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CHANGES AMONG CAPTAINS

Inter - Island Company Makes Well-deserved Promotion.

Captain Thompson of the Keaouha Takes the Kilohana While Mate Green is Promoted to be Captain of the Waialeale.

This is moving day for some of the captains, mates and pursers of the Inter-Island Company. The men who have been changed are busy fixing up their new quarters and getting things into shape for the new state of affairs.

Captain Mosher, who began with the Keaouha, took the Kaala and was placed in the Waialeale, has taken one more step forward and is now in command of the Keaouha. His first trip on the new charge will be to Nawiliwili, Hanamaulu and Koloa tomorrow afternoon.

Captain Thompson of the Keaouha, for years a faithful and efficient employe of the Inter-Island Co., has been given the new steamer Kilohana, until recently, the Mazama. Captain Thompson is justly proud of his new charge and promises that nothing shall come anywhere near him on the sea. The Kilohana will sail for Kilauea and Hanamaulu today.

Mate Green of the Mikahala, another efficient officer, has been remembered, though the Christmas present comes early, he is nevertheless, glad to receive it. Mr. Green is now captain of Waialeale, which steamer is to sail this afternoon for Kapaa, in place of the James Makee, now laid up for repairs. Captain Tullett of the Makee will go along on the Waialeale as pilot. A 14-ton boiler for Kealia is to be taken to Kapaa on the Waialeale.

Captain Bruhn, who has been in command of the Kilohana temporarily, will return to his old love, the Kaula. This steamer will have all her repairs complete by Wednesday and will very probably sail on that day.

Now as to the mates. Wm Hudson ("Buffalo Bill"), second mate of the Waialeale and the second mate of the Waialeale will go mate of the Makee. Mate of the Kilohana will go mate of the Mikahala to fill a vacancy. Second mate Cook of the Kilohana will go mate of that steamer.

Pursers Nelson of the Waialeale will go mate of that steamer.

Pursers Ferback of the Makee goes to the Waialeale permanently.

Max Otroy, who has been taking the place of Wm White as Chief Clerk in the Inter-Island Co. wharf office, goes off today on a well deserved two weeks' vacation.

When he returns, he will go back to his old place as pursers of the W G Hall and Pursers Grube, who is now filling that place, will go back to the Mikahala. This will mean more change among the pursers.

Pursers Nelson of the Waialeale will go mate of the Kaula.

The wedding ceremony making August Haneberg, manager of Olowalu plantation, and Miss Henrietta Hartwig, man and wife, was held in St. Andrew's cathedral at 11:15 this forenoon, the Rev. V. H. Kiteat officiating. Mr. and Mrs. Haneberg will leave for their home in Hawaii in the Kinau tomorrow morning.

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LATEST NEWS FROM WAILUKU

Old Lahaina Court House Being Put in Shape.

Condition of Roads Not Remarkably Good—Church Luau—Items of the Court Term.

Wailuku, Maui, Dec. 10.—Mrs. Jas. A. Thompson, wife of the official stenographer now attending the term of the Second Circuit Court, at Lahaina, came over from Lahaina this morning to enjoy the beauties of Iao during the coming week. Mrs. Thompson will be the guest of Mrs. Kalua.

Mr. John Sheldon, the Hawaiian interpreter of the Supreme Court is receiving praises from the public and the attorneys for the very able manner in which he interpreted the remarks of the attorneys for the prosecution and defense in the John K. Richardson manslaughter case.

Judge Kalua will occupy the pulpit of the Wainane native church at Lahaina at the morning service tomorrow. Rev. S. Kapu of Wailuku is preparing the choir of trained voices for the event. Miss Carrie Kamaiopili will preside at the organ. A luau for the benefit of the church will take place during the services, to which the good people of Lahaina will be expected to help the good cause.

The old courthouse at Lahaina is now undergoing extensive repair under the charge of Mr. Anderson and three others from Honolulu. They are making very good progress. The court room has received extensive repairs. The Judge's bench has been moved to the Olowalu side. The floor of the whole building is in a very bad condition, and Mr. Anderson will have to wait until after the term before he puts in new flooring. Everything will be nailed down in the court room so that no more dances will be held in the building. The court room has been damaged to a great extent by people nailing wreaths and festoons on the walls. It is claimed that this is the first real repairing this courthouse has received since it was built in 1860.

