

## JAPAN ENVOY IS EXPECTED IN CAPITOL TODAY

**TO CONFER WITH NOMURA  
BEFORE MEETING STATE  
SECRETARY**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15—Saburo Kurosu, special Japanese envoy to assist Ambassador Kichisaburo Nomura for the Japan-American peace negotiation is expected to arrive today at 1:00 p. m.

Mr. Kurosu will meet Ambassador Nomura on Sunday at the Japanese Embassy for a detailed discussion before he has a conference with Secretary of State Cordell Hull on the adjustment of the Japanese-American relations. The conference will be held on Monday when Mr. Kurosu and Mr. Nomura will call on Secretary Hull. If further meetings are necessary after Monday's conference, it is understood that Mr. Kurosu and Mr. Nomura will meet Mr. Hull alternately instead of together.

President Roosevelt's trip to Warm Springs was postponed and probably will make the trip after meeting with the Japanese envoy, Mr. Kurosu on Tuesday.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 15—Indicating the readjustment between Kuomintang and Communist parties which has not yet been worked out, Chungking decided to postpone the opening of the ninth plenary session of central executive supervisory committees of Kuomintang until next February, the reliable information reaching here disclosed. ## Russian Ambassador is Reported Safe

LONDON, Nov. 15—Official information from Cairo disclosed that Maxim Litvinov, new Soviet Ambassador to Washington and Laurance Steinhardt, American ambassador to Moscow, are safe.

The diplomatic plane in which they were flying from Kuibyshev to Teheran landed at Pahlevi on the Caspian Sea after having been forced from its course, presumably by bad weather.

## GB ADMITS THE SINKING OF ARK ROYAL

**SAYS ITALIAN SUB, RATHER  
THAN GERMAN U-BOAT  
DID THE TRICK**

LONDON, Nov. 15—The admiralty announced that the famous British aircraft carrier Ark Royal, repeatedly sunk in German propaganda claims, has finally been sent to the bottom of the Mediterranean by an Axis submarine.

An authoritative statement said that the attack on the Ark Royal, as the big warship was returning to Gibraltar, might have been made by an Italian submarine, rather than a German U-boat.

The Ark Royal was not in action at the time of the attack. The British carrier was attacked east of Gibraltar in the Mediterranean, late Thursday and it was first believed the ship could be towed safely to port. The ship's list grew worse, however, and the big aircraft carrier sank early Friday morning.

A large number of her crew and flier personnel was saved. ability to summon the representatives.

## U.S. GENERALS TO NEAR EAST AS ADVISORS

**WILL ACT AS MILITARY AD-  
VISERS TO BRITISH FORCES  
IN INDIA, MIDDLE EAST**

MANILA, Nov. 14 — It was learned that Brigadier Generals Raymond A. Wheeler and Russell L. Maxwell, enroute to Near East as United States military advisors, arrived here this afternoon aboard the clipper.

Well informed circles commenting on the purpose of the two officers going to Near East opined that either Wheeler or Maxwell will cooperate directly with General Sir Archibald Wavell, commander-in-chief of the British forces in India and Major General Sir Claude Eauchinleck, commander-in-chief of the British forces in Middle East.

It is understood that Wheeler and Maxwell are expected to proceed to Singapore tomorrow.

## RUSSIANS CLAIM VICTORIES IN FIVE EASTERN SECTORS

KUIBYSHEV, Nov. 15 — The Russians claimed smashing victories on five sectors of the eastern front Friday, including a Soviet break through from besieged Leningrad.

New Soviet successes were claimed before Leningrad, near Kalinin and Tula on the Moscow front, in the Donets Basin and before Rostov on the Don. The Russians said that in addition to the break-through at Leningrad, near Kalinin, 100 miles north of Moscow; 20 villages were recaptured by Red troops.

At Tula, 110 miles south of the Red capital, the Germans were reported thrown back several miles and some 5,000 killed or wounded.

On the southern front, the Germans attempted to cross the Donets River and were thrown back with the loss of 700 men. Three German divisions made a new assault on Rostov but were thrown back with such heavy losses that

they dug in, just as winter weather swept the Donets Basin, the Russians said.

