### THE BRITISH AND CHINESE IN BATTLE.

Fight Occurs on the Mainland Opposite the City of Hongkong. Apparent that the Celestial Empire will not be Divided Without a Severe Struggle.

Special Cable to the Call and New York Herald.

HONGKONG, April 15.—Fighting has occurred over the British lease in the Kowloon territory, opposite Hongkong. A small force which was making preparations for tomorrow's celebration of hoisting a flag was attacked on Friday.

The One Hundredth Regiment was dispatched on Saturday, which co-operated with the torpedo-boat destroyer Fame, marched overland and encountered a force of a thousand Chinese soldiers in a strong position defended by artillery.

The Chinese fire was returned and the Indians charged, carrying the position, the Fame covering the advance. The Chinese loss was small but the British was nothing. As it is evident the Chinese were guilty of duplicity, the ceremony was abandoned.

General Gascoine with a force of Welch Fusiliers has gone with a gunboat to hoist the flag to-day. Another force of Indians is marching overland to its support and to drive the Chinese forces outside the leased territory.

### KAISER'S BID FOR RUSSIA'S FAVOR.

Orders a Special Performance of a Russian Play and Attends in Russian Uniform.

PARIS, April 15.—The Kaiser has established a curious precedent in Berlin, where Mlle. Savina, the Russian actress, is now playing. Germany's relations with England and the United States being so chilly, the Kaiser is cultivating Russian friendship in every possible way. He ordered a special performance of the Russian play at Kroll's Theatre, which he and the court attended. To add to the solemnity of the occasion, his Majesty wore a Russian uniform. An Ambassador at his side explained what the play was about. The idea of making the costume of a spectator harmonize with the play would make the audience as interesting as the play if the fashion became general.

### Mr. Hoar Is Out of Tune.

Hon. George F. Hoar, the senior Senator from Massachusetts, has no more sincere admirer and well-wisher than The Post.

We believe him to be an honest and conscientious man, a patriotic citizen, and a wise law-giver. Moreover he is an accomplished scholar and an earnest and painstaking publicist. It would be impossible for us to question the genuineness of Mr. Hoar's convictions or to doubt the high and noble purposes of any enterprise of which he was the author. It remains a fact, however, that Mr. Hoar is only human after all. He is capable of errors and misapprehensions, and we need no better illustration of this truth than his present attitude with reference to the Philippines.

Mr. Hoar is not only mistaken, he is inconsistent also, for while he is now denouncing our policy of expansion in the Philippines, he is on record as having voted for the acquisition of the Hawaiian group. If the former be open to blame, then then the latter was wicked and inexcusable. The Philippines have come to us without our seeking, as the logical result of a successful war. We took Hawaii without the smallest justification in morals. The plea that we had been asked to annex the Sandwich Islands will not

bear serious examination. We were asked by a handful of white men who had seized the government. The great masses of the people were as averse to our occupation as are the Filipinos themselves. A philosopher like Mr. Hoar should not take refuge in forms and technicalities. He knows as well as we do that the Hawaiians would have voted, twenty to one, in favor of retaining their autonomy, and he sanctioned the seizure—for that is what it amounted to—in the full conviction of this fact. Events made it our duty to assume the responsibility for law and order and civilization in the Philippines. Our annexation of Hawaii was mere caprice, without the shadow of necessity or obligation to defend it. How can Mr. Hoar champion the indulgence of a caprice and in the same breath exonerate the performance of a duty?

We do not apprehend that Mr. Hoar is losing touch with his own constituents. All indications point the other way. But it is safe to say that he is a jarring and discordant note in the chorus of American public sentiment at this time. One cannot conceive a more pathetic spectacle than that of a benevolent and admirable old gentleman preaching fantastic altruism to a fighting nation with its blood up. Even the spectacle of feeble King Canute, screaming and gesticulating at the senseless tide, was hardly more sorrowful to look at.—Washington Post.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

As a matter of course the Advertiser continues its cry for "white labor" while the owners of the paper continue promoting new plantations and applying for "cheap" labor. The "organ" is playing its tune for the benefit of the hostile congressmen, its owners are playing for the benefit of their pockets.

The wireless telegraph is now operating between France and England and may be considered a complete success. The inventor is being congratulated from all parts of the world, and the world asks, What next? The new invention will possibly be of the greatest value to the armies and navies of the world.

We understand that Mr. W. A. Kinney will return to Washington at an early date and remain there lawyer in the employ of the Dole Government which, we notice, still pays money to "agents at Washington," or is he simply going to exploit his well-known anti-Asiatic ideas (modified)?

What are the "small farmers" who were induced to emigrate to Hawaii doing? Have they already made their fortunes, or have they found other markets for their much advertised products? Tomatoes, eggs, poultry and pigs are in great demand and the market is very "short" of these articles which we are told were to be the mainstay of the small farmers.

