MUNICIPAL FRANCHISE.

It would take a strong imagination to depict anything more ridiculous than the exhibition the Advertiser is making of itself in playing the demagogue to an unappreciative audience.

Our contemporary persists in repeating the gratuitous charge that we have, in discussing municipal government, been voicing a conspiracy of the wealthy against the working classes.

Jealous fear of combinations is not a surprising manifestation by the Advertiser under its circumstances.

That paper only displays its motive too rashly when it runs tilt against imaginary oligarchies.

It would be a fine thing for the oligarchs owning it body and bones if they could perpetuate in municipal affairs the undue power they exercise in national government.

That would be facilitated by the balance of power being held by a marketable portion of the electorate.

Our contemporary repeats the remarks upon the franchise contained in our initial article upon municipal government, and then dishonestly misrepresents them as a monstrous demand for city government by the merchant princes and so forth.

Having done so it exclaims with affected horror, "The Advertiser is uncompromisingly opposed to any such scheme." Keep cool, neighbor.

We have already denied that our sentiments upon this subject were either suggested or inspired by any person or persons outside of the editorial office, and it is a matter of indifference to us whether our contemporary accepts the denial or not.

As for the main question at issue, the Advertiser may rest assured that no system of municipal government will be tolerated which will involve the city being ruled by such men as now misrepresent all the better and more intelligent elements of the community in the Legislature.

Perhaps the Advertiser is not aware of the fact that it slanders the larger portion of the workmen of Honolulu by contending that a property qualification would disfranchise them.

It would find upon a little investigation that such is the case, and that its self-constituted apostleship of popular liberties is the most thankless function it has ever usurped.

A newspaper in which the most meddlesome monopolist in this country boasts chief ownership, however much it may masquerade as the tribune of the people, is not likely to be accepted as the exponent of civil rights.

COMING TO CALIFORNIA.

The foregoing is a New York despatch of the 27th April. Surely this is a good opportunity for this kingdom to get in some good work in the way of advertising its attractions, not only upon the Pacific Coast, but in New York and other Eastern cities.

H. I. R. M. DJIGHT. This vessel arrived yesterday afternoon, 45 days from Callao, having come under sail. She carries 12 guns besides mitrailleuse and torpedoes. She has a complement of 200 men. Sub-lieutenants—Molas, Paparigopol, Tregouboff, Vesselago and Boutakov. Engineers—Egouppoff, Silverstoff and Bersenoff. Navigating Officer—Maeimoff. Artillerist—Chomentovsky. Physician—Routchevsky.

DEATH AT SEA.

One of the passengers on board the Zealandia died on the 5th from consumption. His name was James Nimmo, Jr. He was twenty years of age and a native of Scotland. His parents were passengers with him, and they were all returning to their native country. Soon after death his body was put on ice, and when the vessel reached the dock was placed in care of Mr. C. E. Williams, the undertaker. The deceased was buried from the ship at 11 o'clock this morning, one of the passengers, a clergyman, reading the service. The remains were interred in the Nuuanu Valley cemetery. The flags on the Zealandia were hung at half-mast.

ARRIVAL OF THE ZEALANDIA.

The P. M. S. S. Zealandia arrived in port shortly before seven o'clock this morning from the Australian Colonies, en route for San Francisco. She left Sydney three days behind her schedule time, owing to a strike among the wharf laborers at Sydney, that also caused her getting hardly any freight, she having only 70 tons on board. Her propeller stood about a foot out of water. Arrangements were made with W. G. Irwin & Co. for her to take sugar from here and she has got 70 tons which is about all the Captain wanted. It was stated the vessel would take 300 tons, but could not on account of inability to get war risk. Mr. W. Irwin told our reporter that he could get \$25,000 war risk at 1 percent, if necessary. The passengers have been looking round town all day, and nearly all of them visited the Kawaiahao church, where the remains of the late Queen lay. The Zealandia left at three o'clock for San Francisco.

A PRETTY DECORATION.

In the window of J. M. Oat & Co.'s store there has been on exhibition a photograph of a gold and diamond badge presented by the different posts of the Department of California, to their Commander in Chief, John S. Kountz, on the occasion of his visit to San Francisco last month. The badge is surmounted by the "Eagle" clasp of the regulation badge, from which depends the buff-colored ribbon, and the rank badge of the Commander-in-Chief, which is four stars; there are large diamonds in the centre, surrounded by smaller ones. Below is the regulation badge of gold, and the monogram, "G. A. R." composed of gold and diamonds. The whole surrounded by a laurel gold and diamond wreath, inside of which are grouped the arms of the service, and the national flags. At the base is a drum, crossed swords, and the motto of the Order, "F. C. L." Fidelity Charity and Loyalty. The cost of the badge was about \$600.