A Soviet summary said the position of Russian troops was continually improving in several sectors and that nowhere were the Nazis able to advance.

In Berlin, German high command officially announced that Nazi artillery was blasting the little port guarding the four-mile wide gap to the Caucasus and that German bombers were wreaking havoc among Red troops attempting to escape to the Caucasus and on Russian points on the Caucasian side of Kerchenski straits. The fall of Kerch was awaited momentarily.

Sharp Russian counter attacks on an unidentified Moscow sector were said to have been repulsed and the Germans, in pursuit of the Soviets advanced to a new position. The weather was said to be very bad.

## TAKAHASHI TO SUCCEED HUSSEY AS TENNIS PREXY

With a view to distributing the responsibility among as many leaders as possible, a new chairman was elected at an annual meeting of the HRC Tennis committee yesterday.

W. K. Hussey, who almost singlehandedly administered the affairs of the committee for the last two years and, incidentally, did a fine job of it, will be succeeded by Teruichi Takahashi of the Hilo YBA club.

The position of "czar" of the local tennis fraternity requires a lot of self-sacrifice on the part of the responsible person. For his contribution to the welfare of the game in Hilo, Hussey received a vote of thanks of the committee.

Another change also was made in the standing committee. George Kai, who like Hussey made great contributions during the past year, was succeeded by Masa Hiraiwa as secretary-treasurer.

Appointments of the new committee members will be announced later by Chairman-elect Takahashi.

Meanwhile, the outgoing committee decided on a grand get-together dinner among all local tennis players to celebrate the successful season. The get-together was scheduled for Friday evening, November 28, at the Seaside club, and reservations may be made with officers of any private club or with the HRC committee.

Presentation of trophies, both team and individual, will be made

at the dinner. According to the outgoing president, Hussey, the trophies have now been all received.

## WITHDRAWAL OF U.S. MARINES FROM CHINA IS ANNOUNCED BY FDR AT PRESS CONFERENCE

**Removal of Marines Stationed at Shanghai, Peiping and Tientsin, Will Begin Soon Says Roosevelt**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15—President Roosevelt announced that the United States would withdraw the marines stationed in China and declared, in response to questions, that it was impossible to say whether war with Japan can be avoided.

Mr. Roosevelt told a press conference that removal of the marines who are stationed at Shanghai, Peiping and Tientsin, would begin shortly. Other authoritative sources said that the recall would not actually begin until the American citizens in Shanghai are given a last chance to return to their homeland.

The Americans in the Far East have been advised repeatedly to return to this country and it was understood that arrangements are being made to provide ships for the removal of those in Shanghai who wish to leave before the marine withdrawal.

Mr. Roosevelt would not connect the marine removal order with the status of the United States-Japanese relations and the impending peace talks among officials here and Saburo Kurosu, Japanese ace

diplomat who arrived in San Francisco.

Reporters made several attempts to link the two moves, asking the president whether he believes the American people realize the seriousness of the Far Eastern situation. He replied that he thought the country was aware of it.

There was a widespread feeling among unofficial sources that the withdrawal of the marines was ordered to clear the decks for any possible emergency in the Far East, in event of the U. S.-Japanese hostilities, the small marine forces would otherwise be cut off.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 — President Roosevelt announced that the United States government has decided to withdraw the United States marines from Peking, Tientsin and Shanghai with actual withdrawal taking place shortly. The announcement was made at the press conference with the President reading a brief statement which was handed him by the secretary while press conference was already progressing.

President Roosevelt declined to indicate where the marines will be moved and also refused to comment on the press interpretations of the withdrawal as precautionary move designed to impress Japan.

When asked if the withdrawal will leave American interests in China, unprotected, the president replied that most American nationals in China are missionaries outside of Peking, Tientsin and Shanghai but the few Americans there will be protected by the few marines stationed there.

In regard to this question, Secretary of State Cordell Hull said the withdrawal will not affect the American diplomatic and consular services. All areas will be served as it was, he said.

