DPW head grilled on roads

Lack of funds and inadequate equipment are not the only causes of bad roads in Saipan. Inefficient and uncooperative personnel of the Department of Public Works aggravate the problem.

This surfaced during a public hearing at the Legislature Wednesday, prompting DPW Director John Pangelinan to say that "if the department needs overhaul, I'm willing to do that."

Rep. William Ada said the department needed "a complete overhaul

because it was suffering from an epidemic of equipment breakdown."

Pangelinan, in response to the same question from members of the House

Committee on Judiciary and Governmental Operations on the cause of bad roads in Saipan, said: "I sound like a broken record. I keep saying we need funds and we need equipment."

Later, he said that because of the many things he heard during the hearing regarding which he was not aware of, Pangelinan asked the committee to give him 30 days "to give you what is needed for road repair and service. Funding is not the only thing needed."

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Audit report will have a lot of bad news for NMI

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The ink isn't even dry on the preliminary draft of the first-ever full scale audit of the CNMI government, but already word has leaked out that the figures will show "significant" deficits, as one CPA said. But, it could be as late as Easter before the final report is completed, approved, and published.

Public Auditor Scott Tan and Leslie C. Zuroske, senior account auditor with KMPG, won't talk about

'bottom line numbers' until governor Pedro P. Tenorio returns from the governors conference in mid-March. They did agree to discuss the audit in "general terms."

Zuroske said in an interview Feb. 16 that his company had been in the throes of an audit since July, and the final report

Many of the tongues wagging throughout the Commonwealth lately will now have a lot of crow to chew - especially a copy editor of the Pacific Daily News. Deputy U.S. Attorney George Proctor ended the suspense of last month's sealed indictment Wednesday when he announced the person charged.

Who was indicted? It wasn't CNMI personnel officer Jesus Mafnas, as one

PDN headline heralded a few weeks ago. It was Francisco DeLeon Guerrero.

That PDN story didn't say Mafnas was indicted, but a copy editor responsible for writing headlines did - bringing on a wholesale exchange of gossip about Mafnas.

Guerrero was indicted by the grand jury on Dec. 19 for his alleged role in bringing in almost 100 pounds of marijuana onboard the Stella-1 a

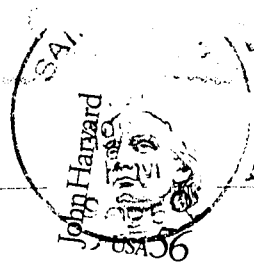
Been wondering why there are a lot of "Temp" plates on Saipan? It's because no "permanent" plates have been available. That's all going to change soon.

Broken Promises

"Retirement" ... what a beautiful word. Many of us work hard all of our lives so we can have a few years to enjoy ourselves without the pressure of work. Yes, retiring is a wonderful thing. ... But, after last week's story which shows that the CNMI government is cheating their employees out of millions of dollars in matching retirement payments, we wonder if many of our loyal public servants are going to even have any money to retire on. The Variety thinks that the legislature needs to take a long and hard look at what's going on here and do something about it before it's too late.

We discussed the story with a member of the current administration's staff, and the newspaper was told "off-the-record" that the present administration "has other priorities right now" and hasn't had the time to address the retirement problem. No timetable of when they would "have time" was brought forth, however by the administration employee.

Is that any kind of an attitude to take about the lives of many people who put their faith in our leadership? We feel that the government has given away millions of dollars of the retirees money to people who don't necessarily deserve it. Plus, we feel their "welshing" on the full contribution towards employee retirement is a darn shame - and may even be a crime.

To make matters worse, the government has also compounded the problem by hiring even MORE people to replace those who have retired, despite "cost-cutting legislation" designed to close un-needed positions.

When will the ever-tightening circle of fiscal irresponsibility come to a stop?

This newspaper knows that confrontational tactics are not the way of the islands. We know that the people - in the past - have let their leaders do what they thought was best. But now the truth is coming out little by little, and we find our leadership has no power to stop the situation - or won't use the power out of fear of hurting someone's family feelings and losing a few votes.

The retirement funds will be just the tip of the iceberg. We have unconfirmed information that the upcoming audit of the CNMI finances will show even more MILLIONS have been squandered in questionable buying procedures, projects that were approved and paid for, but never completed; shoddy construction work on public buildings and roads; overpayment of administration and legislative employees. ... the list will go on and on.

Our government makes big noises about wanting to govern itself - how it's "sovereign". But with the honor of self-government comes the responsibility of self-restraint and wise usage of natural and fiscal resources.

We feel the legislature should convene an investigative committee to find out why the retirement fund promises have not been kept by the government. Who's fault was it?

Did the legislature budget the money? If so, why wasn't it spent in the correct manner?

If they didn't legislate the money, then the Commonwealth is going to have to "bite the bullet" and find the money somewhere - even if it means laying off a few score employees who are not really needed to run the government for a while.

Above all - we need to adopt Guam Governor Ada's ideas on a hiring freeze in government. The CNMI must be run like a business.

This newspaper also suggests that the laws regarding retirement be amended if possible to make a mandatory length of service to the CNMI - not TT or other past governments, of at least 10 years before being able to retire. Nothing can be done about the giveaways which have happened in the past, but something can be done to stop it in the future.

If no one will act in a responsible manner, then perhaps we need to go back under the TT - as bad as it was. At least we could complain to someone in Washington who's relatives didn't work in the CNMI government.

"Discount" for CNMI retirees?

The Retirement Program has recommended to the Saipan Chamber of Commerce a proposal which would give all retirees at least 15 percent discount on all purchases made in local stores here.

The purpose of this recommendation is to cover cost of living allowance in view of our inability to come with additional revenue to accommodate this need. The proposal, according to Tom Aldan, will be presented to the entire Chamber for consideration.

The Chamber's Executive Director Gabriel Boyer said that the proposed program will require the commitment of businessmen here. It is a legitimate proposal. I might note that while employees in both the government and private sector get salary increases via an annual increment or promotions, retirees' monthly income remain basically the same. Therefore, their purchasing power has really been diminished by triple digit stagflation.

I think we owe to this group of people who have worked for more than 30 years serving

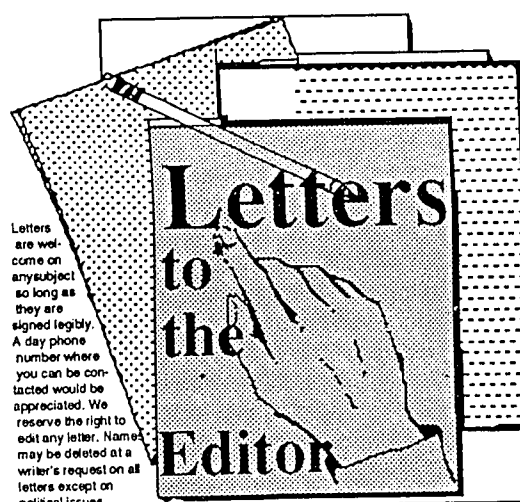

Machine operators respond:

Dear Editor:

In response to your editorial of February 12, we would like to point out some facts about poker machines that you failed to check into before you made your attack on us.

First, the Commonwealth stands to lose substantial economic benefits provided by our industry, including the loss of some 200 jobs now employing locals if poker machines are eliminated.

Of course, we pay gross receipts taxes just like any other business here which go toward the CNMI General Fund. In addition, we also pay the highest license fees for poker machines in the world. These license fees support two very important programs that benefit the local community: The CNMI Retirement Fund, and the Job Training Partnership Act.

This year, license fees will contribute 14% of the total CNMI's retirement fund, or \$700,000.00. Because of the scheduled increases in fees from \$3,000.00 per machine to \$5,000.00 per machine over the next three years, the benefit to the Retirement Fund will increase to \$93,000.00 in 1989 through 1991

and \$1,165,000.00 in the year 1992 and beyond.

In your newspaper last week, we read that the CNMI Government hasn't been putting in some \$10,000.00 it currently owes the Retirement Fund. If the Fund also loses the revenue our industry contributes, what will be left for future retirees?

In addition to what we contribute for retirees, \$80,000.00 from our license fees goes toward the Job Training Partnership Act to train local people. This will also increase as the license fees increase over the next three years, meaning more local people will receive much needed job training as a result of our industry.

One criticism we often hear about poker machines that we would like to dispute is the statement that locals are the only ones playing the machines. While some locals do play, the large majority of machines are located in tourist areas and in gamerooms where they are played by non-residents.

Saipan, being a small island, it's easy to understand how the stories of a few local people who have had problems controlling their use of the machines spread.

the column that way - I certainly apologize.

However, I think the judge are on the same side in many things - but we just go about things differently. My point was that if today's young people expect to succeed in tomorrow's world and Commonwealth, that no private company will ever accept "culture" as an excuse for ignorance and just plain laziness. The Commonwealth is fiscally and diplomatically bound to the United States - who's official language is English. While Chamorro and Carolinian are noble tongues - they are also parochial. Try ordering a bunch of merchandise or conducting long-distance business in Chamorro, it will quickly become evident that business operates on English in both the western and eastern parts of the world.

