LEGISLATURE IN SESSION.

THE SENATE CONSIDERS AMENDMENTS TO THE TAX BILL.

The Bill Relating to Ports of Entry and Collection Districts Passes the Senate—House Proceedings.

SEVENTY-SECOND DAY, MAY 21ST.

THE SENATE.

Senator Brown from the Judiciary Committee presented a report and amendment to the foot-binding bill which was adopted.

Senator Rice reported the Hilo electric railway bill printed.

Senator Lyman from the Committee on Passed Bills reported the deficiency appropriation bill presented to the President for signature.

Senator Baldwin from the Committee on Commerce presented a report and substitute bill for the bill authorizing the taking of water from the Wailuku river for the use of the Hilo Electric Light Company.

Senator Lyman from the Committee on Public Lands presented a report on the bill authorizing the re-appraisal of certain homestead lots, recommending the passage of the bill.

The same Senator also reported favorably from the same committee on House Bill 33, relating to condemnation suits under the right of eminent domain.

The resolutions adopted at the recent Portuguese mass meeting were read and filed, or as one of the Senators expressed it, "placed among the archives of this body."

A communication was received from the House relating to certain bills.

Under suspension of the rules Senator McCandless made a verbal report on the bill relating to army surgeons.

Senate Bill 47, relating to ports of entry, came up on third reading and passed unanimously.

House Bill 6, relating to the extension of certain streets in Honolulu, with the report of the Conference Committee thereon, was taken up and the report adopted.

Senator Brown called attention to the report of the Commission on the Registration of Deeds, etc., and on motion the same was ordered transmitted to the House.

On motion the House amendments to the Internal Taxes Bill were taken up.

The amendment to the title was concurred in.

The amendment giving the Tax Collector three years in which to enforce a lien for taxes was opposed by Senator Brown, who said that one year was plenty. It would lead to a general delay in the collection of taxes as every one would want to take advantage of the provision.

Senator Baldwin said each year's taxes should stand by itself. The idea of running the collection of taxes from one year to another for possibly three years was out of the question.

On motion the Senate refused to concur in the amendment.

The section referring to exemption of personal taxes for the military and sharpshooters was not concurred in.

The House amendments which prevent an appeal to the Supreme Court from the Tax Appeal Board were not concurred in, neither was the last section, an amendment to Section 93.

The bill now goes back to the House, which has the privilege of receding from the amendments not concurred in.

The substitute bill, authorizing the taking of water from the Wailuku river, was ordered printed.

House Bill 42, relating to the re-appraisal of certain homestead lots, was taken up on the second reading and passed.

House Bill 33, proceedings in condemnation under the right of

eminent domain, passed second reading.

House Bill 46, to regulate the practice of medicine, was read the first and second times and referred to the Committee on Public Health.

The Act relating to military surgeons and their regimental rank passed the second reading.

Senate Bill 49, granting an electric railway franchise for the town of Hilo, was referred to the Miscellaneous Committee.
Adjourned.

SEVENTY-FOURTH DAY, MAY 21ST.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Yesterday afternoon the Income Tax Bill passed its second reading. No alterations of any consequence were made excepting the reduction of the rate of tax from three to one per cent.

This morning the House met at ten o'clock. Rep. Richards, on behalf of the Printing Committee, reported House Bill 47 as printed and House Bill 25 typewritten.

The same Representative notified the House that the Appropriation bill for unpaid accounts to Dec. 31st, had been handed to the President yesterday morning.

Senate Bill 45, relating to the extension of Hilo streets, was read for the third time and passed.

House Bill No. 47, creating a new department of the executive, to be known as the Department of Public Instruction, came up for the second reading.

There was a great deal of argument over one of the clauses which debars clergymen from appointment as members of the commission under whose supervision the public schools are to be conducted.

Rep. Kamaooha objected to the clause. He said he thought preachers ought to be appointed to membership on such a commission whenever they could get them.

Rep. Rycroft cited several instances, especially in the case of Canada, where, in the province of Quebec especially, a vast deal of trouble had arisen from the fact that Protestant ministers and Catholic priests were appointed on such commissions, and conflicting religious opinions had led to strife and even bloodshed. Rep. Hanuna seconded Rep. Kamaooha's motion to strike out the section, stating that he considered it an indirect insult to the clergy.