# EDITORIAL

## CERTIFICATE OF BIRTH

Section 1486 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii, 1935, requires the certificate of birth contain several items of information, among which is the question of legitimacy of the child. Oftentimes, a child is put in an embarrassing situation because of illegitimacy appearing on the face of the certificate. This is especially true when the child does not know his illegitimacy and afterwards when he becomes of age he suddenly finds out that his parents are foster parents. He will feel shame when he learns that he was born out of wedlock, bastard, or adopted. It might ruin his social life. It is, therefore, advisable that the information as to legitimacy and illegitimacy be omitted from the certificate.

Mr. Victor Houston's recent letter published in the Advertiser is worthwhile of quoting. He states as follows:

"More power to you for the editorial 'A Medieval Custom' in this morning's paper. The shameful requirement regarding legitimacy should have long ago been eliminated from the public birth records.

"For ready reference I quote the objectionable law on the subject from Revised Laws of Hawaii 1945:

"Sec. 1486. . . . The certificate of birth shall contain the following items, which are declared necessary for the legal, social and sanitary purposes subserved by registration records. The place of birth. . . . ; WHETHER LEGITIMATE OR ILLEGITIMATE. . . .

"On the Hawaiian printed forms of birth certificate, question 8, which must be answered is "LEGITIMATE?"

"By way of contrast, I quote from the New York State Laws, as amended in 1936:

"The certificate of birth shall contain such information and be in such form as the state commissioner of health may prescribe. THERE SHALL BE NO SPECIFIC STATEMENT ON THE BIRTH CERTIFICATE AS TO WHETHER THE CHILD IS BORN IN WEDLOCK OR AS TO THE MARITAL NAME OR STATUS OF THE MOTHER.

"New York has further modernized its practice by providing for 'Bureau of Records CERTIFICATION OF BIRTH' acceptable as prima facie evidence of proof of age in State administrative agencies. This certificate contains only the name, sex, date and place of birth, and Birth Record Number of the place of record.

"Action by our legislature is quite evidently necessary. I hope you will have some influence in bringing this about."

We are absolutely in accord with Mr. Houston's opinion. The certificate of birth should contain only the name, sex, date and place of birth. Other insurmountable informations, especially to the question of legitimacy or illegitimacy, should be omitted. For the welfare of our society and for the interest of the children, we hope that the next legislature will give a careful consideration to this matter and work for revision of the statute which has a reference to issuance of certificate of birth by the Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Sam's sandy eyebrows went up. "I gather you don't approve of the way she's been brought up?"

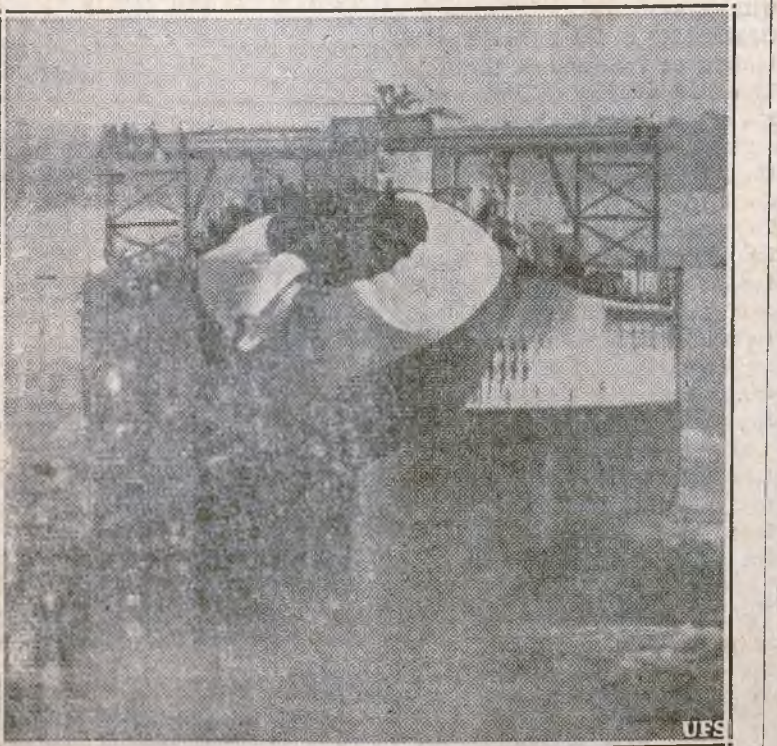
"Do you?" asked Greg.

