### Where Are They?

On July 9th, 1893—nearly a year ago—the following letter was sent to Mr. Blount:

HEADQUARTERS ANNEX'S CLUB,  
Honolulu, H.I. July 9, 1893.

In answer to your communication of May, I would say, that the names on our great register to date are 5,500, and that we are advised of 190-odd on rolls, not yet entered, on the other islands. Of those which are entered, I would estimate that 1,218 are American, being 90-odd per cent. of the total number of Americans on the islands, and 20-odd per cent. of those on the club rolls. English 251, being 26 per cent. of those on the islands, and 4 per cent. of club rolls. One thousand and twenty-two Hawaiians, being 11 per cent. of those on the islands and 18 per cent. of club rolls. 2,261 Portuguese, being 73 per cent. of Portuguese on the islands and 41 per cent. of club rolls. Sixty-nine Norwegians, being 50 per cent. of those on the islands and 1 per cent. of club rolls. Three hundred and fifty-one Germans, being 53 per cent. of those on the islands and 6 per cent. of club rolls. Others 328 unclassified.

It seems that the membership of the annexation club has not increased very much since July 9th 1893 to judge from the number registered. All on the register are presumably members of the club, and all members of the club have presumably registered. But we think it only right that Mr. J. W. Jones or some other highman of the "Headquarters" should come forward and explain the discrepancy between the number of alleged members of the club and the following officially registered supporters of the p. g.

By nativity, the register is as follows:

The main portion of those who have registered are men who under ordinary circumstances would not be entitled to vote. The army furnishes a large contingent, and government officials swell the list considerably. As soon as the names of those registered are published, we shall analyse their voting capacity under generally adopted constitutional principles. As an example of the kind of men who are to have the privilege of calling a constitutional convention, we publish the nationalities of that peculiar mixture that compose Mr. Dole's army, as it appeared a few months ago. There were at that time 250 men (?) and they were classified as follows:

This beautiful assembly that had resided from two weeks to some years in the country is the

great standby in the p. g. voting list. Add to them all the government officials and private employees of members of the government that have been coerced by threats of dismissal to take the oath and it becomes a deep mystery what has become of all the independent patriots who posed as "the people" before the world through statements by Stevens, Alexander, Thurston and the rest of the crowd that has attempted to blind the American Administration and fill the ears of America's people with falsehoods. If the p. g. in the election had followed the principal that they propose to carry out in the new constitution that only naturalized citizens shall have the exercise of the franchise in Hawaii where would the government stand today? How many of the men who have registered and who propose to form a government in this country have showed their alleged patriotism and love and good-will towards these islands by becoming citizens of Hawaii? Even such good and great patriots (!) like Star Smith and Dr. McGrew register under much protest. Since 1876 only 115 Americans have naturalized. A total of 306 foreigners is all that have seen fit during the last eighteen years to take the oath of allegiance to Hawaii and assume not alone the rights (they are always willing to do that) but also the duties of a good and loyal citizen. The registration has illustrated the true character of the adventurers who claim the right to run Hawaii and rule the Hawaiian people. That they will utterly fail is clear to anybody who have studied the history of the world during the last century. Minority government is against the will of the people cannot last. And the p. g. will never get the people with it as long as it is composed of selfish, greedy, bigotted arrogant, purse-proud "missionaries."

### Mistaken Indifference.

We hear that Mr. A. F. Judd, our esteemed Chief Justice, has stated that "even if the Holomua charge him with having committed a murder," he would not take the trouble to deny the charge. Mr. Judd is wrong. The HOLOMUA is read by a great number of people in Hawaii-nee. It appears in the Hawaiian language both in a daily and in a weekly issue, and it finds its way from Hawaii to Niuhau. The charges, that we have presented against Mr. Judd will be read and will be believed by all intelligent men in Hawaii until Mr. Judd takes the trouble to make an explanation and "condescends" to notice the most popular journal in Hawaii. Mr. Judd's sneers, in private conversation, against this journal or its editor don't worry us a bit nor do they help him. We are not after him personally. He would be too insignificant both for our pen or our steel to take any notice of. But as holding the highest judicial office in this country, and representing the dignity of the judicial honor of Hawaii, he should not hesitate in responding to charges publicly made that reflect on his honor, his integrity and his ability. Mr. Judd may represent the 1507 registered voters on Oahu. He is welcome to such representation, and we trust that he feels proud to find about 500 ignorant Portuguese or 185 hired Hawaiians behind him. We represent the PEOPLE, and it is to them that Mr. Judd owes an explanation of the dual capacity in which he lately has appeared. Let him explain how he can be a Chief Justice and guardian in a suit before the courts. Let him tell us how he can watch the interests of the Brown children—strangers to him—and yet look after the conflicting interest of the Judd children, that is his children. Mr. Judd is a public man holding an office of vast importance. The assumed indifference, and the implied insults against this paper will not prevent the people from calling. Explain, Mr. Judd! Explain.