It's impossible to get a good-paying job in the U.S. or in any part of the world where English is the language of business if you can't understand or communicate in that tongue. It has nothing to do with culture - it's education.

Yes, I probably speak and write English better than some people of the islands, but that's because I chose to get an education in that language ("chose" is not quite correct - I was FORCED.) Many U.S. citizens are just as - or more - illiterate than people from the Commonwealth. It's a matter of personal choice - not culture.

It's also true that I don't speak Chamorro or Carolinian. I wasn't educated in those languages. I make an attempt to learn a few words out of respect for the people here.

I certainly don't have the judge's education or background, but I don't resent his success. He chose that path - and culture didn't have a thing to do with it - it was his personal ambition and determination.

Culture didn't have a thing to do with it. One local lawyer said that he/she felt the judge was "off-base" using his position as a judge to write such letters. I disagreed, saying that just because Villagomez is a judge does not abrogate his rights of free

quirements of public hearing and debate on the floor of the legislature not to mention the good intentions and wise decision of the Governor when he signed it into law and had it published. There is therefore no need for any public hearing nor regulation because it is not an administrative order of ruling but is a law.

The implementation of the law will:

1-redound to the benefit of the resident workers because it will encourage employers to hire resident workers as it will be more expensive for them to employ nonresident workers;

2-weed-out fly-by-night or irresponsible entrepreneurs who are mostly foreigners because it would mean that for them to hire nonresident workers, they must have the necessary capital in the Commonwealth in order for them to make a go of their business;

3-deter unnecessary hiring of nonresident workers because of the magnitude of the expenses involved not to mention the more tedious paperwork that they have to comply and do in order for them to employ non-resident workers;

4-assure the foreign governments that their citizens and/or nationals recruited to work in the CNMI are fully covered by a Cash Bond and/or Surety Bond to guaranty the faithful performance of the duties and responsibilities of their employers;

5-suffice to ease-up if not totally eradicate the problems confronting the Labor office whenever an employer fails to faithfully perform his duties and responsibilities in accordance with law or whenever the Labor Office find just cause for the repatriation of the nonresident workers to the country of origin.

Furthermore, the Employers of nonresident workers have the option to either:

a) buy a Cash Bond from the CNMI Treasury in the total

amount as computed by the Labor Office; or
b) secure a Surety Bond from any of the recognized Insurance Companies licensed to do business in the Commonwealth in the field of Surety/Bonding, in the total amount as computed by the Labor Office.

In Guam, they used to require \$5,000.00 bond for each alien worker. Now, it is even more expensive since they raised it to 4% of the project cost.

To quote a member of the Legislature he said "when will you buy insurance? When the typhoon has struck?"

It is therefore imperative that all nonresident workers, in the CNMI should be bonded.

In view whereof, and as a local, I firmly believe that it is to the best interest of the people of the CNMI that bonding of nonresident workers be required as it is being required by law today.

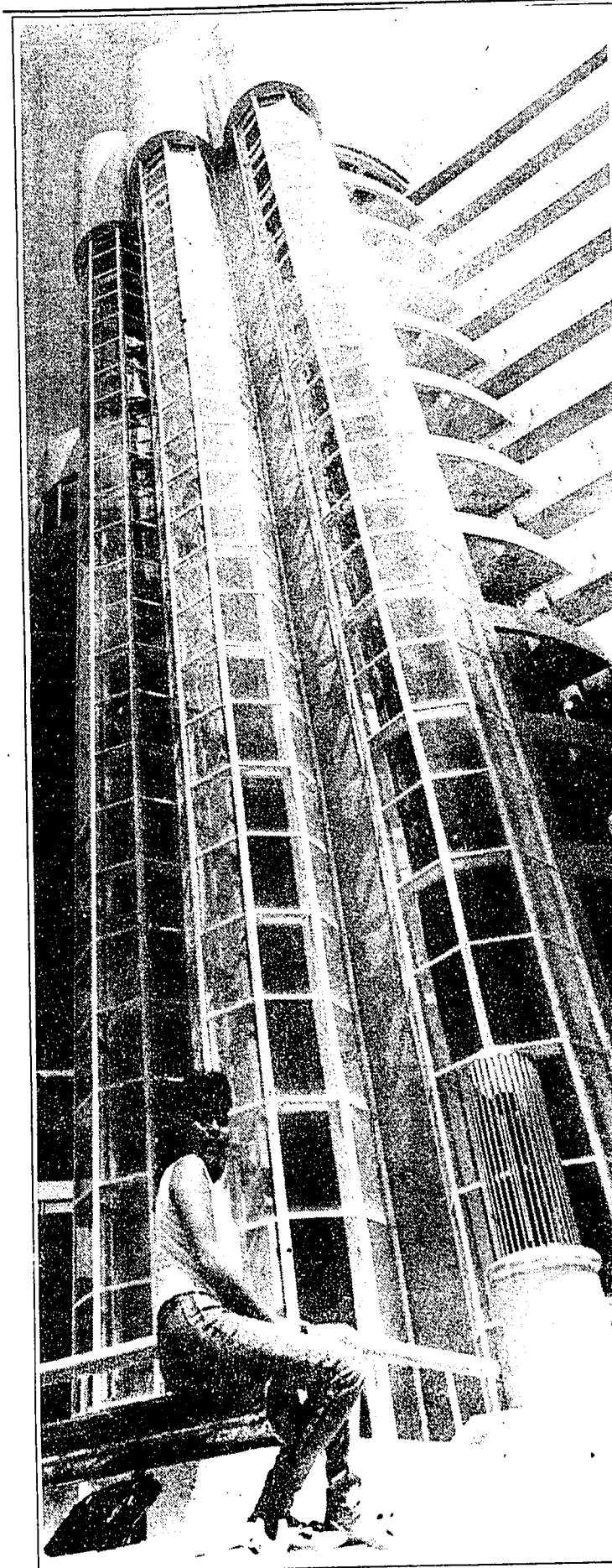

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Burglars plead guilty to crimes

Two Tinian residents pleaded guilty Feb. 11 to several charges of burglary and theft.

Joe John C. Reyes pleaded guilty to two counts of burglary, three counts of theft, a count of attempted theft and a count of forgery. Timothy A. Funkugub pleaded guilty to two counts of theft and two counts of burglary.

Following the admissions Judge Ramon G. Villagomez sentenced Funkugub to one year probation. He was also ordered to perform 50 hours of community work and pay half of the amount of damages caused to the Micronesian Development Co.

Reyes was sentenced to three years in jail, all suspended except for the first six months. He would be placed under probation for the suspended portion of the sentence.

Villagomez also ordered Reyes to pay half of the amount of the damages to MDC and the full amount of the stolen checks.

The two, who broke into the MDC building in June and July last year, were first named in two charges of theft and two of burglary. Assistant Attorney General Edward Hayden filed a superceding information in December and added a count of theft, a count of attempted theft and forgery to the original complaint.

Guerrero resolution helps TT workers get their back wages

About 300 Commonwealth residents are expected to receive a total of \$7 million out of the \$20 million awarded by the District Court for back wages of Micronesian employees of the Trust Territory government.

Senator Herman R. Guerrero has introduced a joint resolution to help CNMI residents and other Micronesians get hold of the money as soon as possible.

Senate Joint Resolution: 6-2, now under review by the Committee on Federal Relations and International Affairs, urges the United States not to continue with its appeal on the District Court decision. It also asks the U.S. congress to "immediately appropriate sufficient funds to pay the

Micronesian employees... in order to remedy the grave injustice caused by discrimination by the Trust Territory government..."
"The award by the court merely

represents income these individuals would have received as loyal TT employees, except for the discriminatory pay policies of the Trust Territory government..."

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BOE budget passes the House Feb. 11

The House of Representatives passed a bill Feb. 11 to finance the operations of the Board of Elections in fiscal year 1988.

House Bill 6-49 introduced by Appropriations Chairman David C. Sablan provides a total of \$161,300 as BOE's fiscal year 1988 budget.

The board, according to Executive Director Juan M. Diaz, need the money to be able to conduct the March 5 municipal council elections in Rota and Tinian.

