**Vaquero Horsemanship.**  
 In the days when I was a cowboy in  
 Old Mexico the vaqueros knew how  
 to ride. Those fellows who go around  
 with wild west shows can't ride a little  
 bit. See one of them lean out of his  
 saddle to pick up something on the

 the ground as the horse lopes by. The

The demand for the ADVERTISER has been steadily increasing of late, requiring the issue of increased editions. We print to-day 1020 copies to meet the demand for the foreign mail, Wednesday's and Thursday's large editions having been exhausted.

TRIAL BY JURY.

The abrupt and unexpected termination of the first trial of Robert Wilcox for conspiracy on Wednesday, has been as mortifying as it is unfortunate. Having been the first occasion when a juryman has taken the liberty to act the role of a lawyer, and to air his sentiments in a trial before the Supreme Court, it devolved on the Judge to act promptly and establish a precedent for similar cases, should they occur again.

This event seems to illustrate the imperfection of our present system of what may be termed a race jury, the only example of the kind that is known to exist. There would be just as much sense in having a Chinese jury to try Chinese, a Portuguese jury to try Portuguese, and so on, as a Hawaiian jury to try Hawaiians. This practice is not known elsewhere that we are aware of; certainly not in Tahiti, or Fiji, New Zealand or Australia, nor in any American or European country, where mixed races exist.

The system appears to have been established by the early legislators of this Kingdom, without precedent, so far as is known. The question has been often asked, whether it is wise to continue a practice which is so liable to engender race animosities? The result of Wednesday's experience would seem to indicate that it will be better to return to the practice of other countries, and have mixed juries for all trials, or what would be still better, to have all cases tried and decided by the Judges, with the right to appeal from one to a full bench.

NEWS SUMMARY.

Since our last news summary of September 27th the State trials of persons implicated in the insurrection of July 30th last, have occupied a very large share of public attention.

The first trial of consequence was that of Albert Loomens, a Belgian, on a charge of treason; and the chief witnesses called by the prosecution were two of the most active ring-leaders of the movement. The evidence of these witnesses, who it is understood turned King's evidence, tended to show that the misguided rioters expected that the King was favorable to the movement, but were disappointed in not receiving any aid from him when the time of action arrived. Loomens was brought in guilty by a foreign (white) jury, and his sentence has been deferred. Ho Fon, a Chinaman, was then tried for conspiracy, and a verdict was also rendered against him. A few of the rioters pleaded guilty, but no sentences against any whose cases have been heard, have yet been given.

R. W. Wilcox, the chief and principal offender in the conspiracy, has his trial pending; and for the past three days evidence has been received against him before the Supreme Court and a Hawaiian jury; but on Wednesday last, the third day of the trial, a jurymen expressed bias before the Court and the jury was dismissed. Never before have Hawaiian courts been called upon to deal with such perplexing State trials, and the end is not yet.

The Oahu Railway is now finished to deep water on the South-East Loch, or basin, of Pearl Harbor; and trains will be ready to run the entire distance to this point, seven miles, by to-morrow. The track is being laid with rails at the rate of nearly half a mile per day, and since the ties have been received in sufficient

quantity the rapidity of track laying has been very great.

The new Volcano road is now constructed nearly to the Half-way House, and great energy is being displayed in pushing to completion and substantially building this great and important national highway. There remains only about seventeen miles of this road to construct.

About two weeks ago a canal was commenced to be made which will connect the Waiakea and Waiolama rivers near Hilo. This will be the first canal ever made on the Islands, and is expected to be finished early next year.

The U. S. S. Nipsic was safely launched from the Honolulu Marine Railway about the early part of the present month. She is substantially repaired, and much satisfaction is expressed by all parties concerned.

Regarding amusements, the past two weeks have been very lively. There have been circus and theatrical performances, balls, yachting parties and social gatherings of all kinds in abundance and of the most fashionable kind. An agreeable visit to the Islands by royal tourists added considerably to the entertainments given, both in zest and number.

The health of the Islands continues good, and business of all kinds is active.

At present there are four American war-vessels in Honolulu harbor, viz.: Nipsic, Alert, Mohican and Iroquois. The latter vessel was about four weeks in reaching this port, and arrived on the 14th inst., followed by the arrival on the same day of the U. S. S. Mohican from South America. H. B. M. S. Espiegle is also in port.

A Remonstrance.

