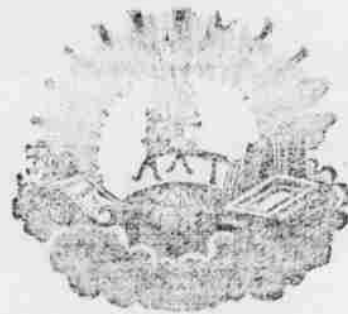

SENATORIAL ORATORS.

WALTER WELLMAN ANALYZES THEM
FOR OUR READERS' BENEFIT.

Ingalls and His Voice—Eustis' Natural
Oratory—Wolcott's Direct Words—Mor-
gan's Classic Sentences—Cockrell's Fe-
lony—Stewart, the Pedestrian.

(Special Correspondence.)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—This has been
a great session for the senatorial orators.
The long and somewhat sensational de-
bate on the elections bill has given them an
opportunity to air their eloquence before
crowded galleries and an attentive coun-
try. Oratory is not one of the lost
arts in the senate, but the number of
genuine orators is sadly limited.

Without doubt Mr. Ingalls is the first orator
of the senate. He is the only man who can attract
crowds which fill every nook and cranny
of the chamber. When Ingalls is an-
nounced to speak people begin arriving
at the senate two or three hours before
the session is to open, to make sure of
getting seats. Every senator is in his
place, and scores of members of the
house come over to listen to the man
from Kansas.

Since oratory is a thing comparative
and entirely dependent for rating upon
the judgment of those who listen, this
sort of compliment means something. It
means that Ingalls is a great orator,
though it must be admitted by his warm-
est admirers that he is not a natural
orator. He is, in fact, a fine example of
what patient study, earnest determina-
tion, long practice, will do for one who
desires to excel as a public speaker.

Ingalls has taught himself to speak, has
practiced, rehearsed, experimented, with
his brilliant wife for a critic or a mirror
as a mentor. The only physical qualifica-
tion for oratory which he possesses is a
great deep, full voice—a surprising,
delightful voice, which his study of elo-
quence has made the most of. No atten-
tive ear need miss a word, not even a
syllable, of one of Ingalls' addresses.

Yet with all this Ingalls is a satirist
rather than an orator. He is a tremen-
dous opponent, but a poor advocate.
He lacks sympathy, magnetism, and
could never stir an audience to tears or
passion. But he can rouse distrust, ex-
cite ridicule, induce contempt. He is a
sword which swishes and sizzles through
the air to cleave or slash the enemy. If
Ingalls were to take to the law he should
be a prosecuting attorney, never a coun-
selor or advocate. Ingalls' success as
an orator shows how strong is the mod-
ern taste for that which is brilliant, pol-
ished, refined, dramatic.

Our most eloquent senators, those
who speak with most feeling, who have
the greater faculty of stirring the
imaginings of their hearers, are from the
south. They are earnest of man-
ner, florid of style. They are not
afraid to display passion, sentiment,
tenderness by all the natural arts of
expression. A type of this class, per-
haps the best example, is Senator
Daniel, of Virginia. A good voice, a
fair figure, ure, admirable flow of language, a
netic earnestness, poetic style, make him
almost an ideal orator of the old school.

The greatest natural orator in the sen-
ate is Mr. Eustis, of Louisiana. He is a
big man physically, has a full voice, fair
eloquence, and a deliberative, imposing
style which is exceedingly effective. If
Ingalls is a rapper, and Daniel a swing-
ing censer, Eustis is a huge, majestic steam
hammer. He lacks Ingalls' clear and
distinct articulation, but he has an ad-
vantage over Ingalls in that he varies
his pace and his tone—now speaking
slowly, while the hearers wait expectantly
and again pouring forth a torrent; first his
voice fills the chamber with reverbera-
tions, and then it falls to a low whisper.
In these methods he resembles Henry
Ward Beecher or Charles Bradlaugh. A
touch of eloquence could take Eustis in
hand and make him one of the greatest
orators of his time, as he is already one
of the greatest orators of the senate.

Young Edward Wolcott, of Colorado,
surely comes after Ingalls and Eustis
among the Senate orators. Like Ingalls
he eschews gesture, and like Eustis he
is a student of elocution. But he has a
voice musical and winning, an easy flow
of language, and courage and sim-
plicity so obvious that he hears
readily take him to their hearts. He
employs none of the stock aids to
oratory, like quotations, metaphors,
sententious phrases, rounded periods,
but is as direct, concise and simple
as man and words can be.