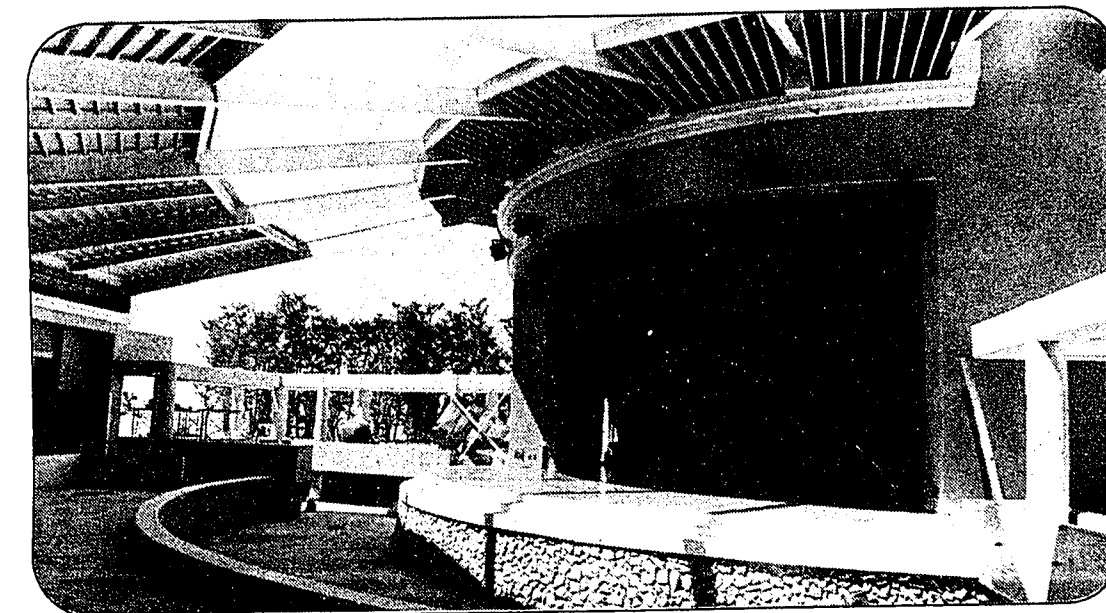
Of the total amount provided by the bill, \$93,100 is for salaries of BOE employees and other personnel benefits and \$68,200 is

for operations.

The House passed the bill on first and final reading. It must be passed by the Senate before it could be transmitted to Governor Pedro P. Tenorio for final approval.

During the same session the House adopted a joint resolution providing for a joint legislative session March 23 to receive Tenorio's annual state-of-the-Commonwealth address.

Army helps education

As tuition to colleges and even vocational schools continues to rise, the U.S. Army continues to be one of the most viable options for getting financial aid for young people who wish to continue their education, according to SFC Tupea, Recruiter at the U.S. Army Recruiting Station in Agaña.

"The GI Bill Plus the Army College Fund can help high school graduates earn up to \$25,200 for higher education," said the recruiter.

This educational incentive has attracted the attention of both educators and parents in recent years. It is available for enlistments of two, three, or four years. Qualified soldiers can earn up to \$17,000 for a two-year enlistment, \$22,800 for a three-year enlistment and up to \$25,200 for four years.

Upon completion of the enlistment, checks will arrive on a monthly basis during the school year. The amount will vary depending on the length of service and number of courses carried.

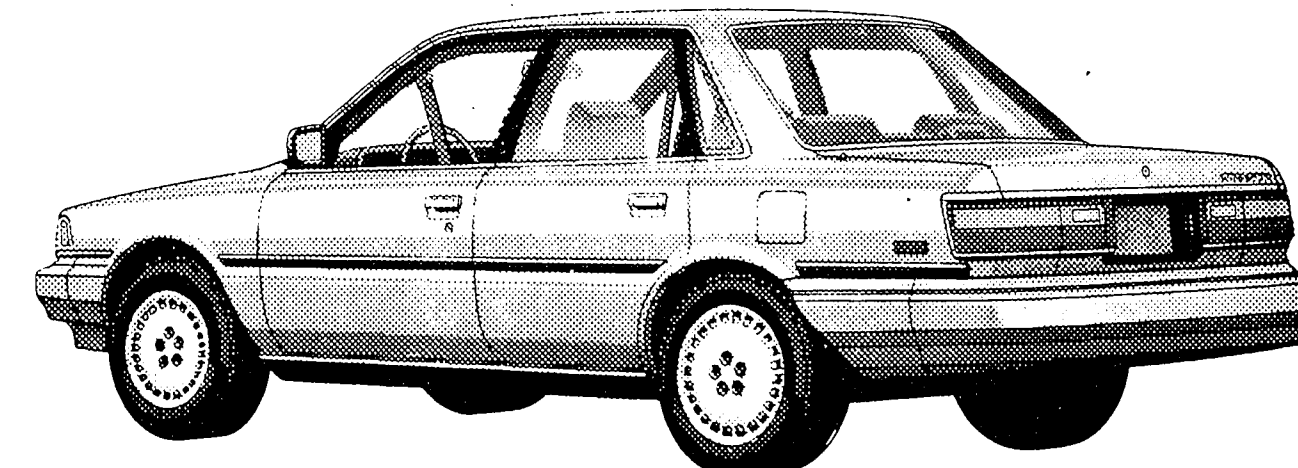
A full-time student who served four years will receive \$700 monthly in GI Bill Plus Army College Fund benefits.

The Army also helps students continue their education even while on active duty. The Army Continuing Education System allows soldiers to attend accredited college courses both on and off post, and the Army will pay up to 75 percent of their tuition for approved courses.

And the Army offers more than educational benefits. Soldiers can select training in one of more than 250 skills, many of which relate to civilian employment in fields ranging from mechanics to electronics, public affairs to engineering.

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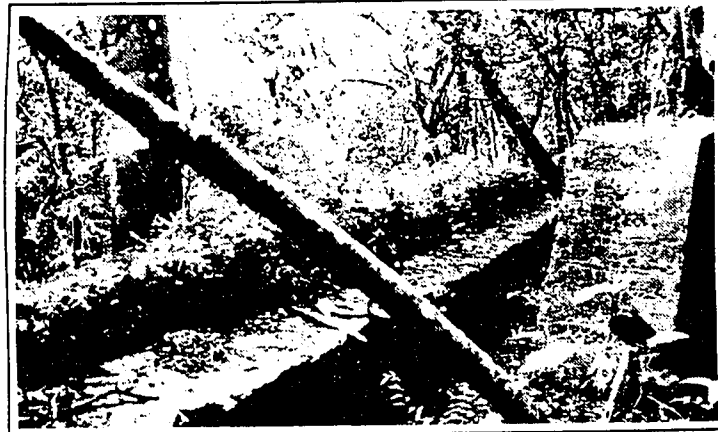
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Hidden throughout Rota are frozen examples of WWII warfare.



Rota war sites of special interest to archaeologists

Archaeologists are soon scheduled to begin a research and mapping project at the Ginalagan World War II complex on Rota.

According to Historic Preservation Officer Jesus B. Pangelinan, two archaeologists from Guam will spend approximately three weeks on Rota to conduct a systematic survey of the Ginalagan site. The area, situated along the cliffline to the southwest of the Sinapalo village, contains numerous man-made caves, fortifications, storage areas and gun positions built by Japanese military forces during World War II.

"Ginalagan is significant from an historical standpoint because it is the only extensive Japanese fortification complex in the Marianas", Pangelinan said. Rota was the only major island in the Mari-

anas that was not invaded during the war, and Japanese defensive efforts were not interrupted there as they were on Saipan, Tinian and Guam.

The work, to be supervised by Dr. Rosalind Hunter-Anderson, will focus on locating all components of the defensive site. An accurate map of the area will also be produced. Dr. Hunter-Anderson will be assisted by a World War II military specialist who is familiar with the function of Japanese defensive features.

As a part of the field survey, Hunter-Anderson will provide professional training to members

of the Rota Historic Preservation Office and to four local workers who will be hired for the duration of fieldwork.

After completing the survey and mapping, Dr. Hunter-Anderson will prepare forms which will nominate the site to the U.S. National Register of Historic Places. The Register is an official listing of significant historic, archaeological and architectural properties. Pangelinan said he hoped that the project would be the first step in making the Ginalagan site an important attraction for Rota's residents and visitors.

LMA experts say island power lines pose a "physical danger" to workers

The bad state of the power system in the Commonwealth does not only result in poor service and revenue loss but also endangers lives of utility workers and consumers, according to the Lyonnaise Marianas America, Inc.

"The physical condition of the Feeder's System has degenerated to unsafe levels at various locations throughout the Grid," LMA said in a report to CUC last month. "Customer service and revenue loss are not the only items compromised in this case. The lives of CUC employees and the general public remain not protected."

LMA, which is CUC's technical adviser, said in its report that CUC's potential liabilities from the dangerous condition of the system are "of a magnitude that could dwarf the F/Y 1989 budget."

LMA said some service drops appear to be undersized while point of attachments vary in style and material. Connections are corrosive at both transformer side and service masts, adding to revenue loss as well. There are many which are uninsulated.

Under these conditions service drops could be detached during strong winds while bad mechanical connections could cause contact with buildings, thereby setting them on fire or possibly causing injury or death to people.

"Drop wires can fall on roadways, high density traffic areas, playing children, etc.," LMA said.

"Should property damage, accident or death transpire as a result of such business operations, the CUC could very well be held liable for any or all of the aforementioned even if this work was performed prior to establishment of CUC," LMA added.

The report also cited unmetered meter bases as a safety hazard. "Virtually all unmetered customers' meter base have been installed with inferior sized wire jumpered between the meter socket jaws," according to LMA. "This allows power to be drawn by the consumer at the rating of the installed main circuit breaker or overload protection device."