Messrs. Henry Waterhouse, L. A. Thurston, and A. W. Carter arrived at Lahaina last Friday in an open whale boat two hours from Kaunakakai via Pukoo, Mokolai.

On Saturday morning the party started for Kihei to look into the new plantation to be started over there. They take the Kinau for Honolulu this afternoon.

During the early part of this week, Lahaina roads were in a very bad condition on account of the heavy rains. But now the weather is improving. Last Monday gangs of men sprinkled the streets of Lahaina next the court house in order not to ruin the shine of the attorneys' boots, but on Tuesday the rain came down almost in torrents and sprinkling was not any further needed. It is claimed by kamaainas that this was the first drop of rain in Lahaina since last March.

The best and most well kept public road in Lahaina is that road running between the cane fields above the jail. It is put over with a kind of black sand, but the roads leading to the court house are worse than taro patches. The canes are growing in such healthy condition that public roads are obstructed in several places.

"Oily Bill" White of the lottery bill fame, was seen riding through the streets of Lahaina one day this week on a mule. His Maui friends are glad of the fact of his having his license to practice law in lower courts renewed, and also of the fact of his oath to support the government. Bravo Bill.

INSTALLATION SERVICES

Rev. William Kincaid, Pastor of Central Union Church.

Meeting of Church Council this Morning—Satisfactory Statement of Faith—Unanimously Elected—Tonight's Program.

Tonight, the Rev. Wm. Kincaid will be installed pastor of Central Union Church. The church Council met in the church parlors this morning and arranged all preliminary matters.

At the opening of the session of the Council, Rev. J. A. Cruzan was appointed moderator and Rev. J. W. Leedingham, scribe. The clerk of the church, Rev. W. W. Hall, made a statement to the Council on church affairs.

This done, the Rev. Wm. Kincaid, the pastor elect, made a most honest, thorough and satisfactory statement of belief. Numerous questions were asked by the members, all of which were fully answered by Mr. Kincaid.

When the questions were exhausted the Council voted to be by itself and Mr. Kincaid left. The Council then voted unanimously that the Rev. Wm. Kincaid be made pastor of Central Union Church.

officer of the United States Government, Honolulu was not a United States port. The United States Government did not pay one cent to Hawaiian customs officers. President McKinley's directing power over the administration of the Hawaiian Islands referred to the laws of the Republic of Hawaii at annexation. Mr. Brown had no authority here beyond that of suggesting or directing matters of form in anticipation of the application of the Chinese exclusion laws of the United States. The latest of these laws, which was passed in 1893, compelled all Chinese in the United States to procure certificates of residence within six months of the passage of the act. Few if any Chinese in the Hawaiian Islands could comply with that law today. It was never intended that the United States laws should be enforced here until Congress took action in that regard.

Mr. Silliman quoted authorities from cases arising out of various annexations of territory by the United States. The principle elicited was that laws might exist technically in a certain territory but could not be enforced without proper means being provided. In answer to the Court, the attorney said the Chinese were not being excluded because they did not have the certificates required by United States law, but because they were laborers and not merchants and therefore could not be admitted under the laws of the United States.

Recess was taken from 12 to 1:30.

Physicians of the city who have called at the military hospital recently, comment very highly on the work of Dr. Wood, the new regular army officer in charge. He is very anxious that the cause of the recent typhoid epidemic among the soldiers of the New York regiment shall be found and the whole matter probed to the foundation. For that reason, he has offered to give all the information he can add to furnish those whom it may concern, any records or papers at the hospital.

One of the prettiest luau that has been given in a long time was the one in Kalihi Saturday afternoon, complimentary to the ladies who assisted in the fair on the St. Louis College grounds recently and given near the home of Judge and Mrs. Wilcox. The tables were set in the old brewery and the whole place was decorated with ferns and flowers. Besides a large number of kamaainas, there was a goodly sprinkling of strangers, among the latter being several army officers.