Rep. Richards believed that the evil effects of allowing religious dissensions to creep in could scarcely be over estimated. On vote Rep. Kamaooha's motion was lost.

This Bill provides that the Minister of Foreign Affairs shall be ex officio Minister of Public Instruction, and makes him chief administrative officer. The President shall appoint six commissioners, to which offices no person in holy orders or minister of religion is eligible, nor to that of Inspector General of schools, an office to which the commissioners are to elect a competent person, whose duties are to visit and inspect all schools and who is given the power to appoint and dismiss teachers, etc. The appointment of school agents is provided for in another section. The department is to fix the salaries of teachers, servants, etc. All schools established and maintained by the Department are public schools. All others private schools. The Department shall have entire charge and control of and be responsible for the conduct of all affairs pertaining to public instruction. Every private school shall be subject to the supervision of the department in certain respects. There shall be no charge for tuition in public schools except that the department may establish select schools where a fee is charged.

There was much discussion over that portion of the bill which provides that the department shall have jurisdiction of a certain kind over private schools. Reps. Kamaooha and Hanuna were opposed.

KATE FIELD'S FUNERAL.

THE SERVICES AT THE CENTRAL UNION CHURCH.

The Floral Offerings and Those Who Sent Them—The Last Rites at the Nuuanu Cemetery.

Central Union Church was filled yesterday afternoon with those who wished to pay the last tribute of respect to all that was mortal of Kate Field. Most of those present had known the deceased either intimately or socially, and they represented the best of Hawaii's citizens. The services were exceedingly simple but none the less impressive. The pulpit and choir railing were covered with floral offerings from friends of the deceased. A quartette composed of Miss Grace Richards, Mrs. Alice Davies, J. Q. Wood and W. W. Hall furnished the vocal music and Mrs. Judd presided at the organ.

At 4 o'clock the casket was borne from the residence of Dr. McGrew to the church and thence down the aisle to the front of the pulpit. It was borne by Dr. J. S. McGrew, Charge d' Affaires and Consul-General Mills, ex U. S. Ministers Thurston and Castle, Vice-Consul Boyd and W. R. Farrington and preceded by Rev. Mr. Birnie reading the first words of the funeral service: "I am the Resurrection and the Life."

After the casket had been placed in position the quartette sang "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," followed by the reading of a psalm by the pastor. The quartette sang "Light, Kindly Light" and the pastor then delivered an affecting prayer in which he alluded to the sad death of the deceased so far away from home but thanked God that in these days no Christian could die anywhere without finding loving hands and hearts to give them Christian burial with all that is implied therewith. Another hymn by the choir and the services at the church were over.

At the cemetery the Hawaiian band played a dirge as the mournful cortege entered. The Paty vault had been beautifully decorated with flowers and upon the wall nearest the head of the coffin a large American flag was draped. The choir sang a last hymn, the remains were placed in the vault and covered with the floral offerings and a final prayer and blessing by the officiating clergyman brought the proceedings to an end.

The offering from the press of Honolulu was a large basket of red, white and blue flowers, tied with the American national colors in remembrance of the intense loyalty of the deceased to her country and flag.

THE BASEBALL SEASON.

Arrangements and Improvements at the Grounds—Schedule of Games.

The baseball season will open on Saturday with a game between the Honolulu and the Stars. Everything about the grounds has been put into first-class shape, the nettings repaired, damaged and broken chairs replaced by new ones, and old seats and benches repaired. REST FOR THE WEARY.

HILO HAS NOW FIRST-CLASS HOTEL ACCOMMODATION.

Successful Management of J. R. Wilson as a Hostess—Beautiful Place Well Kept.

One great lack that had long been a disadvantage, if not a discredit to Hilo has been, it is to be hoped permanently, wiped off the black book of the traveling public. Reference is to hotel accommodation. It is not many years ago court parties from Honolulu, with suitors, jurors and witnesses from the country, arriving in Hilo to attend the Circuit Court term, had to billet themselves all over town—some fortunate enough to have friends here with spare bedrooms and welcome to a hospitable board, but the majority having to hire spare bedrooms from strangers, or lodgings in rude buildings without sitting rooms, or even pleasant verandas, for the enjoyment of hours of leisure. Lucky was the man, however, who could secure even such lodging in connection with a restaurant, for the later applicants had to take shelter where they could not get meals, and it was anything but agreeable to have to travel some distance through rain and mud from bed to breakfast.

