Exhibitions

Artists of Hawaii 1985

Second Floor Galleries November 29–December 29, 1985

The Academy's 35th annual juried exhibition presents works in various media by artists from throughout the state. Over 320 artists from Hawaii submitted 765 works for jurying by Linda L. Cathcart, director of the Contemporary Arts Museum, Houston.

The invitational section of the exhibition, honoring four artists who have made significant achievements in the visual arts in Hawaii, includes Lucille Cooper (ceramics), Henry Inn (photography), Sueko Kimura (painting), and Louis Pohl (painting).


The exhibition is supported by the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts and the McInerny Foundation.

A members' preview reception honoring the artists will be held on Wednesday, November 26, from 8 to 10 p.m.

Invited Artists 1985

The invitational section of *Artists of Hawaii 1985* includes the works of four Hawaii artists who have contributed significantly to the world of art.

Lucille Cooper works in several media: oil, water color, acrylic, and clay-andfiber. Her ceramic work of clay and fiber will be exhibited in Artists of Hawaii 1985. Since her arrival in Hawaii in 1947, Lucille Cooper has contributed widely to the arts. She pioneered the art therapy program at the Hawaii State Hospital and initiated the Ala Moana Easter Art Festival while serving as president of the Windward Art League. She has also served as a commissioner and chairman of the Commission on the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts and as chairman of the Committee of Art in Public Places (SFCA). As lecturer at the University of Hawaii Curriculum Center, she has taught ceramics, ceramic design, ceramic jewelry design, basic design, and painting. The winner of numerous awards, Lucille Cooper recently completed a 32-foot clayand-fiber mural, Reef II, for the Chief Petty Officers Club at Pearl Harbor. Her works are in the collections of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, the Honolulu Advertiser, Hawaii Loa College, Castle and Cooke, American Factors, and many private and commercial collectors.



Doyen of Hawaii's photographers Henry Inn was born in Guangdong Province, China, in 1899. His acclaimed photographs in Chinese Houses and Gardens, published in 1940 and revised in 1950, were taken in 1927 and 1936. Some of these photographs are the only remaining documentation of structures destroyed in the 1930s and 1940s. A second volume, Tropical Blooms, appeared in 1944 and consists of 40 photographs of flower arrangements created by Mr. Inn. His third work, Hawaiian Types, 1945, is a selection of 50 photographs of women representing the different ethnic groups and mixtures in Hawaii. In 1957 Mr. Inn was awarded honorary membership in the prestigious Photographic Club of Paris. At the time the only other American photographers so honored were Ansel Adams and Edward Weston. World War II and China's political revolution forced Mr. Inn to suspend his photographic trips to China. However, since 1975 he has made annual trips and is working on a revised, third edition of Chinese Houses and Gardens. Henry Inn will have a solo exhibition of photographs at the Honolulu Academy of Arts from February 13 to March 23, 1986.

Sueko Kimura, born in 1912 in Hawaii, studied art at the University of Hawaii and received a B.A. and B.F.A. She also studied at Chouinard Art Institute, Columbia University, Brooklyn Art School, and the Art Students League. She taught at the University of Hawaii from 1952 to 1977, retiring as professor emeritus of art. As president of the Hawaii Painters and Sculptors League, she initiated eight free public lecture series on art. Sueko Kimura has also served as a member of the Western Association of College Accreditation Committee and has served the art community in jury duties, critiques and advisory capacities. Individual exhibitions of her works have been held at UH George Art Gallery, Gima's Art Gallery, the Contemporary Arts Center, and the Church of the Crossroads Art Gallery; group shows at the Brooklyn Museum, Argent Gallery, Long Island Museum, Wichita Art Museum, Kyoto Museum of Art, Biblioteca Americana (Budapest), as well as many Hawaii locales, UH Art Faculty Show, Hawaii Women Artists Show, Japanese Chamber of Commerce, Artists of Hawaii, Centennial Exhibition and others. Winners of numerous awards. her works are in the collections of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, the State Department of Education Artmobile, Contemporary Arts Center, Hawaii Kai Development, International Savings and Loan and private collectors in Hawaii, the mainland, and Australia.


Painter and printmaker Louis Pohl was born in Ohio and graduated from the Cincinnati Art Academy in 1940 and continued his studies at the Art Students League in New York. He became supervisor of graphic services for the Federal Works Agency and later designed visual training aids for the army and navy training programs. In 1945 Louis Pohl came to Hawaii to teach at the Honolulu Academy of Arts. He also taught at Kamehameha Schools and the University of Hawaii Summer Session. Louis Pohl has exhibited widely in local and mainland galleries. Individual shows have been presented at the Cincinnati Art Museum, Honolulu Academy of Arts, Gauguin Musée in Tahiti, Contemporary Arts Center, Anderson Fine Arts Center (Indiana), Galerie des Deux Mondes (New York), Paraguay: Americano in Acuncion, Paraguay. Mr. Pohl has served as president of Honolulu Printmakers and Hawaii Printmakers and Sculptors League. He is listed in Who's Who in American Art and Men and Women of Hawaii.

Eighteenth-Century French Drawings

of old master drawings has been weak in its representation of 18th-century French drawings, with only two works, landscapes with figures by Hubert Robert and Jean-Baptiste Pillement. Through a generous gift of Mrs. Frank A. Hecht, who also gave the terracotta bust of a man by Augustin Pajou, illustrated in last month's Calendar News, the Academy has been able to add six 18th-century French drawings, three of which are illustrated here. These acquisitions give a greater continuity in this important area and provide an excellent complement to the 19th-century French drawings in the collection, including Renoir's study for Dance in the Country, Degas' Woman Sponging Her Back, and Cézanne's sketch of one of the figures in his famous Card Players.

