THE LEGISLATURE.

WORK OF OUR LEGISLATURE SO LONG THIS MORNING.

The Appropriations for the Central Fire Station and Nuuanu Street Bridge Fail to Pass.

TWENTY-EIGHTH DAY, JULY 17TH.

THE SENATE.

House bill 13, an act to regulate the acquisition of rights of way over the lands of others was read in the Senate yesterday afternoon for the first time and passed.

After the usual preliminaries this morning Senator Lyman reported from the committee on Internal Improvements an item of \$3000 for the improvement of the waterworks at Hilo and recommended that it pass.

The same Senator also reported in regard to the bridge over Nuuanu stream. The committee find that a steel bridge of 70-foot span would cost \$10,000 while a stone one of three 25-foot spans would cost \$33,000. The committee recommend that under present financial conditions no outlay be made at the present time and that the matter be laid over to the next legislature.

The committee also reported unfavorably on the petition of residents of Hamakua district for an appropriation of \$9,000 for roads and bridges. Report tabled to come up with the bill.

Senator Lyman moved that the vote of the Senate on the Land Bill yesterday be reconsidered, and explained that since yesterday it had been found desirable to change the title of the bill to conform more closely to the requirements of the Constitution. Carried. The bill was then referred to the Judiciary Committee.

The Printing Committee through Senator Rice reported that it had approved printing bills to the extent of \$390.90.

Senator Rice was granted leave of absence for the balance of the week.

The following resolution adopted at a special meeting of the Oahu American Union Party Central Committee on July 13th, 1895, was read and on motion was laid on the table to be considered with the bill:

"RESOLVED: That we earnestly recommend immediate consideration by the Senate of the granting of a franchise for an electric railway in the city of Honolulu, and that while conserving the interest of the people, they secure the establishment and building of such Electric Railway without delay."

The bill changing the location of the Circuit Court from Kau to Kona passed its third reading.

The Act making supplementary appropriations for internal improvements then came up with the report of the Committee.

The item of \$2500 for a retaining wall below the Chinese wash-houses passed.

The item of \$10,000 for a steel bridge over Nuuanu stream was stricken out.

In relation to the item of \$19,000 for a central fire station, Senator Lyman stated that a suitable building could not be erected for less than \$30,000 or \$35,000 and that the Committee thought it desirable to have a good building if any at all. The Committee base their estimates on the cost and progress made on the pumping plant building.

Senator McCandless said that no proper estimates or plans of the proposed building had been made, either by the Minister of

Interior or the Superintendent of Public Works.

Minister Damon was in favor of having definite plans made out before final action was taken.

The item was stricken out with the understanding that the matter would come up at the regular session.

The item of \$800 for teacher's cottage at Puna passed.

Senator Lyman moved that an item of \$3000 for the improvement of the waterworks at Hilo be inserted. He showed that that sum would connect the present system with springs three-quarters of a mile further up and insure a constant supply of water. The Senator stated that the present pipe system was entirely inadequate, especially if it did not rain for two or three weeks.

Minister Damon recommended in the absence of the Minister of the Interior that the appropriation be made \$5000, so as to put in a 10 inch pipe in place of the 6 inch one now in use. The amendment carried and the item was added to the bill.

The bill as amended reduces the appropriations from \$32,500 to \$8,300 and in this shape passed its second reading and was referred to the engrossing committee.

Adjourned to Thursday.

THE REPRESENTATIVES.

House met at 10 a. m.

A message from the Senate announced the third reading in that chamber of the appropriation bill; also, of the joint resolution for a commission to investigate the liquor business.

The bill extending the term of the licenses of saloon keepers in Honolulu passed third reading, Messrs. Hanana and Davis voting against it.

The appropriation bill from the Senate was sent back for the correction of discrepancies.

The joint resolution for a liquor trade commission was taken up.

After discussion the resolution was referred to the committee on public health.

At 11 o'clock the House adjourned for the day.

Police News.