Every now and then an attempt at running something like a regular hotel would be made by some enterprising resident, but heretofore these experiments have not resulted in any marked success, for what reason it is not the purpose of this article to inquire. All that our readers will care to know is whether Hilo has a good hotel now, and whether if it has the boon is likely to be perpetuated. As to both questions I have no hesitation in giving an affirmative answer. The Hilo hotel as at present conducted compares favorably in regard to comfort afforded, to pleasant conditions and to quality of fare with the leading hotels of Honolulu. Its own merits in these respects, the impetus to tourist travel this way—both from the opening of the Volcano road and from increasing fame of Hilo and this island for health and pleasure sojourns—as well as the constant additions being made to the population of people who have means and resources for living well, all bode well for the permanency of Hilo's present attainment in respectable hotel accommodation.

J. R. Wilson, proprietor of the Volcano Stables, well and favorably known to the traveling public, took possession and charge of the Hilo hotel on April 20 last. Mr. Wilson's enterprise in different lines for many years past has been a strong factor in the progress that Hilo has been steadily making. He has also for some time conducted, with great satisfaction to the traveling public, Mountain View Hotel, the half-way house of the Volcano. It was therefore to be expected by those who know his business capacity and energy that, in this step, if he would not revolutionize hotel-keeping in Hilo he could not fail to establish a higher grade in its evolution. Thus early have expectations been fully realized. Without any tourists at present the seventeen rooms of the hotel are all occupied with an excellent class of steady boarders. Tourists who have been there within the last two weeks evinced great reluctance to leave.

The hotel is established in the premises formerly the residence of John T. Baker, whose wife was Governess of Hawaii. Although the buildings are old they are quite well adapted to hotel purposes, but there is now a probability that Mr. Spreckels, who owns the premises, will shortly erect a block especially designed for hotel purposes. No more beautiful location for a hotel could be found on all Hilo's charming hills and slopes. It is right on the middle front of the

