Chizons of the United States: Your suffrage buring elevated me to the office of President of me United States, I have, in conformity with the Constitution of our country, taken the oath of office presented therein. I have taken this outle without mental reservation, with the determination to do, to the best of my ability, all that it requires of me. The responsibilities of the position I feel, but accept them without fear. The office has come to me unsought. I commence its duties natrammeled. I bring to it a conscious desire and determination to fill it to the best of my ability, and to the satisfaction of the people. On all leading questions agitating the public mind I will express my views to Congress and arge them according to my judgment; and when I think it advisable I will always exercise my constitutional privilege of interposing a vero to defeat measures which I oppose; but all laws shall be faithfully executed whether they meet my approval or not. I shall on all subjects have a policy to recommen enforce against the will of the people. Laws are a guern all alike-those opposed to as well as time who favor them. I know no method to secure the repeal of had or obnoxious laws so effective as their stringent execution. The country having just emerged from a great rebellion, many passions will come before it for settlement, in the next four years, which proceding Administrations never had to deal with.