Yet he is not in the least
fact, could not be dismissed if he
close. His success is that of firmness,
of the art of generalization without for-
getting every thought out in the full im-
pact of expression, and of interesting even
uncommonplace elements of facts with
graceful words and carefully chosen
speech. Senator Wolcott prepares all

his speeches, places the copy on his desk
when he speaks, and then never deigns
to look at it.

If Wolcott is a fluent speaker, what
shall be said of Morgan, of Alabama?
Here is one of the most remarkable ora-
tors ever heard in the American senate.
Making no pretensions to eloquence, he
is nevertheless one of the senators well
worth following. His delivery seems
almost automatic. He stands like a pil-
lar, without motion of hands or move-
ment of body. His voice never varies
its tone. There is not the slightest at-
tempt at elocution or modulation.
"What a prosy man!" the careless lis-
tenser would say. But give close atten-
tion and you will be amazed, for there
comes rolling forth a stream of the purest
English ever heard in the senate or any
other public body, even and clear as the
running of water from a spring.

Apparently without any greater effort
than opening his mouth, as if he had been
wounded up with a key, Mr. Morgan
speaks for hours at a stretch, never
using a word which is not per-
fect in its place, never uttering an
awkward sentence, never halting
or repeating. Nor is he dull, except
in manner. His thought is as
rich as his vocabulary. With
skill in the art of the actor and
the orator—skill like Ingalls' or
even Daniel's—he would be the most
eloquent man in the senate. Mr. Mor-
gan never prepares his speeches, except
to think over what he wants to say. If
he puts anything on paper it is mere
memoranda, a skeleton which his phe-
nomenal command of language clothes
in flesh and blood. Where is there an-
other man living who can raise to his feet
and pour forth classes?

Senator Cockrell, of Missouri, is in
his way an orator. If it be the purpose
of eloquence to impress hearers, con-
vince them, convert them, Mr. Cockrell
is eloquent. He is the most vehement
speaker in the senate. He is known
among the habitues of the chamber as
"the feline orator," and the title
is a good one. There is something
peculiarly feline in the man-
ner in which Mr. Cockrell claws
the air in gestation, spreads
his fingers far apart and closes
them convulsively, opens his
mouth wide and closes it appallingly
in giving emphasis, and in the way in which he leans
his body forward, bobs and shakes his
head and shrugs his shoulders, like a cat
getting its back up, in his remarkable
earnestness. Mr. Cockrell is puny,
persistent, implacable, insistent, intol-
erant; he is, moreover, nearly always
right and victorious.

Senator Stewart is now known as "the
pedestrian orator." Until he made his
famous speech on the cloture rule a few
days ago he had not been suspected of ef-
fectiveness as a public speaker. It had
indeed been the common supposition that
he was dreary and wearisome; that he
hummed and droned. Formerly when
he rose to speak his brother senators
nearly always paid him the compliment
of retiring to the cloakrooms. But
there comes a moment in every man's
career when through some inspira-
tion he surpasses himself, rises far
above his usual level, astonishes
all observers. So it was with Mr.
Stewart on this occasion. Never
before had he shown so much
power. It happened that one
row of chairs was for a distance
of thirty feet unoccupied by senators. Mr.
Stewart took possession of this runway
and walking rapidly from one side of
the chamber to the other—facing first
the Democrats and then appealing to
the Republicans from their midst—poured
out a torrent of argument, of warning
and of prophecy which made a profound
impression upon all who heard it.

There are many other orators in the
senate worth writing about. Senator
Gorman, the leader of the Democratic
hosts during the recent struggle, and
now generally regarded as "a coming
man," is developing oratorical abilities
of no mean order. His thin, sharp
voice, somewhat like Maj. McKinley's,
has a dramatic tremulousness in it which
quickly catches the sympathies of audi-
tors.

Senator Hoar, the Republican leader,
is not a great orator, but he is an ear-
nest, effective speaker. Senator Allrich,
who had charge of the cloture rule, is a
direct, frank, businesslike talker, and
one whom the ladies in the galleries al-
ways listen to, for he is, next to Hisscock,
the handsomest of the senators. A fluent,
bold speaker is Joe Blackburn, and a
penetrating single hammer is Voorhees,
of Indiana. Voorhees is like Ingalls,
better as an opponent than as an advoca-
te. If Cockrell is the feline orator,
Voorhees is the tiger. He is sometimes
terrible and vicious in his onslaughts, an
easy to be deceived and misled.

A great deal can be said for and
against the art of the orator, and
without going to the length of saying
that he is the greatest of all men, or
that he is the most important power in
the government, as Mr. Eustis
would say.

"Rat offices" support "rat editors" with a little "r." Go to! Good contemporary; rats do not come "to roost;" they come to stay!

