The Language of Stamps.
The language of postage stamps
is as follows: When a stamp is in-
verted on the right-hand upper
corner it means the person written
to is to write no more. If the
stamp be placed on the left-hand
upper corner inverted, then the
writer declares his affection for the
receiver of the letter. When the
stamp is in the centre at the top it
signifies an affirmative answer to a
question or the questions, as the
case may be; and when it is at the
bottom it is a negative. Should
the stamp be on the right-hand
corner, at a right angle, it asks the
question if the receiver of the let-
ter loves the sender; while in the
left-hand corner means that the
writer hates the other. There is a
shade of difference between deair-
ing one's acquaintance and friend-
ship. For example: the stamp at
the upper corner at the right ex-
presses the former, and on the
lower left-hand corner means the
latter. The stamp on a line with
the surname is an offer of love; in
the same place, only reversed, sig-
nifies that the writer is engaged.
To say farewell the stamp is placed
straight up and down in the left-
hand corner.—[Phil. Record.

THE announcement of the conclusion of a treaty between France and Russia is among the most important news received by late arrivals. It is understood to be a treaty of alliance, offensive and defensive. The draft of such a treaty was made several years ago by France, but for some reason Russia would never assent to it. This new treaty, whatever its terms may be, is probably intended to be an offset to the triple alliance between Germany, Austria and Italy. It is also stated that as an outward manifestation of the friendship between the two nations, the Czar has conferred a highly-valued decoration on the French President.

THE WORLD'S FAIR, CHICAGO.

The Commissioners of the World's Fair, or as it is sometimes termed, Columbian Fair, in Chicago, appear to be at work in earnest, the representatives of every state striving with the others for the best site and endeavoring to secure the largest state appropriation. A second assessment of \$20 on the capital stock of the exhibition was forwarded to every stockholder early this month and their determination to make the Fair a success is shown in the promptness of their remittances.

The Senators and Representatives who compose the committee from the Massachusetts Legislature have started for home intending to ask for an appropriation of \$100,000 to begin with but hoping to get double that sum eventually.

Senator Fassett of New York has worked hard to get a favorable report on a bill appropriating \$200,000 for a state display. The Senate at Albany passed the vote on the 6th inst.

Work has been commenced on the exposition building in preparation for the Southern California fruit exhibit to open on the 12th inst. The National Commission at

Chicago decided at its final session on the 4th inst. that it would not tolerate any more delay on the site question. Local interests that have been endeavoring to upset the plans for Jackson Park and bring back many of the big buildings to the lake front received due notice that such an attempt would not receive the endorsement of the National Commission, and several of the stronger members of the national organization almost succeeded in securing a resolution that the local board would not be allowed even to put up the fine arts display on the lake front, but were in favor of holding the board down to the strict letter of its last expression to the effect that all the exposition buildings should be at Jackson Park.

LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.

German steamship companies have raised steerage rates to America \$2.50.

Flour has gone up 36 cents higher in England, making an advance of \$1.32 for March.

Bulgaria offers \$5,000 reward for the capture of the murderers of the late Minister of Finance, M. Belcheff.

The Royal Commission appointed to examine Westminster Abbey in its relations to future burials report that there is comfortable room for 40 or 50 more; but space can be made for 78 more by devoting every available spot for the purpose. The present rate of Abbey funerals is about one a year.

A statue of Paul de Chomedey Maisonneuve, who founded Montreal in 1642, has reached that city from Paris. It is the work of L. P. Herbert and cost \$10,000. It is to be erected by the city in the Place d'Armes Square. The statue is made of bronze, is nine feet high and will stand on a granite pedestal.

