This letter is in reply to a recent telephonic inquiry from your office to Colonel John W. Yow of this office, relative to the establishment of an ROTC unit at a high school in Hawaii.


The Junior Division ROTC Program at high schools has been operating under a non-expansion policy since 1948 due to budgetary and manpower limitations. Therefore, new units are not being established at the present time. Secondary schools interested in conducting a military program are encouraged to participate in the National Defense Cadet Corps (NDCC) Program. This program is similar to a Junior Division Unit except for certain support functions.

We are inclosing a copy of Army Regulations No. 350-250 which provides information concerning all aspects of the program and the procedures for making application for the establishment of a unit.

Should the officials of the interested high school desire to participate in this program, it is suggested that they contact the Commanding General, United States Army Hawaii, Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, who will be pleased to provide further details and to assist them in the preparation of the application.

I trust this information will be of assistance to you in your reply concerning this matter.


Dear Congressman Inouye:

Please be assured of my support and efforts towards the realization of such a program.

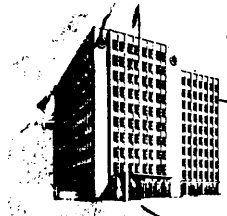

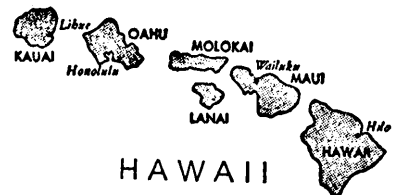