The Department of Public Instruction has issued this "Christmas Vacation Notice" to teachers: "The Government school throughout the Hawaiian Islands will close on Friday, Dec. 23, 1898, and reopen on Monday, Jan. 9, 1899, instead of Monday, Jan. 2, as previously announced."

HABEAS CORPUS HEARING

Test Case of Present Application of Chinese Exclusion Laws.

Counsel Produce Papers and Begin the Argument—Representatives of United States, China and Hawaii Present.

The City of Peking habeas corpus matter came up before Chief Justice Judd at Chambers this morning.

J. A. Magoon, R. D. Silliman and A. G. M. Robertson appeared for the petitioners. Collector General F. B. McStocker, the respondent, and Joshua K. Brown, inspector of Chinese immigration for the United States Treasury Department, were present besides being represented by Attorney General W. O. Smith, Minister of Foreign Affairs H. E. Cooper and Assistant Attorney General A. L. C. Atkinson. The occasion attracted the presence of several members of the bar not professionally connected with the matter. U. S. Special Agent Sewall and Chinese Consul Pin and Vice Consul Goo Kim were present.

Chief Justice Judd on taking his seat, asked if the petition for a second writ, which was returnable this morning, could be argued along with that for the first writ.

The Attorney General stated that the quarantine of petitioners in the second case had not yet expired.

Counsel on neither side were ready to promise that all of the questions should depend upon the decision of those in the other. Therefore the hearing proceeded with exclusive relation to the first case, that of nine Chinese refused a landing from the steamer City of Peking.

Mr. Robertson, after the case was opened by the reading of the petition, the answer and the replication, stated that the petitioners had no evidence to offer, as the Attorney General was ready to admit that they all had return permits issued by the Hawaiian Government prior to July 7, 1898, or to the passage of the annexation resolution by the United States Congress.

The Attorney General, in response to statements in the replication, presented the Treasury instructions to Mr. Brown and other documents pertaining to his appointment.

Mr. Silliman objected to the proposed exhibits as being irrelevant, incompetent, etc., in not showing authority from the United States Government to Mr. Brown to act in his assumed capacity. He accepted a suggestion of the Attorney General that the papers might be filed for what they were worth.

Mr. Silliman then went on to argue. It was law of the United States that no residents of newly acquired territory could be deprived of their rights. The annexation resolution did not intend that any rights of aliens in the Hawaiian Islands should be taken away without due notice. Hawaiian laws relating to Chinese were not passed for the benefit of the Chinese but for that of Hawaii. They admitted laborers and rejected merchants, while the United States laws did the very reverse by rejecting laborers and admitting merchants. It was not intended in the annexation resolution that the peculiar hardships of the United States exclusion laws should go into effect in Hawaii forthwith. Action by Congress was necessary to destroy the effect of Hawaiian laws, in everything wherein the annexation resolution did not expressly do so. The Chinese clause in the resolution was simply a notice or declaration of the policy of the United States. It still remained for Congress to perform legislation by way of applying United States law to the islands, and in doing so Congress would consider the peculiar conditions existing in Hawaii.

The official organ states that "it is said" Charles Wilder is a candidate for Collector of Customs in Honolulu. The official organ can find plenty of candidates for all positions except the governorship. We do not doubt that the official circle will offer to "exchange support" if Wilder will try for the collectorship, and if Wilder is out for the place, it will not be as an undeclared candidate.

"No one fit to govern" is one of the Advertiser's funny story arguments in favor of its undeclared candidate for governor. There was this day appointed in Honolulu a new deputy clerk of court. The plum fell to a friend and protégé of Mr. Thurston, owner of the Advertiser. The new deputy clerk came to Hawaii since annexation. The appointment is a most excellent one so far as we know and we congratulate Mr. Taylor. But will the official organ say tomorrow "No one fit to be deputy clerk, or the idiots of Hawaii"?

RUN YE MUGWUMPS, RUN.