EDWARD HANLAN.

Soon after the Zealandia arrived in port this morning the news ran round town that Edward Hanlan, the great oarsman, was a passenger by her en route for America. Between nine and ten o'clock the reporter of the BULLETIN found him at the residence of Mr. Robt. More, King street, and obtained the following information of his trip, which will prove interesting to his many admirers on these Islands: Hanlan has rowed four races in the Colonies, one each with Laycock and Clifford, which he won, and two with Beach, in which he suffered defeat. Clifford is a big, strapping fellow, standing 6 ft. 2 in. high, weighing 240 pounds, and Hanlan says much amusement was caused to the spectators when the two were alongside in their boats, owing to the difference in size. With regard to his first race with Beach, he was not well by any means, having not got acclimatized, and then a steamer ran into him, which destroyed all chance of winning. In the second race Hanlan acknowledges his defeat by seven lengths. After the start, they kept together for about three minutes, and then Beach forged ahead, and Hanlan found his boat would not go with him. He rowed in a boat that he had only received the day before the race from Boston, Mass., and had not had time to get accustomed to it. He regrets very much losing the championship, but says he will go back to the Colonies in about eighteen months' time and try to regain his lost honors. Hanlan thinks Beach the best man he ever saw in a boat, being a regular terror and having it in his looks. Hanlan likes the Colonies, was treated well, and intends going there to live permanently. It is a great country for boating, and a large amount of money is spent for that object. He thinks he deserves a rest, as he had worked very hard for the past twelve months. During that time he made in the Colonies about \$30,000 in winnings and giving exhibitions. He has received as high as \$2,500 for giving an exhibition of rowing. Of course he lost quite a sum in the races in which he was defeated. He intends getting together a first-class four-oared crew and taking them to the Colonies, to row in four-oared, double-scull and single-scull races. He speaks highly of Teemer, of

Pittsburg, as an oarsman, and says that Peterson, of California, is a fast one. The latter wants to row Hanlan. Before he left Sydney a benefit was given him at the Theatre Royal, which was crowded to suffocation. He offered one of his boats as a prize for the best conundrum on the Beach-Hanlan race. Over 600 were received, and Hanlan says it took two days to read them through. He could not remember the winning one. His boats he all sold before leaving. Hanlan says he will remain in San Francisco about a week, and then go direct to his home in Toronto. He looks well, and has enjoyed his trip immensely, but would have felt better were he returning with the championship honors.

FUNERAL OF A PRINCE.

The funeral of the Chinese Prince Lau-Fu, the cousin of the Emperor Quang Lu, has been conducted with all the pomp and ceremonies due to the exalted station of the deceased. The procession which accompanied the remains of the Prince to his last resting place was headed by thirty-six slaves clad in garments of green cloth, and bearing a huge wooden cage, representing the funeral of the soul. These were followed by one hundred slaves dressed in red, and carrying tablets inscribed with the titles, honors, and virtues of the dead. Next came twenty sportsmen leading the two hundred and forty hounds once belonging to Lau-Fu, the camels, mules, horses, sedan chairs, and the private carriage, drawn by a mule; sixteen servants dressed in green silk bore an arm-chair covered with a tiger skin, a regiment of cavalry and infantry followed, then the body servants and camels, thirty-two priests with temple music, and finally the coffin, borne by eighty servants and covered with a silk pall. The emperor was represented by six empty carriages, behind which walked the grandees. Prince Lau-Fu's arms, carriages, clothes, tents, etc., were all burned as a winding up of the festivities.—Fall Mall Gazette.

THE RUSSIAN NAVY.

Russia's fleet, while numerically inferior, being the third in Europe, is not to be compared to that of England. Russia has a few good ironclads, but not over half a dozen all told. The harbor defenders of the empire are of recent construction. Old style monitors have been built up, additional armor put on and guns of very heavy calibre mounted upon them. In torpedo-boats Russia has nearly as many as the European Powers collectively and they are of a very superior kind. Of guns, the Russian fleet possesses some of the best in the world, made at home. Prior to the ascension to the throne of the present Czar all the guns were made abroad, chiefly at Krupp's establishment, but Alexander III. has wisely encouraged home manufacture in this branch.—S. F. Chronicle.