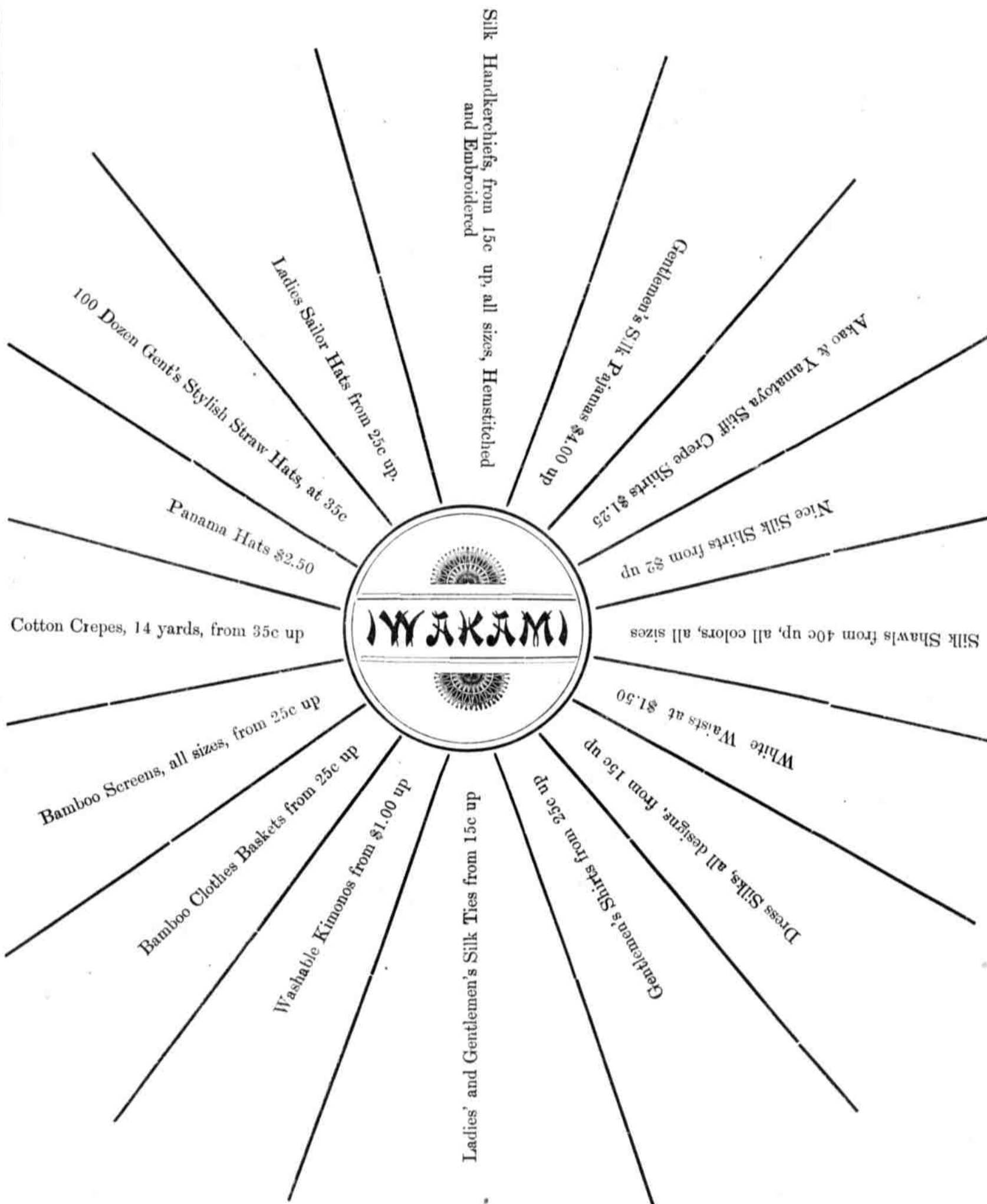

chief residence quarter, on a ridge crowning the first steep slope from the bay. Through a cross street, with an arch of rich foliage, a bit of the water is viewable. A large and lovely grass lawn slants down to the street along the front, adorned with majestic rubber and mango trees on the side next the house. The business quarter of the town begins on the near left front, while the large yard of the court house directly in front adds to the breathing space of the lawn. A carriage driveway curves up on either side to the steps of the front entrance, and on the borders of the grounds many kinds of flowers are blooming.

With reference to the statement of the hotel being full now, it should be added that Mr. Wilson has a large reserve of accommodation. Besides his own former residence he has rooms at his disposal in several neighboring houses, to and from which, when he has occasion to use them, he furnishes carriage conveyance at a moment's notice, the telephone being utilized to announce meals to guests thus lodged. In this connection it may be mentioned that Mr. Wilson is ready at all hours, to furnish saddle horses or carriages, with or without drivers, omnibus or wagonette for parties, to guests at reasonable charges. He runs a regular bus to Coconut Island landing, free to all guests of the hotel. The Volcano House stage, belonging to him, makes a trip each way alternate days, connecting with the steamer Kinau always, also with the Kau stage for the steamer W. G. Hall. Hot and cold water baths are available day and night in a house adjacent to the main building. There is a ladies' parlor and a bridal chamber among the apartments. The bed chambers are airy and always well kept.

One of the first requirements of a hotel is of course a good table, and the Hilo Hotel is not behind any in the country in this respect. A better quality of fresh meats than what are served here cannot be found in the markets of the islands. The cookery is excellent withal. There is fresh fish every day, also several kinds of domestic fruit are on the table at every meal. Milk, butter and eggs of the best and freshest, together with fragrant Hawaiian coffee, are never-failing in supply. No monotony is permitted in the bills of fare to weary appetite. Ah Luna, the active and obliging steward, knows his business well. He has had experience in the Hawaiian Hotel. Withal the rates charged at the Hilo Hotel are reasonable.

Irving Schoen, a young brother of a member of the firm of Richards & Schoen, is clerk of the hotel and fits the position to a charm. Alert, attentive and obliging, he seems to anticipate the wishes of guests, with whom he speedily gains favor by his cheerful disposition. He only came lately to the country, but is one of the leading spirits of the Social Club.

Tourists may now be confidently recommended to do Hilo's many attractions without any fears regarding hotel entertainment. And the tired denizens of Honolulu may be assured that they need do no hustling for comfort in taking a few days or weeks of rest and change of scene at Hilo.

The Hilo Hotel is all right, and its proprietor, "genial Jack Wilson," is the right man to run it. D. L.

MOKUAWEOWEO.

