THE POLICY OF DESPOTISM.

Senator Hoar's Masterly Effort and Eloquent Words of Warning.

(Continued from Saturday)

Must we engrave on that column "We repeal the Declaration of Independence. We changed the Monroe Doctrine from a doctrine of eternal righteousness and justice, resting on the consent of the governed, to a doctrine of brutal selfishness, looking only to our own advantage. We crushed the only republic in Asia. We made war on the only Christian people in the East. We converted a war of glory to a war of shame. We vulgarized the American flag. We introduced perfidy into the practice of war. We inflicted torture on unarmed men to extort confession. We put children to death. We established reconcentrado camps. We devastated provinces. We baffled the aspirations of a people for liberty?"

No, Mr. President. Never! Never! Other and better counsels will yet prevail. The hours are long in the life of a great people. The irrevocable step is not yet taken.

Let us at least have this to say: We, too, have kept the faith of the Fathers. We took Cuba by the hand. We delivered her from her age-long bondage. We welcomed her to the family of nations. We set mankind an example never before of moderation in victory. We led hesitating and halting Europe to the deliverance of their beleaguered ambassadors in China. We marched through a hostile country—a country cruel and barbarous—without anger or revenge. We returned benefit for injury, and pity for cruelty. We made the name of America beloved in the East as in the West. We kept faith with the Philippine people. We kept faith with our own history. We kept our national honor unsullied. The flag which we received without a rent we handed down without a stain.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Lorrin A. Thurston is back from the Volcano. Everybody is glad to welcome Lorrin A. home. He says he prizes his skin too much to stay around Madame Pele these days. That's right, Lorrin, and besides we cannot afford to lose our governor *de jure*.

Lorrin A. Thurston, was in to see us the other day. He laid a cigar on our desk and wanted to know why we haven't begun booming him for Delegate. There's plenty of time, Lorrin, and, besides, we want you to know that the palladium of liberty can't be corrupted by a 5 cent cigar.

It was remarked during the baseball games on Saturday afternoon, that the Punahou crack player, Judge Perry must have had his hair cut recently. The judge's hair is in great demand. Little bunches of it hung on the chandeliers take the place of electric lights. Get meter rates for your locks, Judge.

Manager Ballentyne of the Rapid Transit Co. and his invited guests, waited over ten minutes for Judge Gear, on Saturday afternoon, before starting on the inauguration trip of the Waikiki line. Judge Gear now claims he got so busy chasing a cow out of his garden that he didn't have a chance to finish dressing in

time. That may do for some people, Your Honor, but we weren't born yesterday!

Judge Humphreys made a mistake in deciding against the Hawaiian Tramways Co. in favor of the Rapid Transit Co. His place is to decide upon the merits of the case and the law in the matter, and not upon the public utility of any new fangled concern. Justice and fairness demands like treatment and not a one-sided partiality.

THE INDEPENDENT challenges Gov. Sanford B. Dole, General A. S. Hartwell and William O. Smith to refute the charge that wherever they went in the United States, they always spoke of disfranchising the native Hawaiians if it not so, we want them to step forth and deny this most infamous charge, as it is a discredit to them and to their missionary spirit of fairness.

Well, well, to think that the braided judge, the carpet bagger politician should give a decision in the interest of the public! For a wonder! And what, if his decision had been against the Rapid Transit Company? We dare not prophesy.

Judge Gear at one time belched forth and blatantly announced shortly after he mounted the rostrum of the Bench, that he would obey all of the Republican party's orders in appointments. Taking it for granted, THE INDEPENDENT would ask that in requesting the resignation of Clerk Kaulukou, did the worthy judge consult the Republican Territorial Central Committee in the appointment of Frank Loucks to the clerkship? If so, we would like to hear from the committee; and if not, what is that committee doing any way; is it awake or asleep?

The action of the Rapid Transit Co. in tearing up the girder rail track of the Tramways Co. after midnight last night was like the swooping down of an army of robbers and thieves in the stillness of night, although the moon was shining bright, which the clouds somewhat obscured later on while the work of uprooting went on without a hitch. Residents were aroused from their slumbers by the subdued noise and voices of the laborers, assisted loudly and largely by heavy trucks, and the use of picks and shovels. The scene somewhat reminded us of the Wilcox revolution of 1889, but that was much earlier in the morning. Pain was not in it and will not be for some time yet to come.

Memorial Services for the Dead.
The Oddfellows of this city held special memorial services for their departed dead yesterday afternoon, both at their hall and at Nuuanu cemetery. E. R. Hendry officiated as district deputy and D. P. Lawrence as deputy. Rev. Canon Mackintosh acted as chaplain in the hall and Dr. Rodgers performed the same service in Nuuanu cemetery. About 100 members participated in the services.

Society's Doings.

The past week has been devoted largely as to its society aspect to "marrying and giving in marriage," and the antecedents thereto. The affairs in which the little blind god plays an important part are always of interest to the world feminine, and the doings of the brides, and of their many friends who would honor them before they are led away to the altar, have formed the nucleus around which has been hung many a cosy chat during the past few days. This week there will be more of the outdoor style, more of the mountain, the beach and the lanai.

The event of this week, which will be one of the leading social functions of the season, is the ball to come off in honor of the coronation of King Edward. The British residents of Honolulu are giving the affair at the Meana Hotel, and it promises to be an occasion which will do honor to His Majesty. The grand march will start at 9 o'clock and the guests will trip the "light fantastic" until the small hours of the morning. Prior to the commencement of the dance there will be an informal reception Consul and Miss Hoare receiving. The proceeds from the sale of tickets are to go to the Hospital for Incurables.

A Midnight Raid.

At twelve o'clock last night the Rapid Transit officials backed by 250 laborers with picks, shovels and crowbars took possession of that part of King street lying between the King street entrance to the Capitol grounds and Camarico's store, and set to work tearing out the girder rails which the Hawaiian Tramways Co. laid there more than a year ago. The invasion of the square had been planned with the greatest secrecy and few people knew that such a move was intended. This afternoon the gang is in front of the Young building lying tracks as they proceed, and if they keep on will reach Liliha street inside of a week. Manager Ballentyne states that the work will continue day and night and expects to inaugurate the thorough King street line within ten days.

A Hot Spring.

Ten minutes walking from the corner of Emma and Punchbowl streets will bring any citizen of this city to a hot spring of the like of which probably does not exist in the whole of the United States. Hundreds of people went up Punchbowl yesterday, and returned to town wondering what was the cause of such an outbreak of hot water. It was so hot that it was well nigh more than any finger could stand. Has that got anything to do with volcanic happening? Is it a presage of a future eruption of Punchbowl? The volcanic specialist of THE INDEPENDENT being out of town we respectfully refer the above to C. J. Lyons, of the weather bureau, for investigation.

At Central Union.

The usual annual baccalaureate sermon to the graduates of Punahou College was replaced this year by a discourse to students generally. President Arthur Maxon Smith of Punahou delivered the address to the students last evening at Central Union Church, his subject being "Intellectual Independence."

Democratic Club.

Steps are being taken by the younger element of the Portuguese Colony to organize a Democratic Club in the Punchbowl district. The proposed club intends to make a thorough canvass of the Portuguese and bring to the registration bureau, all who are qualified to vote but have never registered.