Three out of nine Chinese arrested pleaded guilty of gambling and were sentenced by Judge Perry to pay a fine of \$10 and costs each. Those who pleaded not guilty were discharged.

The charge of mayhem against S. Kahano was reduced to assault and battery, to which he pleaded guilty this morning. Sentence suspended.

Pila Paau and Makea Paau charged with forcibly, deceitfully and fraudulently kidnaping one Josephine Puhealualiali will be tried on the 18th.

J. T. Rebello was fined \$5 and costs for using lewd language.

Manuel Madeiros was tried for assault and battery on one Mr. J. Chamusca, was found not guilty and discharged.

F. Gomez was also discharged after being tried on the same charge, the prosecuting witness being N. J. Luiz. The counter-charge against Luiz was dismissed.

Good Words for Amorino.

Joe McAuliffe, who rode Lord Brock and Billy C. here on June 11, speaking of Mr. Ballentyne's horse to a San Francisco Chronicle reporter, said Amorino was a Hawaiian bred horse that he thought could win at the Bay District track, San Francisco, as he considered the Honolulu track three seconds slow to the mile.

Bishop Willis has gone to the other islands.

BOUGHT A PALACE.

Board of Education Acquires the Bishop Premises For a School.

Negotiations for the purchase of the residence of C. R. Bishop on Emma street, part of the property left by the late Princess Bernice Pauahi Bishop, by the Board of Education have been completed.

The building is a palace and will be used for an academy, of which Prof. M. M. Scott will be principal, to be transferred from Fort street school. That institution will be retained for the primary grades. The following appointments have been made by the Board:

W. O. Crowell of Kamehameha normal class, principal of Government school at Hilea, Kau, Hawaii.

D. K. Kanewani, Kamehameha normal class, principal at Olowalu, Maui.

Lilinoe Hapai, first assistant at Waianae.

J. Lenhart, teacher at Lahainaluna, Maui, in place of F. W. Abbott, transferred to be principal at Kaupo, Maui.

Zach McKeague, principal at Keokea, Maui.

Pohakimohuwa, transferred from Waimahalo, to be principal at Waialua, Oahu.

Mr. and Mrs. Lemon at Pahoe-hoe, Hawaii, vice M. F. Scott, resigned, and Florence Scott, transferred to Holuolua, Kona, Hawaii.

Miss Julia Perry, third assistant at Pohukaina school, vice Miss Annie Perry.

W. B. Starkey, transferred from Kaupo, Maui, to Wainiha, Kauai, to be made an English school.

Miss Lillian Brown has resigned as teacher in Fort street school.

Miss M. G. Beckwith, the newly appointed drawing teacher from New Jersey, will begin her duties on September 1st.

THE JUNE RAINFALL.

Extracts from Curtis J. Lyons' Weather Report.

From the report of Curtis J. Lyons, in charge of the Weather Bureau, it would appear that more or less rain fell in all the islands of the group. On this island less rain fell at Waianae and Kapiolani park than any other locality, the former place only getting .10 of an inch and the latter .17. The Electric Light station got more than its share and the greatest fall on the island: 4.27 inches.

On Hawaii, Honoum is credited with 9.43 inches, Waiakea 6.08, Pepeekeo 6.36, Laupahoehoe 6.67, Kau 3.68, Kohala 2.96, Waimea 1.62 and Hilea .50.

On Maui 5.60 inches of rain fell at Mokea reservoir, 2.95 at Reciprocity Mill, 3.38 at Kula and 1.44 at Kaanapali.

On the island of Kauai, Hanalei comes first with 3.90 inches, Hanamaulu 1.61, Lihue 1.32 and Waiawa .58.

Molokai got nearly three inches of rain but only .65 fell on Lanai.

BY AUTHORITY.

ACT 2.