It is a wonder that a proper trail to the summit of Mauna Loa has not long ago been marked out, and shelter for man and beast provided at that extremely interesting spot. As far back as 1841 Commodore Wilkes of the United States Navy, with a large scientific party, attended by a numerous retinue of natives, made his way to the summit and camped for several months beside the crater of Mokuaweoweo. Since that time there have been several eruptions in the crater, which would have attracted many sight-seers, but for the great hardships and dangers of the ascent. There would be little difficulty and no great expense in making a trail immeasurably more passable than the scarcely defined ones now existing. With shelter from the wintry weather often prevalent at the summit the mountain sickness would be robbed of most of its terrors, and there would be no risk for animals in their stay providing fodder was packed up for them. Stone houses could be easily and cheaply constructed of the material than which there is nothing else on the summit plateau. Dr. Friedlaender has proved that a route is feasible to the summit from the Kona as well as from the Kau side. It would be well to have one laid out on each side, as, in case of flows down the mountain, sometimes one would be preferable to another. If better trails and summit shelter were provided many people would doubtless make the ascent when there was no eruption, as it would be to some constitutions only an exhilarating and beneficial adven-

ture, while scientific investigators would find much worthy of investigation both on the way and at the destination. When an eruption took place in Mokuaweoweo such as the recent one, which is liable at any time, with the improved facilities for ascending and provision for comparative comfort at the top, as here suggested, hundreds instead of tens of people would go to see the sublime manifestations. Mokuaweoweo crater ought to be made more accessible than at present, and then it could be entered in good faith on the list of our standard attractions for tourists. The public treasury might fairly be laid under some small tribute for this purpose.

THE BASEBALL SEASON.

It is apparent that the managers of the Baseball Association are determined to do away as much as possible with the annoying features of last season's games. Changing the ladies' section from the centre to one side is a good move and the renovation of the grandstand, seats, chairs and screens is another. The assignment of a more or less exclusive portion of the stand to the press and scorers is one that the BULLETIN has long advocated and worked for, and which will be appreciated.

But, perhaps, the best and most radical change which is guaranteed, is the abatement of last year's nuisance, that pandemonium of noise, interlarded with coarse and vulgar speeches. A reasonable amount of enthusiasm, displayed in a seemly manner, is expected and, indeed, should be encouraged, but the horrible yelling and screaming, the constant stream of annoying remarks shouted at the players, which disgusts everyone attending excepting the offenders, ought to be stopped. The best and most welcome patrons of baseball are the fair sex. They will go in force, if there is no likelihood of rowdyism. But they will not attend if they feel that the grand stand is to present such scenes as those witnessed at nearly everyone of the games played during 1895.

Ladies, especially Honolulu ladies, take a keen and intelligent interest in this pastime and without doubt better ball is played when they are present than when they are not. Again, there is a vastly better patronage from the other sex on account of the presence of the gentler one, so that the finances of the Association are benefited by suppressing those evils which cause the latter to stay away. The Association promises much this year, but not more than can be performed if the directors will not allow their present enthusiasm to die out after the first few games.

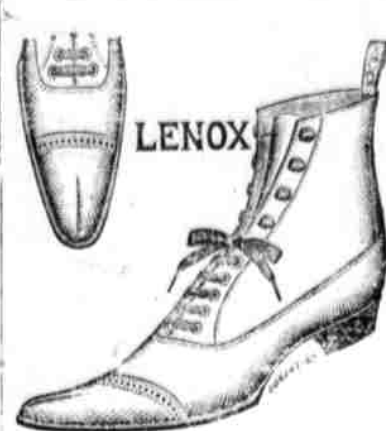

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Miss., Jan. 29, 1896.
DR. C. W. DABNEY, Washington, D. C.
DEAR SIR: Yours of recent date in regard to the "Secretary" plow has been on my desk some days, but I delayed sending a reply in order that I might send some photos which go with this.
Deere & Company sent one of the plows, the first one which was completed, to this station, and we gave it a very thorough test in December last. The ground on which it was used was a field which had never been plowed more than six inches deep, and which had been in red clover for three years. With three good mules we were able to plow ten inches deep without making the work too hard for the team, and by working slowly a part of the ground was plowed to a depth of fourteen inches. The plow certainly does better work than I have ever seen done with any other implement. S. M. TRACY, Director.
Mr. Tracy, in a letter to Deere & Company, says:
I have never seen ground left in as good condition after the plowing, the furrows being thrown so as to pulverize the soil more thoroughly than can be done by an ordinary plow, and all trash and weeds were completely turned under.