To highlight the new acquisitions, a small exhibition of French drawings from the Academy's collection and local private collections will be on view in gallery 9 beginning November 8 and continuing through December.

The newly acquired works by Natoire, Mallet and Augustin, the works mentioned above by Robert, Pillemont, Renoir, Degas, and Cézanne as well as drawings by Matisse, Delvaux, and Dubuffet will be discussed in a Spotlight Talk by Bernice Thomas, instructor in the gallery education department, on Sunday, November 24, at 2 p.m.



Slide Collection Receives \$5,000 Grant

The Samuel N. and Mary Castle Foundation has given the Academy a \$5,000 grant for the expansion of the slide collection. This important collection, which includes slides of works of art from around the world, is a resource for curators, scholars, teachers, and students.

Doris Lutzky, keeper of the slide collection, reports that, since April when the grant was received, almost 1,000 slides of Japanese art have been completed with more in progress. "We have purchased the important and long-awaited reissues of slides on Chinese paintings at the Cleveland Museum of Art and the Metropolitan Museum of Art, a total of 1,472 slides. We are extremely grateful to the Foundation for their generous assistance."

Christo to speak in Academy Distinguished Lecture Series on December 9 at 7 p.m.

Christo to Speak in Distinguished Lecture Series

Christo, the highly original artist who recently completed the huge Pont Neuf wrapping project in Paris, will present an illustrated lecture, "Christo — The Pont Neuf Wrapped and Four Works in Progress," on Monday, December 9, at 7 p.m.

Christo has transformed natural and man-made environments into social and artistic statements that can be experienced by thousands of persons. His projects, accomplished with the help of his wife and business manager Jeanne-Claude, include "Valley Curtain," "Running Fence," and "Surrounded Islands." The \$2.3 million project to wrap the Pont Neuf involved 450 workers, including bargemen, rock climbers, and crane operators, who shrouded the famous 16th-century bridge that crosses the Seine linking the university area, the Ile de la Cité and the Right Bank.

Admission to the lecture is \$7 (members \$6, students \$5). Tickets may be purchased in advance from the Gallery Education Program (enclose a

stamped, self-addressed envelope) or in person at the box office at the Academy's main entrance on Beretania Street. Seating is limited and it is strongly urged that tickets be purchased in advance as tickets may not be available at the door.

Refreshments will be served after the lecture and members of the audience will have the opportunity to meet the speaker.

The Academy's series of informal gallery talks will continue this month on Sunday, November 24, at 2 p.m. Dr. Bernice Thomas, instructor in gallery education, will discuss the works of Robert, Renoir, Matisse, and Cézanne among others in the Academy collection. The talk will also highlight several new acquisitions. Please assemble at the reception desk by 2 p.m.

Gallery Tours on Traditional Arts

Group tours on the art of the traditional cultures of Africa, the Pacific, and the Americas, including pre-Colombian and North American Indian objects, can be arranged. Works of clay, wood, shell, feathers, and fibers are discussed in relationship to man's interaction with his environment. A group may wish to concentrate on a particular culture, for example, Hawaiian culture and its relationship to other Pacific cultures.

Japanese Art Lectures

The Academy Lecture Series, "The Way of the Brush: Aspects of Japanese Art," continues this month with three lectures. The last lecture on November 21 will be the one hundredth since the series began in September 1982. Over 18,000 persons have attended these art history lectures given on Thursdays at 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

November 7: "Water Clear, Fish Visible: Zen Paintings from the Muromachi Period" by Dr. Steven Goldberg, assistant professor of art at the University of Hawaii. Zen (Chan, in Chinese) Buddhism arrived from China at the end of the 12th century and appealed deeply to some aspects of the Japanese character. With it came strong influences of Song China, such as the technique of monochromatic ink painting. By the Muromachi period Zen dominated Japan's religious, intellectual, and artistic life. Japanese painters, many of them monks, created remarkable scrolls depicting eccentric figures drawn from Zen or Daoist legends, symbolic animals, and idealized landscapes. Famous Zen artists, such as Shubun, Sesshu, Shugetsu, and Sesson led this renaissance of Chinese tradition in Japan.

November 14: "Beauty Comes from Use: Japanese Folk Textiles" by Reiko Brandon, artist and curator of the textile collection. From Hokkaido to Okinawa, rural women and girls between their farming and household chores — created some of the world's loveliest textiles. Imbued with an innate sensibility for beauty, these utilitarian textiles have survived despite long years of use. This lecture focuses on Late Edo and Meiji pieces, many from the Academy collection, including rice-paste resist, embroidery, and direct painting methods. Kasuri, or pre-dyed, best known of Japanese textiles, and shibori, or tie-dyed, will be fully discussed.




Lectures continue this month in the Academy Fall Lecture Series, "The Way of the Brush: Aspects of Japanese Art"

November 21: "A Synthesis of East and West: Modern Japanese Prints" by Oliver Statler, writer and adjunct professor at the University of Hawaii. The legacy of traditional woodblock prints is apparent in the work of modern print artists, who have actually revived the classical art of woodblock printing, infusing it with artistic and technical innovation. The traditional cooperative method of artist, carver, printer and publisher has been replaced by the modern artists performing many of the functions themselves. New themes and motifs are introduced, enriching and broadening the subject matter. Often with bold colors and modified methods, the modern prints are a unique blend of Western and Asian influences.

Argentina: "Camila," 1984, directed by Maria Luisa Bemberg, is one of the most popular Argentine films. Camila and the priest's romanticism and idealism expose the complicity of control the church, state, and influential families had over everyone's lives.