Reverting into a reminiscent mood the official organ of present Hawaiian government quotes the famous Blaine hoodoo as: "Run, Romanism and Rebellion." The organ will claim it was a mistake of the types, yet it is not surprising that such an error should occur. The official organ is so accustomed to run to cover when faced with any proposition relating to American politics.

When the official organ has been brought to face the neutrality question it has scurried to cover.

When the official organ is asked to name its candidate for governor it runs.

When the official organ is asked why its undeclared candidate President Dole has not the courage to come out boldly and honestly, the official organ runs.

When the organ's weak mugwump disloyalty is repudiated by Americans the organ skeedaddles with alacrity.

The organ confesses that the revivifying run of American loyalty had to be poured down official necks in order to keep the Hawaiian Government in line with American principle and honesty—there are matters of American principle and American honesty connected with the neutrality business, the organ dares not discuss—and now, first, last and always the official organ rebels against the prospect of a strong, patriotic American administration in the territory of Hawaii.

Our contemporary is wild in its plea for the continuation of Mr. Dole in office, yet it is so worried for fear he cannot gain the prize that it is afraid to endorse him as a candidate. The official organ fears the positive, honest Americanism of Sewall, yet it has not a name or a man to present for the candidacy. The official organ runs even at the thought of endorsing Minister Damon for governor who can carry more local votes than any man in the official ring of which Mr. Dole is the head.

From the very first the organ of Hawaii's official circle has considered it a dishonor for any man to accept the request of friends and announce his candidacy for the highest executive position in Hawaii. It puts the same low debased, un-American estimate upon the governorship of Hawaii that it placed on the first, whipped-into-line action of Hawaii's executive in the neutrality matter. On the other hand the official organ dares not deny that President Dole is a

candidate for governor; it dares not deny that President Dole's trip to Washington is entirely unnecessary so far as the work of the Hawaiian Commission is concerned; it dares not deny that Mr. Hartwell—whose part in the neutrality campaign was nothing more or less than rank American disloyalty to say the least—is or will be advocating in Washington the appointment of President Dole as first governor of Hawaii. The official organ by virtue of an inherent cowardice, and American disloyalty evades constantly and studiously what it knows to be political facts.

By quoting from political platforms it is fair to presume that the Advertiser is seeking some way in which to voice Owner Thurston's remark: "Hawaii for the Hawaiians." 'Tis a catchy phrase, but what has the official organ done to create a Hawaii for the Hawaiians! When the franchise question was before the Commission how much influence did the official circle exert, how many arguments did the official organ bring to light favoring a liberal American policy in dealing with the franchise? What efforts were put forth to create by liberal franchise a Hawaii for the Hawaiians? What Hercules fighting was done to create in Hawaii a home rule that will compare with that of other American territories?

Let the official organ of this territory tell the people what was done, or what is being done to put the rule of this territory in the hands of anyone outside the undeclared candidate's official circle. Point to one single incident where it has not interpreted "home rule" as "present official rule." Why should the official organ be so ardently in favor of home rule, when it tacitly if not openly favored the restricted franchise? Party platforms are pointed to when Mr. Dole's candidacy is threatened. What about party platform references to immigration, party platform declarations on the tariff, party platform assertions on shipping laws, party platform demands for the right of every American citizen to vote? This is another story of course and the official mouthpiece fears to face it. "Home rule" and "Hawaii for the Hawaiians" comes from the official organ. With what echoes of mockery this rebounds from the acts and words of the official circle.

The Advertiser has repeatedly talked of a candidate for "A territory that does not exist." Now it quotes from party platforms for the benefit of "a territory that does not exist," and did not exist when the party declarations were made. The organ not only fails to stand by the full party platforms but also evades its own utterances.

If Congress had intended to treat Hawaii as any other territory of the United States, it would simply have extended Federal laws with the act of annexation. But Congress, because it recognized the American spirit of the rank and file of the Americans of Honolulu, whom the Advertiser sneers at and whom the organ and its friends sought to betray by advocating a declaration of neutrality, and because it recognized here evils which could not be incorporated into the American body politic, provided for a Commission which should report "such legislation for the Hawaiian Islands as it deemed necessary and proper." It is for the commission to say whether the governor shall be appointed from among the residents or not. And as a matter of fact Mr. Sewall has resided here longer than many men who received prompt official appointive recognition from the present official circle.

