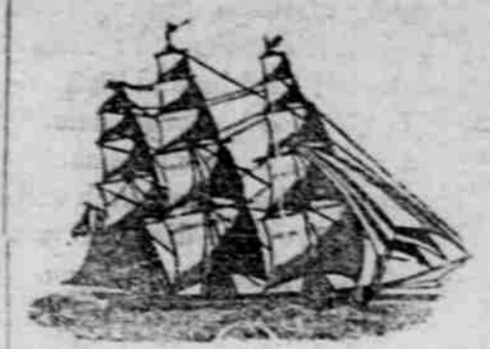

The Love of the Land is Established in Righteousness.

HONOLULU, SEPT. 17, 1894

WHY?

The Advertiser in a very reluctant manner admits that L. A. Thurston has gone as a special labor commissioner. He will spend some days in Washington and then proceed unofficially to Portugal, and then make a tour of Europe.

Why, may we ask, shall the taxpayers of Hawaii pay for the bridal tour of Mr. Thurston? Is it fair that a depressed community shall be taxed to pay for a junketing trip of an impossible official, while a large portion of citizens in Honolulu clamors for water and our friends on the other islands want roads, wharves and bridges. The Republic of Hawaii is cowardly. It did not dare come out openly and tell us that Mr. Thurston left here in a special capacity, although authorized to draw a most luxurious salary and "all expenses paid."

The minister of finance, who is the only honest and decent man in the present cabinet states publicly that retrenchment is absolutely necessary. He tells the councils that the country cannot afford to pay for public works which may be of the greatest importance and we cannot believe that he approves of the expensive journey in search of labor of a man who through his uncouth manners and his pronounced lack of fact is bound to be a failure. Why is Thurston sent to Europe?—Why indeed?

We will not hesitate in answering the question which arises from every throat in this misnamed republic.—

"They want to let him down easy."

Mr. Thurston is impossible in Washington and the executive council knows it—

He is impossible in Hawaii because all hopes of conciliation between the two parties will fall to the ground if the over-rated demagogue is here.—He is impossible as a member of the executive council because Dole and Damon know him of old and the latter realizes the fact that Thurston and he alone, killed the reform party and the 1887 cabinet.

What then could they do with him? As a show of gratitude they decided to let the tax payers of Hawaii put up for a trip around the world.—With a sigh of relief they furnished him with money, letters of credit and letters to all the shop-keepers who call themselves Hawaiian consuls and whose influence is at a par with the one exercised by every peddler in Honolulu.—

We have no objections to get rid of Thurston from Hawaii. But it is a disgrace to find this government squandering its money in supporting a tramps like him in his excursion to countries where he will be ridiculed and where his alleged mission will be more than fruitless.—

We have tried to assist in conciliating the parties now standing at bay against each other.—We should have hailed with pleasure a compromise which honorably could have been accepted by all. We are as always willing to support any staple government in Hawaii which has for its object the progress and true prosperity of our isles.—

But we shall with determination oppose every attempt of the government to rob a treasury already depleted. We shall fight tooth and nail against a legalized swindle that authorizes "Thurstons" mission and we shall beyond doubt frustrate every attempt of the family compact to bring into this country, under vicious and false pretenses men, who even in poverty were happy and to a degree satisfied in their own homes, and who here will find only misery and despair—

The country has a right to ask for an explanation in regard to Thurston's mission. No secrecy is needed or justified. Why did Mr. Dole's republic ship him to those foreign lands? And as the only answer Dole calls "why."

The Oath and the Tiser.

Although we feel somewhat surprised yet we hail the Advertiser editorial of this morning with a deep-felt degree of perfect appreciation. Mr. Armstrong tells us that an oath, and more especially a political oath to a republic, like the one existing under the sway of the present fashionable "Doleres" is of no account whatever and is not a matter of conscience, but of convenience.

The following paragraph proves conclusively the principle under which the government supporting oath-takers work.

"Galileo had a good working conscience when he took, under force, the oath to the church, that the earth was flat, and, at the same time, whispered to his friends, 'It's round, all the same.'"

It is evident that certain foreigners, troubled with a conscience which according to Advertiser ethics is unhealthy have refused to take the oath to the republic and thereby placed the power that be in a sad dilemma.