Lessons in HEALTH

Co-ordinating Exercises

Co-ordination is the term used to describe the harmony which should exist between nerves and muscles to enable us to perform any action with dexterity and nimbleness. It is the most valuable asset of athletes, dancers, and other active persons, but is none the less important to men and women in more prosaic walks of life. Perfect co-ordination gives us better poise, more graceful carriage, increased ease and proficiency in sports. With it one is more alert, more alive, more agile. Those persons whose ungainly awkward actions indicate an almost total lack of co-ordination must exercise patience, but with faithful practice, it can be developed to an astonishing degree. The following exercises are especially designed to teach co-ordination.

Lie flat on your back with both hands extended beyond the head, palms together. Now raise the left leg and bring the right arm forward, trying to touch the toes with the fingers, but keeping the legs straight. Return the arm and leg to starting position. Repeat six times, counting as you return to the starting position.

Repeat the same movement as above, using the right leg and left arm. Six times.

Now combine the two exercises described above, alternating with both arms and both legs, so that as the right hand meets the left foot, the left hand and right foot are near the ground, and as the left hand meets the right foot, the right hand and left foot are near the ground. Repeat six times, counting each time the left leg is down.

PRIORITIES AND YOU

YOU MAY HAVE to give up some of your cosmetics, if the materials that go into them remain on the government's priorities list. HOUSE and HOME

Success with house plants need not be limited to those lucky persons who seem to have "green fingers." If you have the right plant and a basic understanding of the essentials that make for good growing conditions your difficulties are overcome before they develop.

First comes your choice of plant. Keep in mind that the majority of flowering plants have but one blooming period each year. The beautiful specimen you buy at the florist's shop was taken months ago by the gardener, cared for and stimulated until it is in full bloom.

The gardener has controlled the conditions of soil, temperature and moisture regularly and systematically, and has undoubtedly told the florist all about the care necessary to keep his stock fresh and healthy in the shop. Ask the florist about watering, temperature and light.

If the plant is to be repotted the important thing to watch is adequate drainage.

The clay pot with bottom drainage hole should be set on a base that permits a certain amount of air to circulate under the pot. A saucer filled with small pebbles or coarse ashes can be placed under the pot. This prevents the plant from standing in stagnant water.

If the plant is placed in its pot in a jardiniere, this should be large enough to allow some circulation of air around the pot. Standing water should be removed daily.

A plant potted in a non-porous container without a bottom opening should have a good inch of drainage material at the bottom. Large pebbles, broken bits of crockery or good sized marbles are good for this purpose.

If you are sending a plant to a friend who is not a garden clubber it's a good idea to enclose simple suggestions regarding its care. Should it be watered from the bottom? Does it like lots of sun? How much water does it need? Should it be kept in the coolest spot in the house? These answers will prolong the pleasure your friend has with your gift.

Be sure to dig up dahlias tubers!

and gladioli before the ground freezes. Cut off the tops and then dig the roots. Remove the earth and let them dry a few days before storing them away packed in sand. Put them in a cool cellar but where they will not freeze during the winter. Label them so you'll know where to put them for the best color effect in your garden next year.

SIX INCH SERMON

REV. ROBERT H. HARPER

Repentance and Faith.  
Lesson for November 9: Luke 15: 11-24.

Golden Text: Mark 1: 15.

We consider today the familiar story of the Prodigal Son, which presents an example of true repentance and faith, and illustrates the readiness of God to forgive the penitent.

The primary meaning of repentance is to turn away from sin. The consequences of sin will bring sorrow to the sinner, but let him not forget that his sin brings sorrow to God. And let him be grieved, first of all, that he has transgressed against God.

When the prodigal lost his inheritance in the far country and was reduced to such want that he envied the swine he husks, he resolved to return unto his father's house, not asking that his inheritance be restored but that he be given the place of a hired servant. And he confessed that he had sinned in his father's sight and against heaven.