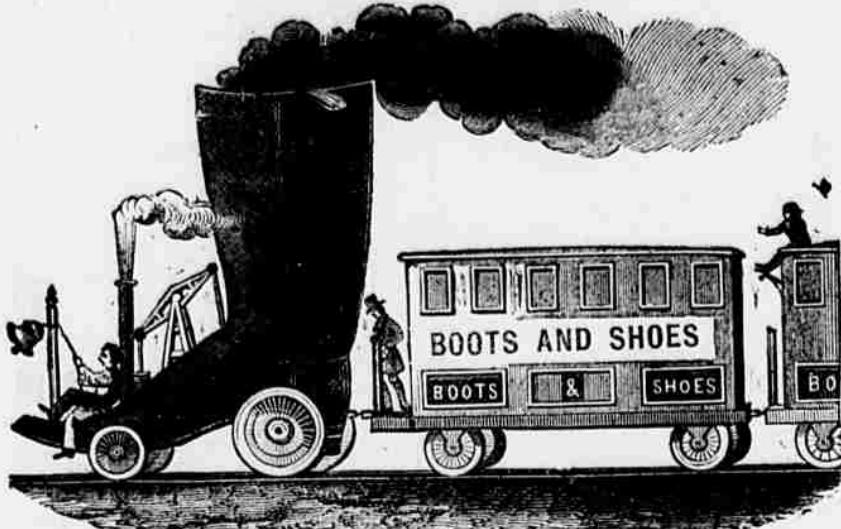

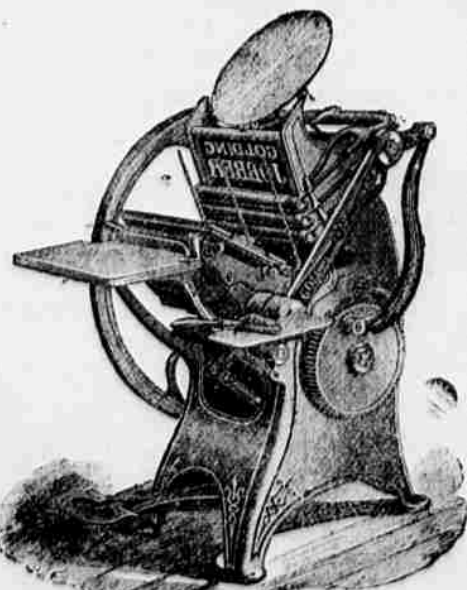

### CHINESE OATH.

A NEW FORM OF SWEARING MONGOLIANS IMPORTED FROM AUSTRALIA.

The subject of Chinese oaths was inquired into last week, in Department One of the Superior Court, the case on trial being that of Wong Ah Foo indicted for the murder of Loi Ah Gow. The prosecution called as a preliminary witness Louis Fong Sing, who, for many years, was a court interpreter in Australia. He was sworn as an expert as to the oaths held most sacred by the Chinese, and he explained at some length.

He first mentioned the decapitation of a chicken by the witness, the beheading being accompanied by the remark, "If I do not tell the truth may my head fall as this fowl's," and added that an effective form had been found in Australia. He then came to the Australian form of oath for Chinamen, and by order of the Court, this form and the customary American form were used, in the hope of getting witnesses to tell the truth. Yellow squares of paper, about nine inches square, were produced by Louis Fong Sing, which bore Chinese characters, of which the following is a free translation:

PETITION TO IMPERIAL HEAVEN.

This is to call the spirits, both good and evil, to descend and watch over the trial of Wong Ah Foo, who is charged with murdering Loi Ah Gow. If I swear falsely and tell one untruth, or do not make a statement according to the facts of the case, I humbly beg the celestial and terrestrial spirits to redress the wrong done to Loi Ah Gow, and to punish me immediately for having been a false witness, to arrest my soul in its flight, to make me perish by the sword, or cause me to die while on the sea and before I reach one-half the distance to China. This is the true and solemn oath, uttered by my own lips, and signed by me this day of the second month in the eleventh year of Quong Sui, and in proof of the earnest of my assertion, may my soul be destroyed, as I destroy this paper by fire.

The witness read this through and then, with a match, burned the paper. When the last shred was destroyed he saluted three times and was then considered fit to testify to anything.—S. F. Bulletin.