MR. EDITOR: In a recent issue of the Bulletin appeared an article signed "Echo," containing several criticisms, one of which reflected severely upon the teachers recently placed here by the Board of Education. As to their alleged incompetency or "greenness" as the writer puts it, we may say that in accepting them for the positions, the Board recognized in their diplomas from the California State Normal School sufficient evidence of their ability to do the work.

As for visiting other schools which "Echo" regards as positive proof of their unfitness, they were acting under the instructions of the Board, and following a custom sanctioned in the most progressive parts of the United States.

It is certainly an injustice to cast reproach upon the conduct of these or any people before their work is fairly begun. The hospitably inclined of the district cannot but deplore that such an unkindness has been offered to strangers.

DISTRICT JUDGE OF HONOKAA.

MR. EDITOR: For the last six months it has been generally understood in this district that the "District Justice" Mr. J. P. Mian would have to resign his position which unfortunately he has had to do on the 15th inst., not from any fault of his but from protracted illness. Mr. Mian has always been a favorite and especially so amongst the foreigners, the question has often come up lately amongst those interested as to who could be got to fill his place; but no satisfactory selection could be made from amongst the natives, (it was always understood a native should be appointed). But within the last week applicants have sprung up like "Jonah's gourd" almost in a night, and it is surprising how many of our fellow citizens suddenly find themselves endowed with sufficient wisdom to dispense justice to their fellow men. Few of them could tell the difference between a case of crim. con. and high treason, in fact some of them know more about the price of codfish than they do about the Penal Code. However, out of so much wisdom it is to be presumed that the judges of the Supreme Court, will be able to make a wise selection.

ROBERT W. WILCOX,

The Leader in the Late Insurrection.

The subject of this sketch was born at Ulupalakua on Maui in the year 1855, and is consequently 34 years of age. His father William Wilcox, was an American, a carpenter by trade, and was for many years in the employ of the late Captain James Makee, who about that date introduced a colony of farmers and tradesmen, and located them on and around his plantation. Young Wilcox received the best education obtainable in those days, and soon after arriving at age was nominated and elected as representative from Ulupalakua to the national legislature, in which he became a favorite of Mr. Gibson, who was then becoming prominent in politics.

At the close of the legislative session, he was selected with several Hawaiian youths, to be educated abroad. He and Robert Boyd were sent to Italy, one to receive a military and the other a naval education. If we remember rightly, they were sent in care of Mr. Moreno, of whom we shall have something to say in future. During Wilcox's absence of five or six years, he acquired a fair knowledge of military tactics and engineering, and became conversant with the Italian and French languages. On the accession of the Reform Government he and the other Hawaiian youths abroad were recalled, and he arrived here early in 1888, accompanied with his bride, who was the daughter of an officer in the Italian army. She has always been spoken of by those who know her, as an educated and accomplished lady.

Finding no employment here, Mr. and Mrs. Wilcox returned to San Francisco early in 1888, and remained for some months, she finally leaving her husband and returning to her father's family in Italy, where she is now. One child was born to them, which she took home. Shortly after his wife left him, he returned here, and opened an office in King street, as a land surveyor, but met with very poor success. He made his home with the Princess Liliuokalani.

Early in the present year, he turned his attention to politics, and endeavored to work up some plan for overthrowing the present government, many of the better class of natives and half whites advising him not to undertake it, and refusing to advance money for this purpose. He, however, succeeded in securing the co-operation of a few natives of the lower class, together with a few half whites who had been in the employ of the government, and for various reasons had been dismissed. His crowd was mostly composed of the ignorant and disaffected, without money, position or ability, and the result was just what might have been expected—a complete failure. It is somewhat singular that all the Hawaiian youths sent abroad to be educated, about the same time with Wilcox, have proved failures. Had they been assigned to learn trades like young Grube in Boston, most undoubtedly their training abroad would have fitted them to fill useful positions at home. But ornamental and military education is wholly unsuited for Hawaiians.

Mr. Wilcox having been arrested as concerned in the insurrection of July 30th, was first charged with treason. Before the trial came on this week, the indictment was changed to conspiracy, and is still pending in the courts. The change was made, we understand, for the reason, that owing to the state of feeling among the natives, there was more chance of his conviction on the latter charge than on that of treason, which is a capital offense.

The portrait at the head of this column was engraved by Mr. F. Ollert, of this city, from a photograph taken while Wilcox was in Italy, and shows him in his cadet uniform.




