CURFEW

The curfew is a law that was made under the Koror Municipal Ordinance No. 1-55. This is only for those who are under eighteen years of age and walk on public roads after 9'Oclock at night, without their parents or other adult who is responsible for them.

Mr. Miner and the police of the minicipality and the District Constabulary are working together in orther to have this law enforced concerning anyone who is under 18 years old. This law was made only here in Koror and it has to be enforce in the area of Koror only.

The curfew was made on April 20, 1955 rat that time Mr. Rudinch was Magistrate and Mr. Heron was a cler.

If they find anybody who is under 18 years old walk on the public road after 9'Oclock they have the power to put them in custody until their parents come to take them.

It is not only for policemen to stop it, because your parents can help it by keeping their children at home aften nine O'clock. And also you people who are under 18 years old, too, can help by being at home by 9'Oclock.