### Something Rotten.

The arrest this morning of "Bosen Ben" with 12 tins of opium in his possession, by police officers not a block from the office of the Port Surveyor indicates that there is something radically wrong in the Customs department. Since the revolution every p. g. man from Dole to Thurston has exhausted his breath and the patience of his audience by telling about the corruption of the alleged opium ring that controlled the monarchical government in Hawaii. They have never brought forward any proofs of their lying assertions nor have they ever drawn comparisons between the "then" and "now." Under the alleged rotten monarchical government the price of opium was about four times as high as it is today. Then, seizures were frequently made and it was hazardous for any man to go into the smuggling. Now under the super-virtuous p. g. and its incorruptible Collector-general not one pound of opium has been seized by the Customs authorities, but the guards have devoted their time to stop and annoy respectable citizens at the gate who were carrying out a bundle of newspapers, a pound of candy or a piece of juicy California beef or an orange. Such trifles never escape the vigilance of the old fossils in Jim Castle's employ, but Casseiros and "Bosen Ben" or anybody else can march out under the very noses of the guards carrying all the opium they may desire. If this government does not want to be stamped as being the most incompetent if not the most corrupt the officials will have to get a move on and perform the legitimate duties for which they are paid by the taxpayers. The Custom House scandal has gone far enough. If the heads of that bureau would devote more time to the business of the country and less to ward-politics the country would be a great deal better off than it is now.

### Suicide??

The editor of the *Advertiser* was seen hurrying along the street in the direction of his office yesterday forenoon with a coil of new rope in his hand. It was suggested by a friend, who noted the uncanny look in the editor's eye, that the new purchase had probably been suggested by a suicidal mania which in turn had been induced in the editorial mind (?) by reading the registration returns, showing that the Portuguese outnumber the Americans upon the roll, nearly two to one, also that only a little over 100 Hawaiians have been coerced into taking the P. G. oath; also that something more than one-third of the registered voters (?) belong to "Coxey" Dole's army of tramps and bummers who drifted upon this beach since January 17th, 1893, and have earned the right to vote by grace of the provision admitting to that privilege all who have borne arms in defense of the P. G.

### Professional.

Honolulu is blessed with a number of theatrical stars, and kindred spirits at present. The members of the Dailey Stock Company (comedy) arrived more than a week ago, and the proprietor and manager-in-chief of the Hawaiian "Cancan" at the Midwinter Fete, arrived on Saturday last per Australia.

Rats is pursuing a more dignified and proper course of late. Poetry is now only occasional indulged in, none original.

The action of the President of the Board of Health, Smith, in his unwarranted insult to newspaper men by refusing them the usual courtesies on the late trip to Molokai, should receive endorsement or censure at the tomorrow's meeting of the Board of Health. The press here has censured him, will the Board?

### Through Their Hats.

Everybody wants an explanation. Somebody wants to know what we are coming to. Somebody desires to learn what Admirals Walker and Irvin are boring for. Somebody wants to know who owned "Bosen Ben's" opium. Somebody wants to know who "Ned" is and to whom he is to be applied. Somebody asks who kicked (except Miss Josephine Gassman) against the Pink Dominoes. Somebody wants to know what Thurston is up to. In fact everybody wants an explanation—even the HOLOMUA, from A. Francis Judd. The explanation is easily given. They all want to talk through their hats and Girdler on Kaahumano street has got the very hats. But he won't have them very long. He has placed everything in that line on his counter for two days only. They are pretty, fashionable, way up and easy to "talk through" and the cost exactly 50 cents a piece. Take your choice and get an explanation.

THE *Tiser* truly states that a committee of the Advisory Council were "sitting" on the accounts of the Attorney General's department yesterday. It is to be hoped that on next Thursday the Council will "sit" on him. He makes no friends for his party.

An excellent illustration of the general incompetency of a portion of the army was displayed, under the patronage of the lieutenant-colonel—with the rank-of-commander-in-chief last evening at Palace square.

Among the visitors was one James Bennett a well known character of the city and who is better known by his sobriquet of "Bosn Ben" a name obtained while serving in the Hawaiian gunboat Kaimiloa of past history. Ben had walked and talked for sometime in front of the Customs' guards when finally he took a side trip to the Inter-Island wharf. His movement being suspicious caused a police-officer to walk towards him when Ben's guilty conscience started his legs and away went Ben on the run. The policeman gave chase, blew his whistle and thus interested others. 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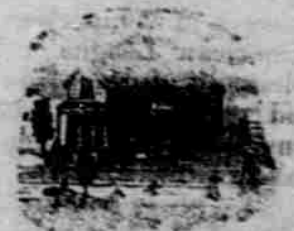
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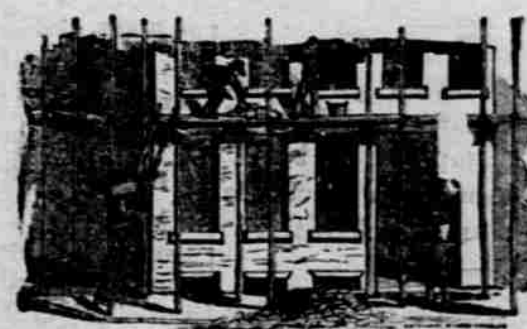
