

There is one phase of the immigration question hard to write about plainly without offending the modesty of readers, yet not less necessary to be written about, talked about and acted upon than any topic touching the wellbeing of the Hawaiian race. The introduction of unmarried males in large numbers must inevitably hasten the extinction of the Hawaiian race. These last immigrants are men-presumably with the passions of other men; and without those aids to self-restraint that lie in high ideals of female chastity. The Japanese is unlikely to be more scrupulous than his Chinese or Caucassian fellow, nor are the daughters of the land likely to be more coy towards his advances. It is necessary to write plainly on this topic. Male immigration greatly in excess of female immigration must inevitably mean more immorality, more prostitution, more rapid ruin of native girls, more sure unfitting of native women for the honorable task, the sacred duty of becoming mothers. No one better knows the truth of what we write than the author of "Sanitary Instruction for Hawaiians." He had never a better opportunity to speak and act for the race he professes to love.