We have thought little about the other son, who, cold, hard and unsympathetic, would not go in to the feast but sulked without. (Read remainder of chapter.) When he complained to his father, he spoke of his own brother as "this thy son." Many who address God as Father do not speak of other men as their brothers. Let them consider the readiness of God to forgive. The world would be a better place if many who claim to be righteous were more inclined to forgive the wayward. It is easy to recognize evil conditions but hard to do anything about them; easy to condemn sinners but often hard to love them and help them.

RODEO . . . amateurs

New Yorkers, who think of the West as starting on the other side of the Hudson river, are having this belief verified at the rodeo in Madison Square Garden where a cowboy from New Jersey is among the competitors in the bronc riding contest. The cowboys, New Yorkers are saying, come from Texas, Oklahoma, New Jersey and places like that.

But wherever they come from, they bring a real thrill to eastern business men who are always talking about "taking the bull by the horns" but never, except during the annual rodeo, get a really means. The rodeo is probably the most exciting event witnessed in New York. Most other spectacles planned to thrill Broadwayites have an artificial flavor about them because audiences know ahead of time that they consist of professionals who have perfected their acts and scarcely ever make mistakes. The performers in the rodeo, however, are amateur cowboys and cowgirls who have come from the West in the hope of winning big money prizes in competition with one another, and the audience never knows what will happen.

WRESTLING . . . steers

By far the most exciting event at the rodeo is the wild steer wrestling contest.

In case you haven't seen one, this act is as simple to explain as it is dangerous to perform. A wild steer, with blood in his eyes and horns that look sharper than daggers, comes rushing full speed out of a pen. A cowboy tears after him on horseback, gets alongside of him and suddenly jumps from his horse to land with his arms firmly around the steer's horns. If he lands right—then it becomes a question of matching his brute strength against the steer's in wrestling the steer to the ground. It's a tough wrestle, but the experienced cowboy usually wins. But if he lands wrong on the jump—if the steer gets loose—then it becomes a matter of scrambling out of the way before the steer can turn on him and gore him with those dagger-like horns.

Many a cowboy has been killed in this dangerous pastime of the West. But it is an excellent demonstration of the American type of sportsmanship, as compared with bullfighting in other countries. For in bullfighting, the odds are all against the bull, but in steer wrestling, the animal scarcely ever gets hurt. It's the cowboy who takes all the chances while the animal just goes through a slight discomfort.

AUTRY . . . Rogers

The star of the rodeo this year, according to the program, was Gene Autry, famous cowboy of screen and radio. But according to the applause of the New York audience, Gene was the one let-down in the show. The most enjoyable part of his act, the applause showed, was when his two beautiful, spirited horses refused to jump through hoops put up for them and, instead, trotted out of the ring leaving Gene twiddling his thumbs.

The audience had come to see Gene Autry and to see Gene was simply a Hollywood glamour boy whose pictures don't appeal to them and who showed no signs of cowboyishness except for being able to make a smart horse do some remarkable dancing. And New Yorkers gave all the credit for that to the horse.

There was an interesting comparison between New York's attitude toward Autry and toward that other famous cowboy who made good in Hollywood—Will Rogers. During the evening I attended it was announced that Mrs. Will Rogers was in the audience and she stood up to take a bow. The applause was greater than for any act during the evening.

New York loved Will Rogers as did people in every section of the country. Hollywood never changed him, or the people's love for him.

PHOTOGRAPHERS . . . news

The rodeo is definitely a western thriller, but several easterners did themselves proud in the arena; namely, the news photographers.

Ordered by their newspapers to get thrilling action pictures, several photographers, with large cameras and pockets full of flash bulbs, were in the arena from the beginning to the end of the show facing wild bulls one minute and bucking broncos the next. Their game seemed to be to get as close as possible to each animal when it was acting up most—and many of them turned to snap pictures on the run while being chased.

The photographers were a leading topic of interest and excitement throughout the show and more than one piece of camera equipment was destroyed by a bull before the evening was over. It was the general opinion of the audience that one of the cash prizes should have been put up for the most daring act of a newspaper photographer.