AN ACT TO CONFER UPON THE MARSHAL AND HIS DEPUTIES, THE SHERIFFS AND THEIR DEPUTIES, THE POWER TO ADMINISTER OATHS.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Republic of Hawaii:

SECTION 1. The Marshal and his Deputies and the several Sheriffs and their respective Deputies are hereby authorized to administer oaths in all cases in which oaths are by law authorized or required to be taken or administered, or in which the administering of an oath may be proper.

SECTION 2. This Act shall take effect from the date of its publication.

ACT 3.

AN ACT RELATING TO THE RESTRICTION OF CHINESE IMMIGRATION.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Republic of Hawaii:

SECTION 1. It shall be lawful for the Minister of Foreign Affairs to grant permits as shall be recommended by the Board of Immigration, upon the application of the employers of domestic, agricultural or mill labor, to any Chinese now residing in the Hawaiian Islands under temporary residents permits issued in accordance with Section 2 of Chapter 80 of the Session Laws of 1892, to remain in this country as agricultural laborers, or domestic servants.

SECTION 2. Such permit shall contain the condition, printed in both the English language and in Chinese characters, that the bearer is allowed to remain in this country solely on condition that while here, he will engage in no trading or mechanical occupation, other than domestic service or agricultural labor in the field, or in rice or sugar mills, and that he will whenever he shall cease to follow his vocation as agricultural laborer in the field, or in rice or sugar mills or as domestic servant, leave this country, and that for every breach of such condition, he shall, on conviction by any District Magistrate, be liable to a fine of one hundred dollars.

SECTION 3. Upon the issuance of such permit to such laborer or servant, the conditions upon which he entered this country shall be void, and the bond theretofore given by him shall be cancelled, and he shall thereafter be subject to all the conditions, restraints, regulations and penalties, which are imposed by law upon Chinese who come to this country to engage in domestic service or agricultural labor in the field, or in rice or sugar mills upon permits issued to them under the provisions of Chapter 80 of the Laws of 1892, as amended by Act 74 of the Laws of the Provisional Government, and Act 27 of the Laws of the Republic of Hawaii.

SECTION 4. Such Chinese laborers and servants shall be included in and be a part of the five thousand Chinese whose entrance into this country is authorized under Section 2 of Chapter 80 of the Session Laws of 1892.

SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect from the date of its approval.

THE ELECTRIC RAILWAY CHARTER.

It is unfortunate for those whose interests the Star is advocating that it is allowing its temper to get the better of its judgment. It is not pursuing the discussion in regard to the railway charter with the calmness and prudence that ought to characterize a controversy of this nature. If there are any objections of a nature that would warrant the Senate in rejecting the bill, the Star should produce them.

The exemptions as to taxation, limited to the two years during which the road will be under construction, is certainly not a sufficient reason; nor is the exemption from custom duty a very important matter, as the material will be almost wholly purchased in the United States and by treaty will be free of duty. The plans and specifications have to be submitted to the Minister of the Interior for his approval, before any work can be done on the road. This in plain English means that the Minister must approve the plans (showing the location and style of the road) and specifications (the material and method of construction), before the company can do one stroke of work, and it is a question in our minds, as to whether this provision is not altogether too far reaching. The Minister would have it in his power to refuse his approval, and thereby actually prevent the construction of the road.

The interest of the public as to rates and service is also, in our judgment, fully protected, as the company's tables require the consent of the Executive Council. The Council can surely be depended on to see that the community will not be imposed upon.

The company undertakes to have fifteen miles of the road constructed within two years, and in operation, and the service has to be approved by the Executive, otherwise they forfeit the right to use any streets not then occupied by them. The success of the project as a business proposition depends upon the company constructing and operating at least fifteen miles, and no better safe guard in this connection than their own interest is required.

It has been suggested that the company provide a satisfactory bond for a reasonable amount that they will begin construction within a fixed period. We understand from this morning's Advertiser that there is no objection to give a bond that they will begin actual bona fide construction, within a reasonable period after they are in possession of an undisputed right of way, or if they have proper assurance that they will have possession of this right of way at a fixed period, they will fix a positive date in the bond.