The report cited the following possible results of the unsafe conditions:

- Improperly installed service masts can cause service drops to detach and fall on occupants or public;
- Improperly grounded systems can cause injury or death to meter readers or occupants;
- Undersized service entrance cable can cause structural fires;
- Openings in meter bases can cause injury, death and also fires;
- Corrosive connections result in revenue loss and sometimes structural fires; and
- Unauthorized taps result in revenue loss.

LMA recommended the adoption and implementation of utility-consumer contracts after correction of existing unsafe service installations in accordance with adopted safety codes, updated rules, regulations and standards.

It also proposed the adoption of utility service installation codes and the training of utility inspectors in the adopted codes, standards, rules and regulations.

As an alternative to adoption of safety codes, LMA said a department of building safety could be established to prepare building and construction codes similar to the American National Electrical Code. This places responsibility and liability of code and safety compliance on the DBS.

Flooding studied in Asia

Bangkok (UNIS) - Typhoon-prone countries in Asia and the Pacific should combine structural and non-structural measures to minimize losses due to floods.

This point was stressed by S.A.M.S. Kibria, Executive Secretary of the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP), in opening here Monday an expert group meeting on improvement of the flood loss prevention systems based on risk analysis and mapping.

Kibria observed that many

Asia-Pacific countries have taken structural measures, such as construction of flood control reservoirs and levees for mitigation of floods. However, these measures require large capital and considerable time to implement.

"Significant research has been undertaken on non-structural measures aimed at minimizing flood losses through flood forecasting and warning and flood risk analysis and mapping," he said.

New Senate measure would speed bills' action

The Senate Committee on Rules and Procedures is conducting a public hearing Feb. 26 on a bill designed to speed up action on proposed laws.

Senate Bill 6-26 introduced by Sen. Juan T. Guerrero also requires mandatory public hearings to ensure that all affected persons or groups are given the opportunity to comment on pending bills before these are passed into law.

Sen. Juan N. Babauta, committee chairman, has invited Chief Judge Robert Heffner, former Senate Presidents Ponciano Raza and Larry I. Guerrero, among others, to testify during the hearing.

SB 6-26 provides that no bill may be passed by the Legislature unless it is submitted to a public hearing in the house where it was introduced within 120 days of the date of introduction.

The bill allows a waiver of the public hearing requirement upon certification that emergency conditions exist, or when a bill is identical to another bill which has been publicly heard.

If the Legislature fails to comply with the public hearing requirement the sponsor of a bill may file a suit in court to enforce the provisions of the bill.

SB 6-26 provides for a fine of not less than \$100 per calendar day against any committee chairman who refuses to abide by the court order. The cost of bringing up the suit may be funded with government funds but not the fine.

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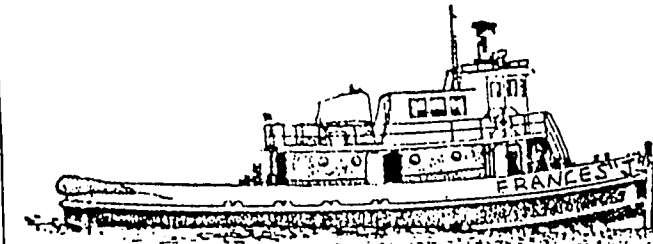
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Cable not against a hearing

Will not debate new basic rates

Executives of Tropic Isle Cable Television said this week that they would "be willing to have public hearings on our new rates, but it would be to explain our new rates - not debate them." Lee Holmes, president of the local cable company, said Wednesday that the newest round of attempts to regulate cable services as a "utility" on the island are at best - ill advised.

Holmes said that even as early as mid-1985 the Houses' attorney at that time, Joel Bergsma, warned the government that any planned regulation of the cable system's rates or station carriage was illegal. But, that advice was ignored and Public Law 4-47 was enacted, which created the CUC, "includes the delivery of cable television services, among others, as a public utility for purposes of compliance."

"The Act requires that the Corporation shall monitor the performance, rates and contractual compliance of the enterprise that provides the service," he added. "In delegating this responsibility to CUC, the Legislature intended that CUC shall ensure that cable tv consumers are provided the highest quality cable television services at a reasonable cost to all consumers."

Bergsma told Rep. Juan T. Guerrero in a June 18, 1985 legal opinion that the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984 establishes a national policy, franchise procedures and standards and establishes guidelines for the exercise of federal state and local authority with regulation of cable systems.

"My review of P.L. 4-47 shows that regulatory powers that the Commonwealth Utilities Corporation may exercise over cable television are not consistent with the new federal act."

The attorney said provisions of 4-47 which would allow the CUC to regulate cable as a "util-

ity' and subject to rate of return legislation is illegal. That federal law "expressly prohibits a government from regulating cable television "as a common carrier or utility ..."

He said that 4-47 should be amended to delete any reference to cable television.

However, that same legal opinion Holmes provided in his interview also said that the legislature can use the "terminology and authority set forth in the federal act to establish a local franchising authority." That authority may regulate the basic cable rates, according to Bergsma's opinion, "in circumstances in which a cable system is not subject to effective competition and in situations where federal regulations permit such regulation."

Holmes did not discuss that part of Bergsma's evaluation, but did say that he and local manager Wayne Easley "were always open to discuss a public hearing." He also said that he felt the \$1 raise in basic cable rates was "not that much, especially considering it's been some time since we raised our rates."

Tropic Isle Cable's president also said that local customers would be getting another channel, beginning March 1. The Arts and Entertainment Channel is being added, which features a lot of cultural programming like opera, plays, and the like. Many of the programs are from Europe.

Sablan bill sets 5 % gross profits tax on garment exports

Rep. Manuel C. Sablan introduced a bill Feb. 11 to impose a five percent gross profits tax on garment exports by local manufacturers.

House Bill 6-50, which was also signed by nine other representatives, says that garment companies operating here "do not bear their fair share of Commonwealth taxes to compensate for the burden placed on the Commonwealth for the volume of power, water, sewage and other public services " provided by the government.

The proposed tax, a modified form of export tax, will be in addition to other taxes currently being paid by the manufacturers. All the garment manufacturers in the Northern Marianas, numbering more than a dozen, export their products to the mainland and other markets.

Guerrero wants cable rate public hearings

Senator Juan T. Guerrero asked the Commonwealth Utilities Corp. Tuesday to conduct a public hearing regarding the plan by Tropic Isles Cable TV Corp. to raise cable television rates in Saipan.

"This public hearing should provide Tropic Isles a forum to explain its decision and allow the general public the opportunity to comment," Guerrero said in a letter to CUC Chairman Jose M. Taitano.

Guerrero's request was in response to a recent announcement by the cable television firm regarding an increase in basic cable tv subscription from \$18.95 to \$19.95 a month. He cited the firm's reasons such as the five percent pay hike for the firm's 20 employees here and the amount spent by the firm in

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Bonding issue not dead

Minimum could be raised to \$3,000

Employers may be required to post bond amounting to more than \$3,000 for each nonresident worker they hire instead of the \$2,000 bond earlier set by the Department of Commerce and Labor.

The department started implementing the bonding provisions of Public Law 3-66 Jan. 1 and employers were told to post cash or surety bond or bank guaranty amounting to \$2,000 for each of their nonresident worker. The bond requirement under the five-year-old law is meant to protect foreign workers from employer's abuses.

Representatives of local industry groups such as the garment companies objected to the implementation of the bonding requirement pending adoption of rules and public review of such rules.

In response, the department published Monday the proposed rules and regulations to implement P.L. 3-66 and P.L. 1-8 governing the hiring of nonresident workers. Among the proposed rules is the requirement that employers who want to hire nonresident workers must

post bond the minimum amount of which must be enough to cover the employee's salary for one month, the cost of airline transportation to the point of hire and \$2,500 for medical expenses.

This means that to hire an employee from the Philippines at a monthly salary of \$500 the employer must be able to post bond to cover the monthly pay, the airline ticket to Manila (\$248 at present) and \$2,500 for medical expenses or a total of \$3,248.

Acting Labor Chief Felix Fitial said in an earlier interview that employers who posted the \$2,000-bond must increase the bond amount if the new rule is adopted.

The proposed nonresident workers rules and regulations published in the Commonwealth Register also include procedures to be followed in hiring nonresident workers, a system of filing of complaints and petitions for hearing and appeal and a basic format for applications and other documents needed in the implementation of the nonresident worker laws.

Comments regarding the proposed rules and regulations must be submitted to the department within 30 days, after which the rules and regulations will be put into effect.

Audit report will show RED ink

Fiscal Year 1986. He declined to say how much the CNMI government would be in the red, but he did say the figure was "significant", and wouldn't deny that the final figure would be over \$10 million.

He said the Commonwealth's books were "confusing", if not downright chaotic because of non-standard bookkeeping practices that vary from department-to-department and agency-to-agency. "I really don't want to be quoted as using the word 'sloppy'" he said.

The Peat Marwick Main and Co. audit firm executive did say that once the "final, final" document was released that "many people will have the tendency to look all the way down to that bottom number - and it could be deceiving." Zuroske said the final numbers are actually still being tallied, but he felt the report given to the governor and legislature in the next few days would be "fairly close to the figures we have now."