The newspaper photographers wanted pictures and more pictures, because the rodeo offers their annual opportunity to give eastern newspaper readers a taste of the West. When the outstanding performers of the great open spaces gather together within the confines of one New York building—that's news.

# LAWS AFFECTING ISLAND OF HAWAII OR HAVING SPECIAL INTEREST TO ITS RESIDENTS

EDITOR'S NOTE: Through the courtesy of Senator Sanji Abe, the Hawaii Mainichi has had the good fortune to secure sheets of all laws passed by the legislature at the special session.

For the information of our readers and the general public, we will publish in these columns every day laws which bear directly on the County of Hawaii, or which, in our opinion, may be of special interest to the Big Island residents and citizens.

H. B. No. 10, Act 14.

TO PROVIDE FOR THE STUDY, INVESTIGATION, CONSERVATION AND INCREASE IN FISH AND SHELLFISH IN AND FOR THE TERRITORY OF HAWAII, AND FOR THE ACTIVE COOPERATION OF THE AGRICULTURE AND FORESTRY OF THE TERRITORY WITH THE UNITED STATES FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE, AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION THEREFOR.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) or so much thereof as shall be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the general revenues of the Territory, in addition to any other appropriation made by law for the same or similar purposes, to be expended by the board of commissioners of agriculture and forestry for the study, investigation, conservation and increase in fish and shellfish in and for the Territory, including, but without limitation upon the generality of the the inshore fisheries and the pond foregoing, the offshore fisheries, culture of food and bait fishes, and for the study of possibilities of improving methods of fishing, and means of utilization and distribution of fish and shellfish, for the purposes, among others, of making the Territory more nearly self-sustaining, and to assure gainful employment, a fair profit and a moderate cost to the consumer,

and for the carrying out of any plans or methods for effectuating any and all of the foregoing.

The amount herein appropriated shall be expended only in the event that matching funds be provided by the Federal Government or in the event that provision is made by the Federal Government for the expenditure of a like sum for the program outlined in Investigation Report No. 42 of the United States Department of Commerce Bureau of Fisheries.

SECTION 2. In furtherance of the purposes of this Act, the board of commissioners of agriculture and forestry, either directly, or through its division of fish and game, or both, is authorized to cooperate with the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, with other agencies of the Federal and Territorial Government, and with individuals, public and private agencies, organizations and institutions, and the board may accept and use donations of real or personal property, including moneys the purpose of carrying out the objects of this Act.

SECTION 3. Subject to the limitation of section 1, the board is authorized to expend so much of the aforesaid appropriation as it shall find necessary for the employment of skilled technical personnel and the acquisition of supplies and equipment in and for the division of fish and game, for the purpose of this Act, which personnel and supplies and equipment

may be in addition to those authorized by the general or any other appropriation Act.

SECTION 4. Subject to the limitation of section 1, the board may enter into such contracts with the bureau of fisheries or other federal, territorial, county, municipal or private agencies as it shall deem proper for the furtherance of the purposes of this Act.

SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

## 100 WAYS TO PREDICT RAIN

One hundred time-tested signs of rain will be presented to you in groups for several days. However, several of these will not apply to the Islands but are bound to add to the interest of the readers. These signs are not mere superstitions, but are the results of years of observation on the part of people who had to depend on Mother Nature rather than a newspaper to tell them what the weather was going to do.

Thus these signs will be found to be largely dependable, and you are urged to memorize as many as you can.

SOOT—Whenever soot falls down the chimney, it is a reliable sign of approaching rain.

SPARROWS—When sparrows begin to chirp louder than usual, get your raincoat out.

SPIDERS—When spiders desert their webs, it is a sign of coming rain.

SPONGES—When sponges do not dry out rapidly after using, get ready for a rainstorm.

STARS—When stars are unusually dim and dull, prepare for rain. A star very close to the moon is also said to be an indication of rain.

STOMACH—An uneasy stomach is often a sign of approaching rain.

STOVES—When stoves and other iron objects rust over night in fair weather, rain may be anticipated.

SUDDEN HEAT—Heat that comes suddenly generally brings rain with it.

