THE OPIUM SEIZURES.

When a passion gets a hold upon any considerable portion of the human race it seldom ever lets go that hold, whether it be the craving for alcohol, for opium or for the indulgence of other passions. If some licensed medium is established through which the passion may be gratified with the sanction of law, the majority of those who are addicted to it will repair thereto because it is the easiest way to minister to the insatiable craving; for degraded humanity will invariably avail itself of the readiest means at hand. There are three courses open to the constituted authorities in regard to these matters. They may let the whole thing alone, in which case the evil will become rampant and undisguised; they may grant licenses for the supply of the poison under specific conditions, which generally have the effect of concentrating the evil for the most part where the eye of the law is upon it and where it can therefore be controlled with greater facility; or they can prohibit absolutely. The result of this latter course has generally been to distribute the evil in all manner of places where it is least suspected. Thus, when the demand for opium, which has assumed such marvellous proportions considering the limited extent of this community, was supplied through a known medium, and although the number of persons afflicted with "the disease for which opium is the proper remedy" was so large as to create well grounded incredulity, yet the supply mostly came through one channel, and the cases of illicit possession were less numerous than in the days of prohibition. Now that the old order of things has returned opium seizures are as numerous as ever, and does any reasonable man suppose that the cases which are brought to light are all that exist. On the contrary, it is much more probable that they form only a small percentage. Whilst we do not uphold the opium law of 1886, we still contend that the broad principle of license is better calculated to abate the evil than prohibition. We, however, incline to the belief that the remedy of the future will lie in antidotes which will eradicate these enslaving passions.

THE JOHN D. SPRECKELS.
She Goes on the Rocks While Entering the Golden Gate.

Captain Potter of the Ferris S. Thompson brings news of a mishap to the brigantine John D. Spreckels while entering the Golden Gate. On the morning of the 26th of April, about 3 o'clock, the Spreckels was entering the Golden Gate with a good breeze. When at Fort Point the wind suddenly left her and the ebb tide drifted her on to the Mile rocks. She laid there twenty minutes when a little harbor tug passing by hooked on to the Spreckels and offered to tow her in for \$200. She was not powerful enough to battle with the tide and let go. The passengers on the Spreckels (who included Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Jackson and child and Miss Winter, all of Kahului) were transferred to the tug, while the John D. Spreckels drifted out to sea in a sinking condition. She set signals of distress and the steamer Queen of the Pacific coming in at the time saw them and took the Spreckels in tow. Half way down the tug Relief met the vessels and towed the Spreckels to the wharf. A steam pump was set to work and the water was pumped out of her. Five feet of water was found in the hold. Captain Potter says he thinks half the cargo would be saved and that the brigantine did not receive much injury. The Spreckels had on board a full cargo of sugar from Kahului.

TWO DAYS LATER NEWS.

The Bark F. S. Thompson Brings Dates of April 25th and 26th.

Yesterday afternoon the bark Ferris S. Thompson, Captain Potter, arrived from San Francisco, after a good run of fourteen days, bringing two days later news than the Australia. Following is a summary:

Gladstone Voted Down.

A dispatch from London, April 25th, says: In the Commons to-day, on a motion for a second reading of the Irish County Government bill, a spirited debate took place, and Sir Charles Lewis, Conservative, and others contended that the bill was incorrectly framed and had been introduced at a wrong time. Gladstone said, to do Ireland justice, the proper method of amending public business was to commence not with local but with central institutions. Balfour opposed the bill, and said as long as the present acute controversy existed Parliament could not extend local government to Ireland. Lord Randolph Churchill said the Government in 1886 pledged themselves to extend local liberty to Ireland. That pledge was the foundation of the Union party and the only platform upon which they could resist repeal. Chamberlain said he was opposed to the bill because Irish and English local government questions could not be dealt with in the same Act. The bill was rejected by 282 to 195.

German Affairs.

A dispatch from Berlin, April 25th, says: The Emperor passed a good night. His fever was lower and his condition satisfactory. He rose at 9 o'clock this morning. He felt refreshed after his night's rest and enjoyed two cups of tea and a few light cakes. The Crown Prince visited the Emperor at 4 o'clock, and afterward the Crown Princess paid him a long visit.

Queen Victoria arrived at Berlin on April 25th at 8:45, coming direct from Munich. The Crown Prince gave his arm to the Queen, assisted her to alight from the car and escorted her to the carriage. The Queen bowed to the select few who were permitted to remain on the platform. The stairs were carpeted and decked with flowers. The meeting between the Emperor and the Queen was particularly touching. He rose early and went to the salon to meet her. As she entered he rose and bowed gravely, but made no attempt to speak. The Queen was deeply affected by the mute welcome. The Emperor withdrew to his apartments after a brief interval.

Queen Victoria made another visit to the Emperor on April 25th. It was the annual day of prayer and repentance, and the Imperial family attended divine service in the castle chapel at Charlottenburg. After service Queen Victoria received the staff of the British Embassy, and later gave an audience of an hour to Prince Bismarck.