No final figure can be found until the status of contracts let, but not paid since 1986. While Zuroske said it "would be unusual for two-year-old bills not to be paid", that was a possibility, as was the general fund being hit for more unbudgeted costs because of faulty bookkeeping errors.

The audit report is actually in three phases - the first being the management letter which outlines what the accounting firm feels are problems in the accounting system, specific individuals or programs that bear closer examination. "This deals with internal controls," Zuroske said in the interview.

Also included in that \$93,000 report will be suggestions for maintaining closer cost controls and fiscal responsibilities in the future. But the main part of the report will be the nuts-and-bolts financial report for the fiscal year, and Zuroske said it wouldn't be

rosy. In places, the figures will be bleak for some departments, he admitted.

"We didn't find ANY evidence of fraud or misfeasance," he said. But, the auditors did find many instances of money not being controlled correctly. Asked to describe which specific agencies were the worst offenders, Zuroske decline to be tied down.

When asked about public works during that budget year, Zuroske said that because of the fuel and power responsibilities of department, the final audit would probably show a significant over-spending of their budget. He would not say how much was involved.

The CPA did say that the subsequent separation of utility responsibilities from the DPW and their assignment to CUC would be of direct benefit in the long run. Bills and costs associated with running the power and other utilities will contribute a large amount to the DPW's budget deficit figures, he said.

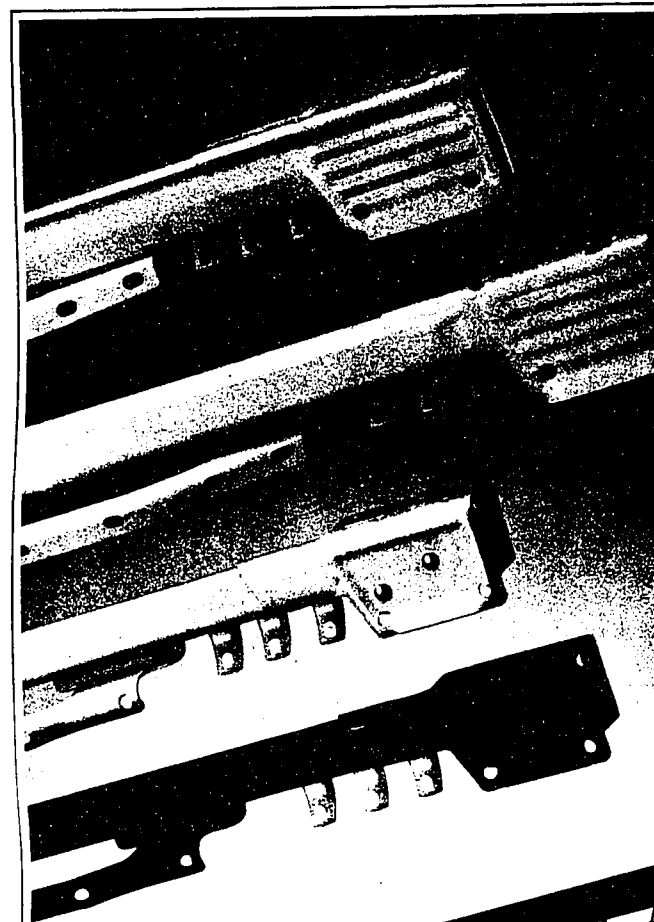
Zuroske would say that his auditors found a "lot" of abuses in the payrolls of almost all divisions of government, including tens of thousands of dollars in unsubstantiated overtime payments to rank-and-file employees, as well as other employees, which should be exempt from overtime.

One of the biggest problems with doing this first audit was setting things up, Zuroske said. "After all, it's been over two years ago that most of these transactions took place." Finding documentation was a real headache, he said, but Zuroske said most employees were cooperative in the effort. Employees of finance were especially helpful in rounding things up and putting them in some semblance of order.

He did admit that some documentation just wasn't around any more and they had to try to get data from other sources to put together a paper

rebuilding facilities damaged by typhoons.

Guerrero said he had no objection to the pay increase. "However, there is a need to know if the cost to Tropic Isles for the pay increase is equal to the cost to the subscribers for the cable tv basic rate increase," he said.

"I am certain that the system is insured; therefore, there is a need to know how much in losses are a part of the two storms, how much of the system was insured, how much of the storm damages were claimed and what is the amount of claim settlement to the reported damages to the system," he said.

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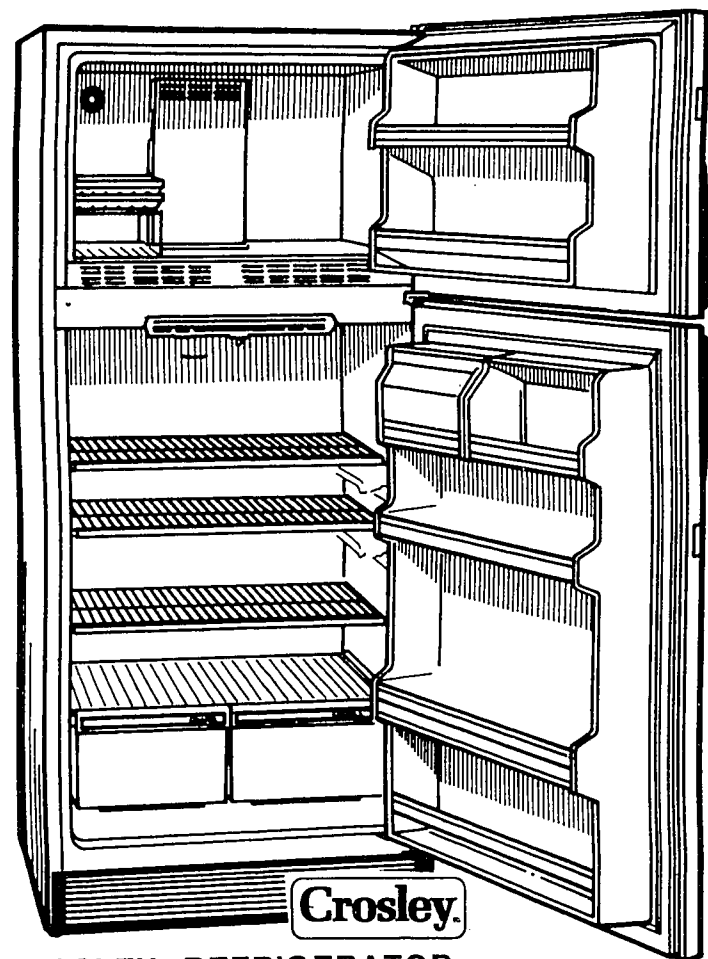
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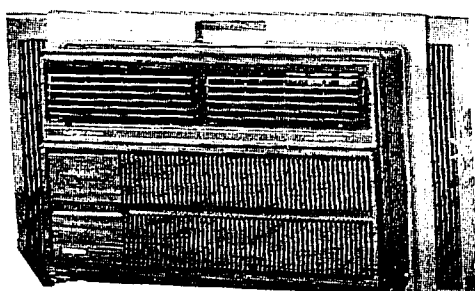
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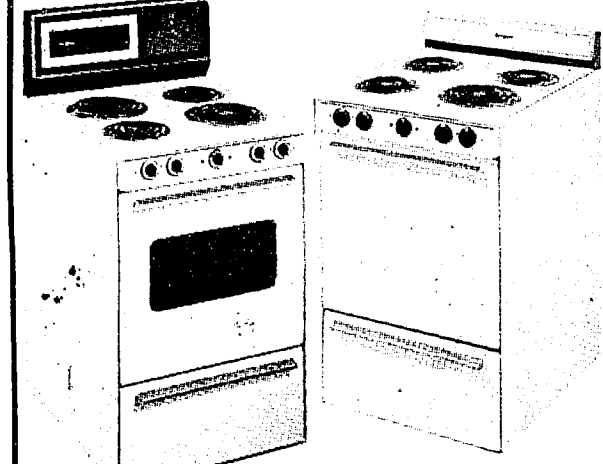
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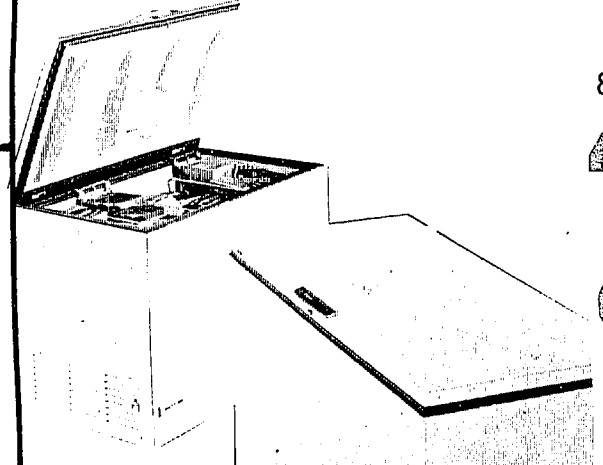
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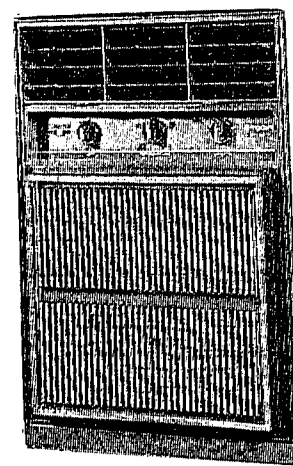
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Landmark property decision is appealed

The Seventh Day Adventist Mission appealed a Trial Court decision Feb. 11 which nullified the purchase by an SDA Mission employee of land to be used for a school project.