Calcutta, April 6.—If the indications are correct, very serious trouble is brewing in India for the British forces. Emboldened by the success of the Manipuris, who recently crushed the Ghoorka army accompanying Chief Commissioner Quinton in his efforts to settle disputes among rival chieftains in Assam, the Miranzai in the Kohat Territory, a district of Peshawar, a division of the Punjab, have risen in arms, attacking the British troops along the whole length of their lines. The attack is being pushed so vigorously that strong reinforcements have been hurriedly despatched to the front. Full details as to this uprising have been withheld by the British authorities here. In addition to the Miranzai trouble telegrams from Rangoon announce that the Haku Chins have laid in ambush in favorable localities awaiting the passing of a small British column on the way from one military post to another. When the British force was well inside a trap laid for it the Haku Chins suddenly opened fire upon the soldiers, instantly killing Lieutenant Forbes and five men and stretching eleven others severely wounded upon the ground. The column, however, returned the enemy's fire with such effect that the British force was enabled to retreat from the dangerous position into which it had been led, and thus escaped total annihilation.

Simla, April 6th.—Sharp fighting with rebellious natives continues. The Miranzai rising is extending. Yesterday the Twenty-ninth Regiment lost nine men killed and four wounded.

London, April 6th.—In the Commons to-day Secretary Ferguson, replying to questions as to the troubles in India, said the Viceroy had telegraphed that he would speedily restore order in the disturbed districts.

London, April 6th.—A Philadelphia correspondent of the Times gives a long account of the new American navy. The Times devotes a critical editorial to the subject, dwelling mainly upon the likelihood that when the American squadrons are carrying a full complement their speed will be largely reduced. The Times concludes: "If the great boldness of American designers is really based upon sound judgment, we need not regret it. We shall equally profit in the long run by their experience, whether it results in failure or success. We may, therefore, watch with keen sympathy associated friendly workers on the same problem."

Not Full Grown.

The S. F. News Letter states that when the news of the Italian Minister's recall reached the officials of the State Department, they expressed the opinion that the dogs of war would not be unloosed. Perhaps this opinion was based, in part on their knowledge of the fact that our dogs of war are only pups.

Few people can form a definite idea of what is involved in the expression, "An inch of rain." An inch deep of water on the surface of an acre of land will weigh 220,000 pounds, or 100 tons. One-hundredth of an inch (.01) alone is equal to one ton of water to the acre.

BEFORE JUDD, C. J., M'CALLY, BICKERTON AND DOLE, J. J.

The defendant being charged with the illicit sale at Hilo, Hawaii, of spirituous liquors, offered the defence that he was the servant of a licensed spirit dealer in Honolulu.

Held, that the license of such dealer not being produced in Court, he was to be considered as unlicensed, by Compiled Laws, page 699, section 35.

Held, that the dealing of the defendant as a servant or agent of the licensed dealer in transferring or disposing of spirituous liquor is to be considered an illicit sale in view of the provisions of sections two and three of Chapter 67 of the Session Laws of 1888.

Exceptions are overruled.

OPINION OF THE COURT BY M'CALLY, J.

The defendant was tried at the November Term, 1890, of the Third Judicial Circuit Court, on his appeal from a conviction in the Police Court of Hilo, of the offense of selling liquor without a license. The liquor in question was a keg of wine sold to a Japanese, and the defense was that the defendant was merely an agent or servant of the Hawaiian Wine Company of Honolulu, or of F. Brown, the manager, receiving orders for their goods, forwarding the orders and receiving and delivering the articles ordered.

The evidence is joined to and made a part of the bill of exceptions. The first exception is taken to the instruction to the jury that "the defendant claimed to act as the servant of F. Brown, who was a licensed dealer in liquors, but the license of said Brown is not produced in evidence. Under the statute you must find the defendant guilty." The statute referred to is Section 35 of an Act concerning the sale of spirituous liquors, found at page 699 of the Compiled Laws, viz., "In all proceedings against any persons for selling or allowing to be sold any spirituous liquor without a license such person shall be deemed to be unlicensed unless he shall at the hearing of the case produce his license." Against this positive statute prescription, the counsel for the defendant cites Act which is Chapter 28 of the Session Laws of 1890 which requires all persons holding a license for any class of business to keep it exposed to view in some prominent place on the licensed premises, under penalty of a fine. We are of opinion that it would not be a common sense construction of these laws to hold that a licensee should not be permitted to employ a person in his store and carry it into Court when the exhibition of it there is required in his defense upon a charge of misdemeanor in selling without such license. In the possible case of his being prosecuted under the latter statute, it would be a reasonable defense that he was at the time in question exhibiting it in Court.

