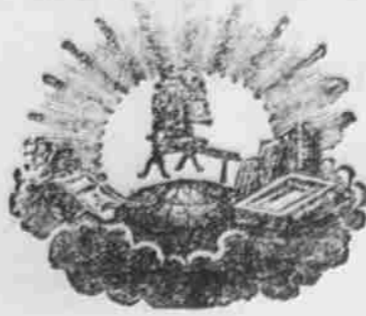

The Hilo Record of July 23 strongly urges on its townspeople the desirability of having a good public hall that would be an ornament to the town.

CHINESE IN JAVA.

The following is from a Batavian paper. It illustrates John Chinaman's methods of pushing himself in the world, so well known in these islands. Had the Hawaiian gates not been made straiter by recent legislation, we should now be sharing with Java, from the same cause as here stated, a fresh incursion of Chinese.

Now that Chinese emigrants find themselves shut out of Australia they come in increasing numbers to Java. In one day, about the middle of last month, no less than 180 of them arrived at Batavia. These newcomers generally begin by competing with the native coolies. After scraping a little money together, they set up shop and run the native keepers hard. Upon getting on a little further in the world, they end by competing with European tradesmen. In fact the Chinese, by their elbowing prevarications and moneyed power, arouse animosity in Java.

A COMMON NUISANCE.

A complaint has previously been made through this paper of an abattoir refuse cart that disseminates a foul odor among the houses along the Palama road. It still continues and is a public nuisance. One prominent resident has had to change the hour of his breakfast, as the cart passing during that meal drove him from the table. Complaint was made to the Health Office and the Police Station. Capt. Larsen sent a policeman of his watch and had the driver of the cart arrested, but only to be released immediately as the Health authorities would not support his prosecution. The ground of their objection was that as the cart was moving and not kept stationary anywhere, it did not come within the meaning of a nuisance. So, then, anything the most repulsive to the senses, if it "keeps moving," must be tolerated. Perhaps the rights of the subject are involved, as, if the cart were tabooed, the next sanitary campaign might be against persons shedding an aroma of garlic and whisky, or of hamburger cheese, who should be kept in durance vile until they consented to purification by a Kona. Seriously, however, we think the Board of Health ought to stop that blood cart or compel its substitution with an airtight vehicle. If not the offended citizens may have to combine for assailing the nuisance through a higher channel.

SAN FRANCISCO MERCHANTS AROUSED.

At the quarterly meeting of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce on July 23, the principal matter dealt with was that of California's maritime interests in the Pacific. The basis of discussion was a communication from Capt. Wm. L. Merry, who prefaced a set of resolutions with a statement of what is denominated "a fact recognized by well-informed merchants, that the Government of Great Britain designs the concentration of the maritime commerce of the Pacific Ocean at the western terminus of the Canadian Pacific Railway." Capt. Merry particularizes and comments upon this British purpose as follows:

To attain this end a mail steamship line has been already established thence to Japan and China; other lines are projected to New Zealand and Australia, via the Hawaiian Islands, Samoa and Fiji, and also to Panama via Mexican and Central American ports, connecting with her steamship lines on the west coast of South America via the Straits of Magellan to Atlantic ports and the English islands. These steamship lines will be covered by large and rapid vessels, useful for purposes of war, literally compensated for carriage of ocean mails. An Australian cable to Honolulu and New Zealand will supplement this maritime enterprise, with the obvious result of great injury to our foreign commerce and decided detriment to our entire country, especially to our Pacific States. This is especially a matter which concerns every merchant, every real estate owner and every citizen of San Francisco. What are our capitalists or our Government doing to offset this policy, so pregnant with injury to our commercial and political interests? Thus far absolutely nothing. Shall we suppose permit the historical commercial policy of Great Britain to wrest from us the commerce of the Pacific? Shall we depend upon the geographical advantages which the Almighty has given the port of San Francisco and do nothing to help ourselves?

The writer of the letter then proceeds to say that, as the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce occupies the honorable position of priority in the protection of American interests at Samoa, that body should now promptly and earnestly impress upon Congress and the Executive, as well as upon their countrymen generally, the absolute necessity of prompt action to maintain their commercial interests on the Pacific against the commercially aggressive policy of Great Britain.

The resolutions passed unanimously. They included the calling of a special session of the Chamber, to which Pacific Coast Congressmen and other chambers of commerce should be invited, for the consideration of special subjects, among which are the following:

"The permanent establishment of ocean mail steamship lines on the routes before named, and the liberal compensation by the Government for the carriage of ocean mails on said lines by steamships available for war and transport purposes.

"The maritime defense of Pacific Coast ports.

"An ocean telegraph cable to Australia via the Pacific Islands.

"The energetic construction of the Nicaragua Canal as a means of national defense and commercial development.

"The encouragement of maritime commerce and increased energy in the construction of a navy."

A letter from John S. Mosby disputed the legality of consular invoices for goods on the free list, "for the plain reason that such invoices are intended solely to protect the revenue and, of course, are unnecessary when there is no revenue to protect. He suggested that some merchant allow his name to be used for testing the question in the courts, by ordering a lot of coffee or tea or sugar from Honolulu and instructing his correspondent not to procure any consular invoice. The chair was authorized to appoint a committee of five merchants interested to investigate the question. This matter of consular invoices is a grievance to Honolulu merchants. It occasions them so much expense and inconvenience that some of them enter small lots of free goods on the dutiable list at the Custom House. If the consular invoices from this side are found to have no legal authority in the United States, then our merchants ought to be relieved from this tax on their importations of free goods from that country.

ELECTRIC LIGHT MATTERS.

The new wheel for supplying power for the incandescent lights is now being placed in position. This necessitates the cutting off of the water passing through the electric light station, so that for a night or two the lights in the city will not be used.

The water was let into the new reservoir between last Saturday and Monday morning, filling it 17 feet deep.

Work on the new reservoir opposite Luakaha has commenced and is being rapidly pushed forward.

Mr. W. V. Lockwood, who arrived on the last steamer, has assumed the duties of Superintendent of the electric light system in Honolulu. Mr. Lockwood is a man of much experience and comes highly recommended by the Thomson-Houston Co. and Mr. Faulkner the late superintendent.

The incandescent lighting will be pushed forward with all speed.

AN OLD FRIEND.

Passed Assistant Engineer Crawford (not Lieutenant as familiarly called here and in the States), while attached to the Alert at this port, took a great interest in the Kamehameha Schools, having been an old hand at technical education. He left here on the yacht Nyanza and resigned from the U. S. Navy. An American paper gives us the first intelligence since received of our old friend as follows: "Robert Crawford of the United States Navy has been virtually selected by the board of trustees of Williamson School of Philadelphia for the presidency or superintendency of that institution. Crawford is well known to Philadelphia as the organizer and first principal of the Manual Training School at Sixteenth and Wood streets. He is about forty-five years old and has been an instructor in the Naval Academy at Annapolis, and taught manual training in the Spring Garden Institute."