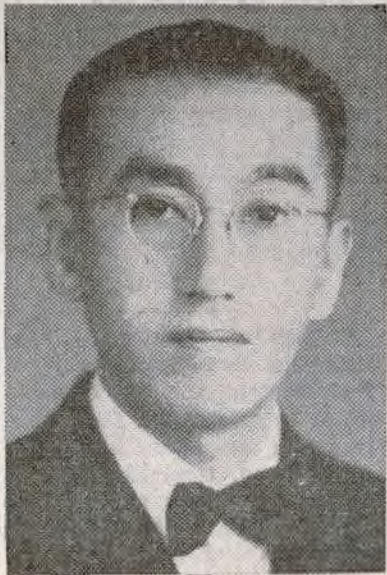
SUN—When the sun sends out distinct shafts of light, sometimes called "The sun's fingers," it is a warning of rain.

SUNSETS—A white, pale yellow or gray sunset betokens rain. An earlier weather book says: "If the sun should set in gray, the next will be a rainy day."

## CALHOOD VACCINATION FOR BANG'S DISEASE CONTROL

Bang's disease, contagious abortion or brucellosis of cattle is probably the most serious disease confronted by local dairymen and is also a problem on some of our ranches. Such a disease is naturally more serious where cattle are closely confined as is the case in most dairies. The use of the blood or agglutination test furnishes quite a satisfactory method of finding the reactors so that they can be eliminated, but it does not give any protection or immunity to the herd. In fact, a clean herd is more susceptible to the disease than one in which a certain amount of natural immunity may have been built up. In herds where there is considerable chance of contact with animals which may be reactors, it is highly desirable to immunize the animals against this disease.

The Bureau of Animal Industry has been working on this problem for many years at the United States Department of Agriculture farm at Beltsville, Maryland, and in cooperative tests with farmers. They have developed a vaccine known as strain 19 which is very effective when calves of the proper age are vaccinated. The following facts brought out by tests of the Bureau of Animal Industry and various state experiment stations are to be noted:

1. Calhood vaccination for Bang's disease control has proven successful and the disease can eventually be eliminated from an infected herd by this method.

2. Calhood vaccination is advisable in herds where there is no Bang's disease infection as a preventive against probable infection if cattle are being purchased or if there is much possibility of contact with infected animals.

3. The best time to vaccinate is between 5 and 8 months of age.

4. Experiments indicate that calhood vaccination gives a high percentage of immunity and that very few animals vaccinated as calves will react to the agglutination test as mature animals.

5. The effectiveness of calhood vaccination depends largely on the care and the vaccine used. Only strain 19 vaccine produced by reliable companies under government supervision should be used. It should be kept under refrigeration and used before the expiration date marked on the bottle.

long. Surgeons use it to light throat and nasal passages during delicate operations.

6. All calves vaccinated should be earmarked or otherwise identified so that there is no chance that some of them will be missed.

7. It is advisable that the vaccinating be done by a licensed veterinarian.

The United States Department of Agriculture has recently published a very good bulletin on this subject, U.S.D.A. Farmers' Bulletin No. 1871, "Brucellosis of Cattle." Copies of this bulletin may be obtained by sending 5 cents to the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C.