By no manner of construction does the latter statute repeal the former statute, which is a rule of evidence. The objects of the two statutes are not inconsistent but concurrent, namely in both cases to show that a party is carrying on business under a license. This instruction of the Court was therefore correct, and upon this alone the verdict might have been sustained. But the other position taken by the defense should be discussed and settled in this case.

The counsel for the Crown requested the Court to give the following instructions which the Court gave. 1. The license granted to the Hawaiian Wine Company for Frank Brown to sell spirituous liquors at a designated store in Honolulu, does not authorize Gaspar to sell or deliver such liquors in Hilo.

2. If Gaspar delivered this keg of wine to the Japanese in Hilo and collected the money for it then, that is a sale within the meaning of the law, and any license to Mr. Frank Brown does not protect defendant. And the defendant asked for the following instruction, "If the jury find that at the time of the sale of the keg of wine to the Japanese, the defendant was the servant of a licensed dealer, having no interest in the sale and delivery except as such servant and that the defendant in the course of his employment sent an order for said wine to the licensee who forwarded the wine to the defendant to be delivered they will acquit," which requested instruction the Court refused to give.

There is some confusion of language in the latter instruction. The first part of it imports that the defendant admitted that he had sold the keg of wine. He does not admit so much. He does not claim that under a spirit dealer's license for Honolulu branch stores can be maintained or that persons can be authorized or employed by the licensee, at other places than his licensed place of business, to make sales, under the protection of his license, of goods sold, charged or consigned generally to such agent or servants. We may say that sales so made would be plain contravention of the intent and effect of a "dealer's spirit license." These licenses are among those which are subject to special police restriction. They are issued for a designated locality. They are restricted by the high terms of a payment of five hundred dollars and of a bond in the sum of one thousand dollars. It is provided that no part of the liquor may be drunk on the premises nor upon any contiguous premises in house directly or indirectly under

the control of the licensee. The penalty of the bond may be forfeited if the licensee shall be convicted of felony, perjury or other infamous offense or of any offense against or violation of the revenue laws or of any other offense under the statute concerning licenses which involves forfeiture. It is plain that the licensee permits the dealer to do the business for which he is licensed only at the place of business which is designated if this police supervision is to be maintained.

May not such dealer upon the order of a customer resident in another part of the kingdom sell for cash or upon credit and forward or ship the goods to him?

There is a statute especially applicable to this, and restricting it Chap. 67 of the Session Laws of 1888, which is entitled An Act to Better Prevent Illicit Traffic in Spirituous Liquors, Sections 2 and 3 whereof entirely control the particular case at bar. Section 2 provides that no licensed pedler, trader or store-keeper clerk or employe, shall forward to any other person any order for the purchase of spirituous liquors to be shipped or sent to or for the use of any other person than himself. And Section 3 provides that "it shall be unlawful for any person not being a licensed dealer in spirituous liquors or a common carrier of goods to receive into or have in his possession custody or control at any port outside the city of Honolulu, any spirituous liquor with intent to sell, transfer or dispose of such spirituous liquor or any part thereof to any other person or persons." Under this legislative construction of the intent and scope of the dealer's license under which the defendant sought to protect himself, any such agency for the extension of the business of a dealer's license has been made illegal by statute, and not only sales, but the receipt of orders and transfer and delivery of spirituous liquors by an agent are made illegal acts.

The instructions given were correct and the defendant's instruction was properly denied.

The Chinaman thinking that discretion was the better part of valor, in this case anyway, immediately retired from the fight and ran to the Police Station for help which ended in his assailant being lodged behind the bars of the Station House.

