THE "BULLETIN" LIBEL CASE.

Walter Hill, editor of the BULLETIN, was arrested on Wednesday afternoon, on a charge of libel. Bail was fixed as \$100, which amount was handed over at once, and the editor allowed his liberty.

The case came up in the Police Court yesterday afternoon. The alleged libel was contained in an article published in the BULLETIN on the first day of March, relating to the arrest of a Chinaman for cruelty to animals. The arrested person was represented at "Yim Quon, a rice planter at Kailua, Koolau," and Man Chip, manager for a Yim Quon, brought the action. Mr. V. V. Ashford appeared for the plaintiff and Mr. Charles Creighton for the defendant.

The prosecution held that the article in question was damaging to Yim Quon, a rice planter and Merchant. The particulars given respecting the arrest, condition of animals, etc. were admitted, but Yim Quon was not the guilty party. The animals did not belong to him, and he is now in China, where he has been for some time past.

The defence maintained that no reference was made or intended in the article to the Yim Quon in China, represented here by his manager, Man Chip, but to the man in charge of the mules, who on the day following the arrest was arraigned in the Police Court by the name of Ah Hee, pleaded guilty, and was sent to jail. The man was called Yim Quon because the reporter was informed by another Chinaman that such was his name. The defendant was not aware until the day prior to his arrest, when the case was being prepared for court, that a wrong name, as alleged, had been used. Had he been informed of it, he would have cheerfully and promptly made the correction, as a matter of common justice.

His Honor did not think he would be justified in putting the country to the expense of sending the defendant up to be tried by jury, and therefore discharged him.

WANTED A GUARANTEE.

The whaling captain referred to yesterday as "so near to and yet so far from his wife," was an object of much gossip among his fellow men this morning. "Yes," said the captain, "I am paying \$9 a day for the privilege of looking at my wife from a distance" (laughter and remarks of "you ought to be thankful that you have that much privilege"). "Why don't you take her on board ship?" queried a friend. "I suggested that to the Board of Health," replied the captain, "and was willing to give my word of honor that I would not communicate with the shore. But they wanted me to give a written guarantee, which I could not do, as the vessel might be blown ashore, and I cannot guarantee against accidents." (Here many opinions were expressed and it was generally conceded that the captain would not be blamed if he violated the guarantee through an accident of shipwreck or the like). "Well, it's pretty tough, anyhow," murmured the captain, "pretty tough."

THE SUGAR PROBLEM.

The interest taken in the investigation of the sugar trust in New York appears to have been intensified by rumors that Claus Spreckels of this coast was about to start an opposition to the great monopoly. This would be good news for consumers if it were true; but there is no reason to believe that Mr. Spreckels contemplates anything of the kind. He has two wars of his own on hand, one with the American refinery and the other with people who ought to grow beets and want unless he guarantees them against all loss and surrenders to them all the profit; and belligerent as he may be—he is a man of whom it may be said, as was said of Sosie, that the vigor of his arm perishes when it is at rest—these two little controversies are sufficient to engross his attention. When the time comes that his product of beet sugar renders his

alliance desirable for the trust it will probably be considered.  
The sugar problem grows more interesting every day. It is now quite clear that unless the Eastern trust can in some way control production in Europe, as well as here, its monopoly of the American market might any day be overthrown by a repeal of the sugar duties. Under the stimulus of bounties, the sugar production of Germany has reached phenomenal figures. It has doubled since 1880. In 1875 Germany exported, in round figures, 44,000,000 pounds of sugar, raw and refined; in 1885, the total exports of both kinds reached the enormous figure of 1,161,000,000 pounds. The increased production of sugar in Germany caused by the bounty system led to its adoption by France, Belgium, Austria, Russia and other countries; in all the countries of Continental Europe, in fact sugar-making has been so artificially stimulated that the amount of sugar grown in the world—exclusive of China and South America, from which there are no returns—in the year 1887 was about 6,000,000 tons, as against about 3,000,000 tons in 1877. Of course consumption has not kept pace with this unnatural development. The statisticians report that the consumption per capita has increased in this country from 36 pounds to 53 pounds, in England from 66 pounds to 74 pounds, in Germany from 12 to 17, in France from 15 to 24. But this increase, large as it seems, did not dispose of the surplus stock; and the consequence was that, until the trust was formed, the course of prices was steadily downward.

Now the trust proposes to put up the price of sugar by closing down a given number of refineries; and this it does just at the moment when so level-headed a man as Claus Spreckels says that he sees his way to add a thousand million tons of sugar to the world's annual supply by developing the beet-sugar industry in California. Simultaneously representatives of the sugar interest in England to devise a scheme to abolish the bounty system altogether. It will be interesting to watch if the Sugar Convention can devise a plan by which the sugar bounties can be abolished without involving the ruin of the refineries and beet plantations which were started on the strength of their adoption.

A little paragraph appeared in the telegraphic news the other day to the effect that Mr. Rockefeller of the Standard Oil Trust had been invited to take charge of the Sugar Trust and to extend its sphere so as to embrace the whole world. The story possesses some plausibility. No sugar corner can be permanent unless it includes Germany, which is now a larger sugar producer than Cuba. Whether Mr. Rockefeller's hand can be discerned behind the movers in the Sugar Convention in London it would be quite interesting to ascertain.—[S. F. Call.

THE PERFECT WOMAN.

If any woman wishes to know whether she is a perfect specimen of her sex she has only to apply the rules laid down for ascertaining the fact and figure on the results. First, as to height, tastes differ, but the Median Venus is five feet five inches in height, and this is held by many sculptors and artists to be the most admirable stature for a woman. As for coloring and shape, here is the code laid down by the Arabs, who say that a woman should have these things: Black—Hair, eyebrows, lashes and pupils. White—Skin, teeth and globe of the eye. Red—Tongue, lips and cheeks. Round—Head, neck, arms, ankles and waist. Long—Back, fingers, arms and limbs. Large—Forehead, eyes and lips. Narrow—Eyebrows, nose and feet. Small—Ears, bust and hands.

For a woman five feet five, 138 pounds is the proper weight, and if she be well formed she can stand another ten pounds without greatly showing it. When her arms are extended she should measure from tip of middle finger to tip of middle finger just five feet five, exactly her own height. The length of her hand should be just a tenth of that, and her foot just a seventh, and the diameter of her chest a fifth. From her thighs to the ground she should measure just what she measures from the thighs to the top of the head. The knee should come exactly midway between the thigh and the heel. The distance from the elbow to the middle finger should be the same as the distance from the elbow to the middle of the chest. From the top of the head to the chin should be just the length of the foot, and there should be the same distance between the chin and the armpits. A woman of this height should measure twenty-four inches about the waist and thirty-four inches about the bust if measured from under the arms, and forty-three if over them. The upper arm should measure thirteen inches and the wrist six. The calf of the leg should measure fourteen and one-half inches, the thigh twenty-five and the ankle eight. There is another system of measurement which says that the distance

twice around the thumb should go once around the wrist; twice around the wrist once around the throat; twice around the throat once around the waist, and so on; but the first are the measures used by sculptors who have gained them by measurements of the Greek statues.—[N. Y. World.
