## The Chinese Bill.

The immigration act that was before the Councils yesterday failed to pass. But there are prospects that at the next meeting the objectionable bill will become law. The committee that has had the bill under consideration has given way to the planters all along and the only point on which a firm fight was made was in regard to the clause that admits the importation of Chinese as "domestic servants." That clause damns the bill because it opens a loop-hole for free immigration. And for that purpose the government favored the retention of the clause in the bill. The country would, if this bill passes, be flooded with Chinese "domestic servants." Mr. W. O. Smith said the other day that the competition of Chinese complained of by our mechanics and storekeepers was not created by "domestic servants." That is nonsense. Nearly all the Chinese store-keepers have been "domestic servants" and there is nothing in the proposed act that can prohibit any "domestic servants" from establishing himself in trade. How is the government going to enforce the clause that provides for the return of Chinese after the contracts have expired? It is commonly stated that a prominent Chinese merchant will leave by the next steamer for China for the purpose of bringing 4000 Chinese "agricultural" laborers to Hawaii. When the contracts of these 4000 men expire and the government tells them to go home it is more than likely that they will say "no" and stay right where they are. Of course the government might try to use force and put them bodily on board the steamer, but even in spite of Colonel Soper's military training (at the lunchtable in the Presidio) the government will find that it has undertaken a pretty tough job. There is one point that our wise men haven't thought of in connection with this matter and that is, that Hawaii in her relation to Japan has assured that country that no large number of Chinese shall be imported to Hawaii. The government will find out, if really, an attempt is made to get 4000 Chinese to come here, that the Japanese government hasn't forgotten the agreement and that it will make things pretty lively for the pro-Chinese p. g. of Hawaii. And we cannot afford to get into more mess and more complications than the "smarties" who run the shop by the grace of Stevens have already brought on this unfortunete country.

## Coercion.

A government official, who does not vote for delegates to the constitutional convention should be discharged according to the *Advertiser*. That is a good instance of the liberal ideas, that this defender of the much boasted Western civilization claims to possess. All officials have taken an oath of office to the p. g. Why they now should be coerced into taking another oath and be forced to go to the ballot box, we cannot see. What's the matter with o. th No. 1? Is that not binding any longer or is the p. g. in such a bad state, that it must have an annual oath from its adherents and officials? The reason is undoubtedly, that the whole crowd feels so sick, because the registration has turned out a gigantic fizzle, and they now want to "kick" at somebody who neglected to swell the meagre list of

voters. Who are the officials by the way who refused to register? Are they not mostly to be found among the judges, and if so, how is the government going to "fire" them before their term is up. By all means, bring in a bill authorizing the dismissals of judges—and start in from the very top. Nothing is sacred to the p. g.—except the contents of their pockets.

## The Best Man.

The loyalists of course do not take any active part in the coming election to a constitutional convention. Nevertheless, it is of general interest to see that there will be some men in the convention, that cannot be led by the missionaries and planters, who of course will have the majority. Of the Honolulu delegates, there are a few who might be considered fairly representative of the community. Judge Robertson will, of course, be elected by the use of an accumulated vote and the two Portuguese candidates will go in, in a similar manner. There are three more candidates, and we consider it good policy for those not pledged to R. Vivas or Fernandez to gather around the best man and elect him by an accumulative vote. Mr. H. Klemme seems the most independent and most liberal of the candidates. He is representing the German colony and he is distinctly anti-missionary. It is safe to state that he will watch the interests of the working classes and fight against all attempts to fill the constitution with missionary nonsense like prohibition and old-fashioned Sunday laws. Messrs. King, Ables and C. L. Carter may all be very nice and competent men, but their business is so closely connected with the capitalists and planters that it cannot be presumed that they will take an independent stand. Let all those who desire to see some fairness in the convention cast six votes for Klemme. Although we don't bother about the convention or recognize its work we believe in seeing one man there at least who has his heart in the right spot.

## Help Cassius Or I Sink!

Such the cry of the Hawaiian provisional government. The handful of usurpers who possessed themselves of the government of the Hawaiian Islands through the connivance of the American minister and the interference of the naval power of the United States, find that hardly a thousand people cannot govern 79,000 without the latter's consent. They know that their power is destroyed as soon as the American flag protects them no longer and continues to sustain the despotism which they have established over the immense majority of the people of those islands. The only hope for them is annexation. In that case they think that they may keep the Hawaiians in subjection and sustain their present ill-gotten power.

That matters would turn out this way we have predicted months ago. We then stated that if the United States should withdraw their forces, stop their interference, respect the independence of the Hawaiian Islands as they are treaty bound to do, and especially to restore self government to their inhabitants, that the provisional government would not last a day.

We think that it should not be the policy of the United States to first upset a foreign government with which we are at peace, establish a new Government representing a very small minority of the people, and use our armed force to keep that minority in power—for the latter will have to be done if the present provisional government is going to continue. The people of Hawaii, natives as well as the majority of the whites, evidently are against the provisional government. The best thing, therefore, would be to instruct Minister Willis to embark on the whole provisional government on one of our ships and bring it over to the United States for safe keeping. It is our creation and we should take care of it before restoring self-government to the people of those islands.—*Washington Sentinel*.

## In the Swim.

"A niece of Mr. E. M. Lees, Mrs. Alice C. Jordan, formerly of this place, for the last 13 years residing in Honolulu, S. I., in a letter of March 4, to her uncle here, refers to the political situation in the islands as follows: 'We are very peaceful and quiet here, but the government is on the alert. At present there are a number of strangers, mostly Canadians, who have come down in the last two or three steamers who are being closely watched. They are not seeking work, and they talk against the government. The government have pretty definite information that these men are here for no good purpose, but are biding their time to get up a revolution. They are presumably hired by some one, but whom? I think, however, that they will be checkmated, as laws has been passed against these aliens, who have been designated the "Queen's Guard." We shall be very glad when the United States decide what they mean to do with regard to these islands. It would be a prey to all sorts of filibusters. The persistent manner in which Cleveland's sympathisers stick to the lies about Mr. Stevens, is truly astonishing to ourselves who are right on the spot all the time and know what lies they are. We know that we are right, and the right is sure to win in the end.'—*Connecticut Paper*."

That scheme has been tried in some places—and always failed, and under the peculiar circumstances in Hawaii it would prove worse than a failure. Why, the women cannot run a Feast of Nations without getting into the wool of each other and if they ever get a chance to meddle in politics it would simply be—There is politics enough in this country—a great deal too much for the size of it, but if ever the doors are opened to let the ladies—God bless them—into the voting booths the situation would be unbearable. Let them stick to picnics, tea parties, dinners, high-teas, Feast of Nations, prayer-meetings and moon light-flirting, but don't make life miserable to the men by letting them find political women at their homes when they look for rest. The exhibition of the letter writing p. g. women since the revolution has effectually proven their unfitness for dabbling in politics, and nobody has recognized that fact more than the p. g. men.