It is a pity, but it is a fact that three of the most valued teachers of this Fort Street School have refused to be recommissioned on the "swearing" condition. The teachers referred to are women. Among the many blunders of the constitution makers was the demand that women in the employ of the government must take the oath, although no right are granted them besides drawing a paltry salary for which they give value to the utmost limit.

The Advertiser advises these ladies to bury their conscience and take any amount of oaths. Conscience according to Mr. Armstrong is a very elastic affair and the conscience of the majority is far better and of a higher standing than the one of a minority. We adopt his theory. He illustrates it in the following manner:

"It was my conscientious duty to stir up a slave insurrection in Virginia," said old John Brown. "It is my conscientious duty to hang you for it," said the Governor of Virginia. Both consciences were hard at work, but the conscience of the majority had its own way, as it usually does, even if it be quite wrong.

If that is correct then the Advertiser has proven beyond doubt why people troubled with conscientious scruples should not take the oath. The "people" of Hawaii is in the majority. The republic is in the minority. "The conscience of the majority will have its own way," says the Advertiser. "Right you are, Moses," say we, and we are the people.

The concluding lines of the Advertiser editorial is most refreshing as coming from a "Christian" journal. The missionary element must indeed have been eliminated from the editorial room of the Advertiser or the following lines would never have been penned:

If the old martyrs, who were burned at the stake for righteousness sake, were to return to life, some of them would say that the line between conscientiousness and pig-headedness was narrow and very indistinct.

The loss of three teachers from the Fort Street School, will sadly injure the reputation and quality of that establishment. The new brooms of the Board of Education seem to be rotten.

The Chief Justice has ordered the District Magistrate to scan the licenses of the attorneys appearing before them. It is understood that the great Doctor of Yale will refuse a license to practice to every attorney declining to take the oath. The convention settled the question of lawyers in favor of them but Mr. A. F. Judd (the doctor) seems to be above constitutional and legislative measures.

We shall in a near future endeavor to devote sufficient space to the Chief Justice in an attempt of imitating the glowing lines in which our morning contemporary burns triple extracted scum on the altar of Kauka Okolekolea Opa.

WAIKAPU.

There is a pronounced feeling of pleasure among the kamaainas of Waialua district that the old Waikapu plantation again has become the property of the Cornwell family that for more than 32 years have lived and ruled on the beautiful slopes of Maui's most picturesque mountains. W. H. Cornwell has bought the old plantation, in connection with his brother-in-law F. Macfarlane. The genial colonel will once more tread the old grounds and mase Waikapu his home and no body doubts the good results that will fall to him and his partner. The old mill has been demolished and sold. Arrangements will probably be made which will enable Cornwell to dispense with a mill during the next season and have his cane ground at the mills of Spreckelsville. If, in the mean time, sugar goes "up" and the republic goes "down," it is possible that a first class mill will be erected on the old stand. And that mill will be built in Hawaii. The sincerest welcome and the truest expressions of "Aloha, await Mr. Cornwell upon his return to Maui.

A number of mules and horses were landed this morning from an incoming vessel. Who collected the fee due to the "inspectors of animals" of whom a very small number was present?

There is no truth in the statement that Mr. Rewter of Hana has taken the oath to the republic. The correspondent to the Advertiser is a fool or a liar as he must have known that the gentleman in question has been residing in Kauai for several months and only returned to Honolulu yesterday.

Lieutenant Cordes of the mounted Police made a very clever capture yesterday. He procured the arrest of a villainous chinaman who actually sold ten (10) cents worth of cigars in the afternoon of Mr. Cordes' sabbath. The man who bought and presumably smoked the cigars ought to be punished by furnishing a medal to the gallant officer and unequalled Verein detective.

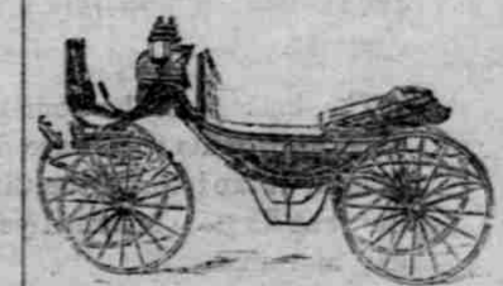