Marybeth Herald filed the appeal at the District Court on behalf of the SDA Mission and Maria Agulto, member of the sect and an employee of the mission.

The case involves a parcel of land with an area of 5,499 square meters in San Antonio originally owned by Dionicio R. Cabrera. Cabrera sold the property to Ignacia Villaluz, a person of Northern Marianas descent, in 1981 for \$3,000.

Cabrera and his wife, in 1983, entered into an agreement to sell (again) the property to Rev. Robert E. Gibson, who

wanted to buy the land and to donate it to the SDA Mission for a school. They agreed on a purchase price of \$25,000.

Since Gibson and his prospective successor, Dr. Stephen Fisher, could not title to the property because they are not of Northern Marianas descent, Agulto was brought in to hold title to the property.

Dela Cruz ruled that Agulto was merely a conduit in the transaction and was subject to the control of Gibson. He also declared that the constitutional restriction against ownership of land in the Commonwealth by persons not of Northern Marianas descent does not violate the equal protection clause of the United States Constitution.

Herald raised numerous issues questioning Dela Cruz' decision. "Did the Trial Court err in resolving the issue of whether Maria Agulto, a person of Northern Marianas descent and member of the Seventh Day Adventist," was

merely a conduit' and 'subject to the control' of non-NMI church members in taking title to property in the CNMI so that her church could build a school?" Herald asks in the appeal.

She also questions the conclusion made by Dela Cruz that Agulto could not hold title to the property because she participated in a transaction with members of her church who were not of Northern Marianas descent.

"Did the Trial Court err in concluding that Covenant Section 805 and/or Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas Constitution Article 12 prohibits parties not of Northern Marianas descent from supplying all or part of the consideration to a person of Northern Marianas descent for the purchase of property in the Commonwealth where title is always retained in the name of the purchaser of Northern Marianas descent?" Herald asks.

Barracks ordered cleaned up

A weathered plywood construction barracks hidden away in the hills of Saipan's Puerto Rico area is the home to 63 construction workers employed by the Rojas Construction Company. During a recent inspection, sanitarians from the Division of Public Health found nearly every possible violation of health and safety codes, nearly two dozen in all by the time they were finished.

The company has been given a month for an extensive cleanup and other measures to insure the barracks are fit for human habitation. Outside the barracks, pools of stagnant water and sewage were producing a strong odor and providing a breeding ground for mosquitoes. Rat holes could be

seen in the walls, including the kitchen, and inspectors noted that the screening of the buildings wasn't sufficient to keep out rats or insects.

Broken and inadequate plumbing was the rule in the kitchen and a communal bathroom/toilet. The inspectors found that the living quarters were unlighted, dirty and without screened windows. They ordered installation of an internal ceiling, overhead fans and light fixtures.

The fly-infested kitchen also featured a litter of puppies sleeping under a serving table. The inspection report ordered that knives and forks and other kitchen utensils be stored off the floor or in a protective cabinet and that hot water be provided.

Moving again to the outside of the barracks, the report ordered the cage of a fighting rooster be moved at least 100 feet from the building. Piles of construction material and other odds and ends on the premises present a further danger of fire and harbor rats; they are to be either removed or at least stored above ground level.

At the barracks and cafeteria of a new San Vicente garment factory, inspectors found a shorter list of violations. Eurotex Saipan, Inc. has 165 employees housed in two units. The company was told to provide an exhaust fan for the kitchen and to clean up a chill box and cabinet there. The report also noted that insulation was needed for electrical cable.

New bonding proposed

The proposed rules and regulations also include the following:

—The maximum deduction an employer can make on the nonresident worker's salary for the first year of the regulations is \$50 for food and \$50 for housing;

—Worker housing must be constructed in a manner which will provide protection against the elements, including wind, rain and flood, and fire;

—Each room for sleeping purposes must contain space at least 50 square feet of floor space for each occupant and a ceiling not lower than seven feet; and

—Any employer or nonresident worker may file a complaint with the Division of Labor regarding violation of any provision of the Nonresident Workers Act or implementing rules and regulations not later

than 30 days after the violation was committed.

hicle Bureau.

Cepeda said in an interview Tuesday that his office started issuing paper license plates in April last year. He said that a total of 2,110 temporary plates had been issued since that date. These are only for new vehicles. Other car owners pay the same registration fee but continue to use the same metal plates.

DPS Director Edward Manibusan said in a separate interview Wednesday that the contract for the supply of the new metal license plates was won by Joeten Motors last year. He said the lengthy period spent on the procurement of the plates was due to the numerous requirements and standards that must be followed under the government procurement rules and regulations.

He said the new metal license plates are expected to arrive from Taiwan this April. Manibusan said the contract amounts to \$56,000 and would provide enough number of plates to cope with local demand for five years.

Manibusan said money collected from the registration of motor vehicles go the the general fund. Cepeda said a total of 6,703 vehicles were registered by the bureau in fiscal year 1987.

Registration fees for motor vehicles start from \$5 for mopeds and motorcycles (with engine rating of up to 100 cc.(cubic centimeter) to \$200 for trucks and other heavy equipment weighing 7,500 pounds or more.

multi-million dollar luxury yacht. That yacht was later seized by the U.S. and removed to Guam.

The man's indictment had been sealed upon the request of Proctor. He said at that time that the indictment was not revealed because of a "continuing investigation" that could have been endangered. That statement, coupled with a PDN story in which a grand jury witness who testified about Mafnas was interviewed in that publication, has led to widespread gossip about the politician.

The U.S. attorney said in an impromptu press conference Wednesday that one reason he asked the grand jury to unseal the indictment was "because of all the publicity..."

Proctor also announced more indictments related to the alleged bribery of Robert Choy, the former Hawaii farmers Home Loan Administration Officer.

Shigenori Hiraga, a/k/a/ "Chico", president of CDC Japan Ltd. was indicted by the local grand jury Thursday. He is charged with allegedly paying Choy \$25,000 in bribes to approve home loans.

That same indictment alleges that Hiraga ordered Mashihiro Ishii of Sumitomo Construction Corp. to pay Choy another \$30,000 as payment for a bogus estimation of the housing requirements and future needs in the western Pacific.

That construction company did work for MIHA, being responsible for 300 housing units in the Koblerville housing area.

Ishii will most likely be an "unindicted co-conspirator", Proctor said.

Also named in the indictments is Alma Valdez - who is charged with attempting to get Ishii to lie to the grand jury.

Hiraga was on Saipan this week, Proctor said, and will be told to post a \$20,000 cash appearance bond for his arraignment next Friday.

The U.S. Attorney said that the Japanese citizen can be tried in U.S. courts and be made to serve time in a U.S. prison if he is found guilty of the allegations.

Proctor also told the press Wednesday that he "was very satisfied" with the progress of the grand jury, and they would meet again the middle of next month.

Thus far the only indictments returned by the grand jury have dealt with off-island residents. Guerrero's indictment was the first local person charged with any crime.

No so-called "white-collar" crime investigation such as local government corruption, have been announced by Proctor. He said that he couldn't comment whether the grand jury has heard or would hear such allegations.

CRM public hearing on hotel set for Feb. 24 at school

The Coastal Resources Management Office will hold a public hearing Wednesday, February 24th, 1988 at 7:00 p.m. at San Roque Elementary School. At the hearing a joint venture group of C. Itoh and Company Ltd.; Micronesia Company Ltd.; Asanuma Gumi Company Ltd.; and

Ueki Gumi Company Ltd. will present its proposal for a resort hotel at Unai Achugao, between the villages of Tanapag and San Roque.

The project falls under CRM's regulatory authority because it has been designated major siting by the CRM program agency

officials. The proposal involves the construction of a 7 story main building with townhouse and apartment accommodations, a restaurant, pool, lounge, stage, waterfall, walkways and landscaping on a \$12 million budget with a construction period of 18 months.

The joint venture has obtained 55 years leases for two 5,174 square meter lots bordering Unai Achugao. The application itself has not yet been certified complete by the CRM Program Board of Agency Officials. Designation of a major siting requires that a public hearing be held prior to

certifying an application complete. Information from the February 24th Public Hearing will be considered in the CRM Program Agency Officials permit decision.

Lots 008 B 12 and 13, the lots leased by the joint venture, consists of 10,348 square meters.