It must not be forgotten that there is another side to this question—the benefits to be derived both by the city and Government, such as increased value of property and increased revenue to the Government from taxation, both on the company's plant and property benefited by the construction of the road, the facilities for rapid, cheap and clean transit,

the annual expenditure of not less than \$135,000 amongst our people on account of wages and supplies and the greater inducement for tourists to visit the islands as the construction of the road will, in all probability, mean the construction of modern hotels at Waikiki. This has been along-felt want, yet strange to say none of local capitalists have had sufficient enterprise or pluck to undertake the construction of such a building.

It is practically a year since our Victoria friends filed their application with the Executive for this franchise. If local capital is ready to build the road why has it not come forward with an application for a charter. It would unquestionably be given the preference. Evidently local capitalists are not ready to undertake it, and are we then to be deprived of the benefit which the construction of the road will confer upon this community?

OBSERVATIONS.

Another filibuster yarn is wiped up. The yacht Aggie, which was reported as having left San Francisco laden with arms for Hawaiian revolutionists, is heard from as late as the 7th inst. passing up Puget Sound to Seattle. Captain Pharo denied all connection with the alleged filibustering expedition. Yet the taxpayers of Hawaii have to foot the coal bills incurred by our "navy" in responding to madcap alarms about such vessels that are engaged in legitimate business more than two thousand miles from our coasts.

According to the report of the United States Steamboat Inspection Service, the loss of life in the United States by disasters to steamers is only one in 2,708,333 passengers carried. Under the law of 1852 the average loss of life was one person to every 250,181 persons carried. The large decrease in fatality is credited to the law of 1871, which greatly improved the service. The loss of life on steam vessels last year was 368, an increase of 128 over the average for the past eighteen years. This increase was caused by the loss of the Colima off the Pacific coast. The foregoing figures show that it is comparatively safe to go to sea in steamers nowadays.

Timely Topics

AN ADMIRAL ANNOYED.

Astoria Revelers Throw Firecrackers on a Steamer and Make Trouble.

Admiral Walker's stately figure is so recent a remembrance in Honolulu that the following account of a disagreeable experience the veteran sailor met with at Astoria, Oregon, will be of local interest. It is from a Portland dispatch:

The lighthouse tender Columbine arrived at Astoria from Alaska early on the morning of the Fourth of July. Captain Farenholt, superintendent of this district, had as guests on the trip Rear-Admiral Walker, chairman of the Lighthouse Board, and Chief Clerk A. B. Johnson of the department. The passage around from the Sound to the Columbia was unusually rough, and Admiral Walker was very seasick. Even Captain Richardson was sick. Shortly after the tender came to the dock a party of young bloods, headed by Sheriff Hare, who had already got well started on celebrating the Fourth, hearing that the Columbine was in, went down to pay their respects to Captain Richardson, whom they all knew.

Unfortunately Admiral Walker occupied the Captain's cabin and as it was early the Captain had not turned out, so the party threw a lot of fireworks on board and into the room where Admiral Walker was, not only arousing him from his slumbers, but badly scaring him. The watch on deck rushed ashore to put a stop to their funny business, and at once became engaged in a fight with the party, in which black eyes and bloody noses were plentiful. The Sheriff drew his pistol and threatened to shoot when the tars, being unarmed, retreated. Admiral Walker was, of course, indignant, but only faintly so compared to Inspector Farenholt or Captain Richardson. The tender came up to Portland, but no one said a word about the affair, and it was not until after the Columbine sailed that the facts came out through Astoria papers. The Admiral rewarded the sailors for their efforts to preserve him from annoyance.

LIQUOR IN FRANCE.

The Government Forced to Act in Behalf of Temperance.

