PEACE IN MOSQUITO.

Government in Charge of Americans-- Ceremonies at Bluefields.

NEW ORLEANS, November 9.--The steamer John Wilson, which arrived here last night from Bluefields, Nicaragua, brings news of the happy ending of the recent troubles there. General Cabeza, who is in command of the district, has removed martial law, which has prevailed ever since the rising of the Mosquito Indians on October 28th. The Government, which was chosen October 28th, and which includes several Americans, was installed with considerable pomp. General Cabeza presided, and nearly all the Americans in the colony were present. The Government building was decorated with the American and Nicaraguan flags, and harmony prevailed between the people who were so lately on unfriendly terms.

Two Americans, one of them David Ingram, son of the late political prisoner, were appointed in the Council of Government. Another American was made alcalde, or judge, and three Americans were appointed to the Municipal Council of the town of Bluefields. The Americans took oath to obey the laws of Nicaragua.

In honor of the event the day was made a public holiday, and the rejoicing was kept up for three days. The settlement of difficulties was received with much satisfaction by the Americans in Bluefields, who are the dominant influence there. The terms practically acknowledge sovereignty of Nicaragua over the country, but Nicaragua concedes the right of local government and practically places the Americans in charge of the Government. The situation is regarded as so satisfactory that most of the refugees have returned to Bluefields.

ARRESTED FOR ARSON.
J. P. Bowen Gets Into a Serious Predicament.

The police secured sufficient evidence yesterday to warrant the arrest of J. P. Bowen for arson. There was a fire in Bowen's residence at Waikiki on Friday night last, and had it not been for the prompt assistance rendered by neighbors the house and its contents would have been entirely consumed. The fire was extinguished and evidence of incendiarism was discovered. Queen Liliuokalani owned the building and Bowen had furniture in the house insured for \$750. Upon investigation by the owner's agent it was found that a fire had been deliberately built under the house. A can of kerosene oil and other combustibles had been inserted through a hole in the floor, and the piece of board cut out replaced and secured with battens. Bowen was seen to leave the house fifteen minutes before the fire broke out, and the work could not have been accomplished in that time.
The following jury was empanelled by Marshal Hitchcock and an inquiry was held Monday afternoon: Charles B. Wilson, Joseph D. Gilman, W. C. Peacock and M. Davis. Upon the jury's verdict the warrant of arrest was issued. A bond of \$2000 was required and the prisoner was unable to secure sufficient surety. He spent the night in jail.

THANKSGIVING DAY.
Church Services and Recreations Out of Doors.

To-morrow, November 29, will be Thanksgiving day. The Government has proclaimed it as a national holiday, and all Government offices and schools will have a vacation for the day. U. S. Minister Willis has requested all Americans sojourning in the Hawaiian Islands to attend Thanksgiving services at the different churches. Rev. Alex. Mackintosh will hold services in St. Andrew's Cathedral at 10 o'clock. Services will also be held in the Methodist hall.
At 8 o'clock there will be a battalion drill on Palace Square, after which the troops will be reviewed by President Dole. The Government band will be in attendance.
At 8:45 o'clock the O. R. & L. Co. will run excursion trains to Pearl City and Ewa plantation at excursion rates. Another train will leave at 1:45 o'clock in the afternoon.
At 2 o'clock in the afternoon will occur the meet of the Honolulu Cycle Race Meet Association at Kapiolani Park.