Power plant overhaul on

The long-overdue overhaul of the Saipan power plant is expected to start in 45 days, this was learned during the Commonwealth Utilities Corp. board meeting Feb. 12.

Finance Director Eloy S. Inos, who is also CUC board member, urged the public during the meeting to limit the use of power and water to essential uses pending the installation of emergency generators. The temporary power plant will provide part of the power requirements of the island while the generators of the main power plant are shut down one by one for overhaul.

The Commonwealth Development Authority is releasing \$2.6 million this month to pay Guam-based Synergy, Inc. for the 15-megawatt emergency generators.

CUC initially planned to lease the generators while the main power plant is undergoing overhaul but later decided to buy the new generators to fill up increasing demand for power. The emergency power plant will utilize low-speed diesel engines built in the United States.

Inos said during the meeting that the final agreement with the CDA was expected to be completed in the next few days. "We'd like to execute it as soon as possible to get funding for the emergency generators," he said.

CUC Executive Director Pete Sasamoto said during the same meeting that the new generators in Tinian were expected to be commissioned in June. The new generators are being installed by Yanmar, a Japanese company.

Sasamoto also said that the first

thinking there was fire in the area. DPS said there was a small grass fire below Capitol Hill but had been controlled.

Lieutenant Governor Pedro A. Tenorio also asked Sasamoto to check the cause of the haze. Sasamoto checked with the United States Navy in Guam and was informed that a satellite picture showed the heavy smoke over Agrihan Island which has a 3,166-foot high inactive volcano.

"We were concerned because there are 25 people there," Sasamoto said.

He said he confirmed Wednesday morning that the smoke was coming from Pagan. Agrihan residents informed him by radio that they saw heavy smoke coming out of Pagan Island from 10 a.m. to 12 noon Tuesday. Agrihan is about 40 miles north of Pagan.

The nearest inhabited island to Pagan is Alamagan, which is 23 miles south of Pagan, and inhabited by five persons. There is no radio facility on the island and the Civil Defense Office, with the help of the Department of Public Health and Environmental Services, is trying to advise Alamagan residents through commercial radio stations to avoid ash fallout.

Sasamoto was scheduled to join a military flight over the erupting volcano Wednesday but the flight did not push through. The extent of the eruption could not be ascertained because the monitoring equipment on the island was sent to Honolulu for repair following the 1980 eruption and had not been returned since.

Sasamoto said that considering the distance reached by the volcanic smoke the eruption could have reached up to 5,000 feet above sea level.

When the volcano erupted in 1980 a mild tremor was felt in Saipan and the smoke reached a height of 25,000 feet.

According to Sasamoto, there are eight active volcanoes in the Northern Marianas. All, except one, are in the Northern Islands. The seventh is a submerged volcano southwest of Tinian. Mount Tapogchau in Saipan is among the inactive volcanoes in the Commonwealth.

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

NEED students learn about how to enrich their own environment

The first annual CNMI National Energy Education Day (NEED) program is shifting into high gear in schools throughout the Commonwealth. The theme this year is "Expanding America's (and the CNMI) Energy Horizons." This year students in the CNMI are joining students from over 8,000 schools in the states as they organize and participate in projects that encourage energy awareness as well as develop leadership skills.

FEMA opens Rota inspections

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has opened an office on Rota to inspect construction and approve payments for homes to replace those destroyed by Typhoon Roy last month.

Federal and state disaster officials said FEMA inspectors Ben Shook and Ed Hummel have set up an office in the Mariana Islands Housing Authority (MIHA) office in Songsong. Hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The telephone number is 532-9435.

Applicants whose homes were destroyed by the typhoon on Jan. 12 have two options for constructing a new house, according to Robert J. Adameik, Fed-

eral Coordinating Officer. They may chose to build a FEMA-designed wood frame home or they may construct a more typhoon-proof concrete and block house. If they choose the FEMA home, the plans and a sample contract will be provided by FEMA. If they decided to build a concrete house, it may be somewhat smaller than the FEMA design, but the plans must be certified for typhoon resistance by a registered engineer.

The inspectors will check the new homes for compliance with FEMA designs if the house is wood frame. They may also be inspecting the construction of concrete and block homes.

Detective's trial set for May 16 with jury

AG's office hampering defense

Detective Alfred A. Pangelinan will be tried by a jury May 16, Judge Jose S. Dela Cruz decided Wednesday.

Pangelinan, 27, was charged Feb. 5 of three counts of theft, a count of misconduct in public office and a count of removal of government property. The theft charges involve \$26,520 in cash, most of it believed to be owned by a Yakuzi chief murdered in Saipan last year, and a .38 caliber handgun. Both the money and the gun are still missing.

The items were kept in an evidence room at the Department of Public Safety building in Susupe. Pangelinan was in charge of that room.

Assistant Attorney General Edward Hayden during the status conference on the case Wednesday that he would not provide the defense counsel with "discovery" unless ordered by the court. "Discovery" in court language refers to evidence, documents and other information which will be used by a prosecutor or lawyer in proving his case.

Hayden did not cite any reason for his refusal to provide discovery to the public defender, who will represent Pangelinan in the trial. Dela Cruz said he would allow a motion to be filed to compel the prosecutor to provide Pangelinan's counsel with the discovery materials and bill of particulars. The bill of particulars will include detailed information about the items Pangelinan allegedly stole. The hearing on this motion will be on May 4.

The complaint filed by Hayden against Pangelinan did not mention the shooting incident Nov. 9 in which Pangelinan got wounded on the head (superficially) and in the abdomen. Hayden, in a press conference following Pangelinan's arrest and arraignment, also would not say whether there was any connection between the shooting incident and the disappearance of the money and the gun from the evidence room. He only said that the shooting incident led to the investigation regarding the missing money and gun.

Vocational courses at college helpful

An inmate, two handicapped and several school dropouts are currently enrolled in a special course at the Northern Marianas College that will provide them the skills to be productive members of society.

Herman Arp, instructor in the vocational education program, said in an interview Tuesday that there are a total of 40 students undergoing training in the general construction course.

He and co-instructor Sonny Flores said instruction is 50 percent classroom lecture and 50 percent on-the-job training. It will take the students two years to complete the course.

Among those enrolled in the course is Gregorio Ch. Basa, an inmate at the Division of Corrections. Arp and Flores said one of their students is hearing impaired and another limps. Others are dropouts from up to the eighth grade.

The course has established a mutually beneficial relationship between the college and the students. On-the-job training for the freshmen is provided by utilizing them to repair and renovate the old Dr. Torres Hospital buildings which the college inherited when the Commonwealth Health Center opened in 1986.

Arp and Flores said the students, while receiving on-the-job training, also receive compensation in the form of stipend.

The program started in 1985 and 12 students who finished the first two-year course are now working in a housing project of the Mariana Islands Housing Authority - and getting paid for it. Flores said these students are now in their third year.

He said the college is planning to go into a full four-year course. Upon completion of the general two-year course students can specialize in a field of their choice during the third and fourth years, like plumbing, electricity, masonry or carpentry.

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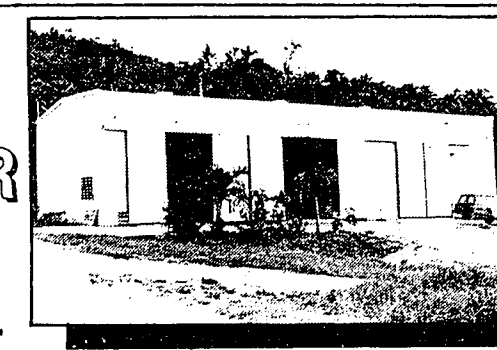
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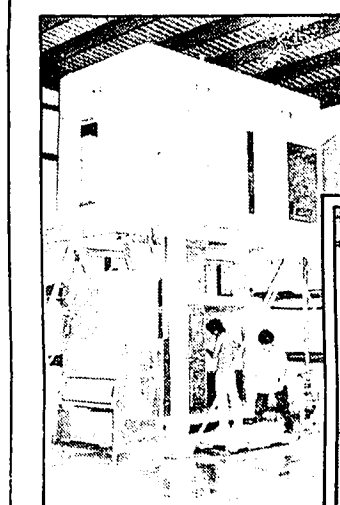
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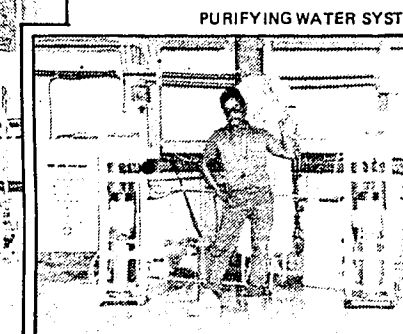


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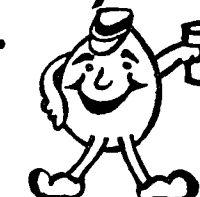


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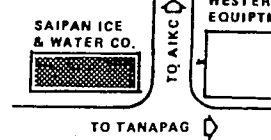

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FINAL NOTICE

Notification is hereby given to the public of the intent of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to provide assistance to local governments and Commonwealth agencies on the Island of Rota to restore facilities located in the base flood plain, which were damaged in the recent major disaster declaration as a result of Typhoon Roy. Public comment about restoration of these facilities and application of the Floodplain Management Executive Order to them was invited by notice in a publication on 12 Feb. 1988.