They talk about the "fuss and feathers" under the monarchy and the members of the Reform Party used to ridicule and sneer at the display of uniforms by officials. Gentlemen, come around when the police have their next monthly drill and gaze on the glittering array of uniforms which now cover the manly forms of the officials of this virtuous, democratic (!) Republic.

There is something positively absurd in the proposition advanced by the Dole Government that custom dues shall be paid according to the laws of the defunct Republic of Hawaii after these islands have become an integral part of the United States. The Dole p. g. has no power to transact business with foreign powers of a diplomatic nature. That shows that it has ceased to exist as an independent government and simply takes care of affairs here as a steward for Uncle Sam. But we cannot see why goods brought from the mainland into this dependency should be submitted to a revenue tax if we are really annexed. The present state of affairs is abnormal indeed.

It is rather rough on the soldiers on board the Warren that they have to land in Honolulu without one dollar in their pockets. Their pay may not be due for a few days and may be handed to them a few hours after they leave Honolulu on their long journey to Manila, but we think

it would have been fair to the men as well as to Honolulu to have given them some money, even if it wasn't quite due while in this port. Of course the "cranks" will say that it is lucky that the soldiers had no money because the gin-mills would get most of it. That may be possible, but the "cranks" should remember that the money spent in gin mills mean circulation here, and that the soldiers, perhaps on their way to a last resting place in swamps of the Philippines would find more comfort in having the dollars in their hands than simply knowing that they were due them. Soldiers don't belong to the class of men who believe that they can take their "sack" with them when they move on their seat on the cauldron or rainbow.

### The Lighthouse Tower.

The latter erred in the matter of frailty and the opportunity afforded to mischievous men or hoodlums to bring the whole structure down by unloosening the screws of the mainstays, while the Thomas Tower is a structure massive enough to last until Doom's day, or rather until the cliffs, on the verge of which it stands, crumble away with the erosion and corrosion of the elements. Like all of E. B. Thomas' work it is honestly and substantially built and will be another monument of his integrity in workmanship. He has the pride of knowing that his own hands did most of the artistic portion of the labor, for he was not content to be simply an overseer. The community may be congratulated on the completion of an honest piece of work.

### Much Ado About Nothing.

There was a very fair audience at the Opera House last evening, and the excellent production of Much Ado About Nothing was highly appreciated.

The talented artists have not yet become familiar with the acoustics of the theatre, and in many parts of the House it was difficult to follow the hues.

**The Attorney-General Announces An Increase In Wages**

Since Mr. H. E. Cooper was appointed Attorney-General he has shown a wonderful interest in the Police Department and is having a monthly inspection—personally conducted of the men every month. Mr. W. O. Smith, while Attorney-General, had faith enough in the Chief of Police to leave that end of his department to the Marshal, but Mr. Cooper considers it his duty to make a monthly inspection, look at the uniforms of the men, give an opinion about their manner of drilling (of which he knows nothing) and condescendingly depart with a few complimentary remarks to the officers in command.

At 10. m. he was around escorted by the Marshal and his deputies who appeared in their handsome uniforms. The Marshal was confined to his canoe—beg pardon, house yesterday, but responded to the call from "duty" and a desire to appear in uniform and he directed the parade in the most satisfactory manner. Without being fault finding we would suggest to our friend, the Marshal, that "blue cuffs" are not *en regle* when wearing a semi-military uniform.

Forty privates and ten officers of the force were paraded in the yard of the Station House under the command of Captain Parker.

Minister Cooper appeared on the scene and in few words told the foot police that the Government had decided to raise their salaries from \$30 to \$45 a month and at the same time withdrawing the trifling allowance for boots which heretofore had been granted to them. The boys are extremely pleased with the generous act on behalf of the Attorney-General and when dismissed from the parade got ready for the drill with unusual energy.

While the men were changing clothes the Attorney-General and party inspected the cells and the offices of the station; counted the pencils, looked at Chester Doyle who has a desk but no uniform, and who hangs on to his "chair," inspected the stocks—we mean books—of the different departments and returned to the yard where the men were put through a manual drill to the satisfaction of the Minister, who, upon leaving, expressed himself as highly satisfied.

Why not have the next monthly drill on the plot across the Station House to give the taxpayers a chance to see what our excellent police force can do in the line of drilling and an opportunity for the Marshals to show their fine uniforms?

**The Board of Education**

Minister Mott-Smith presided over yesterday's meeting of the Board of Education. The question of Government select schools and tuition fees was referred to a select committee with the Minister as chairman.

It was decided to increase the size of the play grounds of the Princess Kaiulani School. Considerable routine matter was attended to.

**The Bishop's Congregation.**

The adjourned Parish meeting of the First Congregation of St. Andrew's Cathedral was held last evening. Mr. V. H. Kitkat, presiding. A committee consisting of Messrs. Kitcat, Henry Smith and S. Meheula, was appointed to draft a reply to the Bishop's address and to report to the adjourned meeting on Wednesday evening next at 8:30.
