The Trial Trip of the Ehukai.

On Friday, at 2:30 p.m., she cast off from the wharf carrying a large number of Mr. Cooke's friends, who had been invited to witness the trial—all told there were 65 on board. It was very soon observed that she answered to the slightest movement of the wheel, and that perfect control of her course could be had. For a little while the breeze was faint and hardly perceptible but soon after passing the bell buoy the wind sprang up and the little vessel danced along over the waves, much to the comfort of our reporter whose harrowing feelings on the subject of the friends he had left on shore overcame him. It was not sea sickness—oh, no—it was merely grief at being thus rudely torn from the embraces of his companions who had bidden him farewell on the wharf with a tear in one eye and a wink in the other.

The bell buoy was reached at 17 minutes to 3 and shortly afterwards the schooner went on the in-shore tack, to allow the Waialele to come up and then have a trial of speed. As soon as the Waialele was abreast the Ehukai went round and then an exciting race began amidst opposing cheers from both vessels. Mr. A. F. Cooke, who was now steering the Ehukai, took his hat off and baring his manly locks to the breeze, encircled them with a white handkerchief and elevating himself behind the wheel, steered ahead determined to win or perish in the attempt. Very soon the Waialele was distanced and ironical cheers greeted her attempted manoeuvre of getting to windward and taking the wind out of our sails.

At 9 minutes past 3 the Waialele gave up the unequal contest and turned for home. The commander of the Ehukai speedily followed suit and the homeward chase commenced. In less time than it takes to write it however, the Waialele, notwithstanding start was passed. On approaching the Consuelo, Mr. Cooke to test the powers of the vessel put her about and sailed back past the Waialele and then turning again arrived at the anchorage as soon as her, at about 4:15. Throughout the trip was most enjoyable, and you can imagine the fervors with which our reporter was received into the bosoms of his anxious friends, and the thoughtful inquiries as to his health. We deem it necessary to state here that the story of 3 sharks inviting our reporter to follow his dinner is a pure fabrication, circulated by some persons envious of his command over his feelings during the trip.

The view of the shore as the vessel passed along was magnificent, and probably few of our readers have ever enjoyed a better panorama than was seen on this trip. We noticed the Marine Railway is rapidly approaching completion and now forms a conspicuous feature in the view of the harbor.

The Ehukai is built by James Dower, and is of 45 tons burthen. On the trip her draught was 5 feet. The keel was laid in February last. She is built for inter island trade, and will go to Waialua weekly.

The band will give a second moonlight concert, at Emma Square, on this evening.

Farewell to Miss Comly.

One of those pleasant, informal, enjoyable reunions, whose tendency is to sweeten and happily life, occurred at the residence of the Hon. J. I. Dowsett, last Friday evening. The occasion was to do honor to Miss Comly, who is about to return, along with her parents, to her home in Ohio. The company consisted of young folks—young Hawaii and young America harmoniously blending and forgetting all national distinctions. The guests assembled by invitation of Mrs. Dowsett. The early part of the evening passed in music, dancing, and cheerful talk. Adjournment to an adjacent building followed at 11 o'clock, the purpose of which was to participate in a spread of delicacies and luxuries that would have gratified and satisfied the gastronomic cravings of Epicurus. After this was a repetition of the first part of the programme—more dancing, more music, more pleasant intercourse. At one o'clock came the hour for dispersing, and everybody was sorry. Sorry that the evening's pleasure had ended, sorry to part company with the generous host and hostess, sorry to separate from each other, and sorry, most of all, to bid adieu to the young lady in whose honor the festivities had taken place. For the company was composed of the intimate personal friends and companions of Miss Comly, whose affection and confidence she had inspired, by gentleness of demeanor and goodness of heart, during her stay of five years in Honolulu.

It is rumored that Mr. Boyd, of the Interior Office, has accepted Mr. Smithies' offer of Master of the Horse, to his proposed Siam Legation. We wish Mr. Boyd joy.

The brig Hazard, Captain Miller, 14 days from San Francisco, arrived at Kahului, on the 23rd instant. She brought a general cargo. Mrs. H. Wiggers and 2 children, and 50 Chinese were passengers.