The San Francisco Examiner is lately without credence as far as Hawaiian affairs are concerned. The article which appeared in that paper on March 23rd, note the date, was doubtless dictated from the center of Fort street!

Evidently the Post Office is being run without sufficient hands. This morning several persons wished to take out postal orders for the steamer W. G. Hall's mail, but the Money Order Branch was closed to the public. Either we should have the postal business done satisfactorily by the Government, or else let the work out on contract to the steamship companies.

His Excellency H. A. Widemann, Minister of Finance, was overtaken by a BULLETIN representative, while he was trying to recover his land legs at the British Club's billiard room. The Minister had nothing of importance from his trip to the Coast to communicate, but, when asked if there was anything in the Examiner's report from Honolulu of a new and complete reciprocity treaty awaiting signature by Queen Liliuokalani, his laconic reply was, "No, that's all humbug!"

OFFICIAL CHANGES.

The following official changes may be expected to take effect tomorrow: Mr. J. A. Mehrtens, to be Deputy Marshal, in place of Mr. Gardner K. Wilder.

Mr. Wilder will receive a new commission as Police Court prosecutor, an office provided for by the Legislature at last session.

Hon. A. N. Tripp, to be Jailor of Oahu Prison, in place of Mr. Mehrtens.

Col. John D. Holt, Jr., to be Port Surveyor, in place of Mr. Tripp.

Mr. Geo. C. Potter will resign the office of the Secretary of the Board of Health, and, it is believed, be replaced by Mr. Chas. Wilcox, Secretary of the Legislature of 1890.

Hon. E. K. Liliuokalani will join the police force.

Ex-Captain Kanalewai of the Royal Guards will be a turnkey at the Police Station.

THE GARDEN ISLE.

Excursions of the Chief Justice--His Impressions of Makaweli Plantation.

Chief Justice Judd remained on Kauai two weeks after the Court rose, with Mrs. Judd and son. A BULLETIN reporter's questions regarding things on Kauai were rewarded with the following information cheerfully given by His Honor.

"After the Court was over we rode round to the District of Waimea and were the guests of the Sinclair family. We also visited Makaweli, the new plantation of the Hawaiian Sugar Company. The party rode up to Hanapepe falls, more properly called the Kukoula falls, the source of the stream furnishing water to Makaweli plantation. The falls are about 250 feet high, probably the highest in the kingdom.

"The ditching, piping, fluming and tunneling are nearly completed, so that water will be got on the land early in May. Three or four hundred acres are being plowed by steam plows, at the rate of 16 acres a day. It is very rich, friable soil, only requiring water to make it productive.

"There are two old craters very conveniently situated so that with very little work they will be adaptable for the storage of water. The cost of getting the water out will be no more than the outlay on Ewa plantation for its steam pumping plant, and when the system is once in operation there will be no further expense except keeping it in repair.

"The tunnel of 80 feet will discharge 60 cubic feet of water a second, which, at the rate of one cubic inch a second for 50 acres, will be sufficient to irrigate three thousand acres. The land has a southern exposure, plenty heat of the sun, very little wind, and, in short, has all the advantages conceivable for a great production of sugar cane. It is in the main good for seven tons to the acre."

His Honor added that the ditching does not destroy the beauties of the far-famed Hanapepe Valley. An idea of the wildness of scenery may be gained from the fact that one has to cross the stream twenty times to get to the falls. The Chief Justice and Master Judd went on a sporting tramp at Makaweli, in company with Messrs. Gay, Robinson and Garstin. With two guns in one day they bagged seventeen turkeys and chickens. Hon. and Mrs. Judd were the guests of Mr. W. H. Rice at Kipuka and of the Messrs. Wilcox at Lihue.

A PILE OF STRAW.

A few days ago there was occasion to publish a communication to the effect that Mr. George Marble and others put out the fire which occurred on Fort street at the residence of Mr. Macanley, the piano tuner. Report now comes that last evening on School street, while calling on her friends, Mrs. Sarah Marble, the wife of Mr. Marble, discovered in time a fire which was burning in the premises owned by Mrs. Catherine Steward, lately occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Downey. A pile of straw and rubbish had been piled up in the yard just outside of the stable near the barn, which if it had burned long enough would have caught the stable and the main house. It appears that the occupants had removed from the place during the day, and in all probability in cleaning the stove some live ashes may have been thrown upon the pile. There was nothing to indicate that it was the work of an incendiary. The fire was put out by natives summoned by Mrs. Marble for help.

THE GERMAN STEAMER Mexico is off port from the West as the BELLETTIN goes to press. She was supposed to be a Chinese immigrant vessel for this port, but her errand here proves to be after coal and water.