A recent dispatch to the New York World says: Here, as in America, the regulation of the liquor traffic is a burning question. For six weeks Parliament has been occupied in the discussion of the proposition of a state monopoly of alcoholic drinks, the exemption of hygienic drinks, such as wines, beers and cider, from the present taxes. The Chamber had accepted both principles, in spite of the opposition of the Government and the distillers, but the bill to embody the second principle was nearly defeated, owing to the apathy of the Ministry in the final debate yesterday, when, to the surprise of everybody, the law abolishing taxes on drinks containing less than 15 per cent of alcohol, was voted by a large majority. The law also doubles the alcohol tax, in order to balance the budget, until the organization of the state monopoly. An amendment was unanimously carried, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of spirits or liquors declared to be dangerous by the Academy of Medicine. This provision involves the suppression of absinthe, bitters, "pick-me-ups" and many kinds of liquors. The law will probably be voted by the Senate, with slight modifications.

The recent ravages of alcoholism in France have necessitated drastic measures. Since 1887 the amount of absinthe annually consumed has nearly trebled, and nervous diseases and insanity traceable to the influence of alcoholic poisoning have increased in similar proportions. The fiscal situation has also demanded a new source of revenue. A State monopoly of alcohol, it is estimated, will produce 113,000,000 francs annually more than the present system of taxation. M. Ribot was originally hostile, but not daring to oppose the majority, has accepted the law.

Under pressure of the opinion of medical men and lunacy specialists, M. Poincare, Minister of Public Instruction, recently nominated a commission to inquire as to the best means of combating the spread of alcoholism. The result of its deliberations is still secret, but a prominent member of the commission informed me that the commission had agreed to recommend the introduction of anti-alcoholic teaching in all primary schools. A subsequent extension of similar teaching will be made in the female secondary schools. A large temperance society was recently founded under the auspices of the medical profession to combat the use of spirituous liquors, and owing to its reasonable methods, of propaganda and the absence of intolerance and fanaticism, the society is progressing rapidly.

YARNS FLOATING AROUND.

ADMIRAL WALKER HAS A FOURTH OF JULY.

Steamer Iwalani to Windward Kaula -- Schooner Sarah and Eliza to Waimanalo--Other Items.

Steamer Lehua overdue from Necker Island.

The schooner Sarah and Eliza took a load to Waimanalo today.

The British bark Velocity left Hongkong for this port May 29th.

The schooner Bertie Minor hence from this port arrived in Port Townsend July 1st.

President Wight of the Wilder Steamship Company has gone on a tour of inspection.

The steamship City of Peking is due to night from Yokohama en route to the Coast.

A full and accurate list of sailing vessels expected at this port will be found in this paper.

The steamer Iwalani came off the marine railway this morning and leaves this evening for Hanamau, Kilauea, Kaihiwai and Hanalei.

The deadly dust clouds rolled down from the esplanade all today, making life miserable for those employed on the wharves. Why can't the government do some sprinkling?

The following vessels are loading coal at Newcastle for this port; the British barks St Julien, Onyx, and City of Adelaide, the Hawaiian bark Mauna Ala and the American schooner King Cyrus.

The government dredger closed down yesterday for a few days' rest, during which she will coal and have her engines cleaned up.

Captain Smith expects to finish the excavation he is now engaged on in about a month.

The American Shipbuilder says: Arthur Sewall & Co., of Bath, Me., will build a steel shipentine, as a sister ship to the Dirigo. It is not at all likely that any four-masted steel sailing ships will ever be built in the United States as British shipowners have about satisfied themselves that yards on the jigger mast are useless for practical purposes.

A number of drunken rowdies disturbed Rear Admiral Walker at Astoria on July 4th, by boarding the light house tender Columbine on which he was making a trip of inspection. The crowd had to be thrown off the vessel by the sailors. Admiral Walker having completed the inspection of the north-west coast is now on board the lighthouse tender Madrona of the California district.

Will steam take the grain trade? is the question now agitating the owners of big sailing vessels who have hitherto counted on Pacific Coast wheat as one certain cargo. Of course steam will take it when the Nicaragua Canal is completed, but the present anxiety is due to the recent chartering of the first steamer in the trade from San Francisco to Europe via Cape Horn. (Marine Journal.)