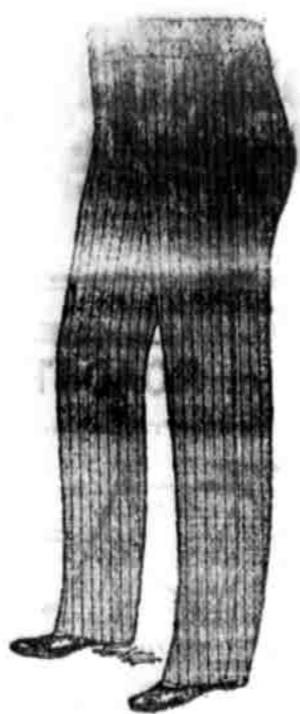

SALT WATER NEWS

MARINE ITEMS PICKED UP ON THE WATERFRONT.

A Mexican War-Ship Coming-The Andrew Welch Makes a Good Trip -The Kaui from Kauai.

German bk H Hackfeld off Koko Head. The bark Sonoma is discharging coal at the Railroad wharf.

The J A Cummins returns to Waimanalo today with a cargo of lumber and coal. The schooner Henrietta is lying on her side near the Railroad wharf, having her bottom cleaned and repaired.

Tomorrow-High tide large, 11:35 pm; high tide small, 11:57 a m; low tide large, 5:18 a m; low tide small, 5:35 p m.

The schooner Aloha loaded sugar from the Kaala this morning. The Norwegian bark Fortuna is receiving the balance of her sugar cargo at Oceanic dock.

The Hawaiian bark Andrew Welch arrived this morning, after a pleasant voyage of 13 1/2 days from San Francisco. She brought a light cargo of general merchandise and several passengers.

Yesterday afternoon, the American bark Pactolus departed on her long voyage around Cape Horn to New York. She took a cargo of 41,596 bags sugar, valued at \$209,888. The cargo was shipped by Wm G Irwin & Co to the American Sugar Refining Co.

The Mexican man-of-war Zaragoza, now at San Francisco undergoing repairs at the Union Iron Works, will shortly start on a cruise around the world, according to a San Francisco exchange. When the ship has been cleaned and repainted, had her machinery thoroughly overhauled and been fitted out with new sails and rigging she will leave for Honolulu. Thence she will go to Yokohama, Hongkong, Singapore, Batavia, Aden through the Suez canal to Malta, through Gibraltar to Cadix, to Seville and Madrid; thence across the Atlantic to Jamaica, to Havana, possible New Orleans and home. Though not an imposing looking craft the Zaragoza's build and guns give her a vicious appearance, and the pose of her dark-skinned sailors as they stand on deck in their bare feet with muskets on their shoulders do not tend to soften the impression.

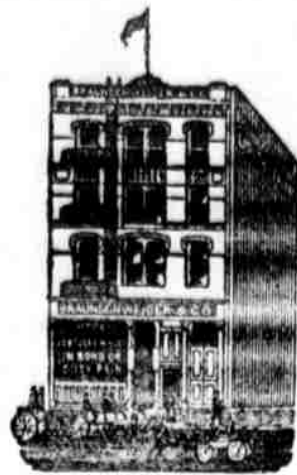

posed to granting such powers. Reps. Rycroft, Richards, Winston and Bond favored it. Rep. Hanuna said that the Board of Education was not properly looking after the public schools now and that he doubted if the new department would do much better. He cited two instances, one of a teacher on Molokai who got drunk regularly every day, the other of a Maui instructor of youth, who was also agent to issue marriage licenses. The latter person was evidently of a thrifty mind, for, in order to make the latter office pay, he compelled the boys and girls of his school to marry one another, whether they had been interviewed by Cnpit or not, and charged them a good round fee for granting the license. The honorable member stated that the attention of the Board had been called to each case, but they had done nothing.

Reps. Rycroft, Richards and Bond concurred in the opinion that the incidents mentioned did not alter the necessity of passing the sections under discussion. No action was taken, however, up to the hour of recess 11:05 p. m.

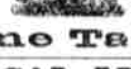

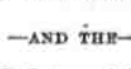
