

NO LOW RATES FOR TEACHERS

Matson Company Says It Can Not Reduce Fare for

Difficulties have appeared in the at tempt of the officers of the National Education Association to secure special rates of fare for Hawaiian teachers who wish to attend the convention of the association in San Francisco next July

Superintendent of Public Instruction Willis T. Pope has received a letter from James A. Barr of the committee on publicity and attendance, enclosing a copy of a letter received by him from the Matson Navigation Company. This letter, written on March 5, reads as fol-

"We are in receipt of your valued favor of the 2nd inst., in connection with an excursion rate for teachers from the Hawalian Islands to attend the N. E. A. Convention-to be held in San Francisco July 8 to 14, 1911-and regret to state that we can not consistently make any lower rate than our regular fares. Our steamers have only limited passenger accommodations, and we have never experienced any difficulty in selling all the accommodations we have on each trip to passengers paying their full fare. If we were to make any lower rates to the teachers we would we compelled to turn passengers away who would be willing to pay the regular tariff."

Attorneys Appear to Voice Objections to Pending House Measures.

Three House bills affecting corporaons particularly were up for discus sion at a public hearing called yes terday afternoon by the House judidary committee, and the hearing brought out a number of corporation attorneys determined to slaughter the measures forthwith.

Against an array of Honolulu's legal talent appeared only Attorney C. W. Ashford, who spoke on behalf of tw of the bills, the third having no spon ho whatever. No decision was reach ed by the committee, which will delib erate over the arguments made and announce its conclusions in the form of a report to the House

The three bills were H. B. No. 36 relating to the issuance of writs of quo warranto, H. B. 58, which is an employers' liability act, and H. B. 134, which gives the Board of Super visors power to regulate and fix the rates of public service corporations.

All of the attorneys took the same line of argument

Ashford, made a hot argument for the bill, declaring that he had applied to the attorney-general in the past for a writ of quo warranto to investigate the Rapid Transit Company and had been refused, applied also to the governor and was refused and then appealed to President Taft. "Yesterlay I received a letter from the secretary of the interior in answer to my letter to the president in which it is stated that whereas the statutes of the Territory of Hawaii give unlimit-ed discretion in such matters to the attorney-general, the president cannot afford relief," stated Ashford, and went on to argue that the attorneygeneral can tie up needed action by simply refusing to issue the writ.

visor Austin, in order to deliver them from the clutches of loan sharks who have in the past been fattening on the interest charged the laborers on short term loans at usurious rates. "When the laborers are paid only monthly, as is the case at present they are continually running short of money," said Austin last week. the end of the month draws near, they

find themselves short of cash. As a consequence they go to a certain mo-ney lending outfit which charges them interest at the rate of five per cent a month. Of course, the consequence 15 that the laborers are losing a great percentage of their wages.

"Now, the best way of stopping this abuse is to stop the necessity for the borrowing of money, and this we can best do by paying the laborers of every week. The law does not specity when Supervisor Lewis and myself must pay the laborers in our district, and we can do it weekly, if we please, and we have decided to do so "We have heard a great deal of the We have made the necessary arrangethe pay roll, and will then get either Supervisor Lewis or my self, as the case may be, to sign it. He will then present the pay roll to the bank, which will let him have the money called for in it. Kealoha will pay off the laborers, and will receive receipts for the money in duplicate, one of the copies being given to the bank. the end of the month the road supervisor will make out his monthly pay the usual way, whereupon the auditor will make out a warrant for the total amount thereof in favor of the bank, instead of making out a lot of individual warrants. The system is simplicity itself, and it should pretty nearly put a stop to the five per cent a month loan business.'