Perhaps the Advertiser has heard that the undeclared candidate pleaded to have the residence

provision inserted in the Commission report and it was rejected by the American members for reasons that were obvious and which the American members were careful to express then and there.

Possibly the Advertiser knows all this, hence its agitation, hence the fear of the undeclared candidate, hence the tendency to run on the part of the official organ. The official organ knows too much about the neutrality record of cowardice and treason, and hence doesn't care or dare to go into details.

What corner will the official organ run to next? Will it, can it, give us the names of present American territorial Federal officials who were kamaainas in the territories where they now hold office?

Warren Suspended.

Chas. Warren, captain on the police force, was this morning suspended from duty by the Deputy Marshal, for conduct unbecoming an officer while in the performance of his duties. Warren did not care to await the return of Marshal Brown and forthwith announced his intention to sever all connection with the Police Department. No appointments will be made until the return of Marshal Brown. In the meantime, Lieut. Rickard will take Warren's place and Pohaku will act in Rickard's place.

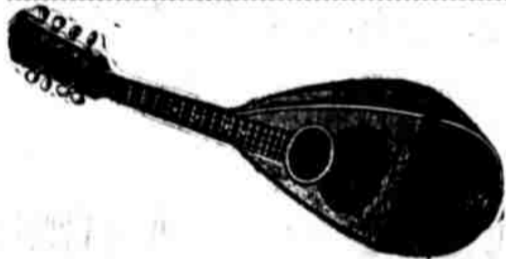

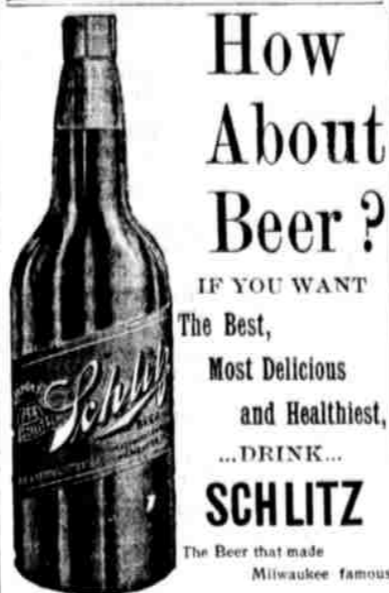

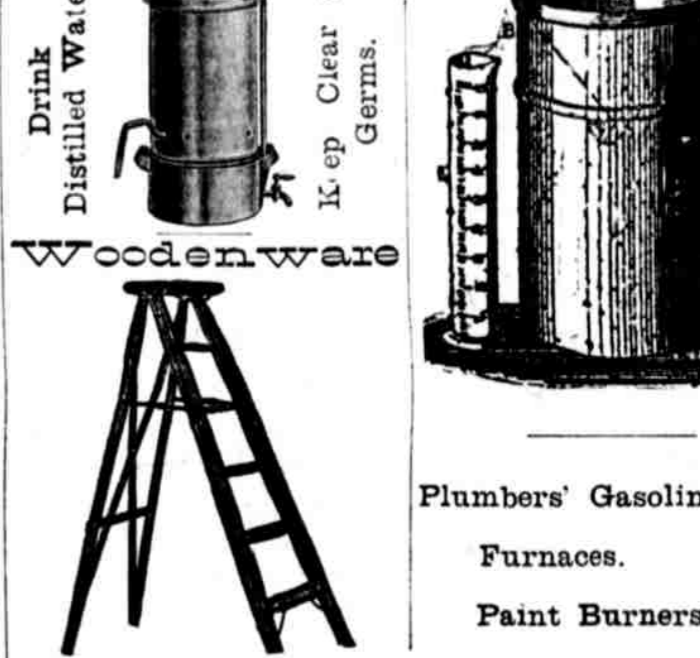