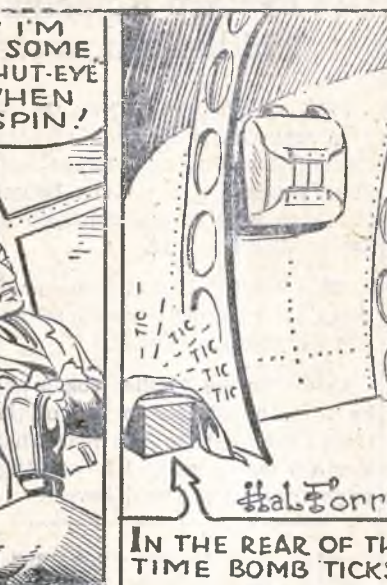
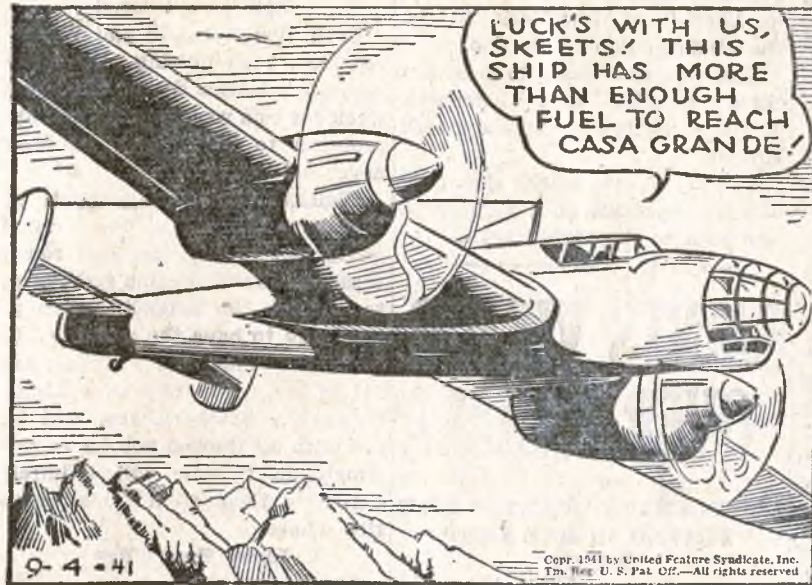

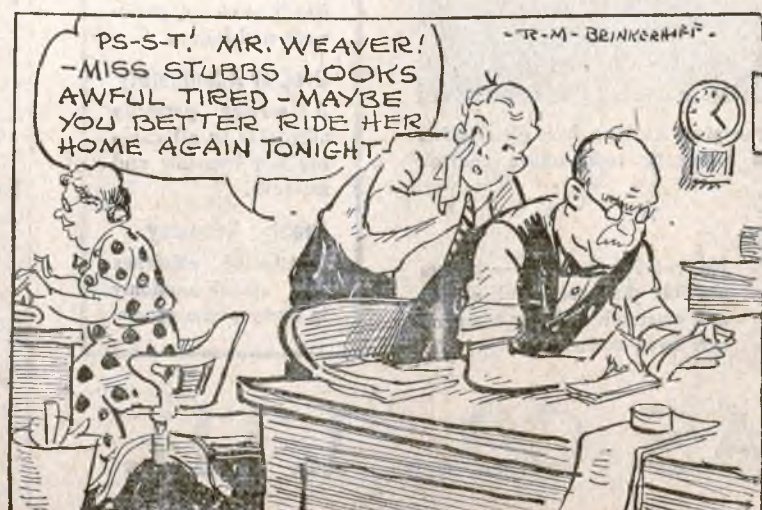

Aug. 10—300 meter individual medley, Jose Balmores at Maplewood: 3:46.9.

Rabid local football followers are looking forward to this week-end to witness this game and a large crowd is expected.









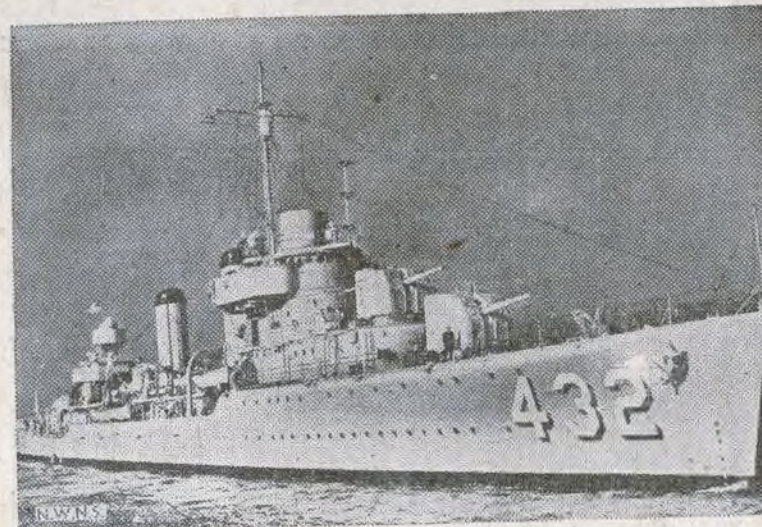


British King Inspects 'Invasion' Weapons
