots efforts and sponsorship of Democratic Party events.

Toward these ends, the Party has just completed (a) running a one-week ad in the two major daily newspapers urging voters to vote Democratic; and (b) running a similar ad in major radio markets. In addition, the following activities will be completed in the coming weeks:

By Oahu County Committee:

(a) <u>Newspaper Ads-Statewide Candidates</u>. Two full-page newspaper ads will appear in the Oct. 19th & 26th Sunday Advertiser/Star-Bulletin newpaper promoting support for "statewide/multi-area candidates" (i.e., Waihee, Cayetano, Inouye, Akaka, and Hanneman) and the entire Democratic team.

(b) <u>Newspaper Ads-Double Truck Team Ad-All Candidates</u>. A double page ad will appear in the major dailies, on the day before the general election containing a picture of you and your fellow Democratic candidates and urging a Democratic vote.

(c) <u>Mass Canvass Team Piece</u>. A party team canvassing piece listing the candidates by island, including brief highlights of the accomplishments of the Democratic Party will be produced. This will be the only canvassing piece featuring the entire Democratic ticket.

By the State Party:

(a) <u>Mass Canvass</u>. The Party will assist in the coordination of an island-wide mass canvass on October 25, delivering a brochure urging a Democratic vote, together with supporters of Democratic candidates.

(b) <u>Party Rallies.</u> The Party is sponsoring a series of rallies (schedule attached) in various parts of Oahu which will be attended by the major candidates. You are encouraged to avail yourselves of the opportunity for voter exposure.

(c) <u>Mailings</u>. The Party will do direct mailings urging a Democratic vote.

(d) <u>Party Issues/Themes.</u> The Party has made available platform statements and other materials to assist you in discussing issues with the voters.

(e) <u>Information</u>. The Party will issue statements via press releases and other means to familiarize voters with Party themes and encourage a Democratic vote.

(f) <u>Endorsements/Photos</u>. The Party will coordinate efforts to obtain endorsements and/or joint photos for you from major Party officeholders or candidates.

(g) <u>Coordination with Other Campaigns.</u> The Party is willing to assist you in coordinating your campaign activities with those of other candidates.

(h) <u>Resource Persons/Expertise</u>. The Party is willing to put you in touch with Party members with the experience and expertise to discuss with you any aspect of your campaign or provide other assistance within our resources.

2. <u>Candidate assessments.</u>

Our budget for the combined program of the State Party and the Oahu County Committee is \$75,000. U.S. Senator Daniel K. Inouye has very kindly donated \$50,000 of that amount to the Oahu County Committee to conduct its portion of this program, making it possible to provide the entire program through a very low assessment to you. We must emphasize that both the State Party and Oahu County Committee programs are necessary to bring about a Democratic Party sweep on November 4th.

Your participation is what will make this coordinated program a reality.

We are enclosing an assessment schedule which shows your contribution to make this program a success. It is based on the number of registered voters whose votes you are seeking.