On Monday last, at noon, an old man named Makoonoona, upwards of 70 years old, was returning to his home in the valley below the bridge at Waihee, and coming along the top of a bank 50 feet high, he was attacked by a pet ram belonging to a native named Solomon Hole. The first blow knocked the old man down, and the second rolled him over a nearly perpendicular precipice. He struck the bottom on his head and cut an awful gash 3 inches in length. He died instantaneously.

On Friday night while the Band was playing, an unheard of effect occurred. In one of the pieces a piccolo solo was to be played. The performer was a little nervous, and Mr. Berger questioned him before the piece began as to his ability to go through with it. But when the solo was about half finished, to the surprise of everybody, the soloist laid down his instrument and sang the remainder of it, in the proper key, and with all the marks of expression required. We believe also that a mistake occurred in printing the name of one selection in the programmes. We mention this as Mr. Berger was accused of substituting one piece for another.

Mr. Furneaux has just finished three fine pictures of the scenery of Puna, Hawaii. The first is what is known as the Green Lake, Kapohe. The water of the lake is green, and the rich tropical foliage growing on the banks, by its reflection, aids in producing the intense verdant green of the water. Within a stone's throw of the Green Lake is a warm spring, crescent shaped, and of a vivid ultramarine in color, which forms the subject of the second picture. The spring, named the Blue Lake, is 90 deg. in temperature and 900 feet above the level of the sea. The water is wonderfully clear and, strange to relate, at this elevation, it has a regular rise and fall which is said to correspond to the tide of the ocean. The third view is a moonlight scene on the beach, at Kau, near Puna. Some natives are landing their nets, and in the background are some cocoanut and lauhala trees. The effect of the tropical moonlight on the water is enchanting. We look on these three pictures, either as a triptych or singly, as being chef-d'oeuvres of landscape painting. They are well worth a visit.

The Gazette's mail issue yesterday is a monument of newspaper enterprise. It reflects the greatest credit on the energy of Mr. Grieve.

The steamer Australia arrived at 1 p. m. yesterday from the colonies. She left Sydney on Aug. 10, and Auckland on the 15. She experienced rough weather between Auckland and Honolulu.

Yesterday at 12:45 p.m. the fire bell was rung vigorously. The fire was on the roof of Ramsay's store, on Hotel street. In a short time the fire was put out.

Last Friday evening Mr. and Mrs. Feer gave a dinner party at the Consulate to the French residents. A most enjoyable evening was spent, and the party did not break up till a late hour.

FRIDAY evening was a great Celestial feast-day, corresponding to the Feast of All Souls. Outside the theatre joss-sticks, candles, and paper prayers for the dead were burnt: cakes, fruit, nuts were thrown into the air: and gin, pork, chicken, and rice were arranged on mats with plates, bowls, and chopsticks laid out as for a dinner. Inside, Joss was specially decorated for the occasion, and sticks of cinnamon and sandal wood kept burning before him all night. These ceremonies are performed for the double object of providing clothes and food for the dead, and appeasing the poor devil who might otherwise trouble the spirits.

LATE FOREIGN NEWS.

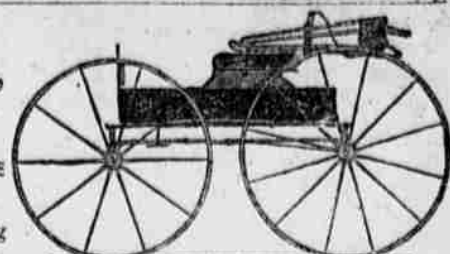

#### The Misogynist.

"How true is Washington Irving's description: 'Thus have I seen,' he says, 'some pestilent shrew of a house-wife, after filling her home with uproar and ill-humor, come dimpling out of doors, swimming and curtsying, and smiling upon all the world.'" After this, with his queer little face puckered up in enjoyment of his theme, he launched out into a diatribe on the disadvantages of matrimony. First he quoted a rude comparison—I think by Seneca—between telling one's wife a secret and unnecessarily taking a sea voyage. Then he bethought him of Montaigne's saying: "Cato, like ourselves, was disgusted with his wife." From that he proceeded to another saying of Montaigne's, that marriage was like a cage: those who were out of it were always wanting to get in, and those who are within were all for coming out—a saying which, he said, was no doubt borrowed from Chaucer's lines:

"Marriage is such a rabble rout,  
That those who were out would fain get in,  
And those who are in would fain get out."  
The last line, he thought, was certainly true, the second one less universally so. Then he had a fling at people who married twice, and wondered if any one had ever been so fortunate as Mabouf in "Les Miserables," who, being asked whether he had ever been married, replied, "J'ai oublié!" "Did you ever read 'Holy Living'?" You will find there what a saintly man thought of mothers-in-law. He tells how a man threw a stone at a dog; the stone missed the dog, but hit his mother-in-law. "Thus," says the pious author, "the stone was not worthy in vain." "Pomposity thought that I was speaking to him, and answered with friendly gravity, 'One of the advantages of that holy state which we have heard so strangely aspersed is the influence of the matron in discouraging irregular hours. I wish you a good night, sir.'" "Good night, sir—good night," chirped the voice of the misogynist after us. "You know what Jeremy Taylor says? 'Better sit up all night than go to bed with a dragon!'"

A citizen who lately built himself a residence, was the other day showing a friend through it, and, when everything had been noticed and discussed, he asked: "Well, do you see any place where you could improve it?" "Yes, I noticed a bad error right at the start," was the reply. Being asked to explain, he continued: "You have no balcony in front." "But I didn't want one." "Well, perhaps not; but when you are run-

ning for office and the band come up to serenade you, and the populace calls for a speech, you will either have to go to the roof or come down to the ground to respond. A balcony is a sort of middle ground—just high enough to escape making pledges, and not too high to promise all sorts of reform. Ought to have a balcony, sir: regret it if you don't." *Austin, Texas, Siftings.*

An account of a shocking tragedy on the high seas was related in the Thames Police Court during the trial of John Anderson for murder of a sailor. The ship *Cuttysark* sailed from London on May 5, 1880, for Singapore, having on board the prisoner as chief officer and the sailor since killed. The steward's story was that, while the ship was rounding the Cape of Good Hope, John Anderson had struck the deceased over the head with a capstan bar, from the effects of which he died on the following day. The Captain then confined the mate to his room, to which the steward carried his meals. In the beginning of September, while the ship was at anchor in the roads of Auger the prisoner told the steward that he had arranged with the Captain to make his escape, and during the night he disappeared. On the second day out from Auger the Captain committed suicide by jumping overboard.

The ship was brought back by the second mate. John Anderson, who had made his escape, shipped as second mate in the *Marianne Gottebohn*, and on the ship's arrival in London was apprehended. He claimed that the act was done in self-defense, but the matter evidently preyed on the Captain's mind and led him to commit suicide.

Since the advent of the toy pistol kerosene has been put to the blush.

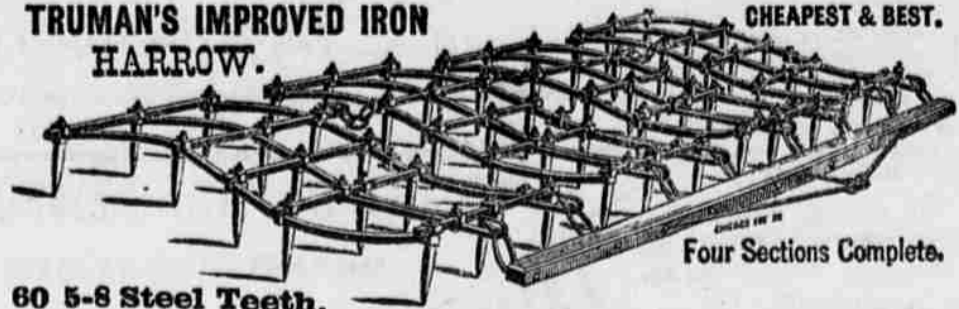

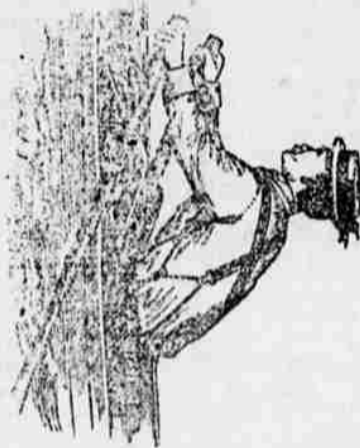