These facilities include, but are not limited to the following:

1. Non-emergency debris clearance.
2. Non-emergency repair to protective coastal facilities.
3. Damage to roads, including streets, culverts and bridges.
4. Damage to water control facilities.
5. Damage to public buildings and related facilities.
6. Damage to public utilities and distribution systems.
7. Damage to private non-profit facilities (hospitals, educational centers, emergency and custodial care services, etc.)

Comments and information received were fully evaluated by FEMA along with evaluation of social, economic, environmental and safety considerations. FEMA also consulted with Commonwealth and local officials to ensure compliance with applicable floodplain protection standards. FEMA has determined that the only practicable alternative is to restore certain facilities at their original locations within the base floodplain because one of the following situations applies in each case.

1. The facility is functionally dependent on its floodplain location.
2. The project facilitates open space use.
3. The facilities are an integral part of a larger network, which would be uneconomical to relocate.

Additionally, the possible effects of not restoring the facility were examined. In each case, there was an overriding public need for the facility that clearly outweighed the Order's requirements to avoid the floodplain when there is a practicable alternative, and that made non-floodplain sites not practicable. The restoration of these facilities will also incorporate certain measures designed to mitigate the effects of future flooding.

the TT Government," Guerrero said in introducing the resolution. "Simple justice demands that they be paid promptly, without legal maneuvering by the U.S. Government trying to avoid meeting its moral obligation."

The resolution notes that the TT government maintained separate pay scales for Micronesians, third country nationals and Americans or persons of European stock. Micronesian wages were about half the amount earned by their American counterparts.

A group of Micronesian employees filed a complaint with the District Court in 1981 and last year the court, according to the resolution, entered its judgment finding that "racial discrimination existed against plaintiffs as practiced by the Trust Territory Government."

The resolution will go back to the Senate floor for a final vote. If it is adopted by the Senate the resolution will be sent to the lower house for similar action.

trail to determine where the money went that fiscal year.

Computer software and hardware incompatibility throughout the government was also a hindrance in getting a full picture, Tan said. This also contributed to the almost six-month time period it took to compile the preliminary audit figures. Zuroske suggested that the government financial offices standardize on one type of software package that can be run on a multitude of hardware configurations.

One major problem area which will be shown in the audit, Tan and Zuroske said, would be with a multi-million loan the governor ordered given to the government from the CDA. That loan had been carried on the books as a "plus", but after judicial review found the loan was illegal, those "+" signs became big "-" signs - involving millions of dollars.

That loan was during a typhoon emergency, but the governor had no authority to order a loan to the government.

Other deficits will be shown in CIP funds, Zuroske said. Repeatedly asked how much money was involved, he declined to say because "the governor is our client and we can't release any figures until he sees them..."

Information from the report may be released prior to the final document, Zuroske said, if the governor allows preliminary figures to be released. Those studies will show on a cost-accounting basis how much each department spent in every like category, such as travel, office supplies, etc.

How much of the preliminary report's availability will depend on how long it takes to come back from Hawaii - where the audit company's offices are, Zuroske said.

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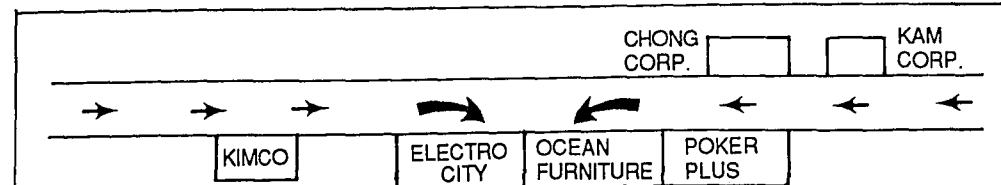
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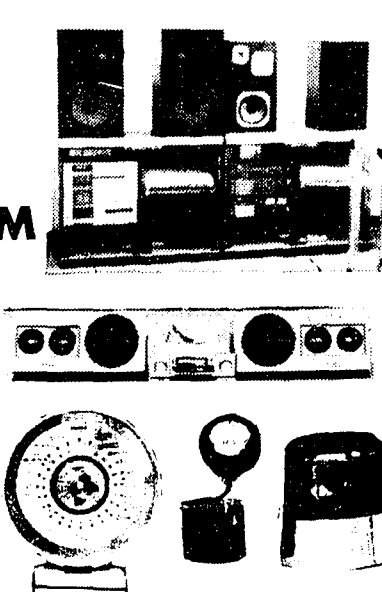
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Hopwood Jr. High Valentine dance

Rocky road for Pangelinan

Rep. Antonio M. Camacho, committee chairman, called the hearing to discuss the road problem on the Commonwealth's main island. Public Safety Director Edward Manibusan and Saipan Mayor Gilbert C. Ada also testified during the hearing.

Pangelinan, at the start of the hearing, admitted that paved as well as coral roads in Saipan are in poor condition. "I am fully aware of the problem," he said. "I am not blind to the issue."

He said his department did not have enough funds and equipment to repair bad roads and keep them in good condition. He said the department did the best it could to do its job.

He said public works received \$320,000 in fiscal year 1986 and \$283,000 in fiscal year 1987 not only for road repair but also for the repair of government buildings, fuel and other materials needed for public works operations.

Rep. Juan S. Torres, who was appropriations chairman in the Fourth Legislature, said the department also received \$1.2 million for the salaries and benefits of its personnel.

Torres asked Pangelinan on the fate of supplemental funds appropriated by the previous Legislature for the repair of dump trucks. "I was assured the equipment would be out on the road," Pangelinan said.

"Is any dump truck running now?" Torres asked.

Pangelinan said none. "Then the money was not used to repair the equipment?" Torres asked.

"I cannot say that," Pangelinan said. He added that he would look into the matter and inform the committee about the fate of the money.

Camacho asked Manibusan if road conditions could cause accidents. Manibusan cited several poorly engineered portions of the road system in Saipan, some of which had been scenes of accidents. "We have not actually determined but we believe they're part of the cause of accidents," he said.

He cited the curve in front of Herman's Bakery on Airport Road, where a fatal accident happened last year. He also pointed to the road leading to San Vicente which was the scene of a recent accident.

Camacho asked Manibusan if he had requested the DPW to patch up potholes on the road. The DPS head said yes.

"What was the response?" Camacho asked.

"The potholes are still there," Manibusan said.

"We are patching up as we have the materials on hand," Pangelinan said.

"It takes a person to die for the road to be repaired," Camacho said. "Am I right?"

"I hope that would not be the case," Pangelinan said. "We do assist when there is death in the family by repairing the parking space."

Ada said he asked for help from the DPW several times but the response he got was either the equipment was tied up to another project or that there was only one piece of equipment available. He said he looked elsewhere and was able to obtain surplus equipment from the United States Navy, due to arrive in the next week or two.

Commenting on the attitude of DPW personnel, Ada said: "Some of the Department of Public Works staff are uncooperative."

He added: "I hope that when the director leaves this hall he would call his staff" and give them discipline.

Rep. David C. Sablan questioned even Pangelinan's request for 30 days to come up with the answer to the road problem, considering that Pangelinan had been with the DPW since 1964. The committee, however, gave Pangelinan the 30 days he requested to submit his answer and to turn over to the committee all the information and documents sought from him. The committee will review the additional information and will call Pangelinan to another hearing.

House wants U.S. action on 902 del.

The House of Representatives adopted a resolution Feb. 11 asking the Commonwealth Attorney General to file a complaint at the District Court to compel President Ronald Reagan to appoint a special representative and resume Section 902 negotiations with the CNMI.

Section 902 of the Covenant provides for the appointment of United States and CNMI representatives to hold consultations on non-financial issues affecting U.S.-CNMI relationship.

House Resolution 6-5, introduced by Floor Leader Vicente M. Sablan recalls that three rounds of Section 902 consultations took place since the appointment of former Assistant Interior Secretary Richard Montoya in September 1985 as Reagan's representative to the talks.

Issues discussed during the three meetings include citizenship and passport problems, control of local fishery and seabed resources, Headnote 3(a) protection, unpaid war claims and immigration control. The last meeting between U.S. and CNMI representatives was held in April 1987 "without any of the important issues being resolved..." The consultations were informally suspended following Montoya's resignation from DOI in July 1987 to run for a senate seat in New Mexico.

Sablan said in an interview Wednesday that his resolution was the extreme measure that the Legislature would take to resume the Section 902 talks. He said the House may hold on to HR 6-5 while waiting for a response to a resolution earlier introduced by Senator Herman R. Guerrero asking Reagan to appoint a new special representative, preferably not from the DOI.

Sablan said Guerrero's resolution was the friendly step. If it fails, the House will transmit HR 6-5, the extreme measure, to the Attorney General to start District Court proceedings.