HON. W. H. CORNWELL today publishes notices against trespassing on the lands of Wai-huli and Kooke, and on the fishing rights of Wai-huli, etc.; also, against trespassing upon the Waikapu common.

IT is understood that Mr. John Niel is to be the next Fire Marshal of the Honolulu Fire Department, in place of the late incumbent who has resigned to take a position as Superintendent of the Bureau of Water Works. LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.

San Francisco, Mar. 24, per S. S. Australia.

UNITED STATES.

Secretary Blaine's success in carrying through reciprocity with Brazil is said to be envied by England and Lord Salisbury.

The Nicaraguan bark Don Nicolas, from Newcastle, New South Wales, for San Francisco, foundered at sea. All hands were saved. The bark was commanded by Capt. Pendleton. She was built in 1836.

Washburn Vike, the English explorer, has returned from the Arctic circle, where he has been during the last two years in search of musk oxen and buffalo. His party underwent terrible suffering in their journey. He was fairly successful in his hunting, bringing the skins of over fifty musk oxen.

Despatches from Chile say there has been severe fighting near Valparaiso recently and that 200 insurgents were taken prisoners, tied together and shot with cannon and muskets by the Government troops.

Carter has challenged Jacob Schaefer to play billiards for the championship of the world. It is announced that Theodore Thomas will likely be the musical director of the world's fair.

A deadlock has occurred in the Nebraska Senate. Johnny Mackay, the actor, died at Cincinnati, March 22d.

A Washington despatch of March 22d says: It is expected that the regular annual proclamation of the protection of fur seals in Behring sea will be issued by the President the early part of the present week.

The negotiations between the United States and Great Britain with respect to the waters of Behring Sea, it is said have not advanced far enough as yet to warrant any modification of the usual form of the proclamation.

A report to the Department of State from the late United States Minister to Japan states that after a long deliberation the native Presbyterian Church in that country has seen fit to recast the time-tried doctrine of the Presbyterian Church and even to make additions to the Apostles' Creed.

Washington, March 21st.—General Joseph E. Johnston died shortly after 11 o'clock tonight. General Johnston was the last, save General Beauregard, of the six full Generals of the Confederacy.

This afternoon (Mar. 14), in the presence of a joint assembly of the West Virginia Legislature, Lieutenant R. M. Brown of the United States navy, was presented with a beautiful and suitably inscribed sword.

Vineyard Haven, Mass., Mar. 14.—The United States steamship Galena and tug No. 9 went ashore last night one mile south of Gay Head Lighthouse, in a fog. The officers and crew, seventy-seven in number, were taken off by the Galena's boats and Broecker's buoy. Both vessels are badly damaged. A despatch of later date says the Galena was pronounced beyond help and was going to pieces.

It is estimated the amount of the subsidy required for the proposed steamship line between Australia and Canada on the basis of Australia's grant of £20,000 and Canada's grant of £20,000, is £100,000 yearly. It is not probable the Government will accede.

A San Francisco despatch says that Jake Kilrain of Baltimore knocked out George Godfrey of Boston, at the California Athletic Club's rooms, on the night of March 13th. It took Jake forty-four rounds to knock the Boston fellow out, therefore the California papers are down on Kilrain.

At St. Paul, Minn., on Mar. 23d, Denny Kelliber was knocked out by Australian Smith in the eighth round.

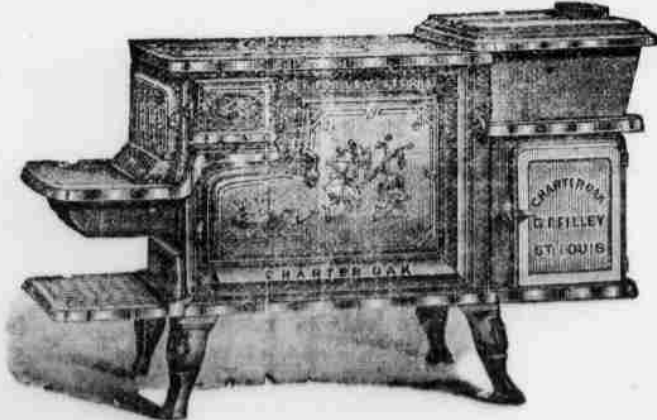

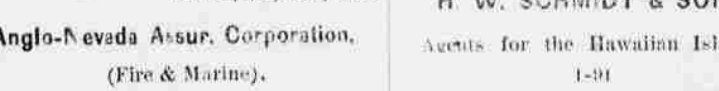