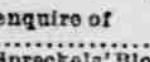

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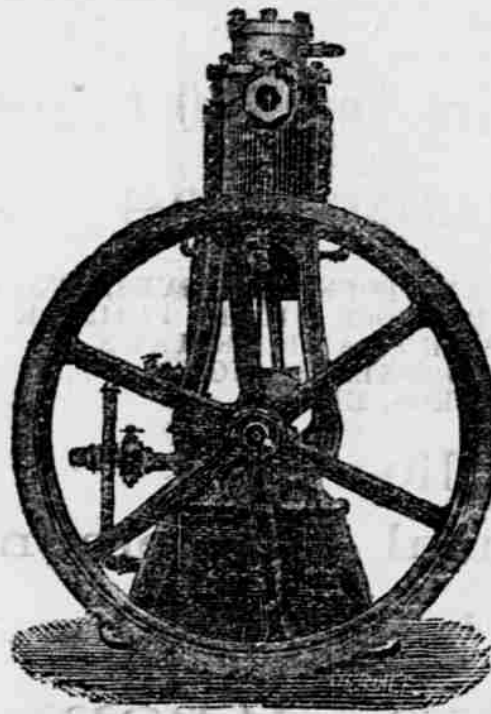

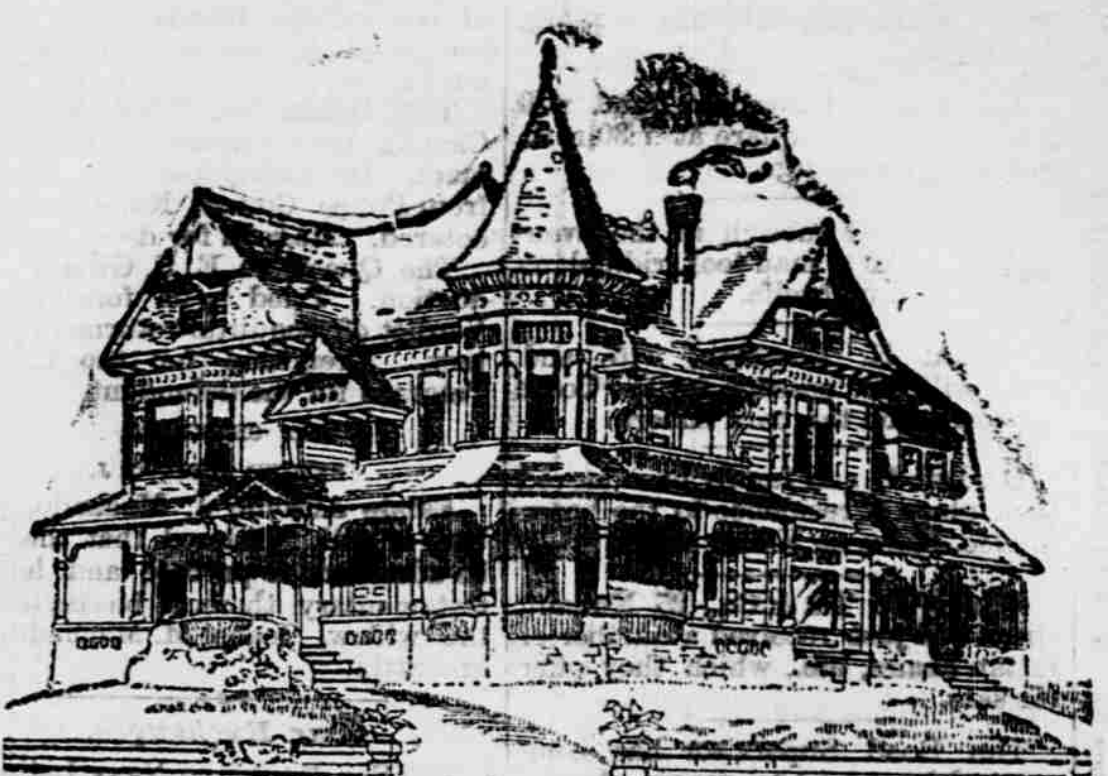