Miscellaneous.

President Carnot, accompanied by members of his Cabinet, left Paris on a tour of the south of France on April 25th. He was cordially welcomed at the depots along his route. At Vierzon the Prefect expressed the confidence of the inhabitants in President Carnot's patriotism and devotion to the Republic. Much enthusiasm was manifested by the people of Laisant and Michelin.

The Duke of Cambridge, Commander-in-Chief of the British forces, was examined before a select committee of Parliament on April 25th. He said that 11,000 additional men were required to place the army on a sound footing. He thought it was impossible to reduce the military estimates, because, with army volunteers, it was necessary to make the service attractive. In Germany this was not necessary, because military service was compulsory. He further expressed great dissatisfaction with the equipment and armament of the forts.

The steamer Catalonia, loaded with John L. Sullivan, arrived in Boston April 24th. On the arrival of the steamer the pugilist was taken aboard a tugboat and brought to the city, and was driven up town amid the cheers and salutations of hundreds who had congregated on the wharf. John L. Sullivan has issued a challenge to fight any man in the world in a sixteen-foot ring, London prize-ring or Marquis of Queensberry rules, for \$10,000 a side, Kilrain or Mitchell preferred.

Judge Samuel D. Lecompte died April 24th at Kansas City at the age of 74. He served as Chief Justice of the Territory of Kansas from 1854 until the admission of the Territory into the Union. He presided over the first Constitutional Convention held at Leocompton.

Three thousand shoemakers are on strike in Berlin.

The creditors of Colonel Mapleson have accepted the offer of 25 per cent.

The conviction of Jasper D. Pyne, M. P., under the Crimes Act, has been set aside.

Doctors Mackenzie and Hovell have brought libel suits against the Cologne "Gazette" and "Kreuz Zeitung."

An emigration movement from the Western Highlands to Canada has been started by Lord Lothian.

The Hamburg dock laborers have struck for higher wages.

General Boulanger has issued invitations to a political dinner.

Count Herbert Bismarck has been appointed Minister of State.

Teaching as a Makeshift.

Any man thinks he can teach school. The college boy teaches in the intervals of his vacation to bring in a little money, or makes a pastime of it for a year or two after he gets his diploma, and while he is deciding upon a profession. The man who can do nothing else feels that he can always fall back upon teaching. It is no disparagement to the many able and conscientious instructors to say that there is a large number of incompetents in the profession, men and women who are not qualified either by natural gifts or training for their work, who, while they may have the technical knowledge required, lack entirely—and this is the worst of all—that warmth of nature that would enable them to kindle the sacred fire of pure aspiration in the breasts of the children under their care. They have nothing in them, and so they give nothing out.

How many teachers there are of this type—empty as drums. You knock at the door of the soul, and get nothing but sound back for your pains. In some respects the teacher is invested with a graver responsibility than the preacher. These young minds are so many fresh tablets on which the first impressions of life are to be written down. What shall they be? Shall they make for intellectual, and above all moral growth, for generosity, nobility, manliness and womanliness, or shall they enslave the soul as well as the mind, and leave the better part of both inert? It is largely in the teacher's power to say. There is a responsibility to make the conscientious men tremble at times, and yet how many men there are who set about teaching with as little thought as other men set about sawing wood.—New York Tribune.

The Use of Novels.

The use of reading is to lighten the load of life and to open vistas of thought which otherwise would be closed to us. Nobody who has any sense wants to go to school again and "stodge" himself with mere information. There are, of course, persons who yearn to learn the names of the kings of Judah in their proper order, and to hear how blacking is made; but they are no better for it when they have acquired the knowledge, even if (as often happens) they are not seized with a distressing desire to impart it to their fellow creatures. It has been whispered to me by persons moving in intellectual circles that the effect of even "the higher culture" is not necessarily exhilarating. It may improve the mind without improving the man, and as a companion in fact it often leaves him duller than it found him, because he has been educated beyond his wits. The mind of man is very curious and cannot be catered for without one's inquiring into its character.

What makes me laugh in my sleeve is to see the fury into which preachers and teachers and lecturers all lash themselves because nine out of ten will persist in taking fiction out of the lending libraries instead of "improving literature." It seems to be quite inexplicable to most of them, though some, I see, attribute it to original sin. In connection with this subject it is pleasant, but by no means surprising to those who are really acquainted with it, to learn that Darwin was a devourer of novels. After middle life he lost his taste for music, painting and even poetry. "On the other hand," he writes, "novels, which are works of imagination—and even those which have nothing remarkable about them—have for some years afforded me prodigious relaxation and pleasure, and I often bless the race of novelists. A large number of novels have been read aloud to me, and I love them all, even if they are only middling, especially if they end well. A law ought to be passed prohibiting them to end badly."—Independent.

Russian Fondness for Display.

There is no people on earth so fond of display as the Russians. The imperial family sets the example with the money wrung from the poor, the princes and nobles follow, and of course the private citizens must keep up the fashion. Their hospitality is proverbial. It is their greatest pride. Strangers are always entertained in the most lavish manner, and one who carries to Petersburg or Moscow letters of introduction from influential people, is sure to be wine and dined as long as he remains.

But behind all this ostentatious display is practiced an economy which the people try to conceal as if they were ashamed of it. The private portions of the gorgeous homes, the living rooms, are usually plain and comfortable, and the cost of a dinner party is sufficient to keep the family for a month or more. It is so in all the royal residences. The show rooms are gorgeous but the living rooms do not keep up the standard. They are plain and poor enough to make a fair average. The ladies of the ordinary household have their party and dinner dresses from Paris, but the garments in which they appear when not on dress parade are made by their own servants at home—always plain and often shabby.—William Eleroy Curtis.

History of the Bean.

The common bean was cultivated by the ancient Egyptians, but their priests regarded it as "unclean." The Old Testament mentions the bean, twice, and it is certain that the Hebrews knew of its existence at least 1,600 years B. C. The ancient inhabitants of Switzerland and of Italy, in the age of bronze, cultivated a small fruited variety of this plant. It was also known to the ancient Greeks and to the ancient Latins, and it grew wild in northern Africa in the days of Pliny. The first cultivation of the bean is prehistoric. It was probably introduced into Europe, says De Candolle, by the western Aryans (Celts and Slavs) at the times of their earliest migrations. A century before the Christian era it went into China, and still later into Japan, and only recently into India. There were probably two places where it grew wild before cultivation—south of the Caspian sea and the north of Africa. The bean would long ago have become extinct had not man cultivated it.—Good Housekeeping.

Itemizing the Little Expenses.

"It is a good thing to keep an account of your small expenses," ex-Minister John Bigelow once said to an acquaintance, as he entered an item in his note book. His listener smiled at the remark, but took it to heart. In recently telling the story of his experience he said that, up to that time, he had never thought of the amount it cost him annually for cigars and drinks and treats and other sundries. He began to itemize the cost daily. He was amazed at the end of the year when he footed up the sum at \$750. A change was wrought in him. He determined that, for the next year, he would keep such expenses down to one-third of the sum in question. "And now," he said, "within ten years I have profited by Mr. Bigelow's advice to the amount of \$5,000, which I have handed over to my wife to keep for hard times. And I have not become mean, either."—New York Sun.

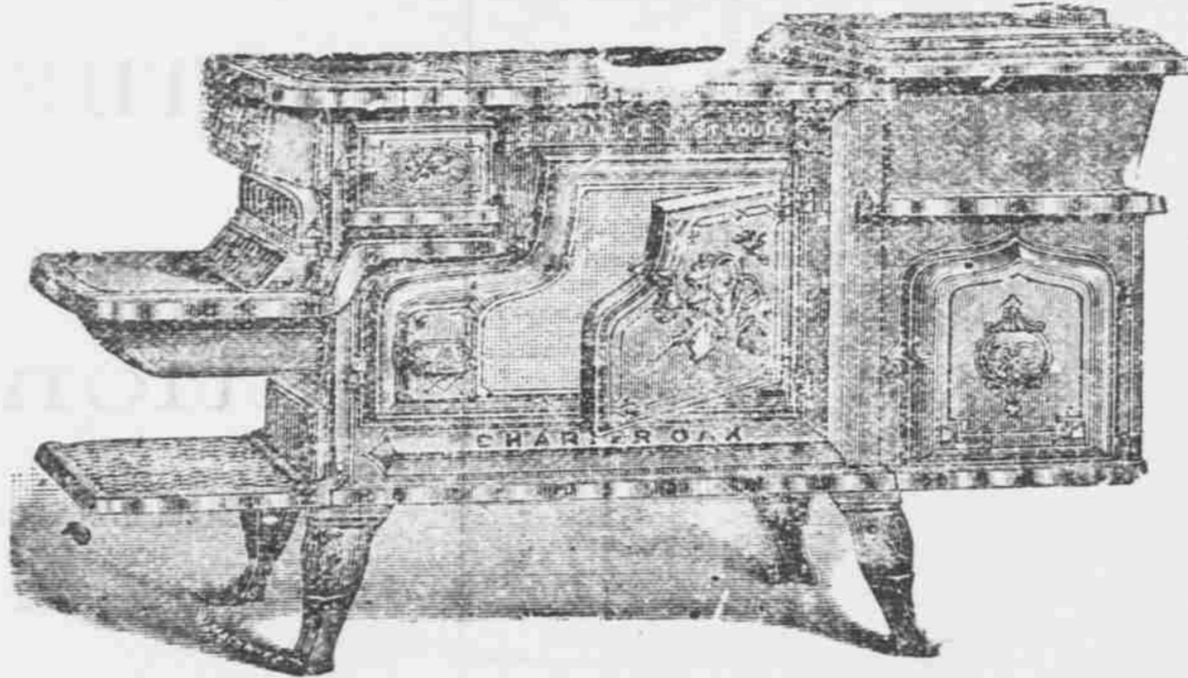
